Spotlight Feature: "Faculty Hack: Using AI to Personalize Clinical Prep"



This month's spotlight shines on a creative way faculty are using AI to save time and boost student readiness: personalized pre-conference questions.

Instead of relying on a single set of generic discussion starters, one faculty member shared how they now ask AI to:

"Generate 5 pre-conference questions for nursing students caring for patients with diabetes," focusing on pathophysiology, safety, and patient teaching."

Within seconds, they have a fresh set of targeted prompts that connect directly to that day's patient assignments. Students arrive prepared, engaged, and thinking critically — and faculty don't have to reinvent the wheel each morning.

This simple practice is a great example of how AI can extend our teaching, not replace it. It's about giving students a stronger bridge between classroom knowledge and clinical application, while freeing faculty to focus on the real teaching moments that matter most.

Every month, we spotlight small but mighty strategies you can put to work right away. These insights are designed to save time, spark engagement, and help you



use AI as a teaching partner — not an extra burden. Let's focus on time-savers that still build student engagement:



★ Insight #1: Use AI to flip your debrief

Instead of creating all your post-simulation questions from scratch, ask AI to:

"Generate 5 reflective debriefing questions for students after a simulation on sepsis management, focusing on teamwork, safety, and patient outcomes."

You'll walk in with ready-to-go prompts, and students will dive deeper into the "why" behind their actions.



⚠ Insight #2: Scaffold writing without spoon-feeding

When assigning papers, try giving students an AI-generated outline as a *starting point* — then ask them to expand, critique, and revise it. This teaches them to engage critically with AI while sharpening their academic writing.



★ Insight #3: Speed up grading with comment banks

AI can help you create a set of reusable comments for common issues (e.g., APA errors, missing rationale, strong analysis). Copy, paste, and personalize — students get consistent feedback, and you get back precious hours.

## Why AI Matters for Faculty

**Educator's Toolbox: "September's Teaching Power Tools"** 



Every nurse educator needs a few reliable tools in their back pocket. This month's picks mix AI helpers with tried-and-true classroom hacks — because sometimes the simplest tools make the biggest difference.

- **Tool #1: Prompt Template Library (AI)** 
  - Build a "starter set" of prompts for your most common teaching tasks case studies, quiz questions, or rubric feedback. Keep them in a shared doc or LMS so you (and your colleagues) can reuse them instantly.
- Tool #2: Quick Debrief Generator (AI)
  Ask AI to draft 5–6 adaptable debriefing questions for clinical or simulation sessions.
  You'll always have reflection prompts ready to spark deeper discussion.
- Tool #3: Exit Ticket Hack (Low-Tech)
  End class by giving students a sticky note or digital poll where they answer: "What's one thing you understand better now, and one thing still unclear?" A fast, low-stress way to assess learning.
- Tool #4: Concept Map Creator (AI + Visual)

  Platforms like Lucidchart or Miro can auto-generate concept maps from a topic you type in. Use them to scaffold tricky content or let students co-build maps during review sessions.

Your toolbox doesn't need to be fancy — just effective. Try one of these this month and see how it shifts your teaching rhythm.

## **Closing Note**



As we launch into fall, let's remember: education is a bit like nursing rounds — unpredictable, sometimes exhausting, but always full of opportunities to learn and laugh along the way. AI may not bring us coffee (yet), but it can help carry some of the teaching load so we can focus on what matters most — those "aha!" moments with our students.
