BBO TIP OF THE WEEK: Speaking of "improving our game", BBO has many great ways to help us do that. I'll be discussing several of them these next weeks. Have you ever played a hand on BBO that you'd like to save later? Perhaps to review it by yourself or with a partner? You can do that "on the fly" as you finish the hand.

First, you will need to do a little advance "prep" work so you have a place to put these hands by creating a BBO folder. Click on the ACCOUNT tab and choose the "Deal Archive" menu item. You will see a plus sign (+) to the right on the SELECT FOLDER line. Click it. You'll see "Untitled folder" pop up in the list. You want to give the folder a better title so click on the pencil icon on the "Untitled folder" line. This allows you change the name (by typing over "Untitled folder"). When done, click on the pencil icon again to save it.

Now, when you are playing, make sure the HISTORY tab is showing you a list of hands and results. Click on the hand you are interested in saving and the hand record screen displays the hand. On that hand record screen there is a blue box with 3 horizontal white lines. This is a universal symbol for a menu. Click on it and select EXPORT from the menu. Another menu will appear and select "Save Deal As." Your SELECT FOLDER list displays. Simply click on the folder that you like to save this hand into.

To view your saved hands later, find the folder by clicking the ACCOUNT tab and choosing "Deal Archive" menu. Click on the folder you wish and a list of hands you saved will display below the folder list. Click on the hand. The hand record screen is displayed. You will see the bidding and can go trick-by-trick, starting with the lead.

ARE YOU A LIFE MASTER! We need your help. Support our new mentoring program. Give a bit of your time to help our beginners and non-life masters advance their bridge skills. Only 1 hour / 1 time per week for 1 month at the time of your choosing. It's super-easy. Random hands at a practice table. See below on how to do a BBO practice table. BBO TIP OF THE WEEK: My topic continues with the useful features that BBO has to help you "up" your game. Last week we learned how to save a hand of interest to you. This week I'll show you how to set up a practice table. You can play hands solo (with robots or yourself in the remaining seats). You can practice with your partner. You can play randomly dealt hands or you can play, or replay, those hands that you saved.

BBO has many different kinds of practice tables, but the one I like best, and is the most versatile, is the "teaching" table. Not that you're going to be teaching. It just has a lot of useful features. On the Home screen, select "Practice". On the next screen, select "Start a Teaching table". On the next screen, don't worry about all those options, simply hit the blue START TABLE button. A play table is displayed with all four seats.

Click the position, for example North. You see a menu that gives you three options: Sit, Robot, Reserve. If you wish to sit at that position, choose Sit. If you want a robot to sit there, select Robot. Basic robots cost \$1 per week of use – no matter how many you use. To avoid this cost, I put myself in the non-used seats. If you want your friend to sit at the seat, select Reserve. It will ask you for the BBO name of your friend and send out an invitation.

Once you are seated, if you'd like to change seats (let's say always to be declarer), simple click on the seat you are at. It will ask you if you want to leave this seat. Say yes. Do this also for the seat you want to change to. Then click on that seat and choose "Sit".

Let's start playing random hands. Click on the menu – the little blue box with the white lines. Lots of fun choices here. But choose "Redeal". A new hand will be dealt to you each time you choose "Redeal". You can go through a bunch of random hands without playing them until you get a hand that you'd like to play.

Remember those hands you saved to look at later (see last week's newsletter)? You can play them here. Choose "Deal Source" from the blue menu. On the next screen, select "Use saved deals". A list of your saved folders is displayed. Choose the folder and close by hitting the X at the top right of the window. The next time you choose "Redeal", it will be the first hand in that folder. Every "Redeal" will move consecutively through all the hands in that folder.

The "Teaching Options" in the blue menu list allows you, as the host of the table (the person that created the table) to control who, at the table, sees which hands. You can play all the hands "double-dummy" if you wish.

Have fun practicing!

BBO TIP OF THE WEEK: More on ways BBO can help you improve your game. Last week we set up one kind of practice table, a teaching table. This week I'll show you how to set up a casual table. You can play with your partner, with other players on BBO that will "pop into" your table or with robots.

On the Home screen, select "Casual." On the next screen, select "Start a table." The "Start a Table" screen will give you the option of starting either a Relaxed game or a Competitive game. I like the Competitive game because, when I also display the History screen, it shows me what others players did on this same hand. Also on this Start Table screen you can choose your scoring method. It defaults to "Imps" but I like to score using "Matchpoints." Toggle on, or off, the Privacy options. If you don't set the "Permission required to play" option to yellow, other players on BBO will be able to join you at the table.

Placing players on the table is identical to the teaching table I described last week. Click the position, for example North. You see a menu that gives you three options: Sit, Robot, Reserve. If you wish to sit at that position, choose Sit. If you want a robot to sit there, select Robot. If you want your friend to sit at the seat, select Reserve. It will ask you for the BBO name of your friend and send out an invitation. If you left the seat "open", other players will "pop" into the seat if you allowed it in the permissions. Once everyone is seated you can start playing.

To play the next randomly dealt hand, click on the menu – the little blue box with the white lines. Choose "Redeal." When you've played all the hands you want, simply press the blue "BACK" button. The table goes away.

BBO TIP OF THE WEEK: More ways BBO can help you improve your game. Have you tried BBO's Bridge Master yet? It's a great way to improve your declarer play. There are five different levels: beginner, intermediate, advanced, expert and world class. There are 30 hands at each level. Each hand is a "puzzle" as to how you can make the contract. You can keep trying to replay the hand until you get the right plays in the right order. If you give up, you can press the blue button to show the solution. It will walk you through the best way to play it and the reason why. All the hands at all levels are challenging – especially at the advanced levels where you practice squeeze plays, discovery plays, Morton's Fork Coup, etc.

It's easy to get to Bridge Master. On the BBO Home Page, click on Practice. You'll see Bridge Master in the menu.
