Dear Falkner Swamp Siblings in Christ,

The late prophetic pastor Rev. William Sloane Coffin Jr. preached in an Easter sermon, “God knows it continues to look like a Good Friday world. What makes the Good Friday story so devastating is that it is still so shockingly true.”

Craven disciples, fickle followers, and calculating politicians were not new in Jesus’ time and are not a surprise now. What is new today are the massive and abrupt changes taking place in our top levels of government, which cause chaos and disruption for thousands of people across the country. The effects will weaken our society, through lost scientific research and the inability to solve problems with large programs like social security and Medicaid, to name a few. These changes are then championed with gleeful announcements on social media by those who are elected and those who are not. The constitutionality of many of these actions will be challenged to protect the common good, and yet it’s not clear the highest office in the land will be held to the rule of law.

The dissonance of Good Friday is the chasm between the kingdom of God and the kingdoms of this world. Which makes the coming dawn of Easter a brave calling to Christians.

Sister Joan Chittester reminds us what Easter is really all about:

*Easter is raw reality. Easter stands in stark witness, not to the meaning of death, but to the meaning of what it is to go on despite death, in the face of death – because of death. To celebrate Easter means to stand in the light of the empty tomb and decide what to do next. Until we come to realize that, we stand to misread the meaning not simply of the Easter gospel but of our own lives. We miss the point. We make Easter an historical event rather than a life-changing commitment. ...*

*If Jesus is risen, then you and I have no choice but to go into the tomb, put on the leftover garments ourselves, and follow Jesus back to Galilee where the poor cry for food and the sick beg to be taken to the pool and the blind wait for the spittle on their eyes to dry. All the fidelity in the world will not substitute for leaving the tomb and beginning the journey all over again. Today. Every day. Always. ... Yes, Easter is about dazzling light – but only if it shines through us.*

I keep my secret still.

Fools! For I also had my hour;  
One far fierce hour and sweet:

Chesterton captures Palm Sunday from the perspective of the donkey that Jesus rode.

## Lenten Worship 2025

Our Lent series is called “Everything (in) Between,” following some of the more well-known stories and parables in Luke’s gospel.

From the creators of this thoughtful series from Sanctified Art:

*Beginning with Jesus setting his face toward Jerusalem (Luke 9:51), the series flows through several familiar stories—the Good Samaritan, the fruitless fig tree, the Lost Sheep, Zacchaeus, and more. Many of these stories are well-known in both sacred and secular imagination, carrying cultural relevance and lore. For example, The “Good Samaritan” title alone could reference a hospital, a charitable organization, a type of law, or a good deed. Perhaps you grew up singing “Zacchaeus was a wee little man” in Sunday School. So many of these scriptures hold significance in pop culture, church history, politics, and everything in between.*

*Each weekly sub-theme explores two supposed binaries, like “faith & works” or “rest & growth,” or “grief & hope.” We often consider these ideas to be opposing. However, as we explore these concepts within the scriptures, we find nuance and complexity. We find that these dichotomies are false. We might begin to see a full spectrum instead of black and white. We might find that God is present in between.*

*And so, this season, we invite you to look beyond black and white binaries and easy answers. We encourage you to notice the dichotomies that define our lives, but also imagine where God might be meeting us beyond the categories we create.*

### DO YOU HAVE A NEED?

Have you ever thought, *“I wish I knew someone who could help me with ...? It’s not especially hard, I just can’t do it by myself anymore.”* It’s critical to know that each of us is not alone — to feel the strength of being part of a church family that cares deeply for each of our members and friends. That not only wishes each other well, but says we’d like to **help** you if we can!

Do you need a picture hung? ...help cleaning out the refrigerator? ...help with shopping? ...have things you’ve wanted to take to Goodwill, or Liberty Thrift, or ... just need some help with carrying items out to a vehicle which will then take it away for you? Do YOU personally need transportation for shopping or an appointment?

We are hoping to put together a list of “tasks a/o jobs” that need doing; and a list of “those who are able to help” with various tasks or jobs. Please call Mary Ann between 1 and 5 p.m. on weekdays. If you get the answering machine, please leave your name and phone number, a good time to have your call returned and state your need briefly. If you feel more comfortable just leaving your name and phone number, we can discuss your need when I call you back.

### CAN YOU HELP?

There is an old Beatles’ song with the refrain, “I get by with a little help from my friends.” Can you be one of those friends?

Do you have some free time where you can lend a hand? We are “making a list and checking it twice” to help some of our family and friends at Falkner Swamp live their lives a little easier.

Can you hang pictures? ...help clean out a refrigerator or freezer? ...take someone to the grocery store, drug store, shopping, or an appointment? ...move some furniture? ...empty out a closet or switch things from a high shelf to somewhere it will be easier to access? ... change a lightbulb?

Can you spare some time to assist someone who just can’t do “it” by themselves anymore? Would you make yourself available for an hour or two a week? ...or a month? ...occasionally, but not on a steady basis? ...maybe, but only on a certain day, or during certain hours?

We’re not asking for a lifetime commitment, but your assistance could be a lifeline to someone who needs occasional help and doesn’t know where to turn to ask for that help.

We don’t want to post a list and have people calling with their requests, for some, that’s just too “public.” Our idea is to have one contact person (Mary Ann Erb) who (hopefully) can make contact with those who have a need and those who can help.

This is a new venture. The idea was presented to the Consistory and received the approval with “yes, please.” Now, we’d like to try to do our best to be the “friend” that someone needs.
