### Dear Friends,

After months of nurturing our spring-time baby chicks, we got a surprise. One Saturday morning I heard Barry call from the kitchen, "It's a double-yolker!"Sure enough, the sunny-side up egg in the frying pan looked like a bright yellow figure eight, revealing two yolks from one egg. From no eggs at all to two yolks in one – surprise!

A couple days later our neighbor, who we've given some eggs to from our newly-laying pullets – that's like a tween-aged chicken – texted us a picture of *her* frying pan, with "Congratulations on your wonderful eggs! First one was a lucky double!"

Our family is new to backyard free-range chickens. So I did what anyone would do when faced with the unknown: I googled. "Why does a chicken lay a double-yolker?" and learned that pullets – those adolescent hens – while firing up their egg production, can overproduce for a bit before settling into a



regular one-yolk, one-egg pattern. Sure enough, within a couple more weeks, the hen's system calmed down to release one yolk per egg like her backyard companions.

After months of nurturing those chicks we got this fun surprise. The profligate wonder of new life emerges, often out of dry, parched places. The dry places of life are before us, in the physical as well as the spiritual realm.

Our scripture readings from the lectionary cycle for Sundays in October speak to this ongoing reality. The prophet Joel offers a vision of God who will quench those parched places: "... be glad and rejoice in the LORD your God; ... he has poured down for you abundant rain ..." (2:23) and "...I will pour out my spirit on all flesh..." (2:28).

As Jesus travels with his disciples, the Gospel of Luke reveals dry places that spring forth with surprising ways that God shows up in people's lives. Out of ten lepers who are healed by Jesus, one returns to give thanks (Luke 17:16); a hardened judge gives justice to a persistent widow (18:5); one thought by self-righteous folks to be beyond God's reach sees himself for who he really is and comes closer to genuine peace (18:13).

Ancient characters and settings yes, but the unfolding drama is often the same then as now. In our personal lives and the collective life we share as a community, a nation, and as a global speck among an expanding universe, the dry places will be watered by God's ever-present love and forgiveness that is available to us all.

God will quench our parched spirits with tumbling waters, these stories of faithful people remind us. Autumn approaches with the land closing down for a season. Our spirits may feel like it, too. All the more reason to come together, and experience the surprise of God.



### **Update from the Cemetery Committee**

1 Bob Erb Sr is planning to retire from mowing the Falkner Swamp Cemetery (adjacent to the New Hanover Fire Company). This will be effective as soon as a new mower is purchased.

2 Rob Erb Jr will take over mowing the Falkner Swamp Cemetery, and Shelby Erb Gey will replace her dad in mowing the Hollowbush Cemetery and Church grounds.

3 The Grasshopper mower has seen better days, is a slower moving mower, and doesn't maneuver well around tombstones. For this reason, both cemeteries have been mowed with the eXmark for the past few years, with Rob driving back and forth on Swamp Pike to move the mower. We are looking to trade the Grasshopper in on a new zero turn eXmark mower from Passmore. The new mower's cost is approximately \$5000, and it will be housed in the shed at the church, and the eXmark will stay where it is, in the block shed at the F S cemetery. This will eliminate the need to drive down Swamp Pike to mow, and then drive back up Swamp Pike to put the mower away. I think everyone agrees on how dangerous Swamp Pike can be, and the lives of our mowers aren't worth risking on the highway when the mowers can each be housed at the respective cemeteries they are cutting.


4 These changes will take place as soon as we purchase the new mower (funds are available in the cemetery funds, it is not coming out of the church budget.)

5 We want to thank everyone who volunteered their time to trim the Falkner Swamp Cemetery. We are hoping to finish out 2019 with the volunteers, and then fall back and regroup during the winter months, checking our options.

6 Last but not least: we have scheduled a Cemetery Work Day for Saturday, November 2<sup>nd</sup>, at this time I am uncertain if the workday will include work in and around the church, but we will definitely be working outdoors at both cemeteries. We've also lined up Nov. 9<sup>th</sup> in case of inclement weather. Jobs include cleaning the gazebo, a grave to be cleaned up, topsoil dressing and grass seed over an area where a pile of dirt was moved, leaning tombstones, and the inevitable need to trim.

We plan to have a physical meeting of the cemetery committee, but I don't see that happening until at least November.
