



DISCUS DIARIES BY GENE HARRIS NORWALK AQUARIUM SOCIETY PART 3

It's now April 15, 1997 so this segment is on the 'taxing' matter of water changes. Water changes are an essential part of aquarium maintenance. The rationale for water changes varies from one aquarist to another but essentially they remove Nitrates and solid fish waste, while at the same time replenishing and freshening the water. If they are removing Ammonia and Nitrites I would say the biological filtration being used is inadequate. Live plants will consume some Nitrates but water changes are a better method to rid them from the tank. Too many Nitrates will grow a single cell plant you may not want to grow algae!

Discus are notorious for demanding high quality water. The usual logic is that they need very soft, very warm, acidic water with up to 90% water changes daily. As you may recall this wild caught discus were acclimated in central Connecticut municipal water which I suspect is not much different than my southern Connecticut municipal water. My four discus are still doing very well and don't have the time or resources to set up automated massive water changes. There are no plans to 'invest' in reverse osmosis equipment. However, my fish do get 25% water changes about twice a week. I use a

siphon hose and vacuum the gravel which covers the undergravel filter.

For the first few weeks I was aerating sitting water for 24 hours to remove chlorine and then preheating it before adding it the The NEC Convention was last weekend and I bought a box of Wardley "Chlor out." This serves to rid both chlorine and chloramine which is chlorine and ammonia chemically bonded. I don't have chloramine in my tap, but there has been measurable chlorine. decided not to be a purist anymore and have succumb to using this chemical water treatment Rose doesn't like the Besides. aeration buckets cluttering the upstairs, and since the discus tank is a living room display tank I have had to concede to quick water changes.

Water changes with my Python hose system does work but has it's drawbacks. The siphon force is not as good for gravel cleaning as is the low tech siphon hose power by gravity and water pressure. Also, return flow of the Python results in chlorine water going direct into the tank. At this point buckets of warm water treated with Chlor out will be my method of water change.

Getting back to the fish, the one discus with tan eyes continues to dominant the group of four. The others frequently show their nine vertical lines which I take as stress and/or submissive signaling. The tan eye one rarely shows any vertical lines which I take to believe is his/her dominance coloration. There are times when tan eyes and the more prominent of the red eyes seem to be bonding as a pair. Although these four fish have scuffles, I've never seen a noticeable wound or split fin on any of them.

One oddity I noticed recently was a female green swordtail (Xiphophorus helleri) late in stage of pregnancy making attack runs on the discus. about brave! The ladies peck at the sides of the discus and try to push them around. The male swords and the non-pregnant ladies have never shown this behavior. I believe the sword must foresee the discus as predatory threats to her future babies. Swords have always been on the lower IQ end of the fish intelligence scale in my book. Perhaps they 'think' more than I previously realized.

The 55 gallon tank now also contains a fine finnage small white/gold angelfish which is good company for the 5 black angels. I added a small pleco for algae control on this southern window exposed aquarium.

AVOID STRESS, AVOID DISEASE

Strange as it may seem, YOU are responsible for most of the disease problems that may crop up in your tank. In this article we'll explore my reasons for saying that and what you can do to avoid diseases in both fresh water and marine tanks.

It's important to realize that healthy fish do not come down with the common ailments normally encountered aguariums. Healthy fish shrug off parasites such as "ich" and Cryptocarion. Hole-in-the-head, bacterial infections of most kinds are uncommon in the wild as is Head and Lateral Line Erosion (HLLE) among marine fishes. These and other diseases strike captive fishes because they are already weakened by stress; their natural defenses are already lowered.

Stress among fishes has many causes and it requires a bit of education and a lot of vigilance to know what to do to prevent it. Foremost among these reasons, from what my tours on CompuServe's Fishnet Urgent Care Section as Duty Officer indicate to me, is poor water quality. Many tanks are underfiltered because aquarists go by manufacturers' ratings, never stopping to think that a filter with a full load of media runs slower debris and slower still as

rule of thumb in this regard is filter turnover should equal 10 times tank | comes in. Read up on the fish capacity in gallons per hour. Another point to remember here is that small, frequent, water changes remove and dilute more dissolved organic wastes and chemicals given off by the fish themselves (such as growth- and reproduction-inhibiting pheromones) than do large, less frequent, changes.

pH, salinity and temperature should be matched to what the fish have evolved for. Many fish are bred for market in water that is far harder and more alkaline than what their wild brethren are used to but. without knowing the origin of your fish, it's better to match it to their original habitat. Generally, this will result in brighter colors and more willingness to spawn. Salinity, or more accurately specific gravity, for marine fishes, should be between 1.024 and 1.026, despite many texts recommending lower readings "to prevent disease". Such advice actually causes stress-related illness.

Another cause of stress is mixing incompatible fishes—such as fast-swimming fish with sedentary

ones or fishes with vastly differing food or water requirements such as goldfish with tropicals. Mixing highly territorial fishes, such as cichlids, with insufficient territories is another common cause of stress,

accumulates in the filter. A good one common to marine tanks as well. Here's where the education before you buy

> them, avoid impulse purchases no matter how enticing.

Lighting and sudden movements near the tank are stress causes that are often overlooked. Be sure there's either daylight or a room light on before the tank's lights come on and a lamp lit when they go off. Sudden transitions from dark to light or vice versa can cause panic reactions in fish, causing them to crash into tank walls ornaments, injuring themselves. Sudden movements can cause the same panic. In addition to the physical damage these can cause, the affected fish release "fright pheromones" that are sensed by all the tank's inhabitants, and these may linger until the next water change.

Another cause of stress is improper diet. This mostly is seen where a tank contains a mix of vegetarians and

carnivores but only one staple diet food is fed. A steady diet of freeze-dried foods can also create problems, as these are generally nutritionally complete. not Overfeeding and resulting tank pollution cause stress long before it ends up fostering bacterial blooms.

How you prevent and treat disease also affects the stress level of your tank's inhabitants. All new arrivals should be quarantined for three weeks. The cost of one small additional tank is miniscule compared to the

cost of replacing the main tank's inhabitants. While in quarantine, new fish should not be medicated but rather closely observed for signs of disease. If a disease is discovered. should it appropriately treated and the fish kept in quarantine for additional week after treatment. A quick word here regarding copper-based medications for

either fresh water or marine: Don't use it. Copper has been shown to cause organ damage to fishes and its use certainly raises their stress levels.

Treat appropriately. Do not switch treatments in midcourse because the treatment doesn't seem to be working and the plants. never indiscriminately treat which can lead to medicationresistant organisms.Remember that viral diseases cannot be treated, which includes HLLE, so don't dump medications into a tank with a virus problem and hope for a cure. In the case of viral infections, eliminate the causes of stress and in many instances the fish will recover on

their own.

Quarantine plants also. These don't need a tank. A kitty litter tray with water and an airstone will do fine. Add potassium permanganate to the water to kill any worms, or other parasites that may be riding on

As you can see, there are many causes of stress in an aquarium, a lot more, actually, than I've touched on here. Faithful adherence to good fishkeeping practices can go a long way to reducing the stress levels in your tanks and keeping your fish healthy. Short-cuts are an invitation to disaster.

MAGGOTS!

MY GENE HARRIS NORWALK AQUARIUM SOCIETY

Now that I have your attention, this article is about a live fish food - yes, maggots! Maggots are house fly larvae. They are not expensive. Most any garbage can with some spoiled uncooked meat and warm weather will result in maggots. Just plain garbage can result in maggots, but meat seems to be the key. I started using them as fish food about 2 years ago after a long night of heavy rain. When I went out to move the garbage cans to the curb, I noticed movement in the cans and in fact all other the lid. These small, white 'worms' are averse to light and excessive water. They flee for their lives when exposed to light, but will risk coming out into the light if threatened with drowning. This is ideal maggot harvesting conditions. I took the lid off the cans and the underside was loaded with even more maggots, perhaps hundreds of them. They are generally less than ½ inch in size,

mostly white/gray with a dark spot on one tip. They can move surprisingly fast. I took the lid quickly into the house and dipped it into an African cichlid tank. The fish ate them with vigor, although as with any live food, there is some apprehension from the fish when they initially realize that what they just put into their move is moving. One thing to consider is the size of the maggot versus the mouth capacity of your fish. Obviously, a school of cardinal tetras cannot bite or swallow maggots. I have fed them to angelfish, swordtails and even discus without adverse results. I have not done any scientific studies of the composition of maggots, bt they appear to be protein based. they loaded with bacteria and viruses, well I don't know? None of my fish developed any disease or death as result of eating maggots, in fact I think it may have induced spawning! My fish always seem very happy to get this treat and the seize and attack response is a posi-

tive development for cichlids to exercise from time to time. No matter how many varied types of flake or frozen food fish may get, the benefits of occasional live foods are high. When adding the maggots to your tank, avoid getting any of the meat or oily waste into your water, just the maggots will do. A small stick or old, and no longer used, butter knife will do nicely to scrap the maggots One last word into the tank. about maggots, your spouse/ mate may not appreciate the benefits of live maggots coming into the house to be fed to your fish. Maggot feedings are best done under the cover of night or when the spouse is still asleep in the morning!


