Chip Cartwright honed his skills over countless hours on the water perfecting the design and use of fishing tackle and special techniques for maximizing the productivity of lures. Chip is also an accomplished Great Lakes troller and routinely produces limit catches of salmon and trout.

He will also conclude the evening at talk with his take on the Status of the lake Michigan fishery.

Next DAS Ice Fishing Outing

The DAS will have our 2nd outing on the Canadian side of Lake St. Clair on Feb. 15, 2014. We will be fishing out of St. Lukes (Tomøs Duck Club) at the end of Rivard Rd.

Buying a Canadian license is quite expensive but can be used year round in different locations such as Erieau, the Canadian side of the Detroit River, etc. We will have a big fish prize for \$5.00. Fishing will most likely end at 3pm with the weigh in to follow.

This type of fishing requires some type of transportation (ATV, snowmobile, or car) to get to the fishing grounds usually 1 to 7 miles out. Make sure your auger is sharp because the ice can be pretty thick by this time.

The fishing here can be fantastic with jumbo perch the norm. The trick is to be mobile; keep an eye on where the people are moving to stay on top of the fish. Everything works here; jigging spoons seem to catch the big ones. Silver, brass, copper, with colored beads, Kenøs Hook Slab Grabbers or Gusters can do the trick. Bait stores can be found at: Lighthouse Cove, Duckyøs at Stoney Point, Mitchelløs Bay and Bass Haven.

Great Lakes Ice Cover Spreading Rapidly

Ice continued to build this past week on the Great Lakes due to the cold air and a temperature staying below freezing and Lake Superior's new record shows it.

The lake is 92 percent frozen, toppling a 20-year-old record of 91 percent set on Feb. 5, 1994. That statistic helped total Great Lakes ice cover soar, and we can expect to see more form in coming days.

The air temperatures this past week averaged around five degrees below normal for the Great Lakes area. This amount of deviation from normal means it was a fairly cold week.

As of February 5, 2014, the entire Great Lakes system is now reportedly covered 77 percent with ice, according to the **Great Lakes Environmental Research Laboratory**. Last week at this time the ice cover was 66 percent. The 77 percent ice cover now still lags behind 1994, when the entire Great Lakes system had an average ice cover of 84 percent on February 5. This data is according to Jia Wang, physical oceanographer at the Great Lakes Environmental Research Center in Ann Arbor, MI.

Let's look at each individual lake.

Lake Superior

Lake Superior is almost frozen over as of yesterday February 5, 2014. Lake Superior is 92 percent covered with ice now. The ice has increased rapidly in the past week, from 76 percent ice cover on January 30, 2014. The high resolution satellite picture from February 3, 2014 shows all of the ice cover on Lake Superior. The current ice cover on Lake Superior is the highest amount ever for February 5. In 1994, Lake Superior was reportedly 91 percent covered in ice.

Lake Michigan

Lake Michigan is now 51 percent covered with ice, as opposed to 42 percent at this time last week. Coyotes were seen walking on the ice just offshore of Chicago this week. This makes us wonder if the lakes freeze over totally, will animals from Canada be able to cross over Lake Huron or Lake Superior, and enter Michigan. It is thought that this is how the last wolverine spotted in Michigan made it into Michigan. Lake Michigan has

been covered with more ice on this date in the past. In 1977 and 1996, Lake Michigan was up to 74 percent ice covered.

Lake Huron

Ice cover on Lake Huron rocketed up an additional 14 percent this week, climbing to a total ice cover of 86 percent. If the ice continues to build at that rate in this next week, Lake Huron could be almost frozen over, or frozen over by the end of next week. People ice fishing are reporting 24 inches of ice on Saginaw Bay near Bay City. Lake Huron has been as much at 95 percent covered in ice on this date back in 1981 and 1994.

Lake Erie

Lake Erie is the shallowest of the Great Lakes, with an average depth of 62 feet and a maximum depth of 210 feet. It also has the least volume of any Great Lake, with 116 cubic miles of water. So it should come as no surprise that Lake Erie currently has the highest percentage of ice cover. Lake Erie is 96 percent covered with ice. Last week at this time Lake Erie had 94 percent ice cover. Erie was entirely ice covered on February 5, 1996.

Lake Ontario

Lake Ontario is an interesting lake. It is the smallest Great Lake when it comes to surface area, but actually holds more than three times the amount of water when compared to Lake Erie. The average depth of Lake Ontario is 283 feet, making it the second deepest Great Lake behind Lake Superior. The deepest spot in Lake Ontario is 802 feet. The ice cover on Lake Ontario is the lowest of any of the Great Lakes, with only 32 percent covered in ice. Last week at this time, Lake Ontario had 27 percent ice cover. Lake Ontario has been covered with as much as 79 percent ice up to this point in the winter in 1994.

Will ice continue to grow?

The ice cover should continue to grow at a rapid rate based on temperatures expected in the next few weeks. You may not want to hear this, but I don't see several days in a row cracking the freezing mark until at least February 21. There could be a few hours above freezing late next week, but that won't slow the ice growth. Also, the weather pattern is going to be fairly quiet in the next two weeks. This means lower wind speeds around the Great Lakes, which should help accelerate ice cover growth.

It is going to be close, but we may be living in a historic winter with regards to amount of Great Lakes ice.

We will see some fascinating ice sculptures if we get a big wind that breaks the ice, and piles it up.

We will also be fascinated when the ice has melted, and we see

Lake Huron Atlantic Salmon Program Grows

Most anglers know that Lake Huron is changing right before our eyes, and we have made some changes to fish stocking at our Huron side ports. Atlantic salmon have been stocked in the St. Marys River for decades by LSSU, and now that program is getting a boost. Fisheries Division has increased our capacity for Atlantic salmon rearing, and we have focused additional experimental stocking not only in the St. Marys River, but also at our Alpena and Oscoda ports. Our unit worked with the public to identify the best possible stocking locations with these additional, but limited, yearling fish. Atlantic salmon have a much different feeding strategy than Chinook salmon, and it is believed that they will thrive in the different forage base that exists today in Lake Huron. After an initial stocking in 2013, look for returns of these fish as soon as 2014!

DNR releases information on actively managing cormorants

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) today announced figures from its efforts with federal partners to actively manage cormorants in several parts of Michigan.



For years anglers have observed cormorants feeding in their favorite fishing spots, with substantial increases in bird numbers over the past few decades. These observations have concerned anglers about the potential effects cormorants may be having on the fish they are

targeting. In response to these growing concerns, the federal government enacted a depredation order in 2003 that authorized states, tribes and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to conduct cormorant management, with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service overseeing the process. Under this authority, the DNR developed management goals at several cormorant breeding colonies across the state to determine what, if any, impacts cormorants were having on the states fishery resources. On-the-ground work to meet these goals is conducted by USDAs Wildlife Services, which began oiling eggs and culling cormorants in the Les Cheneaux Islands in 2004.

Since that time, Wildlife Services has expanded its operations to include efforts at Thunder Bay (Alpena), Beaver Island, Ludington and Bays de Noc (Escanaba), with the culling of up to 10,000 birds per year for the past several years. Subsequently, cormorant nesting populations have been reduced anywhere from 54 percent to 94 percent at peak nesting counts at these locations. In colonies where management efforts have been conducted, the estimated cormorant nest count in Michigan waters has gone from more than 23,000 in 2007 to less than 10,000 in 2013.

In addition to these efforts, Wildlife Services has directed volunteer groups in harassment programs at many inland lakes and Great Lakes bays during spring migration periods. Volunteer groups also assisted in cormorant harassment programs during stocking events at many Great Lakes ports. Each year, management locations are mutually agreed-upon by a coordination committee composed of representatives of several federal, state and tribal agencies.

Its difficult to evaluate the effects of cormorant management and its relationship to sport-fish populations due to constantly changing food-web dynamics, including the establishment of invasive species throughout the Great Lakes,+said Steve Scott, Michigan DNR fisheries biologist. Kaisheries surveys have shown an increase in sport-fish populations during the same period cormorant populations were declining in areas where activities have been conducted. We are seeing some very encouraging results in fisheries at several locations, and anglers are reporting improvements. We are very pleased with the progress we are making through our partnership with Wildlife Services."
