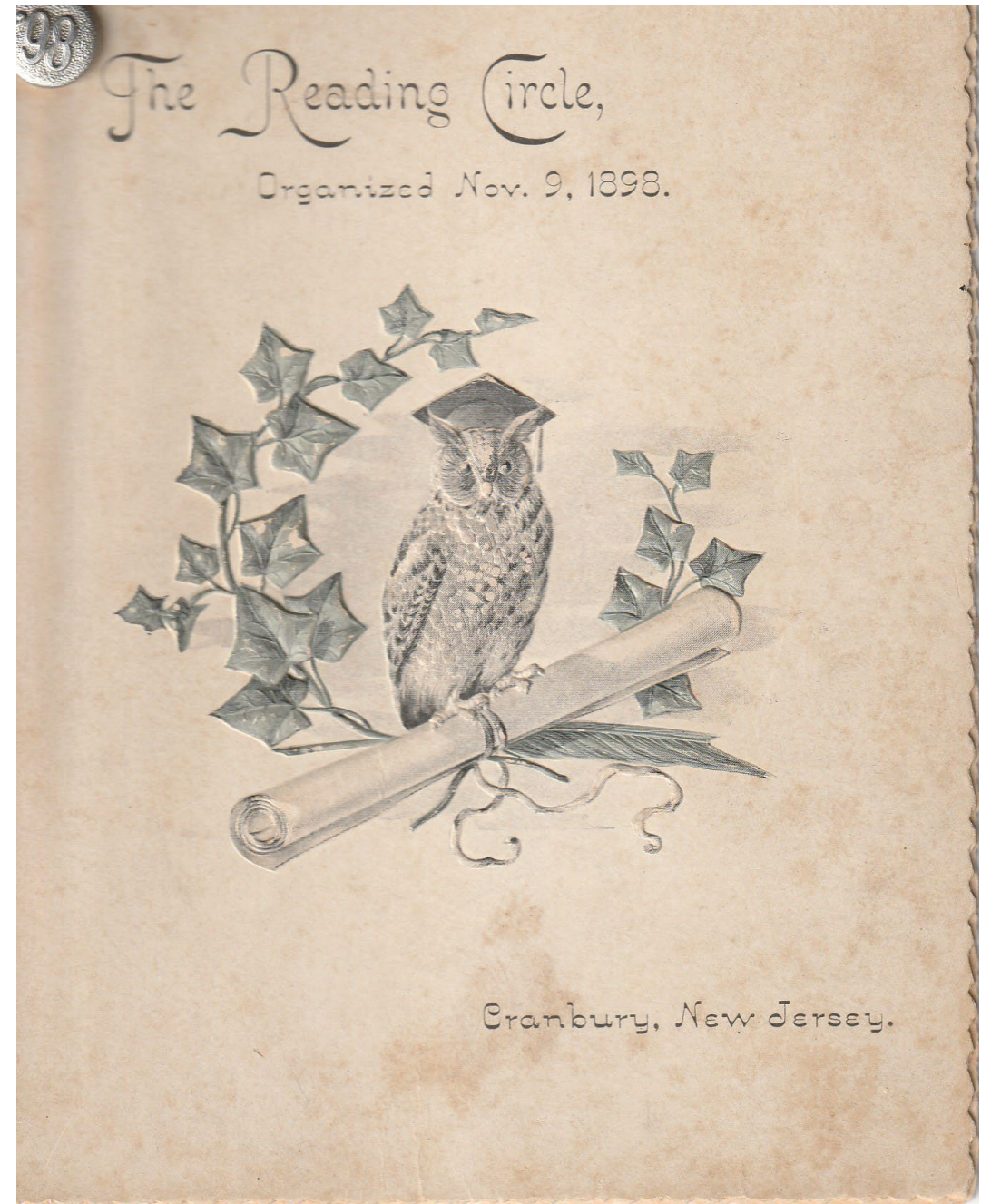

# Inside the Program

## Constitution & Bylaws

### CONSTITUTION.

—o—

1. This Society shall be called the Reading Circle.
2. The object of the society shall be to fill our minds with those things that shall inspire us to higher attainments.
3. The motto of this society shall be "True to the best within us and Loyal to each other."
4. A person may become a member by invitation and majority vote of the society.
5. The officers of the society shall be a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be elected quarterly.



### BY-LAWS.

—o—

1. The regular meeting shall be held every Wednesday at 2-30 o'clock and the first item of business shall be Roll Call.
2. Any leader not commencing on time shall pay a fine of five cents.
3. A committee of three shall be chosen each month to furnish a program for each meeting.
4. The duties of the committee shall be to plan for place of meeting, form of roll call, readers, and notification of the press.
5. The form and expense of any entertainment shall be decided by the society.
6. These By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-third vote of the members present, notice of the intention having been given at a previous meeting.

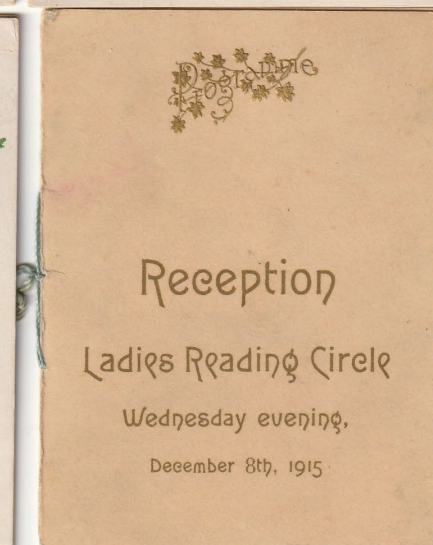

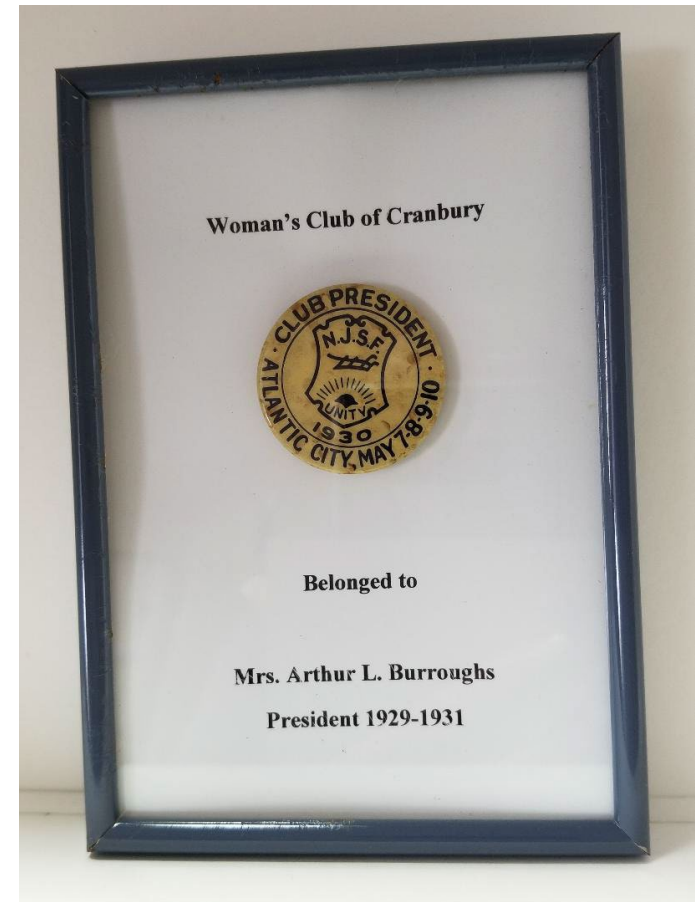
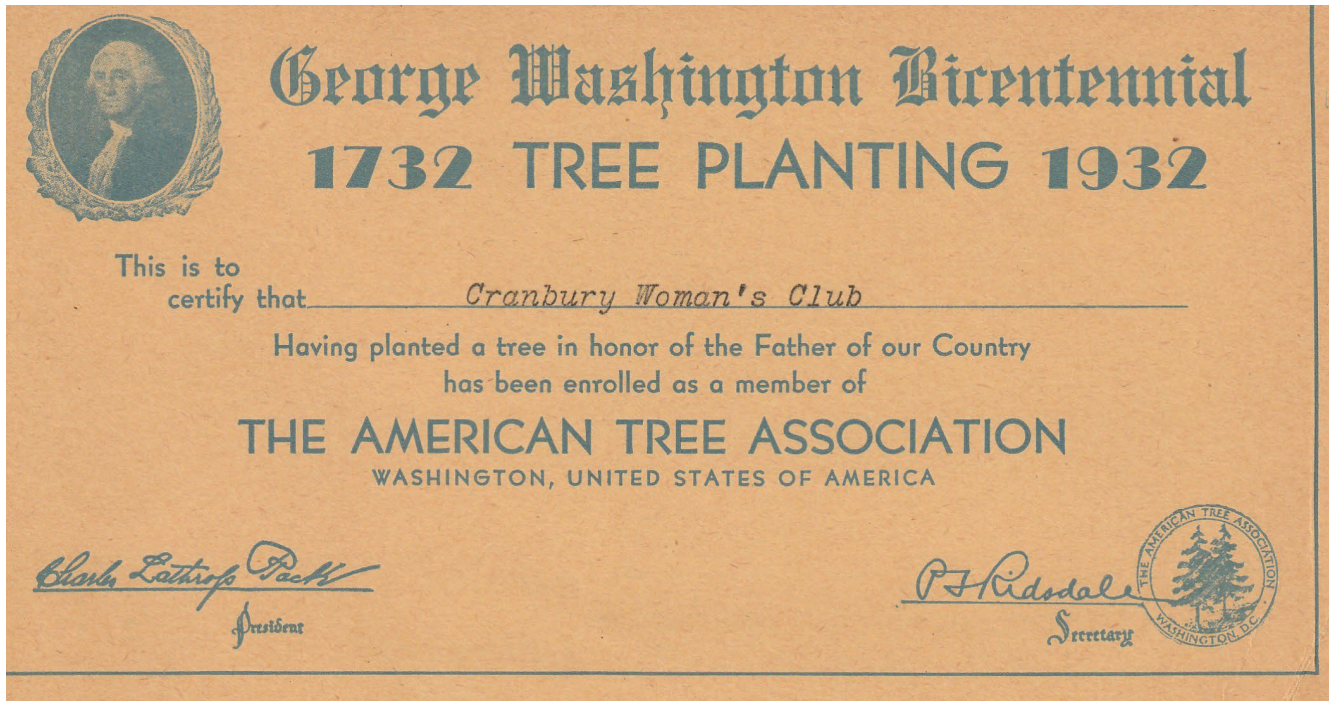

# Rationing

## INSTRUCTIONS

- 1 This book is valuable. Do not lose it.
- 2 Each stamp authorizes you to purchase rationed goods in the quantities and at the times designated by the Office of Price Administration. Without the stamps you will be unable to purchase those goods.
- 3 Detailed instructions concerning the use of the book and the stamps will be issued. Watch for those instructions so that you will know how to use your book and stamps. Your Local War Price and Rationing Board can give you full information.
- 4 Do not throw this book away when all of the stamps have been used, or when the time for their use has expired. You may be required to present this book when you apply for subsequent books.

Rationing is a vital part of your country's war effort. Any attempt to violate the rules is an effort to deny someone his share and will create hardship and help the enemy.

This book is your Government's assurance of your right to buy your fair share of certain goods made scarce by war. Price ceilings have also been established for your protection. Dealers must post these prices conspicuously. Don't pay more.

Give your whole support to rationing and thereby conserve our vital goods. Be guided by the rule:

*"If you don't need it, DON'T BUY IT."*

# The Fruits of Victory



## War Gardens

The United States Department of Agriculture encouraged the planting of victory gardens during World War II. **Around one third of the vegetables produced by the United States came from victory gardens.** It was emphasized to American home-front urbanites and suburbanites that the produce from their gardens would help to lower the price of vegetables needed by the US War Department to feed the troops, thus saving money that could be spent elsewhere on the military: "Our food is fighting", one US poster read. By May 1943, there were 18 million victory gardens in the United States – 12 million in cities and 6 million on farms.

# Fanny Farmer – Thanks from George F Barber, Lt. Col., 87 Armored Field Artillery Battalion

December 30, 1944

Dear ladies, I am rather embarrassed to write a letter to so many people at once. But my embarrassment is rather sacrificial. If you could have seen the way I piled into that grand box of Fannie Farmer candy that came in in one of the early Christmas mails. I am a rabid fan of the F. F. Candies. And they just don't last long with me...

Lasting six brutal weeks, from December 16, 1944, to January 25, 1945, the assault called the Battle of the Ardennes, took place during frigid weather conditions, with some 30 German divisions attacking battle-fatigued American troops across 85 miles of the densely wooded Ardennes Forest. The 87th Armored Field Artillery Battalion played a vital role in that battle. You may know it by another name, The Battle of the Bulge. George F Barber went on to become a full Colonel.

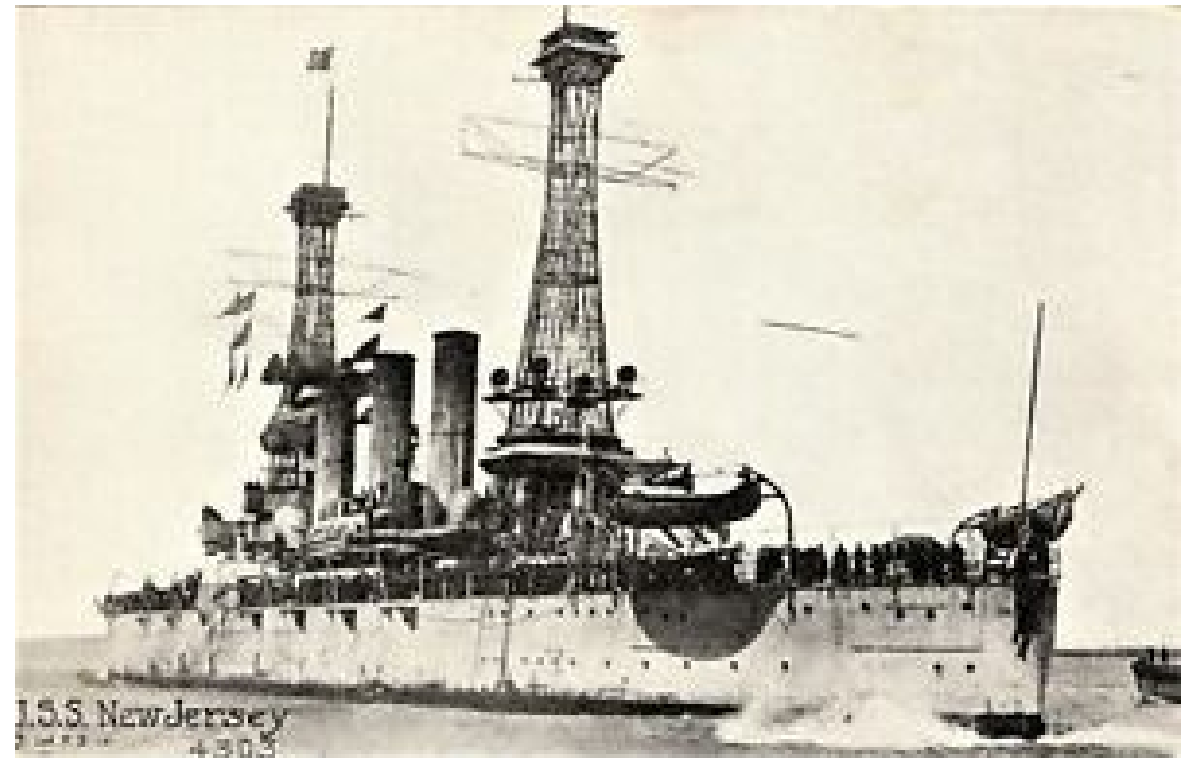

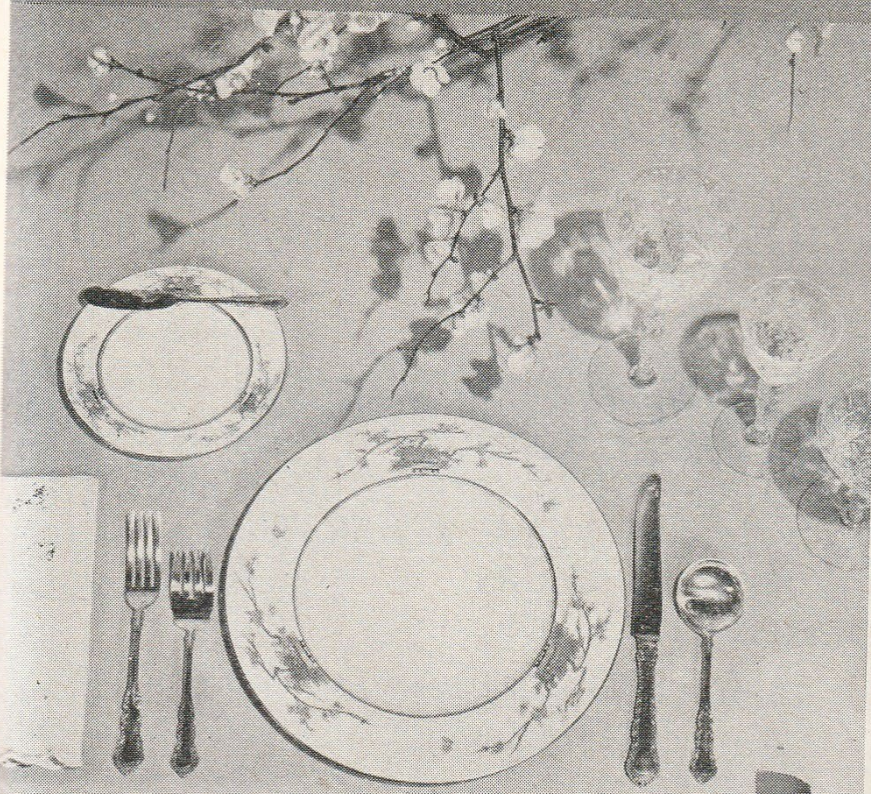

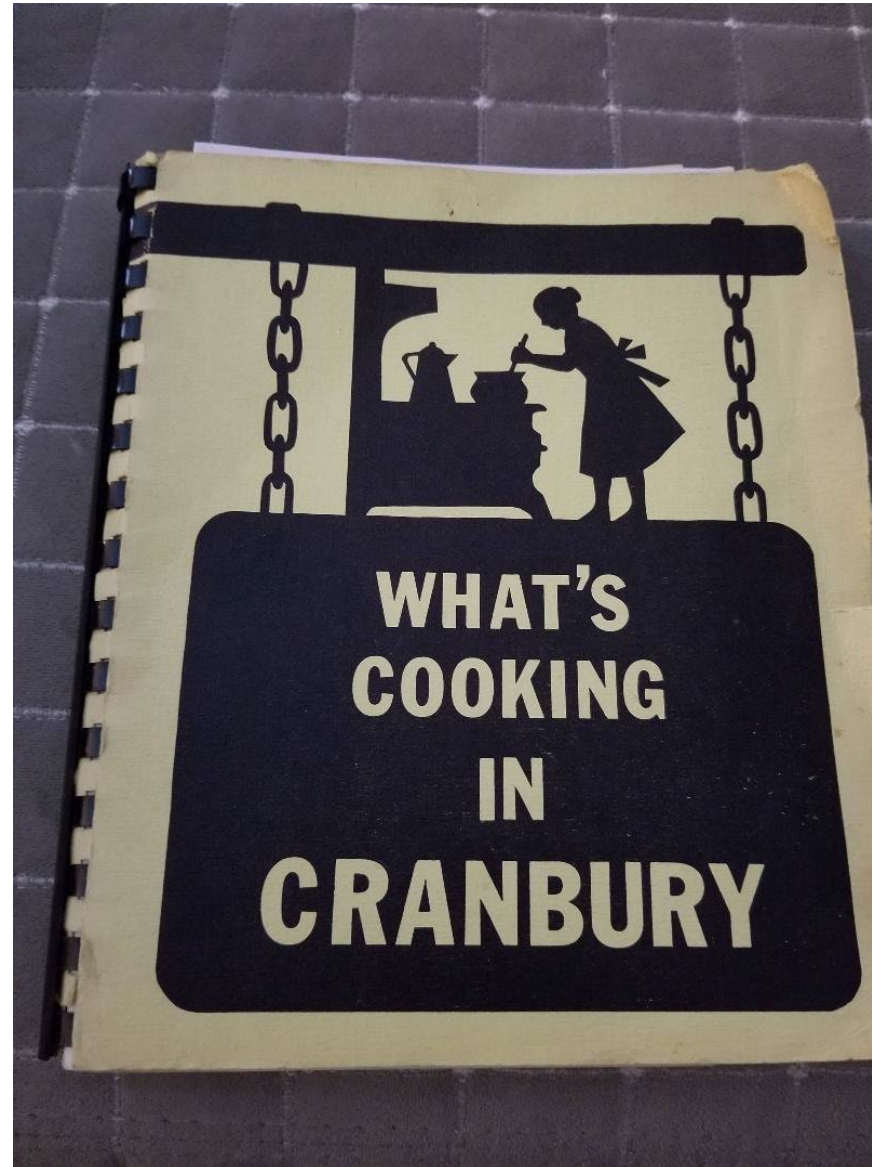
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Just the previous year, Eugenie Bunting, head of the Cranbury Woman's Club's committee on "Friendly Town," had told a meeting of the club members about the *New York Herald Tribune's* new Fresh Air Fund, which aimed at sending children from the city's slums on a two-week vacation in the countryside. "It is your opportunity to engage personally in a mission of rescue," Mrs. Bunting said, and she urged members of the Cranbury Woman's Club to open their homes to these underprivileged youngsters (several women reportedly volunteered immediately), and to ask friends to do likewise to help others and to ensure Cranbury's reputation as a "Friendly Town." The *Cranbury Press* enthusiastically endorsed her recommendation as "another opportunity for Community Betterment."<sup>43</sup>

## Club Formed To Increase Sociability

The Woman's Club of Cranbury was organized on November 9, 1898 as a literary group, and became a member of the New Jersey State Federation of Woman's Clubs on November 1, 1922.

To accomplish these ends the work is divided into eight departments: American Home, Arts, Civics and Legislation, Drama, Garden, International Affairs, Literature and Music.

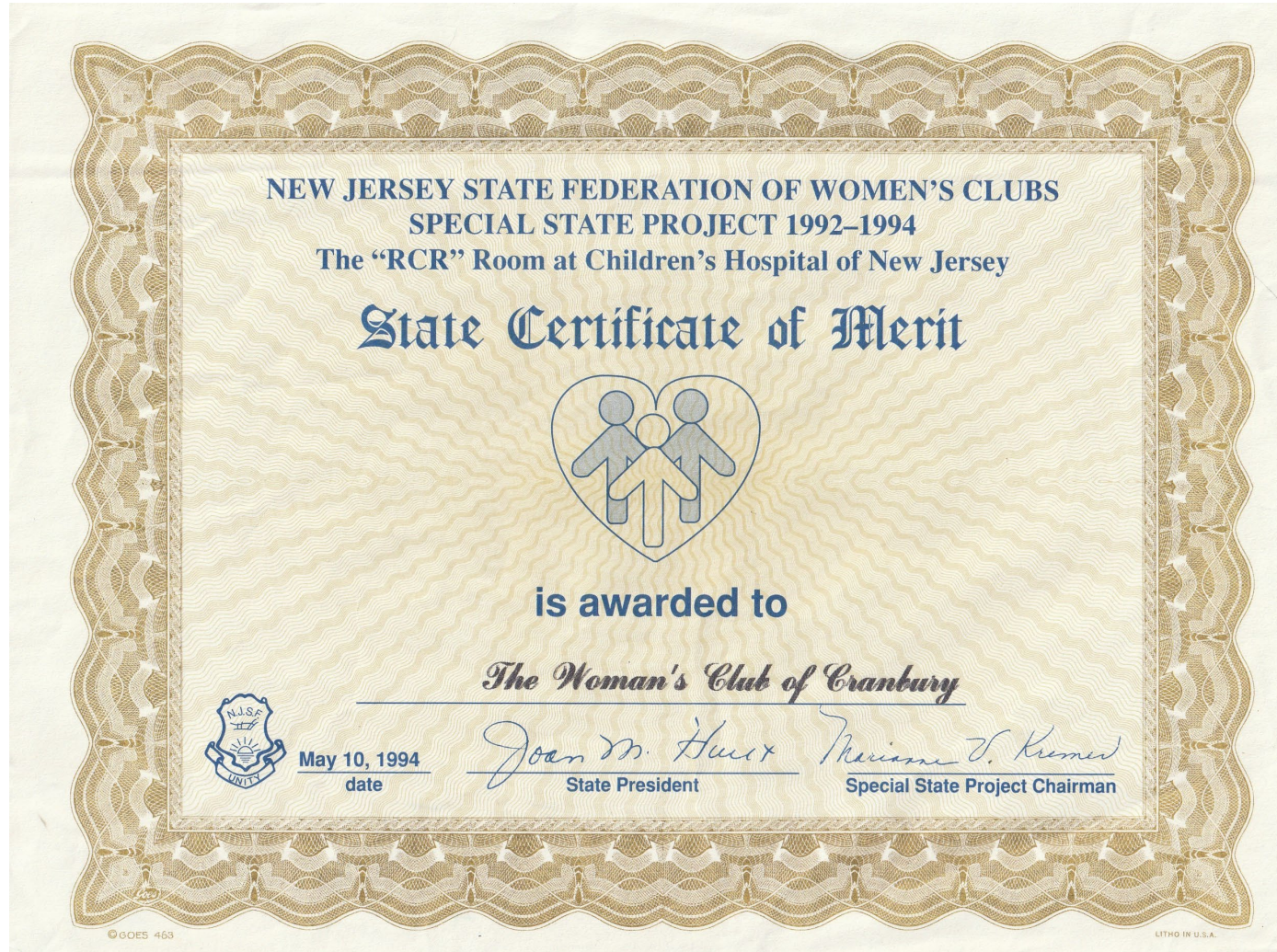
