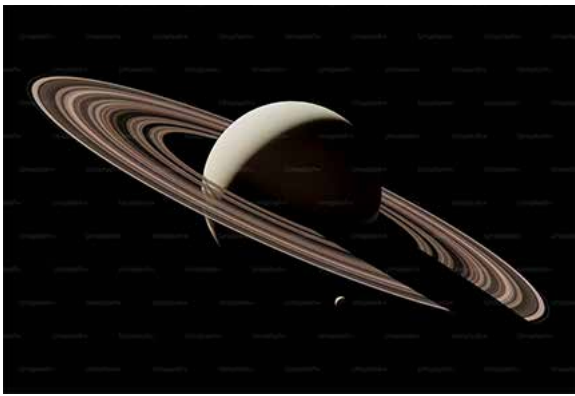

News in Brief

405 Freeway Weekend Closures Set

Caltrans announced extended weekend lane reductions on the 405 Freeway through the Sepulveda Pass. The freeway will be reduced to three lanes in each direction and motorists are strongly encouraged to seek alternate routes and explore public transportation options to reach their destinations. The work will start at 10 pm Friday, September 19, through 5 am Monday, September 22. Northbound I-405 will be reduced to three lanes between Santa Monica Boulevard to just north of Sunset Boulevard. Santa Monica Boulevard on-ramp closed. Wilshire Boulevard off-ramp closed. Eastbound and westbound Wilshire Boulevard on-ramps to northbound I-405 closed. Sunset Boulevard on/off-ramps closed. Sepulveda Boulevard/Moraga Drive off-ramp closed. Southbound I-405 will be reduced to three lanes just north of Sunset Boulevard to eastbound Wilshire Boulevard. Sunset Boulevard/Church Lane on/off-ramps closed. Westbound Wilshire Boulevard on-ramp to southbound I-405 closed.

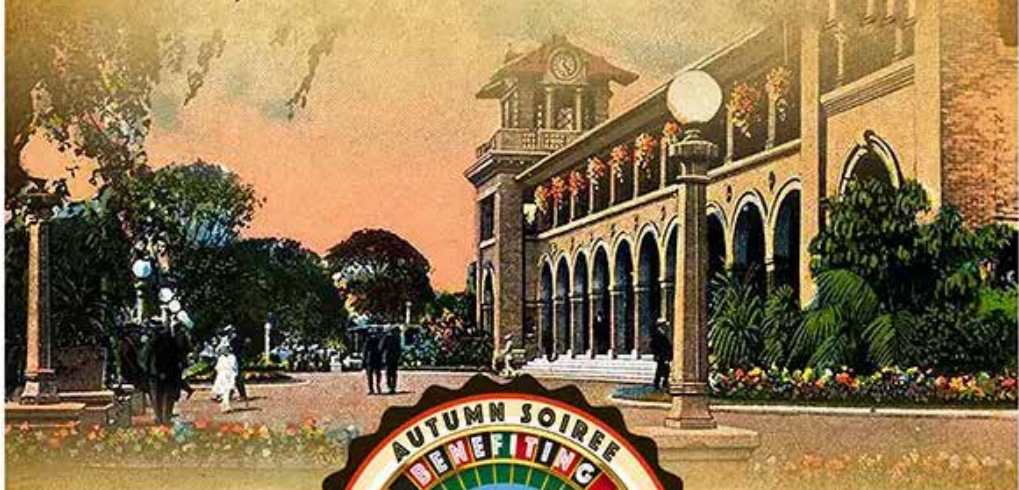

I remember the excitement of ordering new clothes from the Sears catalog, getting brand new shoes, picking out new school supplies and spending too much time picking out just the right Peachee folder. I walked to school by myself, and knew most of the neighbors along my route. My biggest worry in first grade was how to advance to the next reading level in the SRA folder. My friend was telling me the realities of sending kids to school today. Her kindergartener came home proud to have won an award her first day. She won "most quiet" for having tucked herself up on a toilet seat pretending to hide from attackers.

In kindergarten. For both her children she bought bullet-proof inserts for their backpacks so they could use them as shields in case of a mass shooting. With so many school shootings our children are learning real-life lessons - instead of growing up in the safe bubble we did. I'm glad my daughter has graduated and is out of school. Sad that I worry less about her being in the real world than I would if she were still in school. She went to UCSB, and graduated just a year before the troubled West Hills boy shot up that campus. the threat was far away. Here it's sitting in the seat next to you. I have no answers. But I do think that like the homeless problem, it is a mental health issue. But I do think it's a travesty that a six-year old's first gold star should be - not for spelling - but surviving.

Relational and "vested" contracts push this concept further by embedding shared goals, governance frameworks, and flexibility directly into agreements. By creating win-win structures, companies such as Microsoft, FedEx, and P&G

have shown how contracts can transform from transaction documents into frameworks for innovation and growth (Zoho Contracts, The State of Contract Management 2025). Similarly, supplier relationship management (SRM) strategies anchored by strategic contracts enable businesses to deepen collaboration, reduce risks, and co-develop solutions rather than simply enforce obligations.

4. The Future: Smarter, Strategically Responsive Contracts

The next wave of contracts will be even more strategic as AI becomes embedded in contract drafting, negotiation, and risk analysis. Generative AI tools are already helping legal and procurement teams identify risks, flag nonstandard clauses, and accelerate redlining. According to Contract Management Online, analysts project the Contract Lifecycle Management (CLM) market will grow to nearly \$3 billion by 2027, expanding at double-digit annual rates as more organizations adopt these systems.

This shift marks a fundamental evolution. Contracts become dynamic governance tools. They enable organizations to not only reduce liability and improve compliance but also to recover hidden value, support collaboration, and provide real-time business insights.

Contracts as Strategic Assets

Contracts should never be thought of as dusty paperwork. They are living frameworks that define relationships, ensure transparency, and position businesses for growth. By embedding data-driven processes to prevent revenue leakage, adopting AI-powered CLM systems to increase efficiency, aligning incentives through performance-based agreements, and fostering collaboration through relational models, organizations can transform contracts into engines of value.

New Art Exhibit at Soraya in Conjunction With Fiddler on the Roof – Through the Eyes of David Labkovski – “Sholom Aleichem and his Heroes”

The exhibit “Through the Eyes of David Labkovski - Sholom Aleichem and His Heroes” will be on display in The Soraya Gallery in Northridge September 13 to December 31, debuting with three performances of *Fiddler on the Roof* in Yiddish.

Sholom Aleichem (1859-1916) was a renowned Yiddish author and playwright, best known for his stories about Tevye the Dairyman, which was adapted into the Broadway classic *Fiddler on the Roof*.

Through his storytelling, Sholem Aleichem commemorates the past, while David Labkovski (1906-1991), uses his art to document over five hundred years of Jewish life in Eastern Europe before the Holocaust.

Through an art exhibit curated by the David Labkovski Project, a unique fusion of literature and visual art that preserves generations of cultural heritage while providing a deep understanding of historical events and their importance today is presented.

Lithuanian-Israeli artist Labkovski was dedicated to the commemoration of the Jewish “world that was.” Labkovski turned to Aleichem’s stories as his muse to remember the past, to be swept back to his own childhood. The parallels between Labkovski’s Aleichem series and his work depicting his own memories of prewar life are unmistakable. The settings and the characters from his illustrations are intentionally interchangeable with his work representing the “real” townspeople, as if they are one and the same—his love for the characters and for his community can be seen in every brushstroke and pencil line. We meet them all as they are walking in the streets, selling their wares, or enjoying a moment of gossip.

Aleichem captures the zeitgeist of Jewish life at the turn of the century. The stories may be specific to a time and place, but the quirks and peccadillos of the characters, the humanity Aleichem shares, are universal and eternal.

His humorous tales address complex issues: antisemitism, emigration, modernization and poverty. His characters play the cards they’ve been dealt, just as his readers were facing the same challenges. Aleichem’s

world was the world before the Holocaust. In the aftermath, his stories take on new meaning; his words resurrect a world that no longer exists.

Among Aleichem’s most beloved characters is Tevye from *Fiddler on the Roof*, whose trials and tribulations continue to resonate with audiences worldwide. Tevye’s stories are filled with humor and tragedy, unfolding in a classic Aleichem style that captivates readers through winding, immersive storytelling. In *Tevye Strikes It Rich*, Tevye recounts his journey from a log-hauler to a dairyman, after a fateful act of kindness rewards him with money, food, and a dairy cow.

The exhibit at The Soraya will be open to the public for self guided tours and private group tours can be scheduled. The multigenerational exhibit

appeals to audiences of all ages as Aleichem’s stories have universal appeal and humor with many of the same issues from the past relevant to life today.

The Soraya at California State University at Northridge is a world class venue. It houses over 3,500 seats and has had, and will continue to have world class performers.

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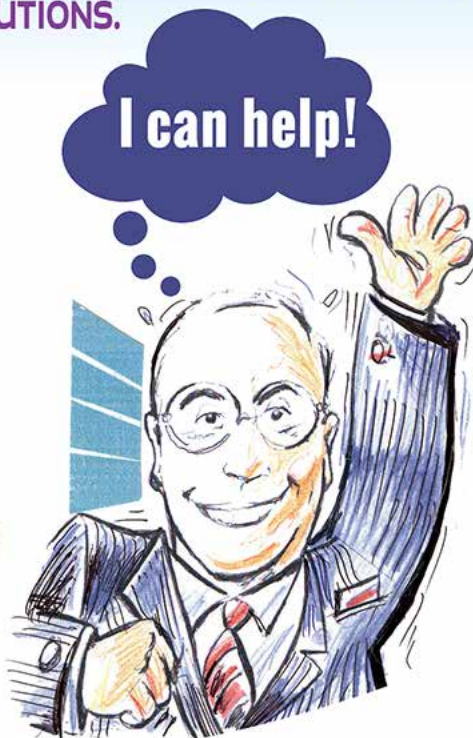
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Lack of Shut Eye Can Lead to Dementia

If you do not get seven to nine hours of sleep at night habitually, read on for new medical information that could threaten your health in your future.

People age 50 or 60 who regularly slept six hours or less each night were more likely to be diagnosed with dementia than those whose regular shut-eye pattern ran the prescribed health seven or more hours of nightly sleep.

Results of one of the longest running trials with human participants have been published in the scientific journal *Nature Communications*. The study, which started in 1985, covered a time frame of over 35 years with 8,000 adult participants supported by the University College London.

A group of European researchers looked at the survey data and linked the data with dementia diagnoses in electronic health records. Since inception of the study, participants have been surveyed every four to five years.

Results as follows: 50-year olds who were sleeping six hours or less a night had a 22% higher risk of dementia later in life while



60-year olds were 37% more likely to develop the disorder.

The British civil servants reported their sleep duration, and some wore sleep trackers overnight to confirm that their self-reporting was accurate.

While the authors cautioned that the findings can't establish whether less sleep causes dementia, they said the new study adds to sufficient shorter-term research showing that too little sleep is directly linked to the development of the disorder.

Other studies have shown that interruptions preventing people from getting a good night's sleep are also linked to eventual onset of dementia.

Past research also suggests that obesity, high systolic blood pressure, and mental health disorders like depression increase the risk of sleep issues.

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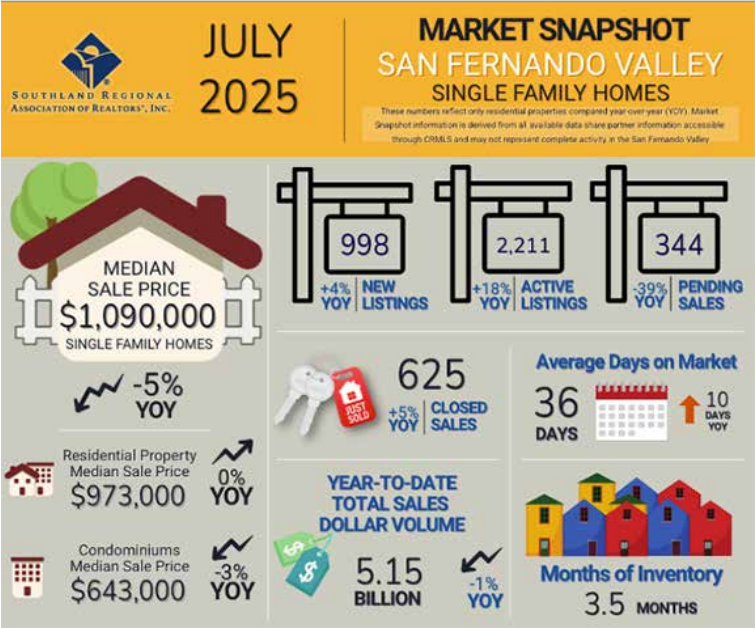
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Inventory Hits One Year High

Existing single-family home closed escrows increased during July compared to a year ago while the collection of home and condominium active listings hit its highest level in 14 years, the Southland Regional Association of Realtors has reported.

Local Realtors assisted the close of escrow of 627 single-family homes last month, a total that was 4.7% higher than a year ago and the highest monthly tally since June 2023. While welcome news, the home sales total remained below levels set during the COVID pandemic in the early years of this decade and pales compared to historical highs that had monthly totals of more than 1,200 closed escrows.

Condominium closed escrows during July came in at 132, down 14.3%.

“While interest rates on home mortgage recently dropped, condominium sales and overall activity slowed due to rates that were still too high for middle- and entry-level buyers,” said Anthony Bedgood, President of the 10,000-member Southland Regional Association of Realtors. “I keep hearing the word ‘fragile’ when speakers describe the condition of the residential real estate market.”

“There’s too much uncertainty about where the economy is headed, about home prices, and about job security,” Bedgood said. “While some people always find an opportunity, most people unsurprisingly want certainty and consistency when it comes to finances and buying a home.”

Bedgood and Valerie Biletsky, SRAR’s Chief Executive Officer, agreed that buyers who are willing to plunge into the market will find an array of options.

“Home and condo active listings are at levels not seen in many years,” Biletsky said. “And it appears the inventory will continue to swell well into the future.”

The Association, which serves the San Fernando and Santa Clarita valleys, reported 838 active listings of condominiums – up 57% from a year ago. New listings during July increased 30%.

Similarly, the 2,204 single-family homes listed for sale on the association’s MLS increased 17.8%. New listings increased 4%.

At the end of the month there were 3,042 home and condo active listings available – a total not seen since 2011. That represented a four-month supply at the current pace of sales, which is close to what market experts believe represents a balanced market, where neither buyer nor seller hold a clear negotiating advantage

The median price of the 627 homes that changed owners last month was \$1,095,000, down 4.7% from a year ago and down from the record high \$1,150,000 set in June. The condominium median price of \$643,000 fell 2.6% compared to the July 2024 record high \$660,000.

According to a new report, over 43,000 Californian households relied on private mortgage insurance to achieve homeownership during 2024 with downpayments as low as 3%. California ranked third in low-down payment homebuyers using private mortgage insurance.

SRAR’s Income-to-Loan guide for July calculated an income of \$297,929 was needed to qualify for an 80% loan of \$876,000 on a San Fernando Valley median-priced single-family home of \$1,095,000.

With the national average interest rate at 6.80% last month, the income needed to qualify was down 6.8% from a year ago. The monthly PITI — principal, interest, taxes and insurance payments — totaled \$7,198.

As of August 4, mortgage rates on a 30-year mortgage had plunged to a 10-month low of 6.57%, down from 6.74% on July 28.

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Nighttrek Report: The September Sky

The highlight of September is the return of the ringed planet Saturn. After 9 pm look east to see the planet rising. Saturn will be at its brightest on Saturday night, the 20th. At this time of the year, Saturn is between the constellations Pisces and Aquarius. In October, Saturn will be fully in Aquarius. It takes over 29 years for this planet to orbit the Sun. If you have binoculars, one of Saturn's moons, named Enceladus, can be spotted. Saturn is not a perfect sphere as its north pole is 90% of the equatorial diameter. Saturn's winds blow at over 1100 miles per hour, the fastest in the solar system. One day on Saturn is just over 10 hours long. Look on Monday, the 8th, when the Moon and Saturn will appear to be close to each other.

The full Moon on September 7 is called the "Corn Moon." This name comes from Native American traditions, as corn was often harvested at this time of year. It is also sometimes called the "Autumn Moon." If you are traveling to Asia, Australia, or parts of Europe and Africa, the full Moon will appear red due to a Total Lunar Eclipse. This is also known as a "Blood Moon." Unfortunately, the lunar eclipse will not be visible in the Americas.

Mars is low in the west in September and appears as a tiny red spot. On Wednesday, the 24th, Mars will be near the thin crescent Moon. Mars is known as the "Red Planet" due to the iron oxide in its soil. It has the largest volcano and canyon in the solar system. It has two moons, Phobos and Deimos, and its seasons are similar to Earth's but much longer.

Dawn Patrol: The planets Jupiter and Venus are a great sight in the east after 4 am until dawn, which is about 5:30 am. Both are super bright with Jupiter appearing to be above Venus. To the right of Jupiter is the Orion constellation.

On Sunday afternoon, September 21, there will be a partial solar eclipse, which will cover about 10% of the Sun. It should only be seen with good eclipse glasses! Next year, on August 12, 2026 there will be solar eclipse in Greenland, Iceland and Spain lasting about two minutes. This is the first mainland eclipse in Europe since 1999. Also, many people are making plans now for the August 2, 2027 solar Eclipse. It will last over six minutes and 21 seconds long. It starts in the Atlantic Ocean and goes through Gibraltar, Egypt and parts of Africa. There will be many cruise ships traveling to this event.

Every night, look straight up to see the famous asterism, the "Summer Triangle." The three stars that make up this formation are called Vega, Deneb, and Altair. An asterism is a recognizable

patter or group of stars that is not an officially designated constellation. Another asterism in same area is the "Northern Cross" which is located within the constellation Cygnus the Swan. Also, the dwarf planet Pluto is in the center of this asterism but cannot be seen with the naked eye. Pluto is primarily known as the largest dwarf planet in our solar system and for the controversy surrounding its demotion. It was once considered the ninth planet but was reclassified in 2006 due to new definitions of a planet.

The next two months will bring us a lot of solar activity with some spectacular auroras. Most of the action will be above Bakersfield and all the way to Canada. The Aurora Borealis, or northern lights, are natural light displays in the sky caused by charged particles from the sun colliding with Earth's upper



atmosphere. We are hoping one might show up here in Southern California.

Another great sight to see in September is our spiral galaxy, the "Milky Way." It is bordered by Sagittarius on the left and Scorpius on the right in the west. It is best to get out of the city lights to see the band of stars.

In the East, the Great Square of Pegasus, the Winged Horse, is a large, prominent asterism in the autumn night sky, composed of four bright stars that form a square or diamond shape. Notice that the square is balanced on one corner and inside of the square there are no stars visible. The Great Square serves as a guide for astronomers to locate other celestial objects, most notably the Andromeda galaxy.

Mark Saturday, September 13, on your calendar as a fun and local "star party" will come back to Paramount Ranch. The Ventura County Astronomical Society is putting on "An Evening Under the Stars" with many telescopes and special events. You can also bring your own telescope. The location is in Agoura Hills and there is plenty of room to park. It starts at 7:30 pm but get there before dark to take full advantage of the evening. Night temperatures can be chilly so dress accordingly. This event is free.
