Erieau.... More 'Eyes' than 'Bows'

The real nice thing about the DAS going to Erieau, Ont. for a tournament is it close proximity to the Metropolitan Detroit Area. The drive is less than one hundred miles for most DAS skippers. Some get up early Sat. morning and make the drive over to the Erieau Marina, launch their boats, get to the 6:00am skipperøs meeting just on time, fish the tournament, do the weigh-in and luncheon and are back home by early evening Sat. night. This can make it a fairly inexpensive tournament to attend with low fuel costs and no overnight bills.

For these reasons, you would think it would be a more popular stop on the tournament schedule, but only 6 boats made the trip.

The fishing there kept the crews busy as it was definitely an entertaining fishery and the catchinø was quite good. The bulk of the catch was the much sought-after, tasty walleye and of course, you were constantly -cleaningø lines of the Silver Bass and Sheephead, that seem to hit anything and everything. Unfortunately, the -eyes dongt have any value in the tournament except for the Big Walleye pool and there were not many ørainbowsø, as the locals call them, caught except by the winning skipper and crew.

It was a great day for fishing with sunny skies warm temperatures and waves less than 2ø Most boats had decent catches of walleyes at each of the 2 fish calls but were struggling to find the steelhead.

Paul Gjeldum and the crew on *Hue* Horizonø, just as they did in Olcott, walked away with the win as they brought 6 steelhead to the scales. Paul has truly earned the nickname of *Hr*. Steelheadø with the back-to back wins. *Hite* Movesø skippered by Carl Ventimiglia took second place with 3 steelhead and the *Sea* Hagø crew led by skipper Blaise Pewinski took 3rd with 2 steelies. *Sloppy Joeø* edged out *Bobbyøs* Toyø by .6 of lb to take 4th Place. Bob Feisel and the *Hickieøs* Seacretø crew did not catch any steelhead but weighed-in quite a few walleyes with one being 8.8 lbs to take the Big Walleye pool. Blaise Pewinski, skipper of the *Sea* Hagø weighed in a 7.35 lb.steelhead to capture the Big Fish pool.

New Revelation On Lake Huron's Collapse Could Spell Trouble for Lake Michigan

The harsh winter of 2002 was a key factor in the collapse of baitfish in Lake Huron, according to a USGS report. Could last winters record ice cover on Lake Michigan have similar consequences?

The harsh winter of 2002 was a key factor in the collapse of baitfish in Lake Huron, according to a USGS report. Could last winterøs record ice cover on Lake Michigan have similar consequences? In the study of freshwater ecosystems there is a classic debate regarding the control of baitfish populations. In simple terms, it can be boiled down to those who argue that baitfish numbers are controlled by the abundance of their food (plankton) vs. those who argue that baitfish numbers are controlled by larger fish that prey on baitfish.

In Lake Huron and Lake Michigan, this õbottom-upö vs. õtopdownö debate is ongoing and complex. Baitfish, and alewife in particular, have declined in recent years. There is evidence that overabundance of Chinook salmon, which prey almost exclusively on alewife, are implicated but there have also been changes in plankton abundance and composition due to invasive species like quagga mussels. While this does not seem to account for a decline in alewife numbers directly, it has affected their condition and, as a result, salmon now must eat more to fill their bellies.

A recent paper published in the õJournal of Great Lakes Researchö adds another wrinkle to the debate. Authors from the **Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources** and **U.S. Geological Survey** present analysis that links the harsh winter of 2002-2003 to the steep decline in Lake Huron alewife numbers that immediately followed. From 2003 to 2012, winters were relatively mild but alewife failed to mount a comeback in Lake Huron. This is where the top-down and bottom-up factors may have come into play. Hard winters had knocked back alewife populations in the past, but they had always recovered. Not so this time, but the changes in Lake Huron were not all bad and the decline of alewife led to resurgence of native walleye, lake trout, and certain native baitfish.

What does this mean for Lake Michigan? It is no secret that last winter was a cold one, and Lake Michigan experienced recordsetting ice coverage of 93.29 percent in early March. Alewives are not native to the upper Great Lakes, and are not well-adapted for dealing with northern winters in a freshwater environment. Adult alewife sometimes die off in large numbers as waters begin to warm up after a hard winter, and young alewife can have difficulty surviving through the winter if they were not able to put on enough weight during their first summer.

For Lake Michigan, this means that last year's crop of alewife may not contribute much to the forage base in coming years. The Acoustic sampling conducted by U.S. Geological Survey in 2013 found that the 2013 alewife year-class was very poor in terms of both numbers and growth rate even before the harsh winter conditions. Declines in older alewife due to the harsh winter are also possible, but only time will tell how Lake Michigan baitfish....and the salmon and trout fishery that depends on them.....weathered the hardest winter in recent history.

Updated Plans to Protect the Great Lakes From Invasive Species Announced

WASHINGTON, D.C. 6 The Asian Carp Regional Coordinating Committee (ACRCC) late last month, announced the release of an updated Monitoring and Response Plan MRP) intended to protect the Great Lakes from Asian carp, and to prevent the invasive fish species from developing self-sustaining populations in the Great Lakes. For the first time the MRP is being released concurrently with a summary of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Serviceøs Great Lakes eDNA Monitoring Program.

The MRP outlines actions for the 2014 field season focused on monitoring and removal of Asian carp downstream of the Electric Barrier System in the Chicago Area Waterway System (CAWS) and the upper Illinois Waterway, and on-going evaluations of the effectiveness of barriers and gears used in keeping Asian carp from establishing in the CAWS and Lake Michigan.

õThe 2014 Monitoring and Response Plan, continues to build off past efforts to protect the Great Lakes by using past data and results to focus attention on actions that achieve the greatest results,ö said Kevin Irons, Co-Chair of the ACRCC Monitoring Workgroup.

Separate from the MRP, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Serviceøs Great Lakes eDNA Monitoring Program examines waters of the CAWS and also across the Great Lakes basin, for early warning signs of Asian carp.

õThe Great Lakes eDNA Monitoring Program highlights our partnership with Great Lakes states,ö said USFWS Midwest Deputy Director, Charlie Wooley. õWeøre excited to share with the public how we are working side-by-side with our state counterparts to collect information that will shape our understanding and response of the potential threat of Asian carp in waters throughout the Midwest.ö

In addition to several reoccurring actions from last year, new actions to monitor populations of Asian carp in the upper Illinois Waterway and the Chicago Area Waterway System in 2014 include:

É Increased sampling for Asian carp downstream of the Electric Barriers to better focus on the leading edge of the Asian carp population in the CAWS.

É Contract commercial fishing crews will expend more effort in the target areas of the Marseilles and Dresden Island pools of the upper Illinois Waterway.

ÉA heightened Asian carp telemetry monitoring program around the Electric Dispersal Barriers.

ÉMonitoring for adult and juvenile bighead carp and silver carp in the upper Des Plaines River focused in four new target areas, and the river upstream of the former Hofmann Dam will be examined for potential Asian carp habitat.

ÉTesting the effects of water gun seismic pressure waves on inwater structures will be conducted before this technology is employed in critical navigational waters.

2014 DAS Ludington Tournaments

The next two tournaments coming up on our schedule will be back to back at Ludington. The first one is our annual Family Day (formerly known as Ladies Day) Tournament and will be held on August 2nd. The format has been changed this year to include all children 16 and under. The guys can set lines and net the fish but only the ladies & children can fight the fish. A main dish will be provided as well as each crew bringing a dish to pass during the weigh-in ceremonies. This port has been a favorite the past few years because of the opportunity to get into some nice kings. Of course, Coho and Steelhead are also abundant in the area but kings are whatd put you in with the top finishers. The following weekend wed go back to our regular tournament format. There will be food and beverages at the weigh-in.

This port, probably more than any other, warrants you checking out the previous week weather and surface temps. Water temps will dictate where the fish will be located. A north blow for several days prior will tend to push cold water around Sable Point to the north and make the better fishing either toward the south or way past the point to the north. Under normal conditions, most boats will be working the drop off that runs from about 8 miles straight out northeast towards Sable Point. The closer you get to Sable Point the more boats youd find so itd be difficult to run lead core or copper. Sometimes the fish will be in close to shore off the Bathhouse or even right in front of the pier heads. The Project just south of the Pier Heads has also traditionally been an area that holds fish.

There are many trap nets in this area so watch for the markers and stay clear. The best way to avoid them completely is to get their positions off of the Ludington Charter Boat Association website and load these positions into your GPS unit. Even with these precautions, keep a sharp lookout and keep some wire cutters handy.

The Skipperos meetings will be at 5:00 a.m. both Saturdays at the Municipal Marina. The tournament starts will be at

6:00 a.m. You can run out to your spot after the Captaints meeting but dont begin setting lines until 6:00 a.m. when the tournament start is announced on channel 72. Fish calls will be at 9:00 a.m. and noon for both weekends. For the Ladies Day Tournament well pull lines at 1:00 p.m., and you must be in the weigh-in line at 2:30. For the regular tournament the following week pull lines at 2:00 and be at the weigh-in by 3:30 p.m. The weigh-in for both weeks will be announced at the respective Captains meetings.
