A new era begins for Detroit Area Steelheaders!

As the Detroit Area Steelheaders moved into the 1990's, the future of the Great Lakes fishery was reminiscent of a foggy morning leaving the pierheads without a LORAN — you could not see very far, but you proceeded with caution with your eyes glued to the compass and the rest of the crew with their eyes peeled for danger!

Anyone who has spent a foggy day on the Big Lakes knows that uneasy feeling of not really knowing your location while trying to get back to where that last hit took place, and, in truth, not really knowing if you were north or south. Kind of risky? Should we continue on? Should we go back and wait for things to clear up? In fact, you may even have questioned your sanity for being out on the Lake in those conditions! Last January, the status of our state organization (the M.S.S.F.A.) and the fishery was in this foggy condition.

The fishery was faced with many serious problems, and the outlook was not the greatest. The northern Lake Huron fishery was looking at the possibility of gill nets remaining in Hammond Bay, and perhaps even spreading south to Alpena. The sea lampreys had again taken their grip on the fishery, and the funding to control or at least keep them from causing total destruction was being reduced. Port Austin lost its lake trout plants. And that fine fishery will be the next one which will draw major attention in the near future - don't be surprised if you notice a big decline in successes there soon.

The Lake Michigan fishery was (and still is) in serious trouble. Reduced plants of chinook and BKD (bacterial kidney disease) inflicted major blows. Water fleas had taken hold. Safe human consumption of salmon was called into serious question. Lake Erie was facing a major crisis with the zebra mussel.

Many businesses have closed or have felt the pinch of the lack of fishermen on the Great Lakes. Many big-name tackle stores and charter captains have gone bankrupt.

The DNR (Department of Natural Resources) director David Hale was in a fog himself, as proven by his response to a question in an interview with the Editorial Board of the Detroit News dated June 12, 1990. Here is Director Hale's reply to a question asking what had caused the reduced numbers of salmon

"Certainly the catch of chinook has dropped off, and dropped off appreciably last year, about 40 percent of what it was in 1986. But keep in mind that . . . in 1986 we had had well over 4 million fishing hours; last year 2.2 (million). So the effort to catch them has reduced I think the important point ed ... I think the important point that needs to be made is that in the other areas of salmon fish in Lake Michigan, the catch per effort is way up. Lake trout, brown trout, coho, steelhead are all very thriving fisheries, and it takes much less effort now to catch those fish than it fort now to catch those fish than it did three or four or five years ago.

When was the last time David Hale went fishing??

He has no idea of what the fishery in the Great Lakes was and is under his leadership and lack of knowledge of the fishery. Our hopes of returning to the great fishing we all enjoyed in the past were slim indeed.

The state organization, the M.S.S.F.A., which at one time had over 6,000 members and was politically powerful with the influence in Lansing to make an impact on the fishery, was (and still is) in a complete fog, gasping for air and providing no services or functions for its duespaying members.

Poor financial management, incompetence, and just a complete lack of unity among its chapters resulted in nothing more than member dues and M.S.S.F.A. assets begin given to its executive director for nothing in return. M.S.S.F.A. had become the problem

instead of the solution. Fortunately, 1990 brought some hope that some of these problems could be resolved. There is now a better understanding of BKD. Fish plants have been restored in Lake Michigan. An agreement has been reached on Hammond Bay. Most of the sea lamprey control funding has been restored, and a new method is being used to combat this major problem. The DNR is now using pens to raise smolts and, hopefully, improve the survival rates of the plants. There is hope in sight that the zebra mussel can be controlled or reduced.

Fishing was better in 1990, and it now seems as though 1989 was the bottom of the barrel - we hope! We have a new governor, and most likely a new director for the DNR.

The new year of 1990 started for the. Detroit Area Steelheaders with one of the best decisions I feel we could have made. We decided to remove our affiliation with the M.S.S.F.A. The justification for the action is well-documented and there's no need to dwell any longer on this subject. The Detroit Area Steelheaders, Inc. is now focused on improving the fishery, and has affiliated with the Great Lakes Sportfishing Council. We are also working with the Bluewater Sportfishing Association to form a coalition to address issues of the fishery.

In September, we donated \$1,000 to the Bluewater Sportfishing Association in support of their reef project at Lakeport. We have given, and will continue to give, support to fisheries research at Michigan State University. It is still our main goal to promote and protect the Great Lakes fishery. Presently, our Board of Directors is studying several ideas for the future to help restore our once-great fishery.

Our membership has increased and our financial status is strong. A new logo was designed and is now in use. The Detroit Area Steelheaders remains one of the most-respected fishing organizations in the state of Michigan.

As always, January is the time for the start of the fishing/boating show circuit,

and Dennis Holloway did another fine job of making sure the Detroit Area Steelheaders remain in the public eye at all of the major outdoor shows. Those shows are an important function of this organization, as we are able to let many people know that we do exist, and that we are busy supporting the fishery for all to enjoy. Our club membership manned our booth and gave the support we needed many thanks to all who helped out!

The February highlight was our Dinner Dance, which is always a great time. Jim Lee and Kathy Burbary did their usual excellent job, and if you miss the 1991 edition, only blame yourself because this annual activity is always a lot of fun!

March is when everybody starts to get the fishing itch. The 'River Rats' thaw out as spring arrives and they begin to notice an increase in fishing success. Cabin fever reaches its peak, and boat trollers begin to count the days.

The Detroit Area Steelheaders Annual Spring Fishing Show took place early in the month, and was a big success. Thanks to all members who stuck it out for two days - 1990 was the first time we tried the two-day format. The 1991 Spring Fishing Show will again be two days, and I'm sure our members will deliver the support needed to achieve the success we've come to expect from this project. A special thanks goes to Bob Ksionzek, who did all the groundwork for the 1990 show.

April brings the trolling tournament redule, and the first stop was in southem Lake Huron. With the guidance of Dick Shirk, Boat Tournament Director we proved again that we have some of the finest fishermen on the Great Lakes. as the Detroit Area Steelheaders easily outdistanced all competition at the Chuck Muer's River Crab Salmon Stakes. Our club fleet, which was smaller than our closest competition, located a big school of kings between Lexington and Port Sanilac which provided us enough action to capture first place and the \$5,000 prize. Other highlights included Skipper Ed Wilczek's misfortune of finding very shallow water and causing the spawning of the now-infamous song 'Rocky, Row Your Boat Ashore!"

As May started to bring warmer weather, the boat trolling tournament schedule got into full swing in quarter-time as 'Doug and the Slugs' made their appearance at the St. Joseph tourney. The fishing was cancelled that day, but the singing of the "Great Detroit Steelheaders' will never be forgotten!

The tournament trail continued to run its course during the summer and the competition was tight as many fine fishermen honed their skills. Dick Shirk's efforts showed, as the summer activities were well-planned and all the outings came off without a hitch. It was another fine job by Dick! Enjoy Florida this winter, Dick - we'll see you in April.

The annual Special People Outing in June was a huge success thanks to our Tim Graskewicz, Dave Barr of the Detroit Red Wings, and the Toledo Beach Marina. Many skippers showed their unselfishness and gave of their time and money to make sure that a lot of "Special People" enjoyed a great time. I still don't know who had the best time, the kids or the


There will be seminars on river fishing, surf fishing, and boat trolling. Other clinics scheduled include fly tying, rod building, and how to prepare smoked fish.

1991 FISHING RULES

- ED WILCZEK RULE The 18" minimum will now also apply to the minimum depth of water you may fish.
- DEAN PILOT RULE When returning to port after a tournament, you must bring your cooler and fish.
- 3. BILL SHACKLETON RULE The discharge of foreign material into any Great Lakes body of water is strictly forbidden. This includes glasses and shoes.
- DOUG KARAKAS RULE To enter the wader division in river or surf tournaments, it is not enough simply to own a pair of waders. You must wear them in the tournament.



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be a Detroit Area Steelheader?

Perhaps you are a fisherman but have never been a member of a fishing club. If you enjoy, or think you would enjoy, catching big salmon, steelhead and lake trout in the Great Lakes or its tributary rivers and streams, perhaps our club, the Detroit Area Steelheaders, is for you.

For example, I fished for stream trout and panfish as a kid, but got away from fishing when I got older. Fortunately, a fly-in fishing trip in Canada got me interested in fishing again. I started to read every fishing magazine I could get hold of, and I became painfully aware of all the big salmon and steelhead that a lot of people in Michigan were catching that I wasn't!

I tried to get involved on my own, but I had no boat suitable for the Great Lakes, and no one to show me where and how to river fish. Thankfully, I went to the Detroit Area Steelheaders Spring Fishing Show in Dearborn in early 1982. I was impressed with the seminars, the tackle prices, but especially with club members in the booths, sharing informa-tion about how to fish for steelhead in rivers, and how to troll with downriggers for salmon in the Great Lakes.

What really got my attention was something then called "Fishing Partners" (an ongoing club program now called 'Crews"). In this program, people like me without a boat were paired up with a boat owner who needed people to be part of his crew and share the expenses of a fishing trip. This was what I had been looking for - I signed up at the show! looking for

who needed someone to go with him on some upcoming fishing trips. He taught me more about boat trolling in a few months than I would have been able to teach myself in five years. We are still fishing together after years, and have already enjoyed a lifetime's worth of memorable fishing trips and friend-

ship. I have gained many other benefits by being a Detroit Area Steelheader besides gaining a lifetime friend and fishing partner. I've had the chance to fish on several other boats and I've learned valuable information from all of them. Several members have shared their river fishing lessons with me and invited me on many trips. I have friends with a drift boat, and another

host composed with

a jet pump. I've had other memorable trips wading rivers in the fall, the spring and even in the middle of winter. I have learned about the Big Manistee, the Little Manistee, the Platte, the Pere Marquette, the Grand, the Rogue and the Au Sable rivers. I've also learned about surf fishing for salmon and steelhead in Lake Michigan and Lake Huron. Closer to home, there are always several trips each summer to Lake Erie out of Monroe to load up on walleye using planer boards and downriggers.

In eight years, I've learned what does, what doesn't, and what might work. I've learned the ins and outs about rigging

boats, what type of electronic equip-ment is reliable and necessary versus what is unreliable or faddish junk. I've learned what kind of boats make their owners happy and what kind make their owners want to "deep six" them!

A club like our club, the Detroit Area Steelheaders, will save you time and money by eliminating trial and error in many areas. You'll also learn how to fish

Come to one of our meetings, or check us out at our Spring Fishing Show on March 23-24 at the Dearborn Civic Center. I think you'll like what you see!

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
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Mitchell wins top honors for 4th time!

Winning 1990 "Skipper of the Year" honors was not easy. In fact, I don't recall it ever being easy despite winning three in a row. This year, we won on the tie-breaker. Last year, we won by catching one fish on the last day. The year before that it also came down to the last tournament. One has only to note that in 1990, no boat won more than one tourney to appreciate how close the competition was.

I have a couple of theories as to why fishing is so competitive now. First, I have no doubt that previous winners could have won three in a row. The reasons they did not are many, but a key one is that many skippers decided to try the chartering route. Jerry Lee and Bob Kring are two examples of that. Today, chartering does not look as desirable to many skippers. It's a tough job, and business is down. Really good fishermen who might have dropped out of our tournaments in prior years to try chartering are now staying—and providing mighty tough competition.

I've always said that we Detroit Area Steelheaders are some of the best fishermen in Michigan because we don't have a home port. We can't be 'fair weather fishermen'. When you tow 250 miles, YOU ARE GOING TO FISH! People who live in fishing ports might be tempted to go home and wait for better times. Fishing under tough conditions makes you a better fisherperson in the long run. The results of our fish-offs with other local clubs bear this out. When the fishing is good, we will probably be beaten by the locals, who know what is hot. When the fishing is tough, we will probably win be-

cause we are better at changing, finding some fish and what they want.

Another factor that has made the tournaments more competitive over the past few years is the fact that we have made few changes in the tournament trail. Skippers with good logs and memories pretty much know what to expect and what to do at these familiar ports. It will be interesting to see what happens at Wilson, New York in 1991.

Another source of more competitive tournaments is rule changes made over the years. The biggest one is that we now count 6 of 9 tournaments to determine the best skipper. Years ago, we counted all events. If you missed one, you were dead. We also lowered the points per fish from 10 to 5, thus putting a higher premium on bigger fish.

The last point that has made tourneys more competitive is more sharing of information. Yes, we still could use improvement, but talk to some of the skippers who fished 5-10 years ago and ask them. Talking on the radio and fish calls have made it easier for everyone to catch fish and have more fun. And that is what it's all about in the end!

In closing, I'd like to issue a special thanks to the "Kemo" crew for 1990, and over the past few years: my ace crew chief Bob Gilbert and his wife Leslie, my wife Linda (who I hope will be on board more in 1991), Jodi Gilbert and her recruits from M.S.U., and various others who filled in when we needed someone to reel in a big one.

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

LOCATION

Looking back on 1990

As another year drew to a close, it was time to reflect upon 1990 and wonder if it was the beginning of the end, or the beginning of an uptum, for our Great Lakes fishing experiences.

In my view, we are obviously still experiencing a downward trend in our salmon fishery, a lack of optimism in the future prospects of bringing the lamprey under control, and a lack of co-operation by our neighbors to curtail the netting of both the forage base and sportfish of our Great Lakes. These, along with our BKD (bacterial kidney disease) problem, and our latest little pest, the zebra mussel, present the D.N.R. with a Mt. Everest of problems to climb.

We cannot, however, allow these problems to lie untouched and dormant. We must keep the pressure on the 'powers that be' with letters and phone calls, stating our positions on these matters. All the above are serious problems, any one of which poses a serious threat to the continued existence of our salmon and trout fishery

As far as the effects of these problems go, we did experience some highs and lows during our boat trolling tournament schedule in 1990. We had highs such as winning the top club prize of \$5000 at the River Crab Salmon Stakes, the "Special People" Day on Lake Erie, the tremendous Oscoda lake trout catch during Ladies Day, and, for the 11 boats that went, the trip to Olcott, New York and the ball they had with all those steelhead and kings.

Then there were the lows ... all the

es, and Rogers Citys - ports which have been just tremendous over the years. Given all the thrills we've enjoyed at these tourney sites through the years, maybe they've earned the right to disappoint us.

I wonder if we've become complacent, expecting every day out on the Big Pond to produce a cooler full of fish. When that doesn't happen, we do a little 'badmouthing' instead of reflecting on the good memories we've shared as a club by just being together for a weekend. Think about all the laughs and good conversation we've had on the docks and on our boats. As I've said before, you don't necessarily measure the success of a fishing trip by the weight of your cooler.

Some of my best memories of fishing come from just being with the guys and gals of the Detroit Area Steelheaders, sitting in the back of someone's boat, exchanging stories on how the big one got away the day before, or how it made three 100-yard runs before succumbing to the net, or how he broke the 25-pound test when in fact you already had a nick in the line, or how it weighed 28 pounds when it really was only 19 pounds . . No one really minds if you stretch the facts a little to cover your conversation. We've come to expect it! It all makes for interesting conversation!!

Before I joined the Detroit Area Steelheaders, I was just another boat going to a port somewhere for a day's fishing, with no one to really talk to about it, with no one to really share the experience. It's a whole new world when you learn to catch them using the experience and knowledge that our fellow club members are willing and eager to share with you.

One thing is certain, and that is that some of the finest salmon and trout fishermen in the state (or maybe even the

We need the continued support of our members in our fund-raising activities. We know we can count on all of you in 1991! Thanks for your past efforts!!





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


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Detroit Area Steelheaders know how to have fu

The first organizational meeting of the Detroit Area Chapter, M.S.S.F.A. (as our club was originally known) was held on October 16, 1974. The M.S.S.F.A. Board of Directors had encouraged two of its own, John Makela and Tom Schneider, to start a chapter in the Detroit area.

Joined by two other Steelheaders, Ed Raquel and Joe Sizemore, the committee of four, after many hours of preparation and planning, founded the Detroit Area Chapter late one night in September 1974
Forty-one fishermen attended that firs

meeting at the Northwood Inn, discussing elections, finances, committees, by-laws, and mostly fishing, naturally! The "First Annual Meeting" was held on December 4, the official beginning of the club. By the end of that first official meeting, membership exceeded 100, 14 directors had been elected and we were on our way!
