RESIDENT OF THE MONTH

Geneva Seagraves Brady has lived all but 8 of her 94 years in or very close to Pleasant Hill. Her considerable family of two remaining children, 13 grandchildren, 23 great grandchildren, and 1 great, great grandchild always received a crocheted handmade item for holidays until her failing eyesight prevented this. Geneva Seagraves was born on January 29, 1925 delivered at home with the assistance of Dr. May Cravath Wharton, the Doctor Woman of the Cumberlands. Her childhood home was on Arthur Seagraves Rd. now called Glade Creek Rd. on the fringe of Pleasant Hill. She was a student at the Pleasant Hill Academy. As a single parent, Geneva and her five children farmed their land just in front of Smith's Chapel Cemetery near Pleasant Hill for several years selling in 1979 and moving to Main Street in Pleasant Hill. In Crossville, she worked at the Cumberland County Medical Center and became the Personnel Manager of Crossville Rubber for 22 years, retiring in 1988. Geneva and her children loved camping and fishing visiting the Smokies often. Pleasant Hill was the fortunate recipient of many of her volunteer hours at the Nursing Home, the PH Community Church, Uplands Village, Neighbors Together Food Bank, and with the Pioneer Hall Museum for 18 years many of them as Assistant Curator. When The Grab thrift store building in the old water treatment plant was condemned in 2003, she was instrumental in gathering a group of concerned citizens who found a place to reopen this historically valuable community resource. They have even named a storage shed "The Brady Barn".

INTRODUCING ONE OF OUR NEW COUNCIL MEMBERS

Don Dowdey is the retired Dean of Library and Information Technologies at Sul Ross State University in Alpine, TX. Sul Ross is a small Hispanic-serving institution near Big Bend National Park. In that position, he served on the University's Strategic Planning and Budget Committees and served on the Dean's Council. He is a graduate of Texas Christian University (BA), the University of Kansas (MA), and Catholic University (MLS). Before beginning his Library Career, Don worked as a community organizer, worked in a pool hall, and managed a restaurant. He also taught English Composition and Lit for several years as an adjunct professor.

Don and his wife Marilyn Brady, a retired History Professor, moved to Pleasant Hill in 2015. He has served on the Board of the Shalom Center for Continuing Education and is Vice-President of the Pleasant Hill Historical Society. A member of the Wharton Association, he has led the Silent Auction for three years, worked in Trash and Treasure, and helped start a Music and Memory Program for Wharton Homes. DID YOU KNOW?

The Pleasant Hill Community House on Main Street was built with two stories. The second floor was accessed from an outside stairway and the custodian's family lived there. The second story was removed in 1953 during renovations. The Pleasant Hill Community Church, UCC held services there from 1934 until moving across Church Drive in 1959.
