Academy X High School is located in a thriving suburban city approximately 25 miles northeast of New York City in Westchester County. The suburban population of close to 50,000 is reflective of the rich racial, ethnic and socioeconomic diversity of the community, including a significant number of immigrant families whose children will be the first to attend college in the United States.

OUR SCHOOL

Academy X High School, accredited by the New York State Board of Regents and the Middle States Association, is a four-year public school (9-12) serving the (your) community.
