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Winds Wreak Havoc at St. Joe

Hazardous conditions and Gale force winds resulted in the St. Joe tournament cancellation. After a week of sustained north winds, the NOAA offshore forecast reported midweek wave heights to 18'. By Thursday afternoon most of the 11 boats that planned to make the trip decided not to go. Small craft advisories and 7' seas led tournament directors to cancel the event late Thursday afternoon. Reports from St. Joe confirmed that the lake never settled down until Monday.

Winds will Blow

Seasoned mariners are familiar with the Beaufort Scale which is commonly used to measure the force of wind by it's effect. When it was first developed in 1806 the scale quantified the effect of the wind relevant to sailing vessels of the day. In the early nineteen hundreds, the scale was adapted to include the winds effect on wave heights and conditions. Today the Beaufort scale remains a practical measure of how wind affects lake conditions. The chart below provides a graphic description.

Great lakes Angler Diary

The Detroit Steelheaders continue to support development of the Great Lakes Angler Diary. A club donation of \$1,000 was presented to Dan O'Keefe of Michigan Sea Grant. Our donation was instrumental in expanding the smart phone application. Sea Grant will use the app for three programs in 2017, Salmon Ambassadors, Huron-Michigan Diet Study, and Bait Ball reporting. An "Angler Dashboard" is in the works that will simplify use of the app to anglers. Android and iPhone native apps will also allow for recording data when service is not available. Based on feedback from last year's beta testing, these additions will appeal to a wider audience and be promoted via newspaper, sport shows, and other means to reach more fishermen.

Thus far, the Detroit Area Steelheaders has been the sole funder of the app, and our logo is featured within the app. Most importantly, app improvements mean more useful data getting into the hands of biologists and fisheries managers. The addition of the Bait Balls function for 2017 should really help. Once we get hundreds of bait ball images rolling in, USGS scientists may be able to make some serious headway on figuring out if anglers are finding concentrations of fish that are being missed in their sampling. This is a big deal in terms of figuring out overall Lake Michigan alewife numbers, and therefore determining stocking levels.



What's the Future of Great Lakes Salmon?

A dozen or so years ago, I moved my boat to Manistee following the collapse of Lake Huron's salmon population. I've observed the recent actions of lake managers, and witnessed their effects on salmon populations. In an effort to stabilize Lake Michigan's dwindling alewife forage base, we have seen drastic cuts to salmon plants. There is a debate taking place, that may determine the future of the great lakes sport fishery. Decisions are being made that not only attempt to reduce pressure on alewife populations, but also establish if Lake Trout or Chinook will be the keystone predator. As a recreational fisherman, I would prefer lake managers maintain a thriving sport fishery dominated by Chinook.

I have not fostered strong opinions on lake management practices and candidly, not followed them closely. We have moved from a time when Salmon were first introduced to control alewives, to today's efforts to preserve them. There is a consensus among great lakes stakeholders to stabilize the alewife stock. It seems how that is accomplished potentially may pit efforts to rehabilitate Lake Trout against the future of the great lakes salmon fishery.

Salmon fisherman know numbers of the Chinook population are down. Understanding why requires knowledge of the contributing factors and what are likely opposing views. In coming months, we will try to present an overview through guest speakers, web posts and articles, on the factors affecting our sport fishery so our DAS membership might come to their own conclusions on how the sport fishery should be managed.

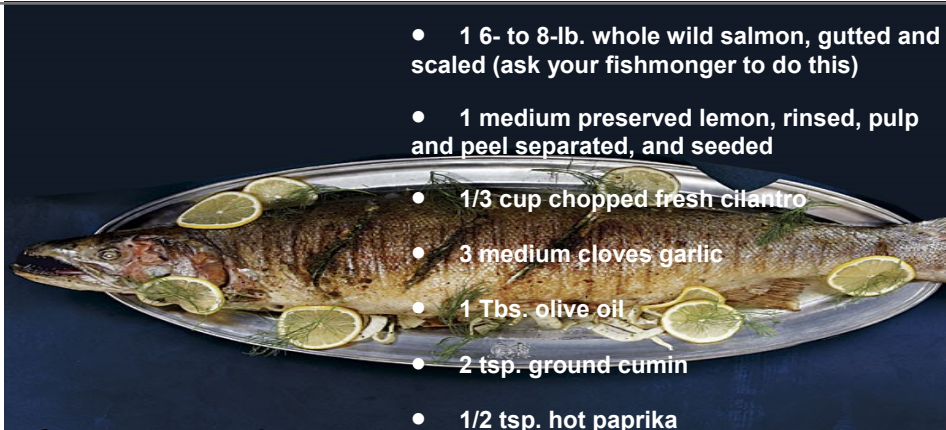

Chefs Table

Grilled Whole Coho Salmon



This show stopping main course is perfect for a summer cookout or celebration. The salmon comes off the grill juicy and tender, perfumed with the preserved lemon-fennel stuffing and deeply seasoned from the cumin-and-garlic-spiked spice paste rubbed into the skin and cavity. Serve with grilled zucchini and eggplant, and warm flatbread.

Using kitchen shears, cut off the salmon's top fins and the fins just behind the gills. Rinse the fish well inside and out and pat dry with paper towels. Using a sharp boning knife, cut deep diagonal slashes almost to the bone 3 inches apart on both sides of the fish.

With a mini food processor or mortar and pestle, blend the preserved lemon pulp, cilantro, garlic, olive oil, cumin, paprika, 2 tsp. salt, and 1 tsp. pepper to a smooth paste. Rub the paste into the salmon's cavity and side slashes. Cut the preserved lemon peel into pieces and stuff them into the cavity along with the fennel slices. Poke the tip of a sharp paring knife through the belly flaps at even intervals, then weave the toothpicks through the holes to close the cavity. Let stand at room temperature while preparing the grill.

Prepare a hot charcoal or gas grill fire for direct grilling. Clean and oil the grill grates 3 times at 10-minute intervals, covering the grill between oiling's.

Adjust a gas grill to medium heat (325°F to 350°F); for a charcoal grill, wait until you can hold your hand about 6 inches above the grate for 4 seconds.

Measure the thickness of the fish right behind its gills and calculate 10 minutes of grilling time per inch for medium rare.

Thoroughly pat the salmon dry with paper towels, wiping any excess paste off the skin. Dust one side of the fish with flour and then brush liberally with oil. Oil the grill again and place the fish on the grill floured side down, with the belly facing you. Leave enough room behind it to roll the salmon over later.

Cover and grill the fish for half of the calculated time. Wrap the tail fin with foil if it begins to scorch.

Dust the top side of the fish with flour, and brush liberally with oil. Slide 2 large spatulas underneath the fish, gently loosening any places where the skin may have stuck, and roll it over onto the second side. Cover and continue to grill for the remaining time, or until an instant read thermometer inserted horizontally into the thickest part of the fish without touching bone registers 125°F for medium rare, 135°F for medium, and 145°F for well done.

Carefully slide the two spatulas under the fish at the head and tail ends and transfer to a platter. Tent loosely with foil and let rest for 5 to 10 minutes.

Carve and serve the salmon:

Remove the toothpicks, and transfer the fennel at the opening of the cavity to a small serving bowl. Carefully peel back the skin from one side of the fish and lightly season the flesh with salt. Using a slotted spatula, remove the flesh from the bones in sections (see step-by-step photos of [how to carve a whole salmon](#)). Scrape the remaining fennel into the bowl; discard the preserved lemon.

Use the spatula to hold the bottom flesh down and then carefully lift up and discard the spine. Lightly season the bottom flesh and remove it in sections, leaving the skin behind. Serve the salmon with the fennel stuffing.

- 1 6- to 8-lb. whole wild salmon, gutted and scaled (ask your fishmonger to do this)
- 1 medium preserved lemon, rinsed, pulp and peel separated, and seeded
- 1/3 cup chopped fresh cilantro
- 3 medium cloves garlic
- 1 Tbs. olive oil
- 2 tsp. ground cumin
- 1/2 tsp. hot paprika
- Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 1 small fennel bulb, halved, cored, and cut into 1/8-inch-thick slices; fronds reserved for garnish
- 5 to 6 thick toothpicks or wooden skewers, soaked in cold water for 30 minutes
- Vegetable or canola oil, as needed
- All-purpose flour, as needed

Fresh lemon slices, for garnish

Upcoming Tournaments

Harbor Beach – Sat., June 3, 2017 – Back on Lake Huron, this port has provided some decent fishing over the last couple of years. Lake trout are the catch here with very few silver fish thrown in. From the cemetery to the south all the way up to Lighthouse County Park to the north, the sandy bottom is perfect for using bottom bouncers off the cannonballs with dodger/spin'n glo combinations. Dodgers in the Trashcan, Hammered Chrome or White finishes with White w/Pink dots, Metallic Green Red Head or Chartreuse/Lime Green spin'n glos are some favorites here. You can find the fish in 70 – 120 FOW.

Tips N Tricks

Lake Trout Techniques

Grand Haven - Sat., May 20, 2017 & Sun., May 21, 2017 – The only two-day tournament on the DAS SOTY tournament schedule. This can be a tough one to win because even though you might do well on Saturday and be up there in the standings you have to go out and do it again on Sunday to stay there. Much easier said than done. There's not much structure here and the fish can be anywhere from 50-60 FOW out to 200 plus FOW. But this is where they'll be as they move up the shore line as the season progresses. A mix of Kings, Coho, Steelies and Lake Trout will make up the catch. It's predominantly spoons that work here but flasher/flyes will take some fish as well. Everyone has their favorite spoons but Blue Dolphins, Green Dolphins, NBKs and Pink Panties are good choices. Don't crowd them and stay out of their way but fishing near the Charters can certainly help you find the fish.

There are times when the target species is lake trout. Or maybe it's a tournament where you need one more fish and the salmon have disappeared. Lake trout can be the fish that saves the day. There are many techniques to catch lake trout but for that near guarantee, what would be the best plan of action?

For the most part lake trout are bottom dwellers. Sure, you can catch them higher. But, lake trout, like all predators will follow the baitfish. Day in, day out the bait they feed on are bottom oriented baitfish. When the sun comes up, you often see the baitfish sink to the bottom where the lake trout are waiting for brunch.

Lakers will be on the bottom in cooler water; generally 46 – 48 degrees. I would look for where 48 degree water intersects with the bottom and start bouncing bottom at that depth. I also like to look for a couple small arches or squiggles on the bottom. It takes a good sonar to see bottom huggers as they are difficult for most sonar to separate them from bottom. Just look for one of their buddies or some bait to betray them.

There are numerous techniques for targeting lakers. The keys are to keep your presentation on the bottom and work it slow. The old commercial fishermen used wire lines with a 1-2 lb lead ball that they let tip the bottom. Off that they would usually run a silver spoon or a strip of sucker belly... and they had to catch fish. Today the number one combination is running "junk"; some sort of attractor followed by a spin-n-glow.

The top attractors are dodgers, rotators or "cowbells". The top lures are spin-n-glows, peanuts, or small silver spoons.

The number one setup on the tournament trail is the "trash

can" O dodger by Luhr Jenson followed by a spin-n-glow. "Trash can" is the color of a galvanized trash can, hence the name. Silver, white, green or chartreuse are also good dodger combos to try. The number one lure is the spin-n-glow. Top colors are white, green and chartreuse. Be sure to get a couple of the light green "Funky Chicken" and "Pearl" with a red head or Pearl with red or pink dots. Let the lakers tell you what color they prefer on any day.

This rig must be run right next to the bottom and run slow. I would set the "junk" about 25 – 30 feet behind the ball. The best technique is to assign a crew member to each downrigger and have them drop the ball down until it touches bottom then bring it up two feet. Watch the rigger arm. If it jiggles, bring it up a foot or two. If it is still for 5 minutes, put it down until it touches bottom and bring it up two. If you just set it and ignore it, you either end up 12 feet off the bottom (above the fish) or you lose the rig to the bottom or worse, the cannon ball (Hello Port Austin) Lake trout like s-l-o-w speeds, too. If you normally run 2.2 – 2.4 for salmon, you need to run 1.2 – 1.4 for lakers. That might mean putting out a trolling bag or a bucket, but you need to go slow. Lakers are notorious for following a rig for a time without taking it. A change in speed or direction will often trigger a strike. Follow these tips and you will catch lake trout and just maybe put that fish in the box that jumps you up the ranks in the tournament.

The ten boats weighed in 29 fish but there were a lot more fish caught than that. Many of the fish caught were Coho that did not make the 19" or 3# requirement to allow them to count toward the boats score. There was enough variety of species to make a success of our new big fish rules. Hard Top N Tails won the \$100

awarded to the boat with the largest King Salmon at 11.9 pounds. Vicki's Seacret won \$50 with their 12.8 pound Lake Trout and Bobby's Toy won \$50 with a 6.1 pound Steelhead. Everyone took some nice Coho home that will make the dinner table sometime soon.

The temperature in the early morning was cold but there was a light wind out of the Northeast so the trolling conditions started out great. As the morning wore on the Northeast wind picked and eventually turned into a sustained 14 mph. That made fishing more difficult for everyone but much worse for those of us with small boats. By 11:30 am Channing had had enough of fishing in 2 1/2 to 3 foot waves so we re-

turned to port and got an early jump on setting up the shore lunch. A shore lunch of fried chicken, potato salad, and chips was enjoyed by 47 people and there was very few leftovers. I told everyone that we had been up all night plucking and frying chicken over an open campfire but it really came from a local market in town and it was pretty good. Thanks to everyone who participated and especially the crew of Channing for working so hard to pull off a shore lunch dinner for 47 people after a morning of fishing. Next stop is St Joe on May 6 and I hope we have great turnout.
