Stories From The Street "TPK1.TPK2 and TPK3"

TPK1 – That's short for Trailer Park Kitty – was found crying and wandering around the property of a caretaker whom we had helped earlier this year. The text read: "Help, kitten crying and I don't know what to do, I put it in a carrier and it's still crying." Off we went to secure her. The sweetest 6-month-old tabby cat you ever did see. But not a kitten, more like a teen. Old enough to be put back there on her own.

But then the next text came, and said: "There's another pretty cat here, she's hungry and can you get her too?" We said, ok, we can trap and alter her, but then she's gotta go back. That's her home. TPK2, a beautiful Torti also proved to be an eventempered girl, who didn't fit the "street cat" type. Something was up.

Wouldn't you know it, a few days later, our volunteer was called to get TPK3, a handsome black and white tuxedo with a worn-out collar still around his neck. Well friends, that's when we got the story that all of these cats had been previous indoor cats and were let out about 2 months prior when their owner "left suddenly."

Obviously, no one was there to take care of these cats, so alternate plans needed to be made. Many thanks to those who sprang into action to help find homes, and especially to *Loving Care Cat Rescue* who took **TPK3** after 21 harrowing days here.

This grant has been established to offset medical needs like: tail amputations, the cost of patient exams, ongoing medication, and other TLC visits that are not specifically covered during the TNR process. Most of these dollars will be used when caretakers visit low-cost veterinarians like the *Humane Society of Harrisburg Area and York CARMA* program. 
