

2. Any leader not commencing on time shall pay a fine of five cents.


3. A committee of three shall be chosen each month to furnish a program for each meeting.


4. The duties of the committee shall be to plan for place of meeting, form of roll call, readers, and notification of the press.

Another Organization Formed a few years earlier in 1890

GFWC's roots can be traced back to 1868 when Jane Cunningham Croly, a professional journalist, attempted to attend a dinner at an all-male press club honoring British novelist Charles Dickens. Croly was denied admittance based upon her gender, and in response, formed a woman's club— Sorosis. In celebration of Sorosis' 21st anniversary in 1889, Jane Croly invited women's clubs throughout the United States to pursue the cause of federation by attending a convention in New York City. On April 24, 1890, 63 clubs officially formed the General Federation of Women's Club by ratifying the GFWC constitution.





War Gardens

The United States Department of Agriculture encouraged the planting of victory gardens during World War II. Around one third of the vegetables produced by the United States came from victory gardens. It was emphasized to American home-front urbanites and suburbanites that the produce from their gardens would help to lower the price of vegetables needed by the US War Department to feed the troops, thus saving money that could be spent elsewhere on the military: "Our food is fighting", one US poster read. By May 1943, there were 18 million victory gardens in the United States – 12 million in cities and 6 million on farms.

Fanny Farmer – Thanks from George F Barber, Lt. Col., 87 Armored Field Artillery Battalion

December 30, 1944

Dear ladies, I am rather embarrassed to write a letter to so many people at once. But my embarrassment is rather sacrificial. If you could have seen the way I piled into that grand box of Fannie Farmer candy that came in in one of the early Christmas mails. I am a rabid fan of the F. F. Candies. And they just don't last long with me...

Lasting six brutal weeks, from December 16, 1944, to January 25, 1945, the assault called the Battle of the Ardennes, took place during frigid weather conditions, with some 30 German divisions attacking battle-fatigued American troops across 85 miles of the densely wooded Ardennes Forest. The 87th Armored Field Artillery Battalion played a vital role in that battle. You may know it by another name, The Battle of the Bulge. George F Barber went on to become a full Colonel.



Just the previous year, Eugenie Bunting, head of the Cranbury Woman's Club's committee on "Friendly Town," had told a meeting of the club members about the *New York Herald Tribune*'s new Fresh Air Fund, which aimed at sending children from the city's slums on a two-week vacation in the countryside. "It is your opportunity to engage personally in a mission of rescue," Mrs. Bunting said, and she urged members of the Cranbury Woman's Club to open their homes to these underprivileged youngsters (several women reportedly volunteered immediately), and to ask friends to do likewise to help others and to ensure Cranbury's reputation as a "Friendly Town." The *Cranbury Press* enthusiastically endorsed her recommendation as "another opportunity for Community Betterment."⁴³


On August 8, 1960, a revolutionary army PATHET LAO captured Vientiane, capital of Laos, and closed all roads and the airport.





Children contribute to Cranbury cookbook

CRANBURY TOWNSHIP — Cranbury's finest cooks are giving away their culinary secrets in "Culinary Creations," compiled by the Woman's Club of Cranbury.

The spiral-bound cookbook, which commemorates the International Year of the Child, lists more than 400 recipes in nine categories.

"I decided on the International Year of the Child theme because I wanted to include children's illustrations, artwork and poems in the cookbook," said Lorraine Stroumtsos, chief editor of the cookbook.

Mrs. Stroumtsos' source for the children's contributions was the Cranbury Elementary School. She contacted principal Charles Argento who in turn requested that the teachers announce the project to their students.

"The response was good," said Mrs. Stroumtsos. "We had a lot of poems and prose submitted and I had to choose among them. I had the children's names cut off from them so I wouldn't know who wrote them. Then I chose what I thought were the best ones."

According to Mrs. Stroumtsos, the majority of illustrations, including the cover, were done by Jose and Elaine Perez. Todd Ashley also contributed some artwork. "Culinary Creations" is alphabetized and is indexed for fast reference.

"The food items are indexed in such a way that if you have 12 pounds of cheddar cheese all you have to do is look under cheddar cheese and you'll find all the recipes that use it," said Mrs. Stroumtsos.



"No recipe was eliminated unless it was an exact duplicate," said Mrs. Stroumtsos. "We have five recipes for carrot cake in


the cookbook, but they differ in either the amount or the kind of ingredients." The cookbook compilation took the




