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CAMPING AT THE FAIRGROUNDS– RV’S, CAMPERS, AND TENTS

Camping is permitted between Saturday, August 1, 2026 at 6:00 am and Sunday, August 9, 2026. **The fee for camping is \$100.00.** Those desiring to use the campground must make a reservation, have that reservation confirmed by the Fair Board member coordinating camping **and pay the fee** at the Marion County Extension Office during business hours **within one week of notification of the acceptance** of your camping reservation. Checks should be made payable to the Marion County Junior Fair. If payment and signed agreement are not received within one week of the notification of acceptance, the spot will be opened for the next person on the waiting list. Reservations may be made beginning May 1st at 8pm via online link and will be filled in the following order of precedence and in order by the time stamp they were received: Marion County Junior Fair board members, Marion County Junior Fair Committee Members, 4-H FFA livestock exhibitors at the Marion County Junior Fair, 4-H/FFA exhibitors at the Marion County Junior Fair, Family members of exhibitors at the Marion County Junior Fair, 4-H/FFA members, and General public. No preference will be given to a previous camping spot. Once reservations have been confirmed, no refunds will be made unless all spots are filled. Once spots are confirmed, no refunds will be made unless all spots are filled. No generators may be used. The campground has 20, 30, and 50 amp breakers. To maintain a family atmosphere, quiet time is from one-hour after the carnival closes until 6:00 am. You are paying for a space for your camper, not a parking space. Please park your vehicles so that campers can get into assigned spaces. Each numbered spot has a North side and a South side. Please park your camper on the correct side of the electric pole for which you are assigned. All camper/recreational vehicles must be out of the campgrounds by Sunday, August 9th, 2026 at 5:00 pm. All recreational vehicles must follow all city ordinances to be on grounds and all drivers must have a valid driver’s license. The Marion County Junior Fair, Inc. is not responsible for any damage done to campers or contents.

2026 FAIR UPDATES

1. Any exhibitor that does not arrive by their species specific in-place time, and failed to notify the superintendent of the late arrival, will not be eligible for championship drive or overall awards.
2. A 5% sale commission will be charged on the sale amount on all items to aid in fair expenses and facilities costs.
3. Cattle barn set up is pushed back to 5:30 p.m. Poultry & Rabbit Set up move up to 5:00 pm.
4. Animal ID will be required for Breeding & Market animals for Beef, Swine, Sheep & Goat through Fair Entry website by May 10th. Note: Horses will still need to do paper forms turned into the extension office.
5. Poultry Blood draw is looking to move to Tuesday afternoon. Time will be announced after it's confirmed with USDA. After blood drawn is made birds can enter the barn and remain until to show.
6. Clover Kids—Small Animal Presentation, No Hooved Animals allowed.
7. All bacons must be accompanied by a full list of ingredients and cure type. List Must be on a postcard and placed in a clear zipper bag, provide 2 card list.
8. Building Exhibits pickup time change to Friday, August 7th 7:30 to 8:30 pm and Saturday, August 8th 7:30 to 8:30 am. All exhibits must be picked up by 8:30 am.
9. Each 4-H member is eligible to sell 1 item that is exhibited in the building. Exhibitor is still eligible to sell 2 items (market animals, rabbit meat pens, pen of broilers, bacons and cured hams) according to the Exhibit Rules for Livestock Exhibits. A 4-H Exhibitor could potentially sell 1 Building Project and 2 Livestock Exhibitor Items for a total of 3 items.
10. New Building Overall Awards, see page 36 & 37 for details.
11. An overall Grand and Reserve will be chosen by the judge between the Grand and Reserve Single Fryer and Pen of 3. The overall Grand and Reserve winners will be sold in the Sale of Champions. The others will be begin the rabbit portion of the sale. Note: there are no additional banners awarded.
12. An overall Grand and Reserve will be chosen by the judge for Ham and Bacon. The overall Grand and Reserve winners will be sold in the Sale of Champions. The others will be in the silent auction. Note: there are no additional banners awarded.
13. Entries will be accepted from 4-H Members, FFA Members and Exploratory Agriculture Education. Details on page #14.
14. New Award Market Beef Feedlot will be replacing the Rate of Gain and Carcass award. Details on page # 20.

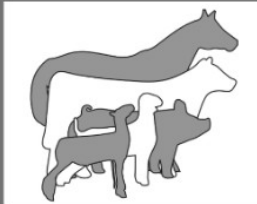

Animal Health Requirements for Exhibition

The following is a SUMMARY, and not a reprint of 2 CSR 30-2.040 Animal Health Requirements for exhibition regulations. Contact the Missouri State Veterinarian's office at (573) 751-4359 for clarification on the following.

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection/General Requirements.

All animals must have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection unless specifically exempted. The Certificate of Veterinary Inspection shall state that the animals are free of visible signs of contagious, infectious, or communicable disease, and describe the animal(s) by species, breed, sex and age. The Certificate of Veterinary Inspection shall reflect all data for required test and vaccinations, all dates, results and the name of the laboratory.

The Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is valid for thirty (30) days.

Animals with active lesions of ringworm with resulting loss of hair or warts easily visible without close examination will not be permitted to exhibit and shall be subject to isolation or expulsion depending upon the nature and seriousness of the disease. Sales scheduled in association with exhibitions must employ a veterinarian to examine animals and process Certificate of Veterinary Inspection for change of ownership. The following are requirements for animals EXHIBITED in Missouri. Animals sold in addition to being exhibited must meet the entry requirements of Missouri.

2. EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR CATTLE IN MISSOURI.

Intrastate (cattle in Missouri moving for exhibition only).

All cattle, regardless of age or gender, must be individually identified by an Official Animal Identification number (AIN) tag and be listed on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

Certificate of Veterinary Inspection required.

A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required with official individual identification for each animal listed.

Sexually intact test-eligible animals must be tested and negative within thirty (30) days prior to entry except cattle from a certified brucellosis-free herd. The certified herd number and date of the last herd test date must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

Steer(s). No test required but the steer(s) must be individually identified and listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection

Brucellosis – no test or vaccination is required. Brucellosis – Cattle from Brucellosis-Free States.

Sexually intact cattle may enter without a brucellosis test. Individually identified and listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

Tuberculosis – no test is required. Interstate (cattle from another state entering Missouri for exhibition only). Cattle from Class A States Rodeo bulls from a Class A state must have a negative brucellosis test within twelve (12) months prior to exhibition.

Tuberculosis. Beef – Tuberculosis-Free States.

Tuberculosis – Free States. All beef cattle two (2) months of age and over (including steers) may enter without additional testing requirements or permit.

Tuberculosis Status-less than free must meet the following requirements:

Must obtain an entry permit. Must have a negative tuberculosis test within sixty (60) days of exhibition, test date must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection; or Move from an accredited tuberculosis-free herd (herd test date must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection) or Move directly from a herd of origin that has had one (1) complete negative herd test within one (1) year (date of test must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection).

Dairy – All classes of dairy cattle, two (2) months of age and older, entering Missouri for exhibition must meet the following requirements:

Must obtain an entry permit.

Have a negative tuberculosis test within sixty (60) days of shipment; test date must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection; or

Move from an accredited tuberculosis-free herd (herd test date must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection); or

Move directly from a herd of origin that has had one (1) complete negative herd test within one (1) year (date of test must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection).

Rodeo livestock, eighteen (18) months of age and older, must be tested negative for tuberculosis every twelve (12) months and obtain an entry permit prior to entering Missouri.

No sexually intact rodeo livestock from Mexico will be permitted to enter Missouri.

3. EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR SWINE

Intrastate (swine in Missouri moving for exhibition only)

All swine must be free of clinical signs of infectious or contagious disease.

Brucellosis – no test required, Pseudorabies – no test required

Interstate (swine from another state entering Missouri for exhibition only).

A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required. All swine must be individually identified by official eartag, ear notch, tattoo and listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

Must obtain an entry permit.

Brucellosis – Breeding swine originating from brucellosis-free states may exhibit without a brucellosis test.

Breeding swine originating from a state having a brucellosis status less than free states must be tested negative within sixty (60) days prior to exhibition except breeding swine from a validated brucellosis-free herd. The validated herd number and date of last validating test must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

Pseudorabies – Swine originating from a state classified as Stage V the National Pseudorabies (PRV) Eradication Plan may exhibit without a pseudorabies test.

All other swine must be tested negative within sixty (60) days prior to exhibition except swine from a qualified pseudorabies-free herd. The qualified herd number and date of last qualifying test must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

4. EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR SHEEP.

Intrastate (sheep in Missouri moving for exhibition only).

Sheep must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease.

All sheep, regardless of age or gender, must be individually identified by an official scrapie eartag and be listed on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

No test required

Interstate (sheep from another state entering Missouri for exhibition only)

Sheep must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease.

All sheep, regardless of age or gender, must be individually identified by an official scrapie eartag and be listed on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

No test required

5. EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR GOATS.

Intrastate (goats in Missouri moving for exhibition only)

Goats must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease.

All goats, regardless of age or gender, must be individually identified by an official scrapie eartag or any other means of permanent identification approved by the state veterinarian and be listed on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. No test required

Interstate (goats from another state entering Missouri for exhibition only).

Goats must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease

All goats, regardless of age or gender, must be individually identified by an official scrapie eartag or any other means of permanent identification approved by the state veterinarian and be listed on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. No test required.

6. EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS EQUINE.

Intrastate (equine in Missouri moving for exhibition only).

Equine that are to be exhibited must be free of clinical signs of an Infectious or contagious disease.

Any equine showing signs of infectious or contagious diseases at an exhibition may be excused by

the official inspecting veterinarian. When an official inspecting veterinarian is present; all equine will be subject to daily inspection.

All equine (except nursing foals accompanied by their dams) must be accompanied by a current VS Form 10-11 or any officially recognized state EIA test chart showing the graphic description of all markings needed for identification, or micro- chip, or legible tattoo, or unique registered brand. A certified photocopy or certified facsimile of the VS Form 10-11 or any officially recognized state EIA test chart may be accepted for the purpose of exhibition.

Interstate (equine from another state entering Missouri for exhibition only).

Equine that are to be exhibited must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease. Any equine showing signs of infectious or contagious diseases at an exhibition may be excused by the official inspecting veterinarian. When an official inspecting veterinarian is present; all equine will be subject to daily inspection.

A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required.

All equine (except nursing foals accompanied by their dams) must be accompanied by a current VS Form 10-11 or any officially recognized state EIA test chart showing the graphic description of all markings needed for identification, or micro- chip, or legible tattoo, or unique registered brand. A certified photocopy or certified facsimile of the VS Form 10-11 or any officially recognized state EIA test chart may be accepted for the purpose of exhibition.

Alteration or substitution of any information on any VS Form 10-11 including certified photocopy or certified facsimile or any official copy of a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection shall cause the document to be invalid and in violation of sections 267.010 to 267.730, RSMo, and may result in civil penalties not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) per violation and subject to expulsion.

A six (6) - month passport from states with which there is a reciprocal agreement will be accepted in lieu of VS Form 10-11. These passports must have proof of a negative

EIA test within thirty (30) days of the date of application of the passport and permanent identification for each horse by means of registered brand, legible tattoo, or microchip to be recorded on the passport and the VS Form 10-11 or any officially recognized state EIA test chart, along with other identifying characteristics. In the event of confirmed vesicular stomatitis in any of the states with which reciprocal agreements exist, use of the six (6) - month passport will be suspended by the state veterinarian of Missouri.

Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE) vaccination and entry permit is required prior to entry on equine originating from states in which VEE has been diagnosed within the preceding twelve (12) months.

Any equine originating from a premise under quarantine for Vesicular Stomatitis shall obtain an entry permit and must include the statement on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection that "the equine listed have not been exposed to Vesicular Stomatitis or located within (10) miles of premises quarantined for Vesicular Stomatitis within the past thirty (30) days".

The board, organization or manager of each assembly or event is responsible for certifying that all equine admitted or participating meet the regulations in this section and shall not admit or allow participation of equine not so certified. Untested equine shall not be allowed to congregate with other equine. The owner of each animal shall comply with requirements under this section 267.010 to 267.730, RSMo, and may be assessed civil penalties not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for each violation.

7. EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS FOR POULTRY AND WATERFOWL

Intrastate (poultry and waterfowl in Missouri moving for exhibition only)

All poultry and waterfowl to be exhibited must be free of clinical signs of any infectious or contagious disease.

No Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required

Pullorum-Typhoid test. All poultry (except waterfowl) exhibited shall be tested negative for pullorum-typhoid within ninety (90) days prior to exhibition or originate from a flock approved by the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP) or an equivalent program which has been tested within the past twelve (12) months with no change of ownership. This information shall be

documented on a VS Form 9-2 (see 2 CSR 30-8.020) or similar certificate which shall accompany the poultry to the exhibition and shall be made available on request.

Interstate (poultry and waterfowl entering Missouri for exhibition only)

All poultry and waterfowl to be exhibited must be free of clinical signs of any infectious or contagious disease.

A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required Pullorum-Typhoid test. All poultry (except waterfowl) exhibited shall be tested negative for pullorum-typhoid within ninety (90) days prior to exhibition or originate from a flock approved by the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP) or an equivalent program which has been tested within the past twelve (12) months with no change of ownership. This information shall be documented on a VS Form 9-2 (see 2 CSR 30-8.020) or similar certificate which shall accompany the poultry to the exhibition and shall be made available on request.

An entry permit is required. Requirements for Sponsoring Exhibitions for Poultry and Water- fowl.

An official representing the person or organization sponsoring the exhibition shall notify the state veterinarian no later than thirty (30) days prior to the exhibition giving the names, place, inclusive dates and times of event.

Record Keeping. The sponsor of the exhibition shall compile a list of all poultry and waterfowl present at the exhibition. The list shall contain the name and address of each owner, the number, species, breed, variety, type, and sex and pullorum- typhoid status of all poultry present. A copy of this list shall be retained by the sponsor of the exhibition for at least twelve (12) months and shall be made available upon request to a representative of the department. Inspection. All poultry and waterfowl to be exhibited must be free of clinical signs of any Infectious or contagious disease. A representative of the department shall have access to the exhibits and may conduct inspections and tests as deemed necessary.

GENERAL RULES

The Marion County Junior Fair is not responsible to any person, individual, corporation, or association for any loss by fire, theft, damage or personal injury sustained by anyone, through the negligence of any person or group of persons. exhibits, or exhibitors.

All entries are due on or before July 1st at 4:00 p.m.

I. JUNIOR FAIR EXHIBITS

1. Entries will be accepted from:
 - a. **4-H Member**
 - a. Must meet club requirements to be in good standing.
 - b. Members who have met attendance of regular meetings set by clubs and/or 4-H
 - c. All active 4-H exhibitors must be enrolled in project exhibited.
 - d. Must be enrolled with Marion County 4-H Club (Coffee Creek, Fabius, Lucky Four, Marion Boosters, Mt. Zion Country Clovers, Pleasant Day, Silver Spurs, Stone, Taylor)
 - b. **FFA Member**
 - a. Must meet chapter requirements to be in good standing.
 - b. Must be enrolled with the Hannibal, Marion County R-II, Monroe City, or Palmyra FFA Chapter
 - c. Can show until their 4th National FFA Convention after graduation from high school
 - c. **Exploratory Agriculture Education**
 - a. Must be enrolled in a 7th/8th grade Agriculture Education class. Not eligible the summer before starting 7th grade
 - b. Must be enrolled with the Hannibal, Marion County R-II, Monroe City, or Palmyra FFA Chapter Exploratory Agriculture Education Program.
 - c. Must meet chapter requirement to be in good standing.
 - d. Must have direct supervision with project from FFA
2. All exhibitors must file entries on Fair Entry website by Wednesday, July 1st by midnight. Entries will be sent to the club leader and project leaders to verify if eligible.
4. Each item entered must be entered in each class separately. If two items are in one class, they must be entered as two separate entries.
5. Each exhibit must be made or owned by the exhibitor and represent work done in 4-H or FFA projects in the current year.
6. All market animals must meet weight requirements to be eligible to sell. The market animal must make weight to be eligible for Champion Drive. Market animals or meat project that receive a white ribbon will not be eligible for the sale.

II. JUDGING AND AWARDS

1. All judging will be based on the Danish system: blue, red, white or no ribbon, according to merit or judge's decision.

NOTE: Funds to support and conduct the Marion County Junior Fair are raised by 4-H and FFA members through donation and fund-raising based on number of entries.

III. RULES FOR PROPER CONDUCT AT JUNIOR FAIR

1. The superintendent in each department is responsible for assigning space and exhibits. His or her directions must be followed.
2. Competent, courteous attendants shall be in charge of all exhibits and give visitors information desired.
3. Exhibitors only may remain overnight in barns and must conduct themselves in a proper manner. Superintendents will enforce this rule.
4. Exhibitors are expected to conduct themselves in a manner showing respect for persons-in charge, other exhibitors and the public.
5. No smoking or alcohol in the livestock buildings.
6. Dogs are allowed only in show barns for the Clover Kids Show on Friday, August 7th. Any other time dogs are not allowed in show barns.

DEPARTMENT A– JUNIOR FAIR AGRICULTURE

EXHIBIT RULES FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITS

Exhibitors must be familiar with and comply with all General Rules in the preceding pages (plus the following):

1. Registration papers on breeding classes of beef must accompany each animal over one year of age to be eligible to show. Cattle under 1 year must be accompanied by registration papers of the dam and proof of registration of the sire (i.e. registration number). To show in breed classes, all beef animals must be 3/4 blood or better. Females without registration papers must show in crossbred commercial classes. Purebred cattle will show in breed classes. Sheep and swine must show individual registration papers on all entries in purebred classes.
2. **Any exhibitor that does not arrive by their species specific In-Place time and failed to notify the superintendent of late arrival, will not be eligible for championship drive or showmanship awards.**
3. Animals or pets will be allowed in barns for exhibit only, except for mother cows and/or baby calves. (Ex. Herd dogs should not be in barns.)
4. Livestock exhibits for fair must be brought in at set times. SEE DAILY PROGRAM.
5. All breeding stock exhibits will be released after the show unless released earlier by superintendent.
6. To be eligible to exhibit, ownership of livestock in the member’s name and in the member’s care by the following dates:

DAIRY CATTLE	Breeding– June 1
BUCKET CALVES	Born between March 1– May 31, 2026
SWINE	All Swine– May 1

GOATS	All Goats– May 1

7. Each 4-H/FFA member is eligible to sell 2 items– market animals, rabbit meat pens, pen of broilers, bacons, and cured hams, provided that the member has not sold at a previous county fair during 2026.
8. Health rules apply to some species. See Health Regulations in this book. Identification of each animal will be checked with official health certificates, vaccination certificates, etc., which must accompany animals.

9. Unbroken or unruly animals will be excluded from the show and sale by the Junior Fair Board. Normally gentle animals that become unmanageable because of strange surroundings may be accepted after investigation to establish this fact.
10. Showmanship classes DO NOT count as one of the entries for beef, sheep, goat and swine, Participation ribbons will be given to all contestants in showmanship. Livestock classes are listed with class number elsewhere. PRIOR ENTRY REQUESTED.
 - a. Showmanship classes may be split or combined at the discretion of the superintendent.
 - b. In order to participate in the livestock sale, **ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS WILL COMPETE IN SHOWMANSHIP.** (Exception may be granted by Jr. Fair Board prior to show).
 - c. Each Exhibitor must own the animal they show in showmanship classes.
11. Only blue ribbon animals may show for champion.
12. Livestock exhibitors are required to keep clean, neat stalls. Keep the area over which visitors pass free from waste and rubbish. AISLES MUST BE KEPT OPEN. Each exhibitors is to furnish their own bedding (unless stated).
13. Livestock exhibitors must show and parade their own animals. When necessary, exhibitors may be assisted by other 4-H and FFA members. Subject to approval of superintendent in charge, parents may assist exhibitors.
14. Any exhibitor in livestock classes who refuses to parade his animal when asked by the superintendent in charge, or who otherwise disobeys rules in the premium book, will lose his right to exhibit.
15. College or university students away from home may enter competition in all classes if they (a) assume responsibility for the project when at home, (b) take full responsibility for all except daily care when away from home (e.g. election of animals, choice of rations, record keeping, etc.).
16. Pumping of any species, unless under a veterinarian's or committee supervision will cause that animal to be disqualified.
17. 4-H/FFA member must be present to sell their own animal(s) or bacon & ham(s); unless exception is granted by the Jr. Fair Board.
18. Must have current "Show-Me Quality Assurance" (SMQA) card for all 4-H exhibitors for each beef, sheep, swine, goat, dairy, poultry and/or rabbit. The Marion County Fair follows the SMQA certification process in each animal division named above. All 4-H junior exhibitors must have a SMQA certification. All 4-H exhibitors need to have their own card, not in the name of their parent.
19. All market exhibitors are responsible for their own animal following the sale, unless purchased by a buyer for slaughter. No re-sell market will be provided.
20. Each market animal exhibitor must submit a sale request card to the show committee within 30 minutes of the end of the exhibitor's final market animal class.
21. No premium will be paid on any item sold at the auction. A 5% sale commission will be charged on the sale amount of all items.
22. All livestock exhibitors are required to help with the setup of the Livestock barns on Monday, and with the cleanup of the Barns immediately following the sale. Each show chairman will take attendance at set up and clean up.
23. The real time award for swine and Feedlot Beef award will be given out at the conclusion of their respective shows.

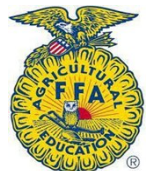

ALL BEEF CATTLE TO BE IN PLACE WEDNESDAY, August 5th BY 4:00 P.M.

Be familiar with general rules for livestock on previous pages, in addition to the following:

1. An exhibitor may make up to (2) entries per class.
2. Only TWO market beef may be shown by an exhibitor. Steers and market heifers will be shown by weight rather than by breed. Weight classes will be determined following weigh-in on Thursday, August 6th.
3. Must have official EID button tag in their ear at the show. If the button tag is lost, contact the Extension Office for replacement. The market animal cannot show for championship without Marion County official EID button tag.
4. Breeding and Market Beef will be required to register by May 10th on Fair Entry website Animal ID form using EID Button Tag and Farm Tag.
5. Health papers required— see animal regulations in front of book.
6. **Any exhibitor that does not arrive by their species specific In-Place time (4:00 p.m. on August 5th), and failed to notify the superintendent of late arrival, will not be eligible for champion drive or overall awards.**
7. Heifers shown in the market class (Class B201) are not eligible to show in any other class, other than showmanship.
8. Any beef female not accompanied by required registration papers must show in the crossbred-grade class.
9. Registration papers on breeding classes of beef must accompany each animal over one year of age to be eligible to show. Cattle under 1 year must be accompanied by registration papers of the dam and proof of registration of the sire (i.e. registration number). To show in breed classes, all beef animals must be 3/4 blood or better. Females without registration papers must show in crossbred commercial classes. Purebred cattle will show in breeding classes.
10. Registration papers must be presented to the superintendent between 4:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. on Wednesday, August 5th.
11. Bulls and production heifers must be born before May 1, present year, to be eligible for junior calf classes.
12. Any beef heifer in production, regardless of age, will be shown in the cow class.
13. All market beef must be born after January 1 of the preceding year to be eligible for showing. Steers or market heifers must have been weighed in at the Marion County beef weigh-in day.
14. Market heifers will NOT be preg-checked at the fair weigh-in.
15. Pumping or drenching of any species, unless under a veterinarian's or Junior Fair committee supervision will cause that animal to be disqualified.
16. Bedding will be provided in Beef Barn, no straw allowed.
17. All beef exhibits must be dehorned. Scurs (true scurs) may be 2" or less. If more than 2" they are ineligible to show and must be removed from the fair grounds.
18. Grand champion and reserve grand champion ribbons will be awarded for female as well as breed champion and reserve champion. Grand champion and reserve grand champion market beef ribbons and trophies will be presented. There will be no weight class, champion ribbons, or breed trophies awarded for market beef.
19. **All market beef must weigh 900 pounds to sell. The market beef will not be eligible for the champion drive if it is less than 900 pounds.**
20. All market beef will be measured with carcass at weigh-in to determine the percentage of lean, first through fifth place real time will receive cash award. The carcass awards for beef will be given out before the showmanship classes. Sale order will be based of class placings.
21. Carcass expense will be deducted from members' sale check unless a sponsor is found prior to fair.
22. A maximum of two market animals, of any species or gender, may be sold by an exhibitor.

23. Each market animal exhibitor must submit a sale request card to the show committee within 30 minutes of the end of the exhibitor's final market animal class.
24. Must have current "Show-Me Quality Assurance" (SMQA) card for all 4-H exhibitors for each beef, sheep, swine, goat, dairy, poultry and/or rabbit. The Marion County Fair follows the SMQA certification process in each animal division named above. All 4-H junior exhibitors must have a SMQA certification. All 4-H exhibitors need to have their own card, not in the name of their parent.
25. Prospect class will be shown after Breeding and prior to Market classes.

Market Beef Feedlot Rules

1. The Market Beef Feedlot award will be a combination of the rate of gain and carcass contests.
2. Ranking from each category will be combined for a total score. The market beef with the lowest score wins. Tie Breaker is whichever calf ranks highest in the carcass rankings. (example below)
3. Market Beef Feedlot award is separate from the market beef classes: however, the same market beef animal(s) must be shown in a market class. All market beef are automatically entered in the Feedlot award contest.
4. Final feed test weight will be taken at the fair. Beginning feed test weight must have been taken at Marion County beef weigh-in, February 7th, 2026. All market beef animals must have been weighed at that time to show and sell. Market beef will be weighed beginning at 10 am, Thursday, August 6th or after the swine weigh-in. This will determine the rate of gain portion of the Feedlot award.
5. Carcass value and placings will be determined by ultrasound. Ultrasound will be done at the same time market beef is weighed at the fair.
6. The top 5 Market Beef Feedlot scores will be awarded and the top two will be awarded a banner with Champion Feedlot Beef and Reserve Champion Feedlot Beef.

Example:

If Calf A ranks 1st in rate of gain and 10th in carcass. Combined score is 11.
 If Calf B ranks 5th in rate of gain and 5th in carcass. Combined score is 10.
 Calf B would be the winner in this example.

4-H/FFA GOAT EXHIBITS

Exhibitors are to be familiar with general rules for livestock on previous pages, in addition to the following:

1. Breeding and Market Goats will be required to pre-register by May 10th on Fair Entry website Animal ID form using scrapie eartag number. Ownership deadline for these animals will continue to be May 1 of the current year. All goats, regardless of age or gender, must be individually identified by an official scrapie eartag. If lost, contact the Extension Office immediately.
2. Health papers required– see animal regulations in front of book.
3. Exhibitors are limited to 2 entries per class.
4. **Any exhibitor that does not arrive by their species specific In-Place time (9:00 am on August 5th) and fail to notify the superintendent of late arrival, will not be eligible for championship drive or showmanship awards.**
5. Goats may be shown hand held, led by rope and/or by halter.
6. Goats shall be in place no later than 9:00 am on Wednesday, August 5th. Weigh-in for market goats will begin at 10:00 am. The goat show will start at 3:00pm.
7. If a doe shows in the market class, it cannot be shown in a breeding class.
8. Each market animal exhibitor must submit a sale request card to the show committee within 30 minutes of the end of the exhibitor’s final market animals class.
9. Must have current “Show-Me Quality Assurance” (SMQA) card for all 4-H exhibitors for each beef, sheep, swine, goat, dairy, poultry and/or rabbit. The Marion County Fair follows the SMQA certification process in each animal division named above. All 4-H junior exhibitors must have a SMQA certification. All 4-H exhibitors need to have their own card, not in the name of their parent.
10. No ice, ice water or alcohol may be used externally or internally as a fitting practice for 4-H/FFA goats. Exhibitor will be expelled from class at Junior Fair Board or judge’s discretion.
11. When a judge is handling goats or when you are waiting to be judged, all four (4) feet must be on the ground. It is acceptable to briefly lift the front end of a goat off the ground to set the front feet.
12. All market goat exhibitors are responsible for disposition of their own animal following the sale, unless purchased by a buyer for slaughter. No re-sale outlet will be provided.
13. Must have milk teeth and at least 50 pounds or more to sell and to be in championship drive. List each animal separately– classes will be divided by weight on day of show.
14. Pumping or drenching of any species, unless under a veterinarian’s or Junior Fair committee supervision will cause that animal to be disqualified.

1. Registered, purebred, and crossbred poultry of all breeds are eligible to show. Must be owned 30 days. All breeds show together.
2. Each exhibitor is limited to two entries per class and must be in 4-H/FFA poultry project.
3. **Any exhibitor that does not arrive by their species specific In-Place time (9:00 am on August 5th), and failed to notify the superintendent of late arrival, will not be eligible for championship drive or overall awards.**
4. Each exhibitor is responsible for cleaning out their own pens and exhibit area.
5. Broilers must be purchased as a county through the poultry chairman.
6. Pens will be furnished.
7. Poultry remain at fair for exhibition, until released by superintendent on Saturday. All exhibitors are expected to help clean the barn after poultry have been removed from the barn.
8. Each exhibitor will be required to work at least one shift in the rabbit/poultry barn. Parental supervision on each shift is required.
9. Any disqualified animal must be removed from the exhibition hall immediately.
10. The greatest of care will be taken of all animals, but the management will not be responsible for any accident, mistake, loss, or damage, regardless of cause.
11. Exhibitors will feed and water their animals before 9 am every morning. Exhibitors will clean pens daily.
12. Non-compliance of the exhibition rules may result in disqualification.
13. Each market animal exhibitor must submit a sale request card to the show committee within 30 minutes of the end of the exhibitor's final market animal class.
14. Must have current "Show-Me Quality Assurance" (SMQA) card for all 4-H exhibitors for each beef, sheep, swine, goat, dairy, poultry and/or rabbit. 2. Registered, purebred, and crossbred rabbits of all breeds are eligible. All rabbits must be permanently and legibly tattooed, no exceptions.
3. Each exhibitor is limited to two entries per class.
4. **Any exhibitor that does not arrive by their species specific In-Place time (8 a.m. on August 4th), and failed to notify the superintendent of late arrival, will not be eligible for championship drive or overall awards. Bring carrier to move rabbit from barn to show arena.**
5. Rabbits remain at fair for exhibition, until released by superintendent on Saturday. All exhibitors are expected to help clean the barn after the rabbits have been removed from the barn on Saturday morning during the livestock sale.
6. Exhibitors are to list the breed of the animal on the entry form by the name of the class.
7. Two trophies will be awarded for large breed, small breed and crossbred rabbits. A trophy will be awarded for Grand and Reserve Champion Meat Pen and Grand Champion and Reserve Champion Fryers.

Exhibitors are to be familiar with general rules for livestock on previous pages, in addition to the following:

1. Market lambs will be required to pre-register by May 10th on Fair Entry website Animal ID form using scrapie eartag number. Ownership deadline for these market animals will continue to be May 1 of the current year. Ownership deadline for breeding sheep is July 1. All sheep, regardless of age or gender, must be individually identified by an official scrapie eartag. If lost, contact the Extension Office immediately.
2. **Any exhibitor that does not arrive by their species specific In-Place time (9:00 am on August 5th) and fail to notify the superintendent of late arrival, will not be eligible for championship drive or showmanship awards.**
3. Health papers required— see animal regulations in front of book.
4. Rams and ewes without registration papers must show in crossbred commercial classes. Sheep must show individual registration papers on all entries in purebred classes.
5. An exhibitor may not make more than two entries per class, each animal to be listed on a separate line on advance entry form.
6. Market lambs will be weighed at 10:00 am or following the goat weigh-in.
7. All purebred and crossbred market lambs will show together in one market lamb class. (Market lambs must be shown slick shorn, less than 1/4 inch.)
8. Ewe lambs may be shown in the market lamb class, but cannot be shown in both market lamb and ewe lamb breeding classes.
9. Ram lambs or those showing late castration will not be accepted in the market lamb class.
10. Lambs must weigh 90 lbs. to be eligible to sell. NO REWEIGHS. Lambs too light will get to show, but will not be eligible to show for champion or sell. Lambs below 90 lbs. will be shown as a special feeder lamb class. Hair sheep lambs must weigh 50 lbs.
11. See “Health Rules” at the front of this book (IV— Exhibition Requirements for Sheep in the State of Missouri).
12. No ice, ice water or alcohol may be used externally or internally as a fitting practice for 4-H/FFA sheep. Exhibitor will be expelled from class at Junior Fair Board or judge’s discretion.
13. When a judge is handling lambs or when you are waiting to be judged, all four (4) feet must be on the ground. It is acceptable to briefly lift the front end of the animal off the ground to set the front feet.
14. Pumping of any species, unless under a veterinarian’s or Junior Fair Committee supervision will cause that animal to be disqualified.
15. Grand and Reserve Grand Champion ribbons will be awarded as well as Champion and Reserve Champion for breeds.
16. Each market animal exhibitor must submit a sale request card to the show committee within 30 minutes of the end of the exhibitor’s final market animals class.
17. Must have current “Show-Me Quality Assurance” (SMQA) card for all 4-H exhibitors for each beef, sheep, swine, goat, dairy, poultry and/or rabbit. The Marion County Fair follows the SMQA certification process in each animal division named above. All 4-H junior exhibitors must have a SMQA certification. All 4-H exhibitors need to have their own card, not in the name of their parent.

4-H/FFA SWINE EXHIBITS

Exhibitors are to be familiar with general rules for livestock on previous pages, in addition to the following:

1. Breeding & Market swine will be required to pre-register by May 10th on Fair Entry website with Animal ID form using the National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) tag or Animal Identification Number (AIN) Tag. Ownership deadline for these animals will continue to be May 1. All swine must be owned and cared for by the exhibitor by May 1 of the current year.
2. **Any exhibitor that does not arrive by their species specific In-Place time (4:00 pm on August 5th) and fail to notify the superintendent of late arrival, will not be eligible for championship drive or showmanship awards.**
3. No boars in showmanship classes.
4. Health papers required— see animal regulations in front of book.
5. All breeding and market swine must have been born on or after December 1st of the previous year.
6. Swine may be purebred, grade or crossbred, but all market animals will show together. Market classes will be determined by weight.
7. Females without registration papers must show in crossbred commercial classes. Breeding swine must show individual registration papers on all entries in purebred classes.
8. An exhibitor may not make more than two entries in breeding classes and no more than a total of two market animals may be shown. Each animal to be listed on a separate entry in Fair Entry website.
9. Exhibits must meet health rules in this premium book.
10. All hogs must be in place by 4:00 pm on Wednesday, August 5th. Weigh-in for market hogs will be at 8:00 am on Thursday, July 30th.
11. All market swine must weigh 230 lbs. to be eligible to sell. Under weight hogs will get to show, but will not be eligible to show for champion or sell. Exhibitors are required to be present with market swine at weigh-in. There will be no maximum weight for market hogs.
12. There will be NO REWEIGHS of market swine. Each exhibitor may only weigh two market swine and those will be the hogs entered into the market classes.
13. Females show in any breeding class at the Marion County Junior Fair cannot be shown as a market entry.
14. All market swine will be measured with REAL TIME at weigh-in to determine the percentage of lean. First and second place REAL TIME will receive a trophy and cash award. Under-weight swine will not be eligible and cannot win awards. Sale order will be based on class placings.
15. REAL TIME expense will be deducted from exhibitor's sale checks, unless a sponsor is secured prior to fair.
16. Grand and Reserve Grand Champion ribbons will be awarded for gilts as well as breed champion and reserve champion. Grand Champion Market Swine and Reserve Grand Champion Market Swine ribbons and trophies will be presented.
17. Pumping of any species, unless under a veterinarian's or Junior Fair Committee supervision will cause that animal to be disqualified.
18. Each market animal exhibitor must submit a sale request card to the show committee within 30 minutes of the end of the exhibitor's final market animals class.
19. Must have current "Show-Me Quality Assurance" (SMQA) card for all 4-H exhibitors for each beef, sheep, swine, goat, dairy, poultry and/or rabbit. The Marion County Fair follows the SMQA certification process in each animal division named above. All 4-H junior exhibitors must have a SMQA certification. All 4-H exhibitors need to have their own card, not in the name of their parent.
20. All market swine exhibitors are responsible for their animal following the sale, unless purchased by a buyer for slaughter. No re-sale outlet for barrows or gilts will be provided.

Horse Show will be open to 4-H and FFA youth of Marion and 4-H and FFA youth from reciprocating counties. Each exhibitor is to be familiar with the Junior Fair General Rules as well as the following:

1. All youth eligible to show as defined by Rule 1, of the General Rules must pre-enter at the Marion County Extension by June 30th.
2. There will be a \$15 pre-registration charge for all non-Marion County residents. If not pre-registered, the charge on the day of show will be \$20. Marion County exhibitors that fail to pre-enter will be charged \$20 the day of the show.
3. All entries are to be in place at the show grounds arena by 2:00 pm and remain until after start of the speed classes. Show time is 3:00 pm. Riders that fail to notify the superintendent of late arrival will not be eligible for high point or overall show awards. Entries must be completed by 2:15 pm.
4. Any animal entered in the horse show must be under the care and management of the member on or before May 1st.
5. 4-H & FFA MEMBERS of all counties need a Missouri 4-H Horse Enrollment Form on file in the county of their enrollment by May 1st. Horse Enrollment Form with appropriate signatures must be shown at registration on the day of show.
6. Negative (EIA) Coggins papers are required at registration.
7. A horse may be shown only once in any given class.
8. Each exhibitor is required to show in either one Horsemanship class or one Showmanship class to be eligible to show in other classes. All exhibitors are encouraged to show in Horsemanship and Showmanship.
9. One entry per class.
10. This horse show will be governed by *Missouri 4-H Horse Show Guidelines* and AQHA Rules unless covered differently in these fair rules.
11. Tying or securing a rider into a saddle in any manner is prohibited. Rubber bands or similar devices on boots are prohibited.
12. Classes H11– H32 will have a Danish System ribbon and a first place award.
13. Game Classes H33– H50 do not require prior entry. The first place individual will receive an award; no ribbons will be given.
14. Each exhibitor shall be assigned a number, which is to be worn during the horse show. All exhibitors must wear their number on their saddle pad or shirt in all classes.
15. Collared shirts are to be worn in all premium classes (H11– H32). 4-H or FFA shirt may be worn in place of a collared shirt for the Game Classes. Failure to exhibit number clearly will result in receiving Danish, but no placing.
16. ASTM/SEI approved helmets are required for game classes (H33– H50) and recommended in ALL classes.
17. Horses will not be allowed to run in or out of the arena during game classes.
18. **WARNING:** Under Missouri law, an equine professional is not liable for an injury to or the death of a participant in equine activities resulting from inherent risks of equine activities pursuant to the Revised Statutes of Missouri.
19. 1st and 2nd Year Horsemanship classes are no point classes.
20. Costume classes must have handler and a narrative 1 minute or less.

21. Appropriate dress for the Costume Class: Make sure you wear closed toed shoes. Please refrain from wearing tube tops, or any tops that expose the midriff , navel, back or cleavage, halter-tops, see-through clothing, or strapless tops. Also, any clothing with vulgar, obscene or offensive messages or images and clothing that would expose undergarments unless shorts are worn underneath.
22. You are allowed three attempts per obstacle in Trail classes.

1. Exhibitor may enter two (2) Hams and two (2) Bacons in the Ham and Bacon Shows, but each must be listed separately on the entry form.
2. All those participating in the Ham and/or Bacon curing project are required to help with the setup of the Sesqui Building on Saturday, August 1st, at noon and with clean up on Saturday, August 8th at 10:00 am.
3. Two (2) entries from the Ham and Bacon Shows may be sold provided that the member is eligible to sell two (2) items.
4. An overall Grand and Reserve will be chosen by the judge for Ham and Bacon. The overall Grand and Reserve winners will be sold in the Sale of Champions. The others will be in the silent auction. Note: there is no additional banners awarded for overall winners.
5. Each exhibitor must submit a sale request card to the show committee within 30 minutes of the end of the show. Exhibitor must be present at the sale to sell their ham (s) and/or bacon(s). See complete Rules for Livestock in the front of the book.
6. **White ribbon hams/bacon and disqualified hams/bacon are not eligible to sell at the Livestock Sale.**
7. **Cured hams or bacon may not be left to cure or age in a commercial meat processing or curing facility at any time.**
8. Ham weights accepted are a minimum of 12 lbs. with a maximum of 30 lbs.
9. The Traditional cure class is for bacon that use only a sugar or salt base cure. The flavored class is for bacon that add additional spice or flavor such as peppered, chocolate, jalapeno, maple, BBQ, etc. NO Alcohol cures allowed on bacon.
10. Bacon Cure: Class #ME1 14T Bacon must use a cure that would be acceptable to be shown at the Missouri State Fair using their guidelines. Butcher shop cures will fall into this class. Class #ME1 14S– Bacon can be cured using a cure of your own choice. Bacon will be judged in separate classes and then overall and reserve bacon will be chosen between classes ME1 14T and ME1 14S.
11. All bacon must be accompanied by a full list of ingredients and cure type. List Must be on a postcard and placed in a clear zipper bag, provide 2 card lists.
12. Bacon & Hams must be checked in from 8:00– 8:30 am on Thursday, August 6th, Bacon & Ham reasons will be taped and shared on social media. If the exhibitor is not present for check-in, the ham or bacon will not be shown or sold.
13. Due to food quality and sanitation, exhibitors of all bacon that will be sold in the sale will be charged a \$20 processing fee per bacon and all sale bacon will be sliced, packaged, and labelled. Service will also be offered for non-sale bacon. Processing fee to Hannibal FFA of \$20 will be deducted from sale checks to cover the packaging and processing cost. If not a sale bacon, cost is due at time of processing.
14. Any bacon not being sold or donated must be picked up by Thursday at 5 pm. For special circumstances, contact a Fair Board member.

SPECIAL AWARDS

Clean Barn Award

A \$25.00 cash award for each species to the club or chapter with the best appearing livestock area, club, family, chapter or individual.. Awards will be given for Beef, Dairy, Goats, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, and Swine.

Outstanding Livestock Project Award

The Outstanding Livestock Project Award is presented each year to an outstanding boy and outstanding girl livestock project member active in the Marion County Junior Fair. Certain requirements must be met to be able to apply. Top applicants will be selected for an interview during livestock set up. The recipients will be selected and announced during the livestock sale at the Marion County Fair.

Herdsmanship Award

The Herdsmanship program at our fair is designed to encourage and acknowledge the good work of 4-H and FFA exhibitors as they care for their livestock at the Fair, and work effectively with superintendents and the public. Herdsmanship is recognized in the Beef, Sheep, Swine, Rabbit, Poultry, Goat, and Horse divisions.

- A good herdsman takes thorough, timely care of their animals from first thing in the morning, through the day and into the evening, in terms of their animal's health, feeding, watering and cleanliness.
- Being at the fair and being shown at the fair is stressful on animals! A good herdsman does their best to minimize the stress on their livestock from before they leave home, until after the fair is over.
- It does not cost a great deal of money to be a good herdsman. It does mean that the member is actively involved with the care of their animals and presents their animals, pens, stalls in a way that shows the best of 4-H and FFA to the public. That means not only the pens and stalls themselves, but also tack , feed, equipment, aisles and the other areas in and around each member's barn area.
- A good herdsman does their best to show their animals in all available classes, including showmanship.
- A good herdsman is ready to show and on time or in line early for all classes.
- A good herdsman is helpful to other exhibitors, the public, superintendents, sale committee members and others that are making the fair possible, and to the public viewing the exhibits.
- A good herdsman may depend upon the help of other family members or club members to care for their animals from time to time, but as the exhibitor, the responsibility for the care, feeding and management of show animals is in the hands of the member exhibiting them. A strong dependence on others to do the work for you is not the sign of a good herdsman.

The fair is a wonderful chance to demonstrate the good work you do to the entire community. Make the most of this opportunity!

 - c. Only those items indicated on the entry form are eligible for judging and exhibition.
2. Member must be enrolled in the project that they are exhibiting in.
3. All posters and display panels must be ready to hang.
 - a. See exhibit sizes and guidelines on next page.
4. Entry time and release:
 - a. Entry time will be Sunday, August 2nd. Times as scheduled.
5. Exhibits will be released at 8:00 pm on Friday, August 7th. **No early release. All exhibits must be removed by 8:30 am August 8th. We are not responsible for items left.**
6. Be sure to follow rules in each Lot for individual class. Failure to do so will result in ribbon rating being decreased one level.
7. 4-H members may not enter items that were part of a school project.
8. Each exhibit shall be made or owned by the exhibitor and represent work done in 4-H, FFA, and FCCLA in the current year.
9. Each 4-H member is eligible to sell 1 item that is exhibited in the building. Exhibitor is still eligible to sell 2 items (market animals, rabbit meat pens, pen of broilers, bacons and cured hams) according to the Exhibit Rules for Livestock Exhibits. A 4-H Exhibitor could potentially sell 1 Building Project and 2 Livestock Exhibitor Items for a total of 3 items.

MISSOURI STATE FAIR Sedalia, Missouri August 13-27, 2026

The following guidelines will be followed at the Marion County Junior Fair:

- Non-animal items judged blue ribbon AND to be of State Fair quality may be eligible to go on to the Missouri State Fair.
- At the end of interview judging, the judge in each category selects a limited number of exhibits from among the blue ribbon/State Fair eligible items. Those items selected are displayed in a separate area with all the State Fair entries. Items selected for exhibition at the State Fair MUST fit specific criteria for size, type and conform to other rules as specified by the State Fair 4-H Division. Items may be selected on the county level as a “State Fair Selection”, but may not actually be taken to the fair if it does not conform to the state criteria.

- An exhibit may be eligible for judging at the county level, but may not be eligible for exhibition at the State Fair.
- The State Fair entries are boxed, taken, and returned from the State Fair by volunteers or 4-H staff. Items too large or fragile to transport may be photographed.
- In some cases, larger items can actually be displayed at the State Fair, if the member is willing to transport the item and retrieve it within the dates and time specified by the State Fair. Contact the Extension Office for those details.
- Items sent to the State Fair are displayed in the 4-H Building. We cannot guarantee that the item will not be damaged or lost, so you will need to consider this when deciding if you want to send your work to the State Fair. Cakes may not be returned if melted.
- Items sent to the State Fair are not re-judged; the member does receive a State Fair ribbon. Photographed items receive the same ribbon.
- 4-H members may have up to two items selected for display at the Missouri State Fair and give one demonstration.
- 4-H members are also eligible to give demonstrations and enter into some fun contests with neat prizes at the State Fair. There is a copy of the State Fair Premium Guide online at www.mostatefair.com.

4-H Missouri State Fair Selection Guidelines

1. No projects submitted may be in binders, folders, or notebooks. . Instead a representative page should be selected and placed in a plastic sleeve to protect it on display. The 4-H member's region, county, and name should be permanently affixed to items. These items will be accepted from any project. No projects displayed in photo albums will be accepted
2. All exhibits should reflect the educational learning gained from project work.
3. Because of display space, available cases and number of exhibits in certain projects, dimension criteria is specified. Items which do not comply with size or other specifications will not be displayed or receive a ribbon. There should not be posters, notebooks, or patterns attached to projects. Scrapbooks made in all projects should follow the guidelines listed for Scrapbooking under Arts and Crafts.
 - POSTERS**– No larger than 14" x 22", flat only, poster board only (no foam board). 3D items shall not be more than 1/8" above the surface of the poster board.
 - EDUCATIONAL DISPLAY**– Educational displays should not exceed 12" in height, 12" in depth, and 14" in width. Can include 3D items and must be free standing. (Posters with items taped to them do not qualify as educational displays. Science fair display boards are too large.)
 - WORKING MODELS**– These exhibits should show how things actually work (cutaway sections of motors or other mechanical items) or can be used to help people identify parts of a motor or engine. Working models should require floor space no larger than 24" x 24" x 24".
 - SCRAPBOOKING**– exhibits should be 1 page/1 side representative of the complete scrapbook. Size not to exceed 12" x 12". Page should be in a clear protective sleeve or clear zipper bag. Do not frame the scrapbook page. If more than one page is submitted for an exhibit, the exhibit will be disqualified.
 - CAKE DECORATING**– Cakes should not exceed 13" in height or at the base. Cake boards are considered in the 13" base requirements. Cake boards should be sturdy, especially if using a cake pan. The use of Styrofoam forms is recommended. May

only use Royal Icing, Rolled Fondant or commercial product that will harden and preserve the decorated cake. Cakes may only contain non-perishable items. They should not be real cakes, or use butter crême, soft royal icing, or tube/gel icing, or include items such as pineapple tops or real flowers. Adding Tylose powder to fondant will help it hold its shape in humidity. Cakes with candy decorations are allowed; however, avoid using candy that melts (e.g., M & Ms, candy canes, etc.). Cakes that have melting items will be removed from display. No more than six (6) per county total— all levels.

-ELECTRICITY— Items should be made in accordance with the National Electrical Code. Consult power suppliers or electricians for code requirements, Battery-operated items are also eligible items. Batteries should be disconnected or have a piece of black electrician tape placed on the ends.

-ENTOMOLOGY & GEOLOGY— Suggested box size is 18" long x 24" wide x 3 1/2" deep to fit in the display racks. All boxes must have a clear display lid; no open boxes allowed. Insects/rocks should be named, labeled and mounted so the boxes can be displayed horizontally. Securely fasten display cover with tape or screws. If a member's entomology/geology collection is displayed in more than one box, the member may send only one box for display.

-FOODS/NUTRITION/PRESERVATION— Food must be of reasonable quality to keep more than a week. Do not send food items which will spoil quickly such as casseroles, pizza, cream or fruit pies, items made with cream cheese, etc. Submit food items on disposable clear, plastic plates. Plastic wrap will be removed so drying of the food will extend display life of the product. Food items will be displayed with their tags. Please do not send expensive or keepsake containers. No samples or recipes are needed with any food items. Perishable food items will need a second identification label. Perishable food items will be displayed with their tags. Biscuits, cookies, muffins and other small items should be four per plate. Non/undecorated cakes should be displayed in mini-versions (portions of 1/3 to 1/4 of a larger total product).

-BREADS— No samples are needed with any food item. Bread products may be displayed in mini or full size versions. Please send items on disposable, clear, plastic plates, unless it is a gift package. Please do not send expensive or keepsake containers!

-PHOTOGRAPHY— Photos must be mounted on a rectangular 8" x 10" matte board. It can be the color of the photographer's choice. The photograph's must be 8" x 10" or smaller. The mounted photo should be placed in a clear plastic 8 1/4 x 10 1/2 inch sleeve. Please note— solid requires that there are no cutouts (or other holes) in the matte board, either around or behind the photo (for example, a surface shaped like a picture frame is not a solid mounting surface). Sleeves are intended to protect these special exhibits from handling, dust and humidity.

Digital considerations: For State Fair 4-H photography exhibits, certain types of editing are permissible and others are not. 1) Altering (editing to change the contents of) a photo is not permitted for State Fair exhibits. Examples include adding a sunset or object, removing someone from the shot, airbrushing to cover a bad complexion, giving a photo subject dinosaur eyes, etc. 2) Enhancing (editing to improve the existing qualities of) a photo is permitted. Examples include cropping the photo, eliminating redeye and changing levels of saturation, brightness, contrast, etc.

Building Project Sale

Objective: The goal of providing the Marion County 4-H members with an opportunity to sell 1 project on the last Saturday of the Marion County Fair is to celebrate the work of the 4-H members in creating their building projects. It also provides a financial incentive to offset the member's cost of making the project, and in turn may expose the 4-H members to the business side of their projects. The ultimate goal is to aid in the education and learning of 4-H members with this opportunity while also providing the same opportunity as 4-H members who sell during the Livestock Sale. An opportunity for the community to support the entire Marion County 4-H program no matter what projects they do.

Sponsor: Marion County 4-H Council (not affiliated with Livestock Sale)

Place, Date and Time: Sesquicentennial Building, Last Saturday of the Marion County Fair. Bidding open from 8:00-11:00 am. Payment and pickup by 1:00 pm.

How Sale is Conducted: Silent Auction run by the Marion County 4-H Council. The format will be similar to the winter Round up Silent Auction.

Rules and Outline for Sale:

1. Each 4-H member is eligible to sell 1 item that is exhibited in the building. Exhibitor is still eligible to sell 2 items according to the Exhibit Rules for Livestock Exhibits (market animals, rabbit meat pens, pen of broilers, bacon and cured hams). A 4-H exhibitor could potentially sell 1 Building project and 2 Livestock Exhibitors for a total of 3 items. No FFA building projects will be sold.
2. Each building project exhibitor must be present on Building Project Judging day and will need to select a project for sale by the end of the day. When members check out at the ribbon table sellers must complete the Building Project Sale form given to them when they register. Parent must sign off on sale of project.
3. All members who sign up to sell a Building Project must sign up for a time slot to serve a shift for the building to monitor the building and projects judging. An adult must be present. A sign up Genius will be sent out after building project judging is complete.
4. All Building projects will be sold in a silent auction format organized by the Marion County 4-H Council.
5. Only Blue Ribbon projects will be eligible for sale.
6. Any Building Project not being sold can be picked at Friday at 8 pm.
7. Any sale item selected for State Fair Exhibit, will have a picture of the item provided for the Silent Auction with a bid sheet. The 4-H member is responsible for providing the project to the buyer when it returns from State Fair.
8. All projects sold must be paid for by 1:00 pm. Projects not being exhibited at the state fair must be picked up on Saturday by 1:00 pm.
9. Payments will be made to the Marion County 4-H Council. 100% of the money goes to the seller.
10. Set up for the sale will be done Friday night at 8:00 pm.
11. These rules are subject to change as approved by the Building Project Sale Committee. Please grant us grace during this first year!

What are the ribbon colors all about?

Most people believe that judging starts at the blue ribbon and goes down. Not true. Judging begins at the **red ribbon** meaning the exhibit met the minimum requirements, shows an honest effort, but has some room for improvement.

A **blue ribbon** means the exhibit has exceeded the minimum standards and may have some small flaws where improvement may be made.

A **white ribbon** is probably the most misunderstood. A white ribbon does not indicate inferior work; it means that the exhibit does not meet the minimum standards. Many 4-H'ers have said that the white ribbons they received were the *spark* that got them started learning and led to blue ribbons later.

If you learned something, you are a winner no matter what the ribbon color!

INTERVIEW JUDGING- What is it all about?

“Learning by Doing” is not only the 4-H slogan, but it is also the basis for the 4-H learning cycle. This learning cycle has three separate parts which are titled *Do*, *Reflect*, and *Apply*.

The cycle begins with the *doing*, for each 4-H member this will be different. It may be raising an animal, leading a group, taking a picture, or any activity performed in over 80 different project areas.

The next part of the learning cycle is *reflect* which begins with sharing the results publicly and that is where “Interview Judging” enters the process. All 4-H and FFA members are invited on Sunday, July 26th to bring their completed project work to the Sesqui-Building in Flower City Park.

During Interview Judging, the 4-H member tells their project work story to an adult who will listen, ask questions, talk about the strong and weak points and ideas for future project growth. The interview is done in a friendly, although very busy environment. The member talks to a different judge for each project, but to only one judge at a time. At the end of the interview, the judge awards a ribbon and the item is displayed with other entries from your club.

CLOVER KIDS AT THE FAIR

What do Clover Kids do at the Fair?

1. Clover Kids are encouraged to (see the back cover for club, date & time) come to Interview Judging Day on Sunday, August 2nd. A judge will talk to them about their experiences this year in Clover Kids and about the items they brought with them.
2. Clover Kids may bring up to 5 items to exhibit at the Fair.
3. Clover Kids receive participation ribbons.
4. Their items are displayed with their club.
5. If your Clover Kid has an animal they have been caring for, they may bring it to the Clover Kids Animal Show on **Friday evening, August 7th**. See the Clover Kids Small Animal Policy in the 4-H Clover publication.
6. Clover kids do not compete for ribbons at the Fair because youth in this age group have a hard time understanding the winning and losing concepts of competition. At this age they view winning and losing as an indication of their self-worth.
7. By displaying their work in a non-competitive environment, youth are more likely to develop the confidence, creativity, and competence needed to build a good foundation for competing later. Clover Kids need to be encouraged to participate with an emphasis being made on personal growth, trying, and improving one’s own performance.
8. NOTE: Clover Kids do need to complete entries on Fair Entry website by 4:00 pm, July 1st, 2026.

4-H SHOOTING SPORTS CONTESTS GENERAL RULES TO ALL DISCIPLINES

1. Missouri 4-H Shooting Sports State Match Rules and Marion County 4-H Contest Rules apply unless listed differently in this premium guide. All disciplines will follow state rules.
2. All 4-H Members must comply with the Missouri 4-H Shooting Sports State Match Rules.
3. One entry per division.
4. Open only to members enrolled in the specific project.
5. By entry to this shooting event, the participant, parent, and certified leader are verifying that the youth has completed 10 hours of instruction per discipline (archery, shotgun, smallbore rifle, pellet and smallbore pistol), demonstrated basic safety, and possesses the basic knowledge and skills required. Any participant which, in the opinion of the range official, does not exhibit basic knowledge and skills will be excused from the competition.
6. For Shooting Sports related building exhibits, see Lot SS.
7. Ear and Eye protection required.
8. Ammunition will not be provided, Participants must provide their own. The ammunition must be approved by the range officials at check in and again when stationed at the firing point. Ammunition must be in the original box/carton and labeled with the name of the participant. Ammunition must meet these specs: 22LR, 40 grain solid round nose bullet; 1250 fps or less.
9. See individual contest rules for accepted types of ammunition for each division.
10. Case Requirement: All firearms, air guns, and bows, must be in a case at all times except when on the range and ready to participate in the event.
11. Open and Empty: All firearms and air guns will remain open and empty (bows) until the shooter is on the range and the command to load or fire is given.
12. Safety Procedure for Air Pistol, Air Rifle, BB Gun, Smallbore Rifle, Smallbore Pistol: While in the case and when brought to the firing line— the rifle or pistol shall have a weed eater string or open bolt indicator (of bright color) in the barrel and protruding a minimum of six inches out of the muzzle and out of the action. Shooting Sports Leaders and the Extension Office have open indicators for sale. If this is not possible in a particular rifle or pistol, some type of open bolt indicator must be used. The firearm must remain pointed in a safe direction when inserting and removing the string.
13. If shooting multiple disciplines that may require you to shoot back to back.
14. Ties will be broken by the highest number of (X's).
15. NO FLASH PHOTOGRAPHY to be used during the Archery Contest. SAFETY IS ALWAYS THE PRIMARY CONSIDERATION. Any violations of accepted safety rules are grounds for immediate disqualification. NO WARNING REQUIRED! Each contestant, parent, or coach on the firing line will wear appropriate ear and/or ear protection for all shooting events.
