About the Project

In Uganda, where trauma rates are high and medical resources are limited, there is an urgent need for innovative solutions. The blossoming of emergency medicine as a growing presents specialty timely opportunity to meet these challenges headon. Integrating ultrasound into emergency care protocols holds the potential to improve patient triage and management, thereby improving patient centered outcomes. This strategic alignment of a developing medical discipline with advanced imaging modalities reflects a progressive approach to addressing Uganda's healthcare needs.


Our initiative entails partnering with the Emergency Medicine Residency program at Makerere University to facilitate the distribution of ultrasound equipment to all regional referral hospitals, provide comprehensive training to local physicians on its utilization for the diagnosis of time sensitive trauma-related injuries, and establish a cadre of local experts to mentor and guide future emergency medicine practitioners.





Our Strategy

We collaborate with community leaders to conduct a comprehensive needs assessment, identifying and fostering locally-driven solutions. Our approach includes partnering with international experts to develop and mentor local talent, cultivating a new generation of skilled professionals. These homegrown experts are then empowered to emerge as the vanguard of future leadership in their communities.





Current Situation

Globally, traumatic injuries account for 9% of deaths, exceeding HIV, TB, and malaria combined, with 90% occurring in Low and Middle Income Countries. In Uganda, fatal crashes have surged sevenfold in 25 years, costing approximately \$1.2 billion annually, equivalent to 5% of GDP. Nearly 85% of those affected are of working age, highlighting the substantial economic impact.

Patients seeking care in emergency departments across Uganda seldom encounter physicians specialized in emergency medicine, resulting in considerable variability in treatment quality. Moreover, the disparity in available resources among these physicians contributes to deviations from the standard of care, particularly for the most critically injured patients.










Our Vision

Our vision is to collaborate with Medicine Emergency medical officers from Mulago National Referral Hospital and extend our reach to regional referral hospitals across Uganda. During comprehensive two-day course, we will empower local physicians with the skills needed to utilize bedside ultrasound effectively, particularly in trauma cases, with specialized focus on Extended Focused Assessment with Sonography in Trauma (eFAST) scan.

As we progress, we will identify and nurture local champions who will play a vital role in sustaining and facilitating future training efforts. Furthermore, we will equip each emergency department with donated ultrasound machines. enabling seamless access to recorded for scans auality assurance purposes. By fostering local expertise and implementing remote review mechanisms, we envision a sustainable solution that will continue to enhance Uganda's patient care across healthcare landscape.






What We Need

Medical Equipment – Investment: \$17,990 USD. This section includes the state-of-the-art Butterfly IQ Ultrasound devices and associated equipment donated to each site. These devices feature a versatile probe known for durability and reliability. Moreover, they allow real-time, tele-consultation support for image interpretation and cloud storage, facilitating quality assurance reviews.

Course Costs - Investment: \$18,915 USD. This pertains to the budget allocation for expenses related to the travel and accommodation of our educators, as well as the operational costs associated with conducting courses at the seven designated sites across the country. Additionally, it includes arrangements for compensating our human models and meeting the nationally mandated patient compensation requirements.

Ancillary Costs - Investment: \$4,820 USD. This total represents the associated expenses covering shipping, customs fees, data collection and analysis, as well as the publication of our research findings.

Total: \$41,725 USD
