POKANE — Christine "Chris" Hamp recently visited three North Carolina farms as part of her duties as National Grange president.

One farm rotated between raising corn, soybeans, cotton, tobacco and peanuts. The next had pivoted from Christmas trees to shipping wreathes worldwide. The third farm milked a thousand dairy goats twice a day; kept 200 Black Angus and was contracted to provide 2,500 weaner pigs a week. "Three totally different operations, all with multiple generations that are engaged in the operation," Hamp said.

The Grange is a nonprofit grassroots community organization advocating for rural America and farming communities.

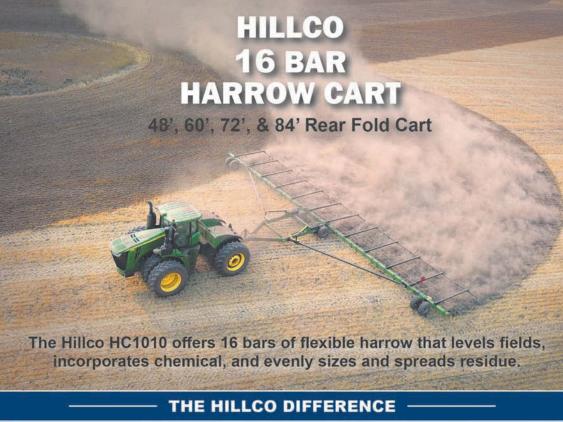

Hamp wants to be sure that the Grange's focus and policies allow farmers, their children and grandchildren to continue in the face of heavy regulations, estate taxes and other challenges.

"The goal every single day is for the Grange to be stronger tomorrow than it is today," she said. "Every single action we take as an organization needs to have a purpose, it needs to be relevant. And it needs to resonate not only with our current members, but it needs to resonate with those folks who aren't members yet."

'Creating calm out of chaos'

Hamp, 57, stood in the middle of the 20-acre property outside of Spokane that she and husband Duane purchased in 2021.

She spent more than 30 years in state and local government, retiring in early 2023. She originally planned to be a city manager. During the fire storms of 1994, she got involved with state emergency management part-time and fell in love with the fire service.

She particularly enjoyed being on the incident management team.

"It's creating calm out of chaos," she said. "It's going into communities that have been absolutely devastated and finding a way to help, getting their feet back on the ground."

She's been in Grange even longer.

She is a fourth-generation member, growing up on a dairy farm originally homesteaded by her great-grandfather in Monroe, Wash.

When she was 5, she joined Tualco Junior Grange #341, and then Tualco Grange #284. She was elected Grange national president in November 2023.

"There's not very many days in my entire life that I haven't thought about or somehow been impacted by the Grange," Hamp said. "The commitment has to be to leave it better than I found it."

Membership on the rise

There are about 1,400 local Grange halls, and 140,000 members nationwide. While many civic and social organizations have seen massive losses over the past decades, the Grange has experienced the opposite, with a net gain in membership for 2022 and 2023, and holding steady in 2025.

Another net gain is predicted for 2025, said Phil Vonada, National Grange communications director.

Membership was highest in the 1870s, when nearly every farmer was a Grange member, Vonada said.

Hamp uses the expression: "This is not your grandpa's Grange."

"In grandpa's Grange, people had more time than money," she said. "A lot of these Granges, every project was done by the membership. Need a new roof? Members showed up Saturday morning, worked all day. Maybe some of the women were in the kitchen making lunch and dinner. Over and over, everything that happened was done with your own hands."

Dues were suppressed because members paid with their labor in many cases. Today, most people would say that time is their most precious commodity, Hamp said.

"Our members don't have a ton of time; that's not the resource that they have to give," she said. "What we do ask them to do, we have got to make sure it's on point – that the meetings are relevant and don't go for hours and hours."

Hamp envisions a rural-centric conference that encompasses all the important issues — commodities, education, health care, transportation, infrastructure and insurance.

She challenges members to invite new folks into their Grange halls. That includes mentoring and preparing the next group of members, she said.

Hamp balances the Grange's history and traditions with a "fresh and clear vision of what our future can be," said Joe Stefenoni, a National Grange board member and president of the Cal-

ifornia Grange.

"Chris is a consummate teacher," he said. "If you want to know something, she is more than willing to bring you into that circle to teach and to grow that new leadership."

Policy recommendations are adopted in local Granges, passed by state Granges and moved to the National Grange, which advocates in Washington, D.C. with Congress and other federal agencies.

Hamp has embraced that bottom-up model, said

Beth Westbrook, a member she said. "It's her fireof the Grange's advocacy board.

"She's a good listener," Westbrook said. "She's the type of leader that says, 'Here's my vision. What are your thoughts about it?' She allows things to be tweaked and evolved, until she has consensus."

Grange members are responding to the opportunities Hamp is presenting, Westbrook said.

"She has the ability to mobilize people to start solving the problems,"

woman hat she's wearing at that point."

Advocacy

Hamp has written opinions about a variety of key topics as president, including investment in rural healthcare, rural broadband and the farm bill.

She believes advocacy will be the new big draw to the organization.

"I think a lot of Granges have gotten away from it," she said. "A lot of granges are not known for their

advocacy work, they're known for their community service work."

Some folks believe advocacy is harder, don't think anyone would listen to them or dread a confrontational conversation.

"Standing behind the counter and serving pancakes, it's kind of hard to get somebody's tail knotted up," she said. "But if we sit down and start talking about policy, people get a little itchy about that."

Advocacy means speaking up for those three-generation farm families and saying, "This is why we do it," she said. "So they can continue to live the life the way they've done it for generations. That has got to be doable."

Favorite memories

"When you talk to the grandpas, the thing that gets the sparkle in their eye is, they're talking about the dance, how they met Grandma in the parking lot," Hamp said. "Everything that brings that sparkle to their eye is some of the shenanigans and fun—that's where they went to have their social piece."

Somewhere along the way, a lot of the fun disappeared, she said.

"All of a sudden, people are thinking Grange is supposed to be serious business, and we can't do that," she said. "I've been through our bylaws and there's nothing in there that says

we can't have fun while we get this work done."

For the first time, the Grange national convention Nov. 8-16 will be on a cruise ship, departing from Miami, Fla., to the ABC islands in the Caribbean.

Hamp's two-year term will end at that meeting. It's up to the delegates to re-nominate her.

"I serve at the pleasure — if they like what we're doing, then great," she said. "And if they don't, then that's perfectly fine, too."

Hamp's own favorite

Grange memories harken back to when she was a kid.

The Monroe Grange hall was an old schoolhouse with a crawlspace that the youth would set up as a Halloween haunted house.

"It was just a dirt floor, musty and damp and cobwebs everywhere — it was perfect for that," Hamp said. "We'd be down there for a couple of weeks, scurrying around and dragging crap in and making this walk people would have to go through."

At the same time, Hamp

says, they were learning about working together. How to vote in favor of or against something, even if it was to vote against something your best friend suggested. How to decide in a meeting what to do with the money you raised. How to be a good neighbor. How to be a good citizen. The importance of being part of the process.

"It's all these things about life that you learned," Hamp said. "I just happened to learn them in Grange."

Bee deaths caused by mites with pesticide resistance

Scientists believe massive honey bee die-offs were caused by alarmingly high levels of viral infections from parasitic Varroa mites — the tiny arachnids had genetic resistance to the most common treatment used against them.

The USDA Agricultural Research Service conducted a study that analyzed samples from six major commercial beekeeping operations affected by colony losses.

Samples were collected in February as bees were being staged for California's almond season.

"While viruses are a likely end-stage cause of colony death, other stressors such as nutritional stress and agrochemicals may have also played significant roles," stated a manuscript submitted by USDA-ARS researchers to a scientific journal.

"Now that they've released the analysis, beekeepers can better underwhat happened stand and take action," said Matt Mulica, facilitator of the Honey Bee Health Coalition.

"We understand more analysis is occurring and we look forward to learning more about the other potential causes of these significant colony losses," he added, in a news release from the organization.

About the study

Researchers found high levels of deformed wing virus and acute bee paralysis virus in pooled colony samples or in individual bees shaking and other signs of morbidity.

Experimental inoculation further confirmed these viruses as the likely cause of mortality in collapsing colonies.

All Varroa mites collected affected colonies tested positive for a genetic marker linked to resistance to amitraz, the most commonly used miticide in commercial beekeeping.

New treatments needed

study's The findings underscores the urgent need for new tools and integrated pest management strategies.

"This is a critical moment for honey bee health," said Patty Sundberg, president of the Beekeeping American Federation.

"We continue relying on a single line of defense against Varroa. These mites are evolving quickly and our management tools must evolve just as fast," she added, in the news

Help may be on the way. The Environmental Protection Agency has proposed registering a new type of insecticide to control Varroa mites, which are originally from Asia.

Massachusetts-based GreenLight Biosciences developed the active ingredient vadescana for an insecticide that interferes with Varroa mite reproduction.

Pouches containing the product would be placed directly into hives. The USDA has said that the new insecticide could replace more toxic treatments.

Important pollinator

Nationwide, than 60% of commercial hives have been lost since summer 2024, representing a total of 1.7 million colonies and an estimated financial impact of \$600 million, according to the USDA.

Honey bees pollinate a wide variety of crops and more than 1/3 of U.S. produce.

The value of crops that require bee pollination is estimated at more than \$20 billion annually in the U.S. and \$387 billion globally.

"Our nation's food supply thrives, and is sustained, by the work of our pollinators," said Joon Park, acting ARS administrator.

"USDA scientists continue to research major stressors and new parasite treatment strategies, which will help reduce the agricultural challenge presented by the Varroa mites in honey bee colonies," Park added, in a USDA news release.

Kitchen Corner: Recipes for fresh cherries

RY DΔΝΔ

July is a month for fresh cherries. Here are some recipes from Cherries Northwest.

Northwest cherry pie Ingredients

- •2 Pie crusts, prepared
- •2 tbsp Cornstarch
- •2 tbsp cherry juice, reserved from pitting (fresh) or from rinsing/rehydrating (preserved)
- •7 cups Northwest Cherries pitted
 - •3/4-1 cup sugar*
- •1 tbsp almond extract or bourbon-vanilla bean infusion

Instructions

Using a fork, whisk together the cherry water and cornstarch in a small bowl, then set aside.

Stem and pit the cherries, if not already done.

Fill pie dish with cherries and blend the remaining volume (about 2 cups or 1/4 the total volume) into a puree. Pour the remaining whole cherries into a mixing bowl and return to the refrigerator (if using frozen cherries).

Using a heavy-bot-tomed pan, gently heat the puree and sugar over low heat until the volume has reduced by 1/3 to 1/2. Constantly stir across the bottom to prevent burning.

Once reduced, remove cency. Gently and briefly

from the heat and stir in the cornstarch slurry until the mix regains translucency Gently and briefly reheat if needed. Stir in the extract and let the mixture cool to room temperature.

Pour the cooled mixture

over the whole cherries, gently stirring to incorporate. Pour the final cherry mixture into a 9 or 10-inch prepared pie crust, and top with a second crust.

Pinch, crimp and vent the top crust. Brush with a beaten egg if so desired and sprinkle lightly with coconut sugar.

Bake at 375 degrees for 55-60 minutes, or until the crust is golden brown and the filling is steadily bubbling. Aluminum foil may be used around the crust edges to prevent browning during the second half of the bake. Transfer the pie to a cooling rack, and most importantly, allow the pie to cool completely before serving (3-4 hours).

*sugar may be substituted for 3/4 - 1 cup coconut sugar (Grandma later changed this to lower-glycemic coconut sugar)

Sweet cherry almond bars

Ingredients

About 14 ounces of pitted cherries, halved or rough chopped (about 2 1/2 cups)

- •2 Tbsp sugar
- •Juice of 1/2 lemon
- •1/2 tsp almond extract
- •1 tsp cornstarch

Shortbread dough

- •1 cup flour
- •1/4 cup almond meal or almond flour
 - •1/2 cup sugar Pinch of salt

 - •1/2 tsp baking powder
 - •1 egg yolk
 - •1 tsp almond extract
 - •1 stick (1/2 cup or 4 ounces) cold, unsalted butter cut in pieces

Topping: 1/4 cup sliced almonds

Instructions

Set oven to 350F

Lightly spray an 8x8 baking pan

Stir together the cher- flour ries with the sugar, lemon juice, extract, and cornstarch. Set aside, tossing sugar occasionally to encourage some of the juices to start flowing.

Put the flour, almond melted meal, sugar, salt, and baking powder into the bowl of a food processor and pulse to combine.

Add the yolk, extract, and butter, and pulse or process to combine just until the dough comes together, it will be crumbly.

Press 2/3 of the dough into the bottom of your pan to form the crust. Top with the cherries. Then crumble the remaining dough evenly over the cherries. Top with the sliced almonds and bake for about 40 minutes until the dough is just golden and the filling is bubbling.

Let cool before cutting.

Notes

If you don't like almond extract, use vanilla extract instead.

You can make your own almond meal by grinding whole almonds in a food processor.

Fresh cherry crisp **Ingredients** For the Cherry Layer:

- •2 1/2 ball pounds fresh cherries, pitted and halved
- cup granulated •1/4 sugar
 - •3 tbsp all-purpose flour
 - •Juice of half of a lemon

For the Crisp Topping:

- •1 1/2 cups all-purpose
 - •1 cup oats
- •1/2 cup granulated
 - •1 tsp baking powder
 - •1 tsp salt
- •8 tbsp unsalted butter,

Instructions

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. In a medium bowl, add the cherries, sugar, flour, and lemon juice. Stir until combined. Transfer to a greased cast iron skillet or 9 X 13-inch cake pan.

In a mixing bowl, whisk together the flour, oats, sugar, baking powder, and salt until well combined. Pour the melted butter into the dry ingredients mixture. Use a fork to mix until combined.

Pour the cherry mixture into the cast iron to create an even base layer. Cover evenly with the crisp topping.

Bake the cherry crisp for one hour until the cherries are bubbly and the top is golden. Serve warm with a scoop of vanilla ice cream or gelato.

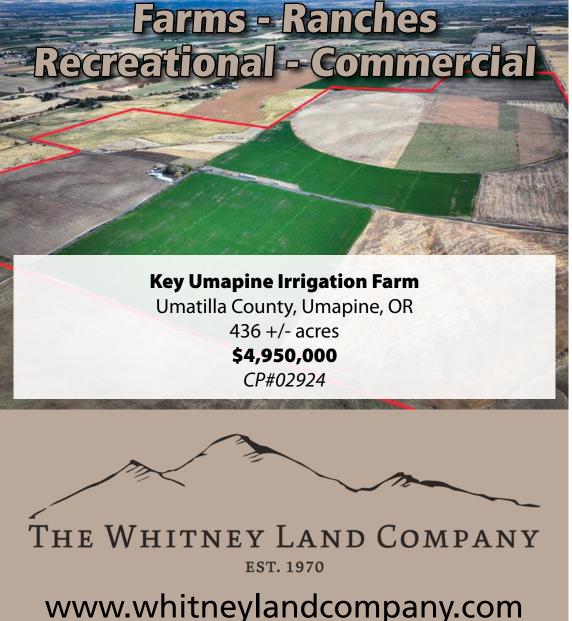

Senators hear market concentration causes ranchers to drop 'like flies'

R-CALF CEO Bill Bullard got a sympathetic and bipartisan reaction as he told a Senate committee that beef and sheep ranchers are being exploited by meat-packers, a claim disputed by a trade group that represents the packers.

Bullard testified June 24 at a hearing on competitive markets held by the Senate Judiciary Committee. He said a handful of meat-packers have all but eliminated competition in the beef and sheep industries.

"Ranchers at one end of the supply chain and consumers at the other are being exploited," Bullard said. "Our cattle and sheep markets are fundamentally broken, and we ask Congress for its intervention in rigorous enforcement of our antitrust laws and the Packers and Stockyards Act."

packers' group, the Meat Institute, was not represented at the hearing. Institute spokeswoman Sarah Little said in an email that industry figures show packers lost money per head in 2024 and losses have continued so far in 2025.

"On the other hand, cattle producers are making record profits," she said. "This is due to simple supply and demand. There are not enough cattle to meet strong consumer demand."

Bullard agreed in a post-hearing interview that cattle prices are high because consumers want beef, while the U.S. cattle herd has shrunk. But ranchers have seen prices spike before and then collapse, he said. "That doesn't happen in a competitive marketplace."

Four companies handle 85% of all steers and heifers, according to the USDA Economic Research Service. Bullard said market concentration and "unrestrained globalism" have thrown the cattle industry into a crisis.

"For decades, our ranchers have been dropping like flies," he told senators.

Sen. Josh Hawley, R-Missouri, agreed with Bullard's take on the marketplace.

"If you're a cattle rancher, you're not getting paid for your product. If you are a consumer at the grocery store, you're paying an arm and a leg for some hamburger," he said. "Who's really making out like a bandit here? It's the monopolists. It's the four companies that control 80% of beef processing. That's not competition."

New Jersey Sen. Cory Booker, the committee's top-ranking Democrat, said he agreed with Hawley.

Bullard said he was encouraged that senators from both parties were sympathetic.

"Clearly, there is an awareness of what the cattle industry is facing," he said.

New strawberry, lost in paperwork shuffle for years, continues late plant breeder's legacy

AURORA, Ore. — A new strawberry called Finnito is on the verge of being released and continues the legacy of Chad Finn, a USDA Agricultural Research Service berry breeder.

Finn, who worked and collaborated at Oregon State University in Corvallis, Ore., developed new strawberries, blackberries, raspberries and blueberries for 26 years.

He created numerous selections that have become industry standards, including Columbia Star and Black Diamond blackberries and the Tillamook and Sweet Sunrise strawberries.

"He was just really prolific," said Ted Mackey, a retired USDA ARS research technician.

The strawberry was stuck in the paperwork shuffle until September, when Jenyne Loarca was hired by the USDA ARS as a blueberry and strawberry breeder.

Loarca — who was fired in federal budget cuts in February, then rehired — said she made Finnito a top priority.

"There was so much excitement from strawberry grower community," she said.

Finnito ripens later in June than most strawberries and could slightly extend the season's finish.

The variety was meant to help Pacific Northwest growers diversify into the fresh market, as processed sales, traditionally the main channel for the fruit in Oregon and Washington, have been slipping for decades.

OSU's strawberry open field tour on June 11 at the North Willamette Research & Extension Center included a "blind" flavor and appearance test for nine new varieties.

Finnito seemed to be a crowd pleaser, though that should come as no given Finn's surprise track record.

Colleagues described Finn as a gregarious guy who loved getting together with family and friends over food.

His work will continue to feed future generations.

During the five years before Loarca was hired to replace Finn, a private breeder helped fill the void, experts said.

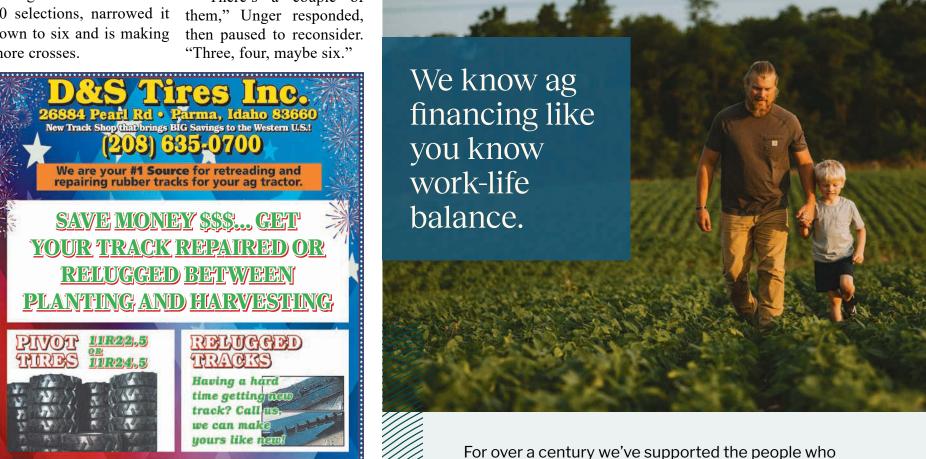

Bullard shared the witness table with four others, including Roger Alford, principal deputy attorney general in the Department of Justice's antitrust division.

The Justice Department is suing Agri Stats, alleging the Indiana-based data consulting firm is violating the Sherman Act by monopolizing information that allows packers to control the meat supply.

"We absolutely agree that agriculture and antitrust are fundamentally important," Alford said.

Congress passed the Packers and Stockyards Act in 1921 to prevent meat-packers from taking advantage of thousands of ranchers. The Biden administration proposed making it easier for individual ranchers to bring claims under the act, but withdrew the rule.

While R-CALF supported the new regulations, other farm groups, including the American Farm Bureau and National Cattlemen's Beef Association, argued the rules would prevent meat packers from offering tailored contracts to individual producers.

Several ag groups praise federal budget law

Several agriculture groups praised the federal budget reconciliation package — known as One Big, Beautiful Bill which President Donald Trump signed July 4.

Cattle

"This comprehensive piece of legislation includes several issues that USCA has long advocated for and we will continue to engage in discussions as this moves forward," U.S. Cattlemen's Association president Justin Tupper said in a statement. In the new law, the livestock indemnity program establishes a payment rate for losses due to predation at 100% of market value and for losses due to adverse weather or disease at 75%. The law introduces additional payments for unborn livestock death losses incurred on or after Jan. 1, 2024, at a rate determined by the agriculture secretary not exceeding 85% of the payment rate for the lowest class of livestock. The livestock forage disaster program allows for two monthly payments and specifies eligibility criteria based on grazing periods. The law also provides emergen-

cy assistance for cattle with specific payment rates and eligibility criteria and specifies funding allocations for foreign animal disease prevention programs.

Dairy

The law will "create several key opportunities for dairy," National Milk Producers Federation president and CEO Gregg Doud said in a statement. The law calls for investments that will "benefit dairy farmers and the cooperatives they own." The law renews the dairy margin coverage program through 2031 and updates its production history calculation based on the highest production year of 2021, 2022 or 2023 and extends producers' ability to receive a premium discount for locking in coverage. The law provides funding for USDA to conduct mandatory dairy processing cost surveys every two years to provide better data to inform future allowance conversations and folds remaining Inflation Reduction Act conservation money into the Farm Bill baseline. This will result in increased long-term

Natural Resources Conservation Service's Environmental Quality Incentives Program, according to the federation.

The law provides new trade-promotion funding based on current programs and increases funding for animal health programs that help to prevent, control and eradicate animal diseases such as H5N1 (bird flu) in dairy cattle.

Wheat

The law "will empower America's wheat producers to invest in their operations, remain globally competitive, and support national food security and economic resilience," National Association of Wheat Growers president Pat Clements said in a statement. Reference prices are increased for Agricultural Risk Coverage and Price Loss Coverage safety net programs, with an inflation adjuster and improved price escalator to keep pace with rising market and input costs. The law boosts funding for supplemental disaster assistance programs and expands access to affordable crop insurance options.

Specialty crops

The law's investments "are a key piece of the puzzle to enhance the competitiveness of specialty

crop growers, but there is still work to be done," according to a statement from the Specialty Crop Farm Bill Alliance. The law increases funding for the Specialty Crop Research Initiative and Specialty Crop Block Grant, Market Access, and Plant Protection Act pest and disease programs. Senate rules "prohibited the inclusion of many of the innovative policy initiatives that we proposed, such as investing in mechanization and automation, modernizing procurement rules to include more high-value fruits and vegetables, and reforming crop insurance that would provide many of our growers with an affordable and effective safety net for the first time," according to the alliance's statement. "We stand ready to work with Congress to enact the remainder of our priorities at the earliest opportunity and look forward to advancing future farm and food policy in the context of comprehensive, bipartisan farm bills."

Fertilizer

Officials with The Fertilizer Institute said the new law's tax provisions and farm safety net enhancements will benefit the industry.

"Policies that provide for industry growth, expansion and innovation are critical for the continued success of the U.S. fertilizer industry,"

president and CEO Corey Rosenbusch said in a statement. "Our competitiveness on the global level comes in part from certainty and the ability to plan and invest in the future. The tax policies included within this legislation will allow

our industry to continue providing our farmers with the crop nutrients they need to grow the food that feeds our country."

Equipment

The Senate version of the

legislation improved upon the earlier House version "by making key pro-growth provisions permanent," according to a statement from the Associated Equipment Distributors.

"By permanently extending and

restoring pro-growth, capital-investment-incentivizing tax policies, the Senate is ensuring longterm tax code certainty that will benefit the equipment sector and the broader economy," president and CEO Brian McGuire said.

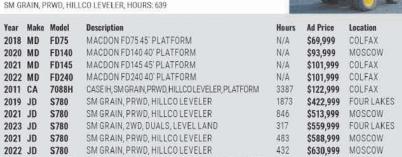

Walla Walla sweet onion farmers power through uncertainty

WALLA WALLA, Wash.

— Washington's handful of Walla Walla sweet onion farmers are right in the thick of harvest.

"I would say we have an average to slightly-above average crop," said Michael J. Locati, president of the Walla Walla Sweet Onion Marketing Committee.

Harvest kicked off June 5,

about a week to 10 days earlier than usual, Locati said. It will run through the first week of August.

About 10 farmers raise the popular niche specialty on 500 acres. Walla Walla sweets are protected by a federal marketing order, which regulates the handling of sweet onions grown in the Walla Walla Valley of southeast Washington and northeast Oregon.

Prices are comparable to last year, at about \$24 for 40 pounds.

"There's a bit of deflation out there," Locati said. "There's a lot of onions on the market right now. There's been a little slower demand. We're trying to adjust harvest accordingly."

Farmers have been able to find workers to hand-pick the onions, he said. With temperatures predicted to hit more than 100 degrees for several days during the week of July 7, harvest start times may move back from 4 a.m. to earlier, he said.

"We're blessed to have a crop, we're blessed to have the people here to help take care of it," Locati said.

More onions

"Margins are getting squeezed as inflation goes up and we keep the same price as last year," Locati said. "We're trying to move more units, and then it's tough because then there's a lot of onions on the market."

It can be hard to demand a price premium when there's uncertainty in the marketplace, he said.

"Uncertainty creates a lot more uncertainty," he said. "It doesn't help that there's more onions out there."

When there's more onions than they can sell as Walla Walla sweets, farmers sell the extras at the regular fresh onion market price.

"When you're trying to get a premium and you're hand-harvesting, and then the general onion market is mostly machine-harvested ..." Locati

said. "When the discrepancy between the regular onion market and your premium gets larger, it gets harder to sell the premium." Last year, that fresh onion

price was about \$14 for a 50-pound sack. This year, it's about half of that, Locati said.

"When the regular onion market supply exceeds demand, the price of all onions suffers," Locati said.

Reddish-hued rosé Walla Walla sweet onions represent up to 15% of the market. Harvest

began two weeks early for the sub-section of the niche onion.

Locati was just finishing up harvesting some July 2, and will harvest some later-transplanted rosés for the rest of July and the summer.

NOAA Fisheries weighing ESA protection for Chinook salmon

The National Marine Fisheries Service, or NOAA Fisheries, will determine whether springrun Chinook salmon in the Pacific Northwest warrant protection under the Endangered Species Act beginning in the fall.

Under a stipulated settlement agreement filed June 26 in U.S. District Court's Portland division, the agency has until Nov. 3 to determine whether listing Oregon and California coastal salmon as threatened or endangered is warranted, and Jan. 2 for Washington coastal salmon.

"We are unable to comment on matters of litigation," NOAA Fisheries spokesman James Miller told the Capital Press.

The plaintiffs—the Center for Biological Diversity, Native Fish Society, Umpqua Watersheds and Pacific Rivers—sued the agency for the decision in February.

By pressing for an ESA listing determination, the plaintiffs are recognizing "broad West Coast impacts" to salmon runs, said Darryll Olsen, board

representative for the Columbia-Snake River Irrigators Association.

"The common denominator here with Columbia-Snake River salmon runs is ocean conditions, separate from harvest impacts," Olsen said.

The "overpowering force" of ocean conditions on all West Coast runs, including Columbia-Snake river fish, was documented in a U.S. Army Corps of Engineers report in 1994, Olsen said.

That report "provided indisputable data/evaluations that ocean conditions were the key driver affecting salmon production trends, with greater robustness than other fresh water survival factors," Olsen said. "This empirical observation remains constant."

The center in a statement called the deadlines an "important legal victory."

"The government has taken far too long deciding whether to protect these imperiled Chinook salmon, but these deadlines will hold officials accountable," center legal fellow Jeremiah Scanlan said.

USDA ordered to re-evaluate grasshopper spray program

A federal judge has ordered USDA to re-evaluate the environmental impacts of its grasshopper and Mormon cricket suppression program in the West within two years.

The agency's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service must correct deficiencies in its 2019 review of the program, requiring a greater focus on "integrated pest management" techniques and the cumulative effects of pesticide use, among other factors, according to U.S. District Judge Marco Hernandez.

The federal suppression program is important for Western farmers and ranchers, as outbreaks of grasshoppers and Mormon crickets can severely damage crops and forage for livestock.

About three years ago, the environmental nonprofits Xerces Society and Center for Biological Diversity filed a lawsuit against the agency, arguing its spray program violated the National Environmental Policy Act.

"APHIS's widespread, routine application of pesticides on public and private rangelands to manage grasshoppers — many of which never reach economic infestation levels — harms not just grasshoppers but also numerous non-target insect species critical to ecosystem functioning and productivity," the lawsuit claimed.

Last year, the judge agreed with the environmental plaintiffs that USDA had put too much emphasis on direct suppression of the pests with insecticides and did not adequately evaluate the use of preventative measures.

Despite this finding, Hernandez did not overturn USDA's legal authorization for the overall spray program to continue.

Since then, the fedgovernment and environmental plaintiffs have been debating how to remedy the shortcomings in USDA's previous

"environmental impact statement" about the program's consequences.

Though APHIS argued imposing a two-year deadline to correct the EIS was unnecessary, given the time-related requirements of NEPA, the judge said it was appropriate to provide the environmental plaintiffs with "a remedy should there be a delay."

"This is particularly appropriate where, as here, the legally inadequate EIS will remain in place indefinitely without action by APHIS," Hernandez said.

While the judge agreed the environmenwith tal plaintiffs on the deadline, he did not grant several other requests, such as requiring the USDA to completely redo the study instead of merely supplementing the 2019 version.

The judge also denied an injunction that would've required the USDA to issue "real-time, application-specific notifications of APHIS spraying activities" before the new review is complete, since this remedy is "not sufficiently tailored" to the violations and goes "far beyond what NEPA requires."

Although producers, processors and industry experts say there haven't been widespread immigration enforcement operations in the Pacific Northwest, immigrant workers are nonetheless fearful.

PNW hasn't been targeted for raids, but workers are scared

Farmers, processors and industry experts say that while there haven't been U.S. Immigration Customs and Enforcement raids or sweeps at farms, packing houses and processing facilities in the Pacific Northwest, many immigrant workers are afraid.

Even while advocating mass deportation of illegal immigrants, President Trump has suggested that he would support a program that would grant legal status to farmworkers under certain conditions. Earlier this month, he said

to issue an order to ICE regarding immigration enforcement actions against farmworkers.

The administration has yet to propose a plan for exempting farmworkers from immigration enforcement, or clearly said it won't conduct random raids on farms.

Save Family Farming, an advocacy organization, issued a press release drawing attention to the possibility that a labor shortage will develop. Contradictory statements from the Trump administra-

on social media that he expected tion won't help, said Ben Tindall, executive director of Save Family Farming.

> "The administration and Congress must sit down with farmworker advocates and agricultural leaders to craft immigration policies that actually protect the people and communities feeding this country," he said.

> Jon DeVaney, Washington State Tree Fruit Association president, said reports of federal agents nearby, whether true or not, have caused disruptions for some agricultural operations.

"I have heard reports of ICE arriving at farms or processing facilities looking to carry out warrants for specific individuals, but not broader raids here in Washington," DeVaney wrote in an email.

Idaho Dairymen's Association CEO Rick Naerebout said immigration enforcement raids have not been seen in the industry in the state but have occurred elsewhere, such as at Outlook Dairy Farms in New Mexico early this month.

"We know enforcement actions are happening in other states," he said. "We're fortunate it hasn't happened here, so the concern is merited. There are more unknowns than knowns at this point."

Jennifer Uranga owns Mountain West Ag Consulting, a southwest Idaho business that specializes in federal H-2A guest worker applications and in farm human resource needs.

"I think there have been cases where the workers have been staying away when they heard there are rumors of ICE enforcement" in Idaho, Washington and Oregon, she said.

Cherry pickers needed

With a bumper cherry crop, Northwest producers say they are facing a shortage of pickers this season. It's unclear, however, how much the potential for enforcement actions is contributing to the shortage.

"The shortage is worse than I would expect in a big crop. Growers are having trouble meeting their usual

number of people picking," said Mike Omeg, director of operations for Orchard View Farms, headquartered in The Dalles, Ore.

"To make the shortage worse we have a big crop of cherries this year," he said in a text message exchange.

Lesley Tamura, Columbia Gorge Fruit Growers board chairwoman and a pear farmer, said Hood River, Ore., was included in the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's list of Oregon sanctuary jurisdictions and that's making workers especially nervous.

"Cherry growers in harvest right now are short in their labor force because so many people are terrified of coming up from California, so our growers and employees are definitely feeling the impact," Tamura said in an email.

Tamura wasn't sure if there's an ICE presence in the area or if there are simply rumors stemming from fear and panic.

Carlos Torres, owner of PLM Orchards Wenatchee, Wash., grows cherries, apples and pears, and he's facing a shortage of workers, so employees he has are working as late as they can every day.

"We all, here in the valley, are down on workers," Torres said.

He expects the shortage to continue throughout the late summer and into fall during the harvest for apples and

Torres said big growers are increasing wages to get more help, so smaller growers with fewer resources will face tougher times.

Charlie Lyall, who grows cherries, apples and concord grapes, said he was almost finished with cherry picking and faced a labor shortage.

"A lot of the California guys, and probably from other states, they were late coming up, and I don't think some of them came up," said Lyall, owner of Lyall Farms headquartered in Mattawa, Wash.

"Once you get behind, you just can't catch up. We're going into thinning for apples. I'm expecting a tough time getting enough workers," he said.

No impact on processing

ICE reported detaining more than 70 illegal aliens at a meat-packing plant in Omaha, Neb. They used stolen Social Security numbers to get jobs, according to ICE.

There have been no reports of raids in Northwestern processing plants.

"Outside of what's been on broadcast media, I haven't heard anything from any of my members or from anything that's occurred in the Columbia Basin or Central Washington," said Jack Field, executive director of the Washington Cattle Feeders Association. "Thus far, I haven't had any reports from feedyards having any issues. It sounds like so far, everything's been business as usual."

Jacki Madill, executive director of the Washington Beef Commission, agreed.

"Both of our major packers have not expressed any concerns," Madill said.

Fear is real

"We had one case last week where one worker did not want to work in a field harvesting because they saw a truck they thought was an ICE truck — it wasn't," Alan Schreiber, executive director of Washington Blueberry Commission, said in an email.

nia Association of Winegrape Growers president. said there was a lot of general unease in agricultural communities.

The association is ensuring that growers have the most up-to-date information on enforcement actions and that each member knows what to do if ICE enters their property.

"We also want to ensure that our workforce knows their rights, and that we are actively communicating with them," she said, in an email.

Snake River Sugarbeet Growers Association executive director Samantha Parrott said the issue highlights a broader concern.

"Agriculture across the country relies heavily on a workforce that's estimated to be 50% undocumented," Parrott said. "If that workforce disappears, how will we continue to produce food? Food security is national security and we need real solutions that recognize the realities of labor in agriculture."

Before irrigation researcher Troy Peters helps farmers decide which sprinkler setup or other efficiency-enhancing technology to use, he thinks about how a single drop of water gets to its ideal spot in a crop field.

"Any time you can reduce the amount of time that droplets are flying through the air even by fractions of seconds, it just increases efficiency tremendously," the Washington State University Extension irrigation specialist said.

Using pivot sprinkler irrigation, even converting from a mid elevation spray application system five to 10 feet off the ground to a low elevation spray application system a foot off the ground can increase application efficiency by 15-20%, the Prosser-based Peters said.

"And this makes a huge difference, especially when there's drought — when the grower doesn't have enough water for the season or could

use the water somewhere else," he said.

A big-picture problem in the arid West is that while soil, sun and other conditions are good, "we just don't have enough rainfall to

grow things without irrigation water," Peters said. "So being as efficient and effective with the water we have is the idea — and then using more technology and tools that are being developed to

make that happen, to be better with that."

Variable-rate irrigation is one recently popular approach to further increasing the efficiency of sprinkler systems, he said. Center pivot sprinklers apply different volumes of water to different areas, and "the idea is to get the right amount of water to the right areas of the field."

Also using sprinklers, one way to minimize drift and get droplets into plant canopies and soil as efficiently as possible is to move the application point closer to the ground. Irrigators may need to add sprinkler heads — decreasing spacing between each to improve application efficiency and uniformity, Peters said.

In a low elevation spray application system, nozzles are placed just above the canopy. But in a low energy precision application system, sprinklers or bubblers are placed on or just above the ground. And in a mobile drip irrigation system, drip tubing is attached to a center pivot and dragged.

Usage of these systems can reduce pumped volume and pumping costs because the water doesn't have to travel as far from its source, Peters said.

challenges," he said. "You have to manage that irrigation system a little differently."

Technological advancement continues in remote monitoring and control of sensors in the field and integrating real-time data into management programs, Peters said. Soil moisture and irrigation pressure can be tracked and pumps controlled from a mobile phone, for example.

"When growers can do that, they can do a better job of managing their water," he said. "Instead of getting into the truck and driving 10 minutes to the pump and messing with a pivot point, the farmer can read the sensor and make a decision based on that. All that is becoming much more integrated."

Chemigation-related monitoring and control systems also

are improving, helping irrigators precisely track application of chemicals through irrigation water, Peters said.

He has been working on a smartphone application that uses weather data to help growers track and manage irrigation and nutrients. A just-released test version models nitrogen in soil, a feature designed to help the farmer determine when and how much to fertilize.

Peters also has an irrigation scheduler app that uses data from an ag weather network to model crop water use and in turn help growers decide the best times to turn water on

and off to optimize efficiency.

"The more growers have the right information and the controls readily available in hand on their phones, they are going to make better decisions, make more money and save energy," he said. "Everybody wins. That's where we're going more and more."

Kindwall-Moore connects farmers, buyers by overhauling supply chain

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho
— Joni Kindwall-Moore likes to bring people together.

"You literally can't do business well without understanding that humans need connection, and networks drive everything," she said. "If we start looking at things as interactions instead of just transactions, we can create more resilient models that are better for the economy and better for people."

Kindwall-Moore founded Snacktivist Foods, a food innovation company, in 2015, designed to elevate underused crops and farmer-connected supply chains.

She helped found the North American Millets Alliance in 2022, to help promote millets as a crop and ingredient in food processing, in conjunction with the United Nations' International Year of Millets.

Now she is launching the Ryzosphere, a platform for producers, processors, buyers and farmer-focused support services.

Kindwall-Moore wants to help farmers make connections within the supply chain.

"We underestimate the power the markets have over what farming actually is," she said.

"Farmers are some of the most educated, resourceful segments of the population. They're incredible — they're businesspeople, but they're also land stewards. But their hands are tied. They don't have democratized access to markets."

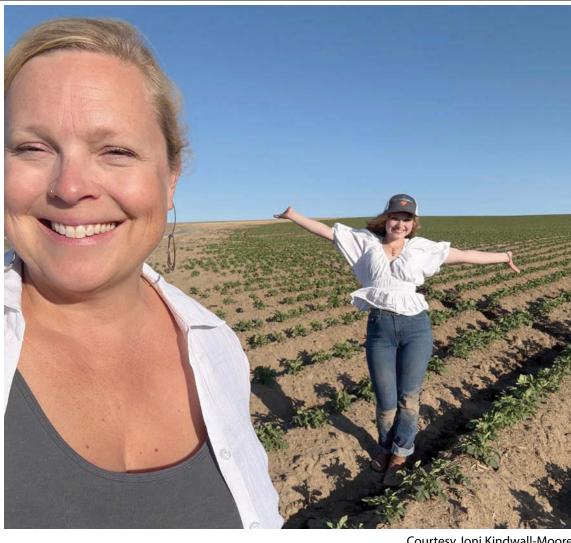

Kindwall-Moore often asks farmers what they wish they could be doing on their farms. The answer often comes tied within the reality of what's profitable. But most farmers feel a "deep need" to make sure their practices benefit the entire ecosystem, she said.

"The markets must fundamentally shift if we ever want to support a sustainable model on farms," she said.

People and plants

Kindwall-Moore is an ethnobotanist, a scientist who studies the relationship between people and plants for food and medicine. She was a researcher in health sciences and then became an ICU-ER nurse, a position she held for 15 years until 2019.

"I was really troubled by the fact that so much of our patient population was there for preventable health-related disease," she said.

Snacktivist focuses on innovation around grains such as millet, sorghum, buckwheat and teff, which don't require as many inputs, are drought resistant and rich in nutrients.

"Once we bring back healthier rotations to farms, the health will impact the economics and will impact the environmental outcomes," she said. "You cannot solve one — they all come together. We've tried to do reductionistic models of fixing systemic problems, and it just fails again and again."

Upbringing

Kindwall-Moore grew up on a small farm between Tillamook, Ore., and Salem.

"Timber, fishing, farming was my upbringing," she said.

Her parents both worked off the farm. She'd work harvest in the summer, driving commercial double-axle, 18-speed diesel trucks at 16.

While living in Alaska, she saw the tug of war between wild fish, farmed fish, nutrition, rural economics, sustainability and natural resources extraction.

"All of the things in my life have brought me back to the connections between human and food," she said. "I really enjoy this work a lot. I feel like I can make a difference."

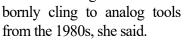
Updating food and ag

Kindwall-Moore first developed the Ryzosphere business plan under a different name in 2016-17, pitching it as a technology incubator to potential investors.

She was told at the time there was no need for transparency in the food system, or digital automation, and that health and climate didn't matter.

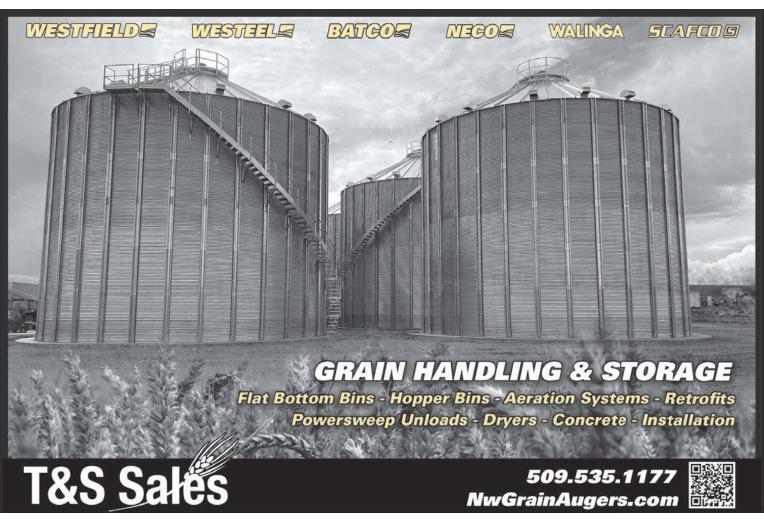
"And then they said, 'You're a mom and a nurse — you should probably just make cookies if you want to do something impactful," she said.

Food and agriculture stubbornly cling to analog tools

"We've not embraced consumerization that transformed real estate, travel and consumer purchasing, like Amazon," she said. "It's transformed everything but food and ag."

Connecting to the right farmer

By "automating diligence," there's less risk for farmers, she said.

For example, she worked through Snacktivist to buy sorghum from a grower, but didn't ensure the grower's farmhands knew that the sorghum needed to be gluten-free, which required a double-wash on all of the harvesting equipment.

"Because we hadn't put all of the steps in place, they didn't know, they went out and harvested it, and it was all contaminated, I couldn't buy a single bag," Kindwall-Moore said.

Fortunately in that instance, the farmer had another place to sell his sorghum.

"But we've had situations where that could have been catastrophic," she said. "Now a farmer is sitting on a crop they can't sell. That's economically disastrous. And, when those deals fall through, why don't we have a place where we can say, 'Hey, we've got an excess of something,' or there's a purchaser who says, 'I'm short on something because my (crop) got ruined by hail. Where can I find somebody who's growing this crop under these management practices, these criteria?""

The Ryzosphere is slated to launch by invitation only in September for early adopters, and then more widely in early 2026.

It's not just for the so-called "most perfect organic farmer in the world," Kindwall-Moore said.

"If you want to do better, and you can demonstrate that year after year you're making an improvement, you're our people," she said. "Different buyers have different needs, and our job is to connect them to the right farmer."

'Processing is the center of the universe'

As co-founder of the North American Millets Alliance. Kindwall-Moore has been an advisor on CIVC, which is working to expand and establish a processing facility in Montana for organic and regeneratively grown gluten-free oats, millet and buckwheat in Montana.

She's raising awareness around millets for purchasers and farmers. It's a good example of how Ryzosphere will help support new processors, she said.

"Processing is the center of the universe for us, because processing is where it all stalls out," she said. "That's how the consolidated giants of the field exercise their dominance over the industry, they control the manufacturing. If we can shine a light on independent processing and manufacturing, we can start to actually grow our own market."

There's room to work with the larger companies, she said. But "robust" independent processors would make the food system more "nimble."

"The big guys can't shift very quickly — for a number of reasons, I'm not expecting them to," she said. "But if we could have all of these independent processors popping up doing niche work that represent a critical need in the food system, it's a really big market signal that the tides are shifting towards more diversity, higher-quality food. That's how we're going to get the big guys to change. Eventually they're probably going to acquire a lot of these smaller niche processors."

Processing is the most significant barrier, Kindwall-Moore said. "A lot of great projects just can't move forward because they can't get through that value chain."

Regenerative

potatoes

Through Snacktivist, Kindwall-Moore is helping Hutterian farmers in Odessa, Wash., find prospective buyers for their regeneratively grown potatoes. They're trying to move 18 million pounds raised on 13,000 acres: https:// tinyurl.com/prkhhr7r.

"Low-Chem-Pact" potatoes are grown using significantly less pesticide, water and nitrogen fertilizer compared to those grown using conventional methods.

"That's what makes me so

excited about this project," Kindwall-Moore said. "If you can put something as humble and simple as a potato in front of somebody and say,

'This is radically different from the potato you grew up with' you're winning," she said.

The spuds are now sold in various avenues, including as french fries in a Las Vegas casino and a large hospital food service management company.

"We had to develop a brand-new business model for how to figure this out, because there are no norms for regenerative premiums in the market, at all," Kindwall-Moore said. "We had to completely rethink the whole deal."

So far, the project has helped sell 6 million pounds, she said. "I'm really hoping next year at this time I can say we've helped move 20 million pounds," she said.

She wants to help other regenerative potato farmers

"Once we get the market's attention, we're going to be glad that we have each other," she said. "If you're trying to fill a large contract, chances are, you might have to reach out and aggregate."

It's a diabetic-friendly grain, high in fiber, and tastes like rice. Kindwall-Moore cites its nutritional value, drought resilience and soil health properties.

Research shows that use of pearl millet in rotations of potatoes, strawberries or tobacco dramatically decreased nematode damage because it interrupts the pests' life cycle.

It's used for dairy cattle feed because of its high calcium.

"Why don't we have processing infrastructure for that?" she asked. "Farmers would love to grow it, we have germplasm that will grow here. We just don't have the market path for it."

Make America Healthy Again

Much of Kindwall-Moore's goals and approach align with the Make America Healthy Again campaign.

"I'm really grateful for it," she said. "I do believe sometimes it's a little misguided from the perspective of me being both a health care professional, a trained scientist and a true food system innovator. I wish they'd spend more time talking to people like me, and they don't."

She believes it's a positive for farmers, but falling short of what it could accomplish with a more holistic approach.

"Having access to a safe food supply, that's as fundamental as it gets," she said. "Why we as a nation have been totally neglecting that and allowing outside interests, like private corporations or special interest groups, to corrupt that, is something that Americans have got to wake up to."

'You just want to be around her'

Mansfield, Wash., farmer Douglas Poole met Kindwall-Moore while working to improve the soil health of his farmground by diversifying his crops beyond a wheat-fallow rotation.

"Every time I turned around, Joni knew somebody — she knows everybody," Poole said. "You just want to be around her. I've sat countless times watching her in a room, and everybody is on the edge of their seat. She could probably call the president of the United States and in five seconds, she'd have him hooked."

He's working with Kindwall-Moore to raise sorghum.

"First and foremost, to be able to grow a crop rotation that actually has a market," Poole said.

"Wheat is wheat is wheat, and then we got real lucky with canola; the crusher's 90 miles from my ranch," Poole said. "But from there, it kind of just falls off for where we can take some of these products. If I can find a market for something I need to be doing anyway, that's great."

Poole plans to participate in the Ryzosphere. Just the networking aspect of it is a "huge deal," he said, giving him the

chance to compare experiences with other growers.

"It's fun watching her work

her tail off to find those markets for us," Poole said of Kindwall-Moore. "Anything she does, I think is going to turn to gold. She truly is looking at humanity, and just wants to do better by that."

'Progress out of chaos'

The Ryzosphere is raising \$2 million by the third quarter of the year to get up and running, amid a tough funding environment and trade uncertainty.

"What we're building is a really great opportunity to create progress out of chaos," Kindwall-Moore said.

"My 'why' is, I know we can do better," she said. "I know we can change the way food does business, so that it is supportive of farmers' lifestyle and their business, but still produce better-quality food. I truly believe that is possible."

She believes farmers get caught in the crosshairs of political arguments surrounding food.

"They need to make a living and it's our job to make sure that they can while doing the best work," she said. "That's what I'm trying to achieve."

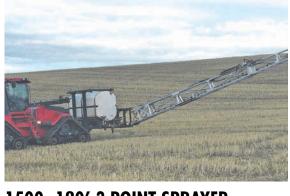

Writing rancher does what she loves for decades

Sometimes weak or sickly calves are being nursed in the living room so they can be turned out to graze with the herd in spring. Deadlines for articles and books always loom. Cattle and horses need to be fed.

It's a lifestyle that is perfect for Heather Smith Thomas at Sky Range Ranch south of Salmon in east central Idaho.

For six decades, Thomas has written more than 15,000 articles for horse and cattle publications along with 23 books about horse training, livestock care, and life on the ranch she has called home since childhood.

"It's not often that you get

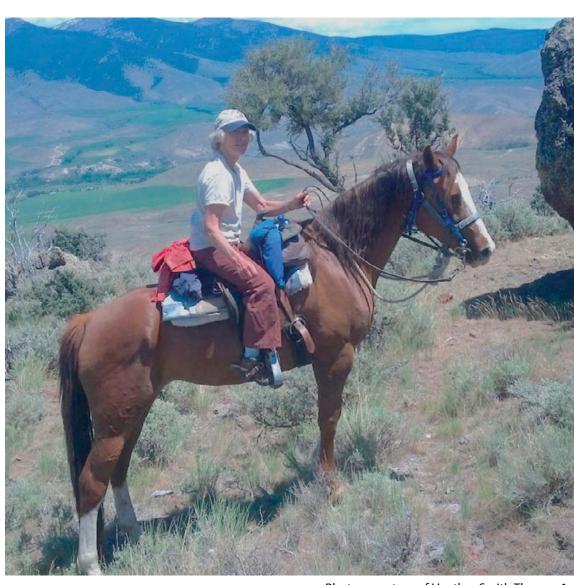
to do the things you love," she said of writing, training horses, and raising cattle with her husband, Lynn, along Withington Creek beneath the Lemhi Range.

UI to hire operations, finance director for dairy-anchored CAFE

The University of Idaho seeks applicants with dairy management experience to serve as director of operations and finance at a major research facility under development near Rupert.

The Idaho Center for Food, Agriculture and the Environment, slated to be the nation's largest research dairy, is expected to start milking by early 2026 and to eventually have a herd of more than 2,000 cows, according to a news release. Research at the facility will focus on addressing complex issues pertaining to environmental sustainability.

The new job will entail oversight of all dairy operations including cows, feed, employees, equipment and monitoring daily activities to ensure quality.

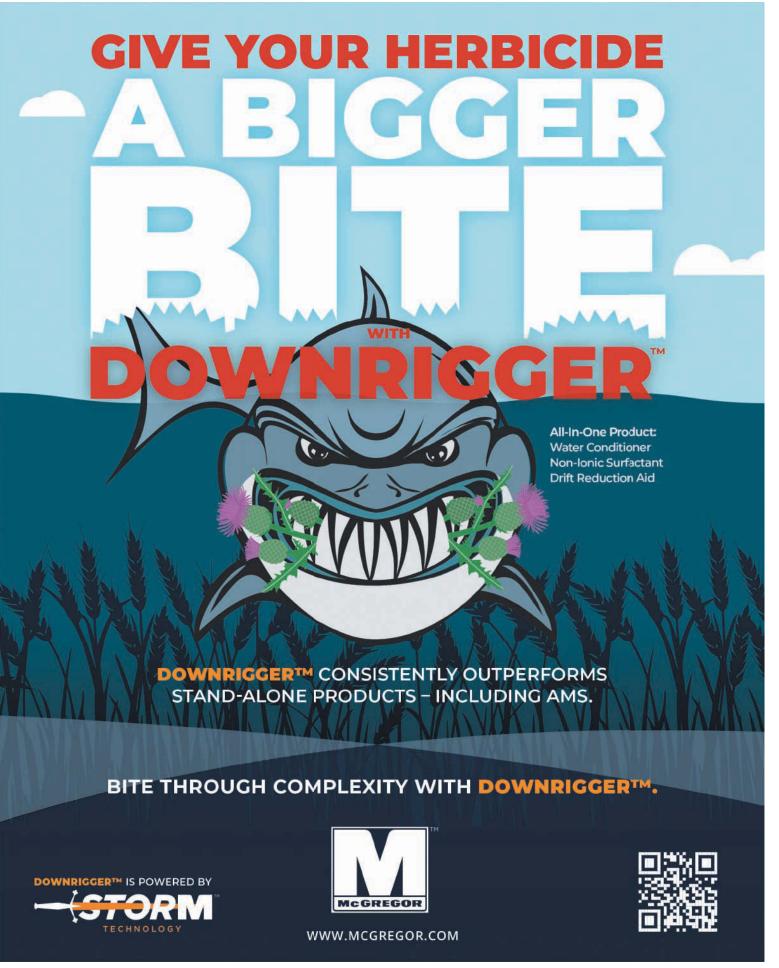
"Hiring a director of operations and finance for CAFE is a crucial step for several reasons, particularly as we prepare to milk cows in 2026," Mireille Chahine, acting head of the UI department of animal, veterinary and food sciences, told Capital Press.

The director will help recruit and hire "a high-functioning team needed to start milking cows and support both research and production" and will "help ensure that all the moving parts operate smoothly and efficiently."

The university "has already been working diligently to hire faculty positions associated with CAFE," she said.

UI already hired assistant professors and extension specialists Izabelle Teixeira, who has expertise in dairy sustainability and nutrition; Gilbert Miito, who has expertise in air quality; Pramod Acharya, who is focused on forage agronomy; and Emily Bedwell, who specializes in irrigation.

In hiring an operations and finance director for CAFE, the university requires candidates to have at least five years of experience managing a dairy of comparable size or larger, according to the release. Other required experience

includes managing crop production and applying dairy byproducts, managing staff and operating heavy equipment.

Candidates should have an agricultural background or a bachelor's degree in dairy science.

Applications received by July 1 will receive first consideration, officials said. The salary will be \$100,000 or more, depending on experience.

CAFE has been made possible by a partnership involving UI, industry and government, according to the university.

In 2017, the legislature appropriated \$10 million from the state's per-

manent building fund to help finance the project.

In September 2022, the state board of land commissioners awarded \$23.25 million toward CAFE from the sale of UI endowment land in Caldwell that was no longer being used for experimental farming.

During the 2025 legislative session, the legislature appropriated \$250,000 toward building maintenance funds for the new milking parlor.

"We are excited to see this project come to fruition and are looking forward to cows being milked at the facility," Chanine said. "The support from our partners and stakeholders has been overwhelming and truly appreciated."

on Your Homestead Farm."

Many of her stories are still posted at smallfarmersjournal.com. Her blog that she wrote for many years is also still posted.

Thomas' father, a Methodist minister who always wanted a small cattle ranch, finally fulfilled his dream along Withington Creek, instilling in his daughter a desire to one day run the family ranch.

In high school, Thomas launched her writing career.

"I started writing to express my interest and passion about animals, especially horses and cattle," she said. Her articles helped pay for her education at the University of Puget Sound. During the summer between her sophomore and junior years, she wrote the manuscript for her first book, "A Horse in Your Life: A Guide for the New Owner."

It was published in 1966, the year she graduated from college with degrees in history and English.

After college, she and Lynn, who had known each other in high school and dated in college, were married in March 1966. They ran a small dairy farm near Gooding with the goal of saving enough money to eventually return to Withington Creek to run her dad's ranch.

In 1967, they returned and started purchasing his ranch "as well as half the ranch where we're living now. For 40 years we leased the other parcels, putting it all together. With hard work and my writing, this was enough land to have enough cows to create a livelihood."

Sky Range Ranch stretches for 5 miles along the narrow creek canyon.

"It was a tremendous challenge — to create new ditches and repair old ones, and build more than 10 miles of new fences and repair the old ones on parts of these ranches," she said. "There are more than 25 miles of fence and 10 miles of ditches on this strungout place."

Thomas describes their ranch as "beautiful country but not very productive with steep hill pastures and limited hay ground in small meadows along the creek. To maximize our grazing potential, we have cross fences to facilitate pasture

rotations and bought extra hay."

With crossbred bulls of several breeds, they developed a herd with genetics suited to the high altitude pastures.

A few years ago, the

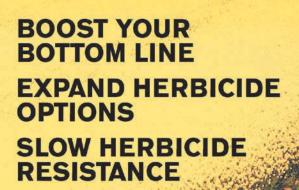

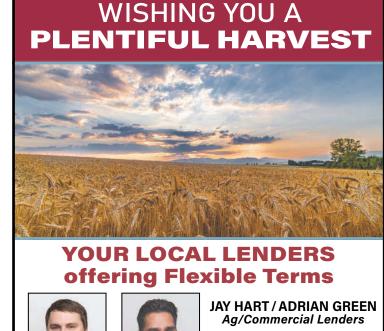

Facing soft sales, tractor dealerships focus on service and upgrades

New farm tractor and combine sales continue to lag in 2025 after a slowdown that started the previous year, according to the latest report from the Association of Equipment Manufacturers.

Soft sales led savvy dealerships to focus on service and aftermarket upgrades such as precision agriculture technology, said Curt Blades, AEM vice president.

SS Equipment New Holland, headquartered in Pasco, Wash., focused on deals with winter overhaul programs, said Jay Herbers, corporate sales manager. The economy has been tight, limiting sales of tractors, combines, swathers and bailers, he said.

"The biggest thing in this economy is selling your business as a whole," Herbers said.

Salesmen need to prothe dealership's parts and service out in the field.

Chad Hochstetler, general manager for Rickreall Farm Supply, a Kubota dealership in Rickreall, Ore., said farmers and ranchers were making investments in their existing equipment.

"People are trying to be resourceful," he said.

In some cases, that means seeking versatility and using tractors as "Swiss Army knives."

"How can we make our tractors do more things? That's some of what is occurring in the market right now," Hochstetler

Hochstetler was hopeful sales would improve in the third and fourth quarter of 2025 as agricultural uncertainty regarding trade and other matters is resolved.

Herbers said there was optimism.

"When you're able to get a quote to a guy, it's trending upwards," he said.

Farmland Tractor in Tangent, Ore., sells tractor parts and when the economy is tough, parts sales increase, said Ty Raschein, whose family owns and operates the business.

"Nobody is buying new, they're fixing old, so that's better for us," he said.

Raschein said margins are tight across the country, including in Linn

"We're still doing what we love — just on a smaller scale," she said.

County, Ore., where grass seed isn't moving.

Blades said uncertainty, higher input costs and higher interest rates continue to hamper tractor sales.

Preliminary data also indicates that the fleet age for tractors and combines is relatively young, with many farmers, ranchers and rural residents making larger purchases within the past eight years.

During the pandemic, for example, dealerships experienced record high sales of tractors less than 40 hp as people were stuck at home.

Combine sales sharply down, but were strong just a few years ago thanks to advancements with precision agriculture.

AEM data showed sales of tractors from 40 hp to 100 hp suffered the smallest percentage drop yearto-date in 2025.

Herbers said midrange tractors sales for machines from 75 hp to 100 hp were decent, in part because ranchers use

those machines and beef is a hot segment.

Hochstetler said the sweet spot for sales at Rickreall Farm Supply was from 40 hp to 80 hp.

"It isn't bad. It's down slightly," he said.

Total farm tractor sales through May hit 80,332, down 12.8% from the first five months of 2024.

Self-propelled combine sales — measured as a separate category by AEM — were down 43% to 1,253 year-to-date.

In 2024, tractor sales fell 13.2% compared to the previous year, while combine sales dropped 24.3%.

for lower-court judges to block polices nationally.

The 6-3 decision on June 27, which could strengthen President Donald Trump's ability to govern by executive orders, was hailed by Trump. District courts have issued about 25 universal injunctions blocking, at least temporarily, Trump's orders, including several imposing tariffs.

"It was a grave threat to democracy, frankly," Trump said.

Conservative justices, in prior rulings, have urged the court to review whether district court judges can issue injunctions that apply to other jurisdictions and to parties not involved in the case before them.

Three nationwide stays, including one by a judge in western Washington, against Trump's order ending birthright citizenship gave the court the opportunity to take up the issue.

Writing for the majority, Justice Amy Coney Barrett said universal injunctions have no historic pedigree. The first universal injunction was issued in 1963, more than a century after the Founding Fathers passed the Judiciary Act of 1789.

Barrett cited a study that found 123 universal injunctions were issued between 1963 and 2023. Some 96 were issued during the presidencies of George W. Bush, Barack Obama, Joe Biden and Trump.

"Nothing like a universal injunction was available at the founding, or for that matter for more than a century thereafter. Thus, under the Judiciary Act, federal courts lack authority to issue them," Barrett wrote.

Trump said the ruling will prevent courts from overriding an elected president.

"In recent months, we've seen a handful of radical-left judges effectively try to overrule the rightful powers of the president to stop the American

Potato acres this season are mostly flat

Potato acreage is down by about 9% in Washington and unchanged from year-earlier totals in Idaho, Oregon and California, according to a midyear report by USDA's National Agricultural **Statistics** Service.

The nationwide total of about 912,000 potato acres planted — including 315,000 in Idaho, 145,000 in Washington,

people from getting the policies they voted for," Trump said.

Groups from across the political spectrum, including farm groups, have sought universal injunctions. Farm groups supported a universal injunction last year against the Corporate Transparency Act, which

mandated businesses to report to federal financial crime investigators.

Also last year, a district Roberts court judge issued a universal injunction against a Biden-era rule giving guest foreign farmworkers union rights. A federal court in 2015 issued universal injunction against an Obama administration rule that extended the reach of the Clean Water Act to low

spots in farm fields isolated from waterways.

Chief and justices Clarence Thomas, Samuel Alito, Neil Gorsuch and Brett Kavanaugh joined Barrett in the ruling. The ruling did not address the constitutionality of Trump's order ending birthright citizenship.

Justices Sonia Sotomayor, Elena Kagan and

Ketanji Brown Jackson dissented. Writing Justice John for the three dissenting judges, Sotomayor said Trump's order was plainly unconstitutional.

> The ruling means that no matter how illegal a law or policy is, courts can never simply tell the executive branch to stop enforcing it against everyone, she wrote.

> Only individuals who are parties in a lawsuit

will have their constitutional rights protected, according to Sotomayor.

"No right is safe in the new legal regime the court creates," the dissent reads. "Today, the threat is to birthright citizenship. Tomorrow, a different administration may try to seize firearms from law-abiding citizens or prevent people of certain faiths from gathering to worship."

43,000 in Oregon and 20,000 in California — is down by just over 1.9% from 930,000 in 2024, according to NASS survey-based estimates.

Northwest acres contracted by fry processors dropped by a higher percentage than total planted acres, "meaning there will be a lot of potatoes trying to find a home at harvest time" in fresh and open markets, said Dale Lathim, Potato Growers of Washington executive director.

to have a phenomenal crop" with yields and quality well above historical averages in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Alberta, he said. If a strong crop materializes, the number of potatoes entering the market would increase proportionately.

Given overall demand, carryover storage and reduced processor orders, "we should have reduced planted acres significantly more than we did," Lathim said.

As for potatoes grown earlier and stored, "my gut tells me there are going to be less to work Also in the region, "it through this year than

Commission CEO Jamey Higham said. "It's too ilar to that of 2024, comearly to tell."

Growers make their decisions about which crops to plant in which amounts, he said. And with prices down for potatoes and assorted other crops, "there are not a lot of good options out there in any of the commodities," a factor in Idaho potato acres essentially staying flat from 2024.

IPC field counts produced an estimate of 313,045 acres planted this year, including 32,859 designated for seed production, according to the commission website.

With planted acres simmission board members likely will set a budget "that is also fairly flat" for the fiscal year that starts Sept. 1, Higham said.

NASS has had total Oregon planted acres at about 43,000 for some time, and "it is very unlikely that we still have 43,000 planted potato acres in Oregon," said Gary Roth, executive director of the state's potato commission. "Our largest segment is processed-potato acres in the Columbia Basin, and those farms have seen contracted acre cutbacks."

Oregon's current planted-acre total probably is below 43,000 given processors' reduction of about 8,500 contracted acres over the last few years combined, he said.

"We may have had some increases in chipping potatoes, but not nearly anything offset 8,500," would Roth said.

The U.S. continues to see increased pressure from foreign competition, "and it remains unclear what future planted acres could be," he said.

NASS covers many crops in its annual acreage report for the U.S., released June 30.

Idaho potato equipment company sells assets as part of bankruptcy

An Idaho company that manufactures potato planting and harvesting equipment has sold substantially all of its assets for more than \$2 million as part of bankruptcy

proceedings.

Double L of Heyburn, Idaho, filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy proceedings last year to shield its assets from foreclosure while continuing operations, citing several vears of financial losses in the millions of dollars.

The company said it'd experienced "consistent, disastrous negative cash flow," with losses ranging from \$5 million to \$11 million in recent years, and considered a sale the best option to prevent a sudden closure that would endanger its employees' livelihoods.

Earlier this year, the U.S. Trustee's Office that oversees bankruptcy cases urged the judge presiding over Double L's bankruptcy to convert it into a Chapter 7 liquidation based on its "continuing loss and unlikely rehabilitation, gross mismanagement, unexcused failure to file timely reports of sale," and other problems.

Among other issues, the U.S. Trustee's Office complained that it did not believe the asset sale had

company had not filed a report of sale, which "may be related to difficulties accounting for raw materials or inventory items."

The company responded by filing financial documents showing that its assets had been sold for nearly \$2.2 million to the Barclay Limited Family Partnership of Idaho.

Double L's initial bankruptcy documents said the company planned to sell its assets to BTR Manufacturing of Paul, Idaho. Filings with the Idaho Secretary of State indicate the Barclay Family Limited Partnership is an affiliated entity with the same registered agent as BTR Manufacturing and other companies involved in truck parts and repairs.

Despite the report of sale, the U.S. Trustee's Office has objected to a Chapter 11 plan of reorganization filed by Double L, saying an associated disclosure statement "fails to provide adequate information" and arguing it doesn't sufficiently explain the plan's benefits compared to a Chapter 7 liquidation.

The bankruptcy judge recently ordered the com-

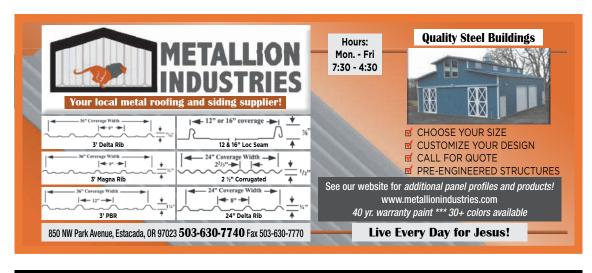

Washington teen develops one of world's first hydrogen tractors

CENTRALIA, Wash. — Pedro Picazo has liked to take stuff apart to see how it worked and put it back together ever since he was little. "I've always liked to be hands-on," he said.

Picazo, 18, has converted a 1940s-era John Deere Model B tractor to hydrogen power.

"As of right now, I have (one of) the world's first" hydrogen-powered tors, Picazo said.

Picazo bought a hydrogen-powered Toyota Mirai at a salvage auction, took it apart and configured the parts for the tractor.

"It's cool, but it's a little weird," Picazo said.

John Deere produced the Model B tractor from 1935 to 1952.

Hydrogen interest

Picazo moved to Centralia about four years ago. His family has a 5-acre ranch in California, raising corn, sheep and horses. While playing volleyball there, a cousin showed up in a Toyota Mirai and told him it runs on water.

"I wanted to know how that worked," Picazo said.

While discussing clean energy in freshman science, Picazo asked teacher Kendra Meek why hydrogen wasn't used more in Washington.

"We both started digging more into it," he said.

Picazo first built a hydrogen-powered go-cart from scratch as he studied what is needed to create a hydrogen generator.

Picazo asked to use one of the engines at the back of Meek's classroom for the go-cart, for an FFA district competition.

"She told me, 'As long as you can make it work with hydrogen," Picazo

said. "That's basically where it all started."

Meek said she made the suggestion "kind of as a joke."

'Oh, no — those kids by the end of the year, they had that engine working on hydrogen power," Meek said. "By July, he had a go-cart made."

Picazo was 14 or 15 at the time, she noted.

"And then in his junior year, he comes to me a couple of months later and says, 'Hey, I think I'm going to build a truck," Meek said.

The next thing she knew, Picazo was moving forward on the tractor project. He'd made various connections while attending a state alternative energy conference with the high school principal.

The tractor took about a year in planning, designing and looking for sponreceived sors. Picazo about \$23,000 from various sponsors.

tor during a February 2023 hydrogen summit.

Blue Fuel Solutions and New Holland promote the H2 Dual Power as available to order, built in Italy but converted to dual power in the Netherlands, using a combination of hydrogen and diesel.

CNH Industrial 2009 introduced a concept hydrogen tractor that is not currently commercially available, said Kristina Post, external communications specialist for the company in North America. The company pivoted to methane, compressed natural gas and liquefied natural gas tractors.

"We're excited to hear more about the FFA student who is diving into such a neat project!" Post said of Picazo.

Picazo graduated June 6 from Centralia High School, where he was the treasurer for Centralia FFA.

Hydrogen at a glance

A hydrogen tractor basically has instant torque, Picazo said.

"It's not really the horsepower you're looking for, it's torque," he said.

There's no emissions, the only byproduct of hydrogen is water, he said. "So it's completely renewable."

The Douglas County Public Utility District sells hydrogen for about \$4 per kilogram. About 6 kilograms are needed to fill a vehicle, Picazo said. "And you get 500 miles out of it," he said.

Hydrogen is much more expensive in California, about \$33 per kilogram, he said.

Hydrogen infrastructure is growing as more companies get interested.

Picazo wants to demonstrate hydrogen's potential as a fuel, and that a 17-year-old can work with it. He turned 18 on June 29.

Does hydrogen fuel require extra precaution?

"Yes and no — if it's not done correctly, yes,"

Picazo said. "The tanks hold 10,000 [pounds per square inch], but they're rated for 40,000, four times what the working pressure is going to be. The majority of times, tanks don't see 10,000 psi; they see around 7,000 to 9,000."

The amount of pressure depends on the fueling station, he said.

"It's not something (the public) should be scared of," he said. "When you mention hydrogen, people think about the Hindenburg and accidents

that have happened, and they think it's a ticking time bomb. But if you look back, when electric vehicles first started, they were catching on fire. Same with gasoline vehicles. Nothing's 100% safe, there need to be all the safety precautions to do it."

hydro-Software in vehicles gen-powered will detect leaks. Hydrogen-powered vehicles have been on the road for years now, he said.

"The government won't let something that's not safe be on the road, especially coming straight out of the factory," he said.

The carbon footprint is smaller than an electric vehicle, which requires time to charge and can only run for a certain amount of time before needing to cool down.

There's not enough infrastructure to power all the electric vehicles, Picazo said.

Hydrogen requires electricity to make it, but "it's basically just like a gasoline vehicle," he said. "You plug the nozzle in, five minutes tops to fuel up to a full tank and it's got another 400 to 600

miles on there."

Potential farm use

Farmers can place shipping containers on their farms and purchase hydrogen generators, Picazo said. They could have separate fueling stations on their property and fuel up at little to no cost, he said.

"They just hook up to water and electricity and they could be producing their own hydrogen, and if they really wanted to, they could sell it to other farmers, too," he said.

Picazo foresees hydrogen-powered tractors being produced and sold. He's working on a conversion kit for vehicles.

Hydrogen would be more affordable than diesel and would not require delivery, he said.

A 10-gallon tank would require about \$40 to fill up on diesel at \$4 per gallon, he said. If the Douglas County PUD is selling hydrogen at \$10 per kilogram, it would cost \$60 to fuel up the tractor.

"You're going to get a lot more run time, you're going to be following emissions regulations and it's a lot cleaner," Picazo said. "You get (the same), if not more performance out of it, depending on the size of the electric motor, and there's little to no

cool as a teacher and advisor to watch an individual that literally takes an idea

high school grew that idea into something that was pretty big, pretty cool."

Washington farmers are getting pushed to consider alternative energies, she said. She could see Picazo becoming a consultant to help make those kinds of conversions.

"What an amazing young man," said Dave Warren, founder of the Washington Green Hydrogen Alliance, who met Picazo after he built the go-cart. Warren is helping Picazo find a hydrogen-compatible fuel line hose for the tractor.

Warren encourages future employers to hire Picazo for their research and development or innovation units.

"The fact that (Picazo) himself designed a go-cart to run on hydrogen as a self-learner, picking people's brains — the best engineers in the world are working on that right now, how to make hydrogen-powered fuel cell electric vehicles, trucks and buses," Warren said.

The fact that Picazo did it while still in high school, "to me, that's genius,' Warren said. "I'm an engineer by training, and I'm in awe of what he's done."

FFA message

Meek encourages other FFA members to similarly think outside of the box.

"The message to advisors is, 'Don't hold them back," she said. "If you have a kid who comes to you with some crazy idea like Pedro did, you've just got to step back and let them go, give them the support they need and let them grow."

"He knows all of the different alternative energies and he can give you all the reasons why hydrogen power is the way to go," she said. "He's done his research, he's asked his questions, he's gone out there and talked to people that are in the field doing it. Don't hold anybody back. Even the craziest ideas can sometimes be

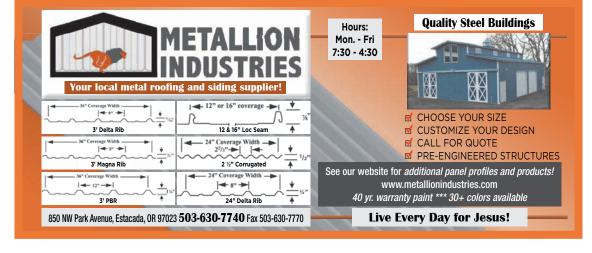

Vietnam agrees to eliminate tariffs on U.S. farm goods

President Trump said Vietnam has agreed to eliminate tariffs on U.S. goods, potentially creating trade opportunities for Pacific Northwest crops such as apples, cherries and potatoes.

Trump announced the trade deal in a social media post July 2. The U.S. will impose a 20% tariff on Vietnamese products shipped directly to the U.S., while Vietnam will let in U.S. products duty free, Trump said.

"It will be a Great Deal of Cooperation between our two Countries," the president said. "... Vietnam will do something that they have never done before, give the United States of America TOTAL ACCESS to their markets for Trade.

"In other words, they will 'OPEN THEIR MAR-KET TO THE UNITED STATES,' meaning that, we will be able to sell our product into Vietnam at ZERO Tariff."

The White House did not immediately release any other details about the agreement, including when it would take effect or whether any goods would be exempted from the deal. Trump imposed a 46% tariff on Vietnamese goods on April 2, one of the highest of the "Liberation Day" tariffs. The tariff was suspended while the U.S. and Vietnam began trade talks.

The Vietnamese government said in April it expected to reach an agreement to stabilize trade relations between the countries. Trump said he made the deal after speaking with Vietnamese General Secretary To Lam. "Dealing with General Secretary To Lam, which I did personally, was an absolute pleasure," Trump wrote.

The U.S. exported \$3.85 billion worth of agricultural products to Vietnam in 2024, making it the ninth-largest foreign market for U.S. farmers and ranchers, according to the USDA Foreign Agricultural Service.

U.S. farm exports to Vietnam could increase significantly under an agreement that eliminates tariffs, according to farm groups.

Vietnam generally imposes high tariffs on U.S. farm goods. Other agricultural exporting countries — such as Australia, Chile and Canada — have tariff-free trade agreements with Vietnam, putting U.S. exports at a further price disadvantage.

Vietnam lets in frozen fries tariff-free from Canada, Australia and New Zealand, but imposes a 12% tariff on U.S. frozen fries. The U.S. exported \$3 million worth of fries to Vietnam in 2024, but the market could grow to \$40 million a year if the tariff was eliminated, the American Potato Trade Alliance estimates.

Vietnam places an 8% tariff on U.S. apples and a

10% tariff on cherries and pears. Eliminating the tariffs could increase apple and cherry sales by \$10 million to \$25 million a year and pear sales by about \$10 million, according to the Northwest Horticultural Council.

Vietnam is a potential high-growth market for blueberries, but only if its 15% tariff on fresh blueberries and 30% tariff on frozen and dried blueberries are lowered or eliminated, according to the North American Blueberry Council.

The U.S. sold less than \$600,000 worth of cranberry products to Vietnam in 2024. Vietnam could be a \$5 million to \$10 million a year market if it eliminated its 25% tariff

agency predicted in mid-June. Depending on the weather, the supply could rise as high as 48% or drop as low as 41%, according to the bureau.

The Roza Irrigation

District plans to stop delivering water on Sept. 28, 23 days earlier than usual. If the water shortage worsens, the district's board will have to decide whether to shorten the season more, reduce flows or do a combination, district manager Scott Revell said.

"I'm always nervous it's going to drop," he said.

The Reclamation Bureau's five reservoirs store water to irrigate some 464,000 acres. Farmers with senior water rights will receive full allotments, but this is the third straight summer that junior water-right holders have been cut back.

Only once in the past 55 years have the reservoirs been this low at the start of July. They hold only 67% as much water as usual.

In better water years, Roza, an 86,000-acre district based in Sunnyside, delivers water until Oct. 15 to irrigate fruit and hops. Farmers are fallowing ground to stretch the water out, Revell said. "They're having to make tough, tough decisions."

The Reclamation Bureau projected at the beginning of June that irrigators would be cut back to 43% of normal. The bump up in mid-June to 45% helped hay farmers with their first cuttings, said Urban Eber-

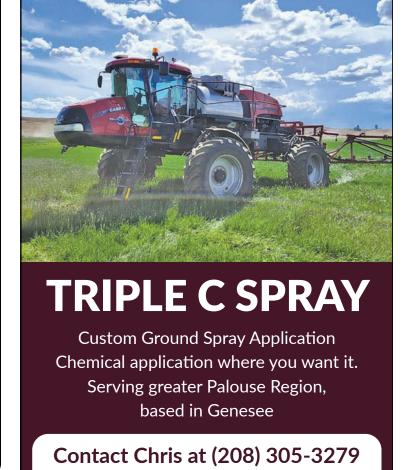

Agriculture secretary pledges quick action on farm labor

U.S. Agriculture Secretary Brooke Rollins said the Trump administration will act quickly to legalize more farmworkers to protect agriculture from mass deportations of illegal immigrants.

Rollins said she has been working with Homeland Security Secretary Kristi Noem, Labor Secretary Lori Chavez-DeRember and deputy chief of staff for policy Stephen Miller to streamline the H-2A foreign farmworker program.

"We're going to make it cheaper, more efficient and more effective for those farmers," Rollins said July 3, standing next to President Trump as he was leaving Iowa after giving a speech at the state fairgrounds in Des Moines.

"We will have a 100% legal work force very, very soon, thanks to President Trump's leadership," Rollins said.

Trump publicly asked cabinet officials three months ago to develop a program that allows farms to keep valued workers who are in the country illegally. The administration has not yet announced a plan, nor did Rollins offer any details.

The USDA estimates about 40% of U.S. farmworkers are illegal immigrants. For several years, some U.S. House members have promoted the Farm

Workforce Modernization Act as the path to legalizing undocumented farmworkers.

The legislation proposes that undocumented farm-workers without criminal records be allowed to become "certified agricultural workers" and eventually a "lawful permanent resident."

The H-2A program addresses a shortage of U.S. farmworkers. Foreign workers are issued temporary visas to work for a particular farm. Federal

law requires the workers to be housed and paid at least a minimum wage set by the Labor Department.

Trump has repeatedly said he wants farmers to be able to retain workers, even as his administration calls for the deportation of all illegal immigrants.

"I'm not going to be abandoning my farmers," Trump said June 30 in Florida. "We're strong on the borders, but we're also strong for the farmers, but also for others, in the hotel industry, etc.

"They're not going to have citizenship, but they'll be working. They'll be paying taxes," he said. "We're going to put our farmers in charge of those people that are under them. They know the people, and I think it's going to work out really well.

"We're going to take care of our farmers, but we're going to take the criminals out," Trump said.

hart, manager of the 72,000-acre Kittitas Reclamation District in Ellensburg.

"Two percentage points is actually incredibly helpful when we're this short," he said.

The district hopes to deliver water until Sept. 1, but will have to ramp down water deliveries this month, Eberhart said. Most of the district's fruit growers have wells to draw from, he said.
