No Longer Trusting Our Eyes

The book of Judges has a very interesting ending that gives a strong warning for how to live life. The context of Judges shares the start of life in the Promised Land. One will study in the book of Exodus the Jewish people being led by Moses to the Promised Land. Then study in the book of Joshua about how the Israelites moved into the Promised Land. The Lord shared the command to take over every part of the land, but the Israelites fail to do that.

Early in the book of Judges the death of Joshua is recorded. Right after he died the Israelites were in an identity crisis that they should not have been in. When Joshua was alive, they served the Lord (Judge 2:7). The Israelites were faithful to the promise they made to the Lord in Exodus 24:3. They promised to obey everything the Lord commanded.

But that changed quickly. A generation later, the Israelites "did what was evil in the sight of the Lord and served the Baals" (Joshua 2:11). Then the Lord sent for them judges to rule over them. There were twelve judges to lead the Israelites. They were not perfect people who always did the right thing. They led Israel by following the Lord, but they made lots of mistakes during that time because they were affected by sin as well as everyone else.

The saddest account of the lives of the judges is how the book of Judges concludes. "In those days there was no king in Israel. Everyone did what was right in his own eyes" (Judges 21:25). This passage is a powerful look into the life of the Israelites. Everyone looked to themselves as the final authority on life. They felt as though they never had to submit to the will of anyone else or that they should never serve anyone else. They believed that they were always right, no matter the subject.

This is a verse that we need to look at as we look in the mirror. At times we are faithful to the Lord. We passionately desire to serve Lord and we willingly submit to His commands in our lives. Other times, we want to be God. In these moments of life we attempt to rework the Lord's commandments to make sure we get what we want. We seek to manipulate the Lord into doing what we think is the best.

In those moments we are doing what is best for ourselves in our own eyes. We are not living under the power and authority of the gospel, the redeeming work of Jesus Christ. Instead, we are seeking to glorify ourselves. We are not to trust our eyes because they will lead us astray. We are called to trust in the Lord with all of our hearts (Proverbs 3:5-6), to walk by faith and not by sight (2 Corinthians 5:7), and to submit to the Lord (Job 22:21-25). Let us daily refocus upon the Lord by reading the Word, praying, and seeking to live in fellowship with the Body of Christ. Let us walk by faith and not by the sight of this world
