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Nominate Your Horse for Year End Awards

Don't forget to nominate your horse for the 2023 Year End Awards Program. We look forward to an active year of dressage and eventing.

There are only two steps to qualify for the IaDCTA Year End Awards.

First be a member! Second– nominate your horse before you start showing!

Log into the IaDCTA website IaDCTA.org with your membership name and password. Then click the Nomination button at the top. You can nominate your horse in any of the disciplines listed – dressage, western dressage, sporthorse, or horse trials. Each nomination costs \$15. Scores can be easily submitted through an online portal beginning this summer. PLEASE NOTE: You must nominate your horse prior to receiving a score that will be submitted for year end awards.

Virtual Ride A Test with "R" Judge Heather Stalker April 24, 2023

Heather is a United States Equestrian Federation (USEF) R (Registered) Dressage judge as well as an R Western Dressage judge. She is currently involved in the USDF/USEF Dressage Judges "S" training program. Judging highlights include officiating at the 2021 Arabian Sport Horse Nationals, the 2021 National Dressage Pony Cup, the 2019 Morgan Grand National Championships and at the 2020 and 2022 Western Dressage Association of America (WDAA) World shows. She has also had the opportunity to judge the Caribbean Equestrian Association Championships in 2020, as well as to judge internationally in Trinidad and Jamaica in the past. She actively judges both dressage shows and horse trials in Florida.

Heather is an amateur dressage competitor and has ridden through the Grand Prix level, earning her bronze, silver and gold medals from the United States Dressage Federation (USDF). As an amateur rider, she earned the 2011 national championship at Grand Prix and the reserve national championship at Intermediare 2 and Intermediare 1, as well as numerous regional championships at all levels competing on Arabians that she has owned and trained. She further was awarded the reserve year end high point honors at Prix St. Georges in the amateur and vintage categories against all competitors in 2018.

Members should email their information to Rhea at cello2002@hotmail.com, including the You Tube link for their video, name, phone number for text message, and what test they are doing. If you want to use a Google drive link, dropbox, etc that is also OK. Sometimes You Tube wants to strip the music off of Musical Freestyles due to copyright issues, if that is an issue we can use another app. Rhea will also be at the Spring Ahead show if you want me to download your file to my computer.

Rhea will check and make sure the link works, and send info to Heather.

Heather will be judging/commenting on tests the last week of April, and will send the paper forms back to Rhea (I'll give her a Priority Mail envelope, so we will get them promptly).

Rhea will scan the paper tests and email to each participant and forward the text message with the recorded oral comments to each participant.

Tests may be submitted from now-April 24. You are welcome to record at the Spring Ahead show and send your ride for additional comments and inputs.

The videos do not need to be done in an actual dressage arena, but should be in an area approximately the size of an arena with something to mark the letters. Record from "C," if possible. The first test is free for members. For nonmembers, the cost is \$15 per test. If members wish to do more than one test, the cost for additional tests is \$15 per test. Payment can be mailed to Nena or made via PayPal.

Designated hours will be posted at the show office for use of the warm-up area and show arena. Riding on the show grounds prior to or after the posted designated times is by permission only.

The release/waiver form must be signed by riders and/or their parents in a form acceptable to <u>laDCTA</u>.

Warm up area- No children are allowed in the warmup area that are not entered in the show. Competing children in the warmup area must be accompanied by their parent (or designated responsible adult). No jumping of horses in the warmup area.

www.is open to any interested individual. Membership/Horse nomination application may be submitted with entry. For safety reasons all mounted riders and handlers are required to wear an ASTM approved safety helmet with harness

fastened and boots with heels.

Ask the Judge Questions about Dressage With Amy McElroy

Amy McElroy is an FEI competitor, and a USEF S judge. She is qualified to officiate at any USEF recognized national show at all dressage levels. She rides, trains and teaches at Fair Lane Farm in Aiken and judges between 15 and 20 dressage and eventing shows

Dear Amy,

I am planning to compete with my horse at Training Level Test Three and First Level Test One this season. I noticed that there have been some changes in the new 2023 versions of these tests and I am hoping you can answer some questions about them.

First, I am curious why the trot serpentine in Training Three was replaced with a "loop"? I am also wondering what is the correct way to ride this movement. Another question: how do you know which posting diagonal to be on? Can you be penalized, or get an error, if you are not on the correct one? What about when you are trotting across the diagonal? Are there any other changes for these two tests that I should know about? I would appreciate your guidance.

Signed, Ready for 2023

Dear Ready,

You have some very good questions and I would be happy to share information about these tests. First, let's look at the new patterns in the 2023 Training Level Test Three. Test Three has many changes and improvements, and it is clearer than the 2019 version that it replaces. It is also a shorter test, although the recommended ride time is the same 5 minutes, and 30 seconds, it has two fewer scoring boxes, 13 as opposed to 15.

Let's begin with the purpose of the test. You can find this stated on the top left-hand corner of your test sheet and it is always important to keep it in mind. The purpose of the 2023 test is "To confirm that the horse demonstrates correct basics, by showing suppleness both laterally and longitudinally, moving freely forward in a clear rhythm with a steady tempo, and readily accepting contact with the bit. Correct geometry and lines of travel should be shown." This test introduces two new movements: a shallow trot loop and a canter-to-trot transition on the diagonal. There are new directives for the free walk, which now includes the word "overtrack." In other words, your horse's hind hooves step should clearly be stepping over the print made by his front hooves. This is true for any test where the free walk is asked for, but this is a clearer description than we have had.

To answer your question regarding replacing the trot serpentine with the trot shallow loop, I understand this was done for several reasons. Prior to the 2019 test, Training Three also required a trot shallow loop. It was replaced in 2019 by the three-loop serpentine in an attempt to help riders because there was often confusion over the correct geometry for the shallow loop, as well as how to execute a correct bend throughout the pattern. Unfortunately, riders were still having difficulties with the bend and geometry in the three-loop serpentine. I also understand it was too tricky to fit in all three loops when the test was ridden in the small arena (20 meters by 40 meters) as opposed to the full-sized arena (20 meters by 60 meters.) So here we are back to the shallow loop, redesigned to be clearer and simpler to ride correctly. This movement directs you to leave the track slightly after the first long side letter, trot to X, then return to the track slightly before the last letter on the long side. It is performed in both directions and has a coefficient of two, meaning that the score is counted twice each time.

What is important in the shallow loop is to show clear changes of bend on a curved line. For example, if tracking left, slightly after H, you begin a single loop through X, developing your horse's bend to the right as you leave the track. Maintain the right bend until you return to the track slightly before K, at which point you change your bend back to the left. At Training Level you may do the trot work either in rising or sitting.

If you choose to post, what diagonal is required? You might be surprised to learn that there is not a required posting diagonal for judging purposes. Your judge will not be focusing on this aspect of your ride, and there would not be any deduction and for sure not an error if you were not on a specific diagonal. In fact, the posting diagonal would never warrant an error: The only time you could receive an error for your rising trot is if the test clearly requires you to be sitting and you are not. What is most important is for your horse to stay in balance. Many riders choose to change their diagonal with the changes of bend as you technically will be changing direction through the loop. When it comes to changing the rein across the diagonal in the rising trot, your main concern should not be which diagonal you're on, or when or where you change it. This is totally optional: Change at the start of the line, at X, or at the end of the line. This movement is not part of the current Training Three test but it is asked for in both directions in First Level Test One in conjunction with a trot lengthening. Reminder: you are on the correct diagonal when you rise and fall with your horse's outside front leg.

The current First Level Test One is similar to the 2019 test. In the past, this test introduced 10-meter half circles in the trot and 15-meter circles in the canter, as well as trot and canter lengthenings. In the new test, the canter lengthening has been removed, giving the canter tour more ease and allowing the horse to develop more strength and balance before lengthenings are introduced at this gait. This test still has an average ride time of 5 minutes and 30 seconds, but there are only 15 scoring boxes compared to the 17 boxes in the past. First Level Test One also has some changes in the verbiage of the purpose. It now states the horse should be on the bit, whereas before it stated that the horse was to maintain "a more consistent contact with the bit."

I hope this has given you more insight into these two tests including how to ride the loop and what to do about posting diagonals. Please note that I am not discounting the importance of the posting diagonal. In these movements, you should be most concerned about quality, balance, and geometry, all of which can be easier to achieve if you are on the correct diagonal. As you prepare for your first show in 2023, remember to read the purpose of your test and make sure you can achieve it: this will be the expectation of your judge.

On Friday April 16, 2023 I was able to attend Steffen Peter's lecture called *The Mental Aspects of Dressage*, and I wanted to share some of the notes I took.

Learning to be patient with yourself is critical. This means tolerance of yourself too.

You have to be okay with whatever outcome

Mindful network of thoughts will set you up for success

When you are doing the actual test it becomes a flow state which stops all the noise

You cannot manage stress, you can only manage yourself

Put a period on overthinking by telling yourself to shut up and move on.

Keep it simple. Understand the aids, and slow yourself down

One destructive thought can destroy. Being mindful, think about the way you feel, but more importantly think about the way you think.

Learn to enjoy autobiographies so you can read about how others overcome challenges.

AND ALWAYS be patient and find time to share space with the horse.

WHAT I DID ON MY VACATION IN AIKEN SC by Derith Vogt

I have been visiting my Midwestern transplant friends in Aiken for many years. In the late 19th century, Aiken gained fame as a wintering spot for the wealthy from the Northeast, and of course, some of them had horses. You name it, it is there... driving, polo, racing, dressage, steeplechasing, eventing, and trail riding in the center of town in the wonderful Hitchcock Woods. There is something horse related going on almost every day.

This trip I attended a clinic with Lucinda Green. There are those that do and those that teach. She does both extremely well. The first day of her clinics are getting to assess you and your horse over stadium fences. She may have four set up as bounces and tell you to take one and three at an angle. You might find yourself coming in at an angle and then take the last one straight. The goal is to see how fast you can get your horse to focus on where they are going Yes, you can change direction in mid air. Banks,? Just walk up them first. If your horse stumbles, he will figure it out and not do it the next time. Let them do it. They have to be able to think. They have to be allowed to see the fence early and find their own take off spot. You stay in balance. When in two point you should just see your toes when you look down. You want the sense that if your horse tripped, that you would not been thrown off. Your job is to be ready for trouble at all times. "Plug into the saddle, enclose the horse with your legs and cuddle them. The riders that pinch with their knees and pitch forward throw the horse's balance off and they are the ones that die. "To say that she is bit more blunt than most of us are used to is an understatement, but she teaches without having anyone in tears. She is not a fan of studs. She thinks they are over rated and mostly don't do anything but jam your horses legs. You have to be clear, fair, and consistent with your horse. Your hands have to be able to go from "concrete to feathers in a second." (N. Olivera) It is a paradox ...go and then stop. Use your voice. After jumping the last fence, "Remember that you are going to tell them to stop and use your voice. I don't want to see these horses shocked by the halt. I don't care if they are not on the bit or have legs akimbo, I just want their bodies absolutely straight. The landing is basically your prep for the next fence so what happens after the fence is almost more important than what happens in front of the fence. So don't forget your halt and keep them straight. It's a really brilliant training aid that so many people waste, by just cantering off and patting their horses. "


BOOK REVIEW
