Congratulations to Jill McDonald, 2022 Jennie Award Winner

Jill McDonald grew up in Red Creek, NY, with a population of 632, where she volunteered at the town library, was a girl scout, newspaper editor, played soccer and was a Sunday school teacher.

She married a military officer a week before nursing school graduation and began the life of a military spouse. During her husband's first deployment she worked as a nurse at her Alma Mater, mentoring and tutoring students.

At home she was involved in church activities, especially those for infants and preschool children and their mothers. She led the way in expanding the babysitting service for preschoolers to a twice weekly six-hour service where children could play and be cared for while affording respite for the mothers. She became active in PTA, volunteered at school and became a soccer mom.

In 1978, her husband rotated to Seoul, Korea. Jill was appalled that military families there had no on base childcare options. She met with commanders and gained approval to investigate the problem. She sought space and funding, developed operating and hiring procedures and sought equipment sources. Near the end of her 3rd year in the country, Jill had established two full-time day-care centers, enlarged a part time preschool and a third center was under construction.

In 1981, when Jill was employed as a part time Registered Nurse, her family was named a "Great American Family" primarily based on their efforts in Korea. Seeking to validate this honor locally, Jill answered an ad for a supervisor of the 50+ volunteers at Army Community Service (ACS). She became acutely aware that a major problem facing the relocating spouses was employment. Jill envisioned a program to assist the spouses in gaining local employment. Program Development Implementation Funds were awarded to ACS Fort Monmouth based on the already established volunteer program. Over the years, Jill expanded the program offering workshops, training, Job Fairs and became the Subject Matter Expert for the Department of the Army. She mentored new managers from other bases and shared her materials, teamed with other military services to write desk guides, and saw the program become available to spouses around the world as a Congressionally mandated core program with the Department of Defense, now known as Employment Readiness Program. She is especially proud of the Summer Youth Volunteer Program that she created and operated for 16 years to prepare teens for the "World of Work" through volunteer service.

In 2014 she was recipient of the NJSFWC Cecelia Gaines Holland Award, the highest honor that can be bestowed upon a New Jersey clubwoman for outstanding civic work.

Since she retired Jill has focused her energy on assisting elderly neighbors and friends, improving the quality of life for soldiers, veterans, their families and the children and alumni at Girard College.

Jill is called the Cookie Lady, not just for the cookies she makes for friends, but she bakes, packages and provides 100 cookies twice a week for a lunch program for the needy and provides cookies for a variety of community and charity events.

A Rhode Island native, Mary Pat joined the Matawan Junior Woman's Club (NJ) in 1978 when her husband was transferred to New York City. She served as GFWC NJ Director of Junior Clubs 1994-1996 and as State President 2006-2008. During her term as State President, her special project was support for NJ's 21 Domestic Violence Shelters, during which monetary and in-kind donations totaled \$607,433.15.

She has served on the GFWC Board of Directors on the Bylaws Committee (two administrations, one as Chairman); the Resolutions Committee, Membership Committee, Communications Committee and as the Meetings and Convention Chairman.

In addition to Federation obligations, she is serving a two-year term as Secretary for her Florida community's HOA and as a consultant to the Architectural Review Committee, which she previously chaired for five years. She worked for 11 years for Central Jersey Blood Center, first as Donor Recruitment Manager, then as Special Projects Manager.

A widow, Mary Pat has a son in TX and a daughter in suburban DC, two grandsons and four granddaughters. She divides her time between her home on Hutchinson Island, Florida, and an apartment in New Jersey. Operation Cuddly Comfort Dolls - Woman's Club of Pt. Pleasant As told by Mary Kay Tokar

Our project began approximately four years ago, after reading about a similar project online. We envisioned it becoming a sort of signature project for our club. Several members had family members with Alzheimer's and Dementia.

We called the project Operation Cuddly Comfort. The club voted for a starting fund for the project, and since then, the rest has been raised through donations. The club fundraises for this separately because some members feared it would detract from our scholarship and other charitable project funds.

The dolls are free to Alzheimer and dementia patients throughout Ocean County.

Members researched dolls and desired characteristics for the doll, even buying and returning several. It had to look lifelike, be a good size, not too heavy, soft, and most of all - open and close eyes. Research suggested that dolls whose eyes stayed open, patients often thought they were dead.

After a doll was settled on, we initially bought them full price from Amazon. Eventually, we contacted the company and arranged to purchase them wholesale, approximately for half price. In the beginning, all the dolls were white, however, now we purchase black dolls, and are waiting for the Hispanic style to be available. Dolls are purchased by the case.

Since the dolls all come dressed alike, we purchase doll clothes and redress them, so they look unique. Each doll also gets a blanket, sometimes crocheted by members, and sometimes made from purchased fleece. The dolls are dressed, swaddled in the blanket and tied with a ribbon. Some are dressed as girls, some as boys. We hold dressing day, and members get together to dress and swaddle the dolls.



When the project first began, pre-covid, members would deliver the dolls in person. We would contact a facility, determine how many dolls they could use, and arrange a delivery date. When the patients were presented with the dolls, members spent time asking for a name, etc. Each patient received a birth certificate for the doll, with the name they chose. The certificates stated the dolls were a gift from the Woman's Club of Pt Pleasant. One facility even arranged a Delivery Day party with balloons and cake.



What a joy to present the dolls, and see their reactions. Patients often treated the dolls as real. Talking to them, singing to them, rocking them, hugging them and sometimes crying. Many of us had tears in our eyes as well. Since Covid, we no longer can do in person delivery. Club members contact the facility for the number of dolls needed, and arrange to drop off the dolls in the parking lot. Not quite the same, but it still works.

Funds are raised in a variety of ways. Some members have asked family for a donation in lieu of birthday or Christmas gifts. One member did a Facebook donation collection for her birthday. After the death of a members' Aunt, who had Alzheimer's, and had one of our dolls, some members of the family chose to donate to the project in lieu of flowers. At fairs, donations are collected in a jar. A member holds a doll, and when passers-by do a double take, and say they thought it was real; it provides an opening to talk about the project saying the Alzheimer patients thought they were real as well.

When the member first gave a doll to her aunt, her uncle was very skeptical and said just one more thing for him to pick up, etc. Later he reached out and contacted her, and said he was wrong, the doll was an important thing to her aunt and comforted her tremendously. Members of the club, are grateful for the recognition they have received for this project, and hope will be able to continue for many years to come, bringing some joy to those suffering from this disease.

GFWC Hollidaysburg Area Women’s Club, sponsored an outreach project that focuses on young children with developmental needs. The project: “START SMALL” – An Early Intervention Project, Instruction for Children with Development Needs from Age Birth to Three Years, was sponsored by their Education and Libraries CSP. Fifty toys and books were purchased and donated to the North Star Support Office where the Early Intervention service providers taught parents and care givers how to use the items to enhance development.

Two clubwomen delivered 50 items valued at \$300 for this early intervention. The toys and books were dispersed to children ages birth to 3 years who receive developmental support. The club's gifts will allow for these items to remain in homes when the instructor is not there. Without this gift, the children would have limited access to these types of developmental, interactive books and toys. This project will have a profound impact on the children and their families.



All the toys and books were labeled to identify that the gift was provided by the club and included their Facebook and website information. Included with each gift was a flyer explaining the developmental aspects of the toy/book, and the club's mission. The agency for Early Intervention in their county handled the distribution of the instructional materials.

The flyer accompanying each book and toy included the following message: *GFWC Hollidaysburg Area Women's Club Education Committee supports education at all times in life. We hope this gift will help build skills in your baby and a relationship with you as you play together! The mission of the GFWC Hollidaysburg Area Women's Club is to develop the educational, civic, and social interests of its members, to advance the welfare of the community, and to promote the progress and work of the General Federation of Women's Clubs.*

Descriptions for each developmental area accompanied each toy:

Fine Motor- All that block-grasping and put & take play helps strengthen your baby's hand-eye coordination and dexterity.

Problem Solving- Babies will exercise their problem-solving skills as they figure out how to sort & drop the blocks in the correct spots.

Curiosity & Wonder- All the bright colors and fun shapes help to engage your baby's natural sense of curiosity during playtime.

A flyer accompanying the books encouraged and stressed the importance of reading and interacting with their children at an early age. The special time spent reading together promotes bonding, builds relationships, develops an appreciation for art and writing, and aids in language development. It was also emphasized that a child's brain develops fastest up to age 5.
