Office of Executive Director

Economic Development & Tourism Activity report – update

NLG continues to engage the four Nisga'a Villages and 3 Urban Locals on Economic Development (TDC) and Tourism Projects via the Prosperity Steering Committee. The Committee meets by-monthly.

Tourism Implementation Plan

- -hire a tourism coordinator
- -launch the website
- -implement the social media strategy
- -develop communication plan
- -train cultural ambassadors in each village

The Tourism Website as discussed would track visitors to the Nass Valley To help collect data to inform how we plan our marketing (among other aspects) in the future. "Discover Nisga'a" will help promote Tourism and Economic Development in the Nass. Testing of site will begin February 2022.

Vetter Falls

Following the 2019 WSN Strategic Plan, Vetter Falls Lodge was identified as a central hub for tourism activities on Nisga'a Lands. an RFP was published in September 2021 (First RFP). The First RFP generated two responses:

Nass Valley Tours (NVT)

-NVT currently operates tours in Anhluut'ukwsim Laxmihl Angwinga_'asanskwhl Nisga'a Park. The operator of NVT is a Nisga'a citizen. NVT wishes to expand its operations and offer accommodation at Vetter Falls Lodge. NVT does not have the current capacity to operate the restaurant.

-Nisga'a Valley Health Authority

NVHA submitted a proposal to operate VFL as a land-based healing centre. NVHA has identified VFL as a culturally safe space and proposes to operate programs in a non-clinical environment. NVHA has contemplated a variety of care programs from drug and alcohol recovery programs to intensive therapy programs. NVHA's programs run for 1 week to 12 weeks

Land and Resources Directorate

Land title: Gingolx Special Survey is almost complete – update
In September of 2020, the Executive ordered the special survey of parts of Gingolx
Village Lands. The purpose of the special survey was to accommodate changes
to parcel boundaries as a result of the road paving and drainage improvements.
The special survey is now completed, and the draft survey plan and Surveyor's Report

were submitted to the Executive. A hearing as required of the Nisga'a Land Title Act was held on December 6, 2021 at the Gingolx Memorial Recreation Centre. There were ten members of the public in attendance at the hearing. 21 letters, telephone calls and emails were received by the Registrar, of which 10 raised matters relevant to the special survey.

Briefing Note January 26, 2022

NISGA'A LAND TITLE REGULATION AMENDMENT, 2022

In 2015, the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada (TRC) published a report outlining 94 separate calls to action. TRC call to action #17 involves various levels of government enabling residential school survivors and their families to reclaim names changed by the residential school system by waiving administrative costs for the name-change process.

In November, Executive passed NLGER 2021/125 directing NLG to implement TRC #17.

In response to this direction, the Nisga'a Land Title Office has prepared a draft amendment implementing TRC #17). The Amendment adds a section to Schedule 1 of the *Nisga'a Land Title Regulation*, *NLGSR 2013/01* specifically waiving fees associated with a name change application submitted to the Nisga'a Land Title Office to reclaim a name changed by the residential school system. The Amendment does not change the provincial administrative process required to legally undertake a name change in British Columbia. Once an applicant has legally undertaken a name change in accordance with provincial law, the Nisga'a Land Title Office will waive all administrative fees to register this name change.

PROPOSED NISGA'A ANNUAL FISHING PLAN 2022-23

GENERAL

Introduction

1) The Nisga'a annual fishing plan for 2022–2023 is consistent with the Treaty, the Nisga'a Fisheries and Wildlife Act and the Nisga'a Fisheries Regulations. Following the general provisions, the Nisga'a annual fishing plan is divided into four parts, dealing with the harvest of salmon, intertidal bivalves, crabs and oolichan respectively. The plan does not apply to the harvest of wildlife fish.

Interpretation

- 2) In this Nisga'a annual fishing plan,
 - "DFO" means the Department of Fisheries and Oceans;
 - "Director" means the Director of Fish and Wildlife under the *Nisga'a Fisheries and Wildlife Act*;
 - "enforcement officer" means a Nisga'a fish and wildlife enforcement officer or Nisga'a fish and wildlife guardian as defined in the Nisga'a Fisheries and Wildlife Act or a fishery officer or fishery guardian as defined in the Fisheries Act;
 - "Fisheries Act" means the Fisheries Act, RSC 1985, c. F-14. Current to November 17, 2020;
 - "fork length", in respect of a fish, means the length of the fish measured from the tip of the nose to the fork of the tail;
 - "harvest" mean fishing for, catching or attempting to catch, fish by any method;
 - "Harvest Agreement" means the Harvest Agreement referred to in paragraph 21 of chapter 8 of the Treaty;
 - "mesh size" means the total length of the twine measured along two contiguous sides of a single mesh, including the distance across the knot joining those sides but not including any other knot;
 - "Minister" means the Minister of Fisheries and Oceans responsible for the Fisheries Act;
 - "NAFP" means this Nisga'a annual fishing plan, and includes any in-season adjustment to the plan;
 - "Nisga'a Fisheries and Wildlife Act" means the Nisga'a Fisheries and Wildlife Act enacted by Nisga'a Lisims Government;

- Ongoing, covid slowed down meeting sessions. In progress.


COMMUNITY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT
