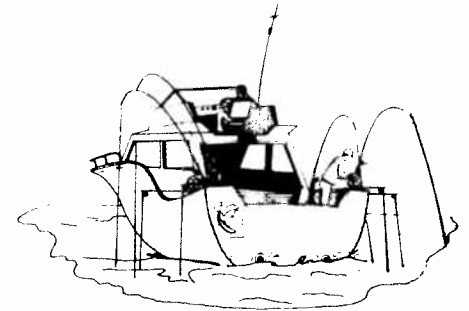

Detroit Chapter upholds title on Au Sable

Au Sable Chapter claims defeat again!

With bad weather forecast, 43 members of the Detroit Chapter ventured forth to the town of Oscoda. This trek was to defend our title against the AuSable River Chapter. Thirty-six members arrived by tournament time, ready to do battle. These intrepid Steelheaders were met with two to three feet of snow and a river frozen over from the Meadows to the mouth. With this situation, most members fished new holes, or holes they hadn't fished in years.

The day progressed with Bob "Walk-a-Mile" Kanas chasing fish down the river (twice!), only to lose them, Ed "Walk-on-Water" Yankoski spending most of his time in the Oscoda laundromat, and Tom "Corky Man" Schneider tripping, stumbling and complaining his way to ecstasy. All this fun ended up at the Van Etten Sportsman's Club for weigh-in and dinner.

With the weigh-in out of the way, dinner was served. Hot dogs, beans, potato salad, munchies and beer were the menu of the day.

After dinner, the results were announced and the Detroit Chapter members had successfully defended their title against the stout-hearted members of the AuSable Chapter. Tom Schneider led our chapter with a 10 lb., 8 oz. steelhead, good for first place overall. John Kehrer turned in two fine 'steelies' on our behalf. John's fish, at 6¾ lbs. and 7½ lbs. landed him second place in the individual trophy awards. Detroit's three 'steelies', tipping the scales at 24½ lbs., were good enough for the win, even though Oscoda turned in four fish, totaling 23¾ lbs. Only 12 ozs. separated the two chapters.

The Detroit Chapter would like to thank Rose and Ron Raynak and the AuSable River Chapter for their hospitality and efforts in making this an outstanding tournament.

Au Sable River Team Tournament

(Au Sable River, Saginaw & Detroit Area Chapters)

On March 17, 1979 the AuSable River Chapter, the Saginaw Chapter and the Detroit Area Chapter are engaging in a new idea in river fishing tournaments. Instead of the usual chapter versus chapter tournament, we are going to have a team tournament.

Rules are as follows:

1. A team will consist of three members, one member from each chapter. In case of unequal chapter entries, two or three members may be drawn from one chapter. It is not required that each team fish together.
2. The lottery will be at Desi's at 6:00 a.m. Saturday morning. You must sign in prior to 6:00 a.m. at Desi's in order to qualify for the lottery.
3. Fishing starts at daylight and ends at 5:00 p.m. Weigh-in will be held at AuSable River Outfitters, from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. or until completed. All steelhead must be a minimum of 18" long to qualify for weigh-in.
4. Final standings will be based on the total weight of a maximum of six steelhead turned in by each team.
5. Entry fee of \$3.00 must be paid by March 10, 1979.

Trophies will be awarded for the first five teams, with three trophies per team. Refreshments will be available. A Chapter trophy will be awarded to the Chapter with the highest weight per entry. All trophies will be awarded Saturday after the weigh-in. For additional information, call John Tymensky at 532-1687.

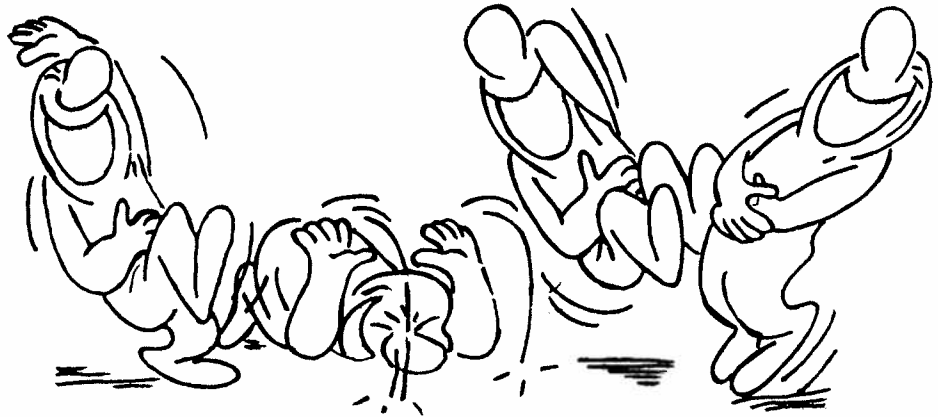

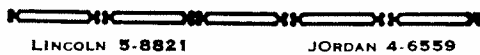

New Steelheader learns from chapter veterans

Have you ever been fishing in a pack and one boat is making a killing? You can see that the fisherman is using a bright color spoon, so when you get close to his boat you give him a shout--"What are you using and what color?"--only to have him holler back "BLACK Rapala!"

Or have you ever been ice fishing with a group and someone says to put all your fish but one small one in a bucket and if anyone should wander by and ask, tell him that's all you have caught? Have you ever been with one or two other boats which you know really caught a mess at Marysville and the next day on the Hotline you hear that one of the boats reported that they "killed them" in Marine City?

Have you ever heard several boats talking on the radio about how well they are doing, and when you ask them where they are fishing, you get "dead silence?"

All of these things just go to prove there are a lot of good fishermen who do not choose to share with anyone the how, when and where of their success.

After thirty years of fishing, when I decided to try steelheading, I also decided to ask a Steelheader in a manner I would like to be asked about walleye fishing, which had been my first love. While working with Bob Kanas and knowing that he was a die-hard Steelheader, I told him I would like to try his sport and explained to him my lack of stream experience.

Any successful fisherman knows that there is an awful lot of technique involved with fishing for any specific species of

fish, much too much to be learned in a few minutes. So Bob dug up a year's supply of *Fishin' Tales*, and the state paper, with all the excellent articles on river fishing underlined.

Armed with all this knowledge, Bob went with me to the local sporting goods store to help me pick out his favorite size and style of hooks, drifting baits, etc. He loaned me a rod and invited me to join Ed Yankoski and Bob's ten year old son Scott for a weekend on the AuSable.



WOULD YOU ASK these two anything?

We started out December 17, 1978 in the Boy Scout hole, which held a number of coho. Ed, Bob and Scott had beached eight or ten of these fish. However, I found a great deal of difference between wire line with two-pound sinkers and this fishing with two-pound test line and split shots. I could not get a single fish to take an offering!

Bob put his rod down on the bank and came over to take mine. On his first cast, he set the hook and handed me the rod. I was pleased with the fight I received from this old half-dead coho. After landing the fish, I asked Bob how he managed to get that No. 12 hook in the tail of that fish.

The water started coming up and we began fishing for steelhead in earnest. It was late afternoon and we had worked our way down the river. Ed had two fish on for a few minutes and he invited me to share his hole. In a few casts, I had a steelhead on for approximately three good wiggles. After bringing in the line, it was evident one of my knots had not held. An immediate discussion ensued regarding the quality of knots required for walleyes.

Well, it was a few minutes later while I was intently watching and feeling my line that I felt a fish, set the hook, and nothing! Once again, I felt a strike, set the hook and then I heard Yankoski roaring. Ed had hooked my line and was

COOK'S CORNER

SEATTLE SALMON PATTIES

- 1-16oz. can salmon
- 2 beaten eggs
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/4 cup snipped parsley
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1 teaspoon dry mustard
- 2/3 cup fine dry bread crumbs
- 3 tablespoons shortening

Drain salmon, reserving 1/3 cup liquid. Remove bones and skin from salmon. Flake meat. Cook onion in butter until tender. Add reserved liquid, 1/3 cup crumbs, eggs, parsley, mustard and salmon; mix well. Shape into 6 patties; roll in remaining crumbs. Melt shortening in skillet. Cook patties over medium heat until browned. Carefully turn, brown other side.

"DISCO DRIFTER", "CORKY MAN" AND FRIEND

Three battle snow, cold and ice on Au Sable

When I set the alarm for 2:30 (a.m.), I knew that I wasn't going to get much sleep. Little did I know that between Johnny Carson, George Raft and a bed full of lumps (anxious anticipation), I wasn't going to get even a wink.

When the phone started ringing at 1:45 a.m., I turned off George and went to answer what I was sure would be the "Corky Man" telling me the trip to "Mother River" was off. Imagine my surprise when it wasn't the "Pres", but rather an Orson Welles relative informing me of the recent landing. I carefully instructed my informant where I thought he could meet with his Martian friends, and began putting my gear in the car.

Tom was still asleep when I arrived but a couple of short blasts on the horn took care of that. Did you ever notice how many people get up at 3:00 a.m. to see Schneider get off on a fishing trip? I wish my neighbors were like that! "Disco Drifter" was a little late but seeing how he had manned the booth at Cobo, Tom said let's be cordial, besides, he was driving!

Four hours later, after breakfast with Forward's regulars, we were pulling on

waders when the whistle announced the first wheel was under way. The trip through the knee-deep snow was much easier than two weeks previously because our trails had been kept open and our first stop was a half-mile below the Rea Road bridge.

Near the end of our first hour, and during my umpteenth retying session, I heard the familiar "Fish On" ring out. A quick look brought the Yakima patch into focus. Further study indicated a jumping and twisting motion above the water and slightly downstream of the "Prez". After a short but violent fight, the unmistakable sound of a parting line filled the air. Much to the delight of Mr. Fish, and the disgust of Tom, one more jump was made as the fish attempted to free itself of the trailing line.


With renewed interest I retied the line and made the drift that I had finally found through the tangle of debris lining the hole. Midway through the drift the line stopped and as I brought the tip up, the throb of the fish made the temperature rise twenty degrees. "Fish On" echoed across the stream and I began to carefully lead him around the chunks

of floating ice. Almost immediately I heard another "Fish On", and as I looked over my shoulder, I saw Lance had also figured out the drift. After a brief fight, two fish were on the stringer and "Disco Drifter" was holding up his 9 pounder for the camera. As the day wore on and the temperature continued to drop, three more fish were hooked but all managed to shake the hook or break the line, and after six hours of sub-zero weather, three tired but satisfied fishermen climbed into the car to start the southbound "Red Eye Express".
