Ice Fishing Outing Feb. 9, 2013

With a little help from OLD MAN WINTER, we hope to have safe ice by Feb. 9 on Mitchell's Bay, Lake St. Clair. Last year we weren't blessed with ice here, so a dozen of us went to Lake Simcoe and had a blast . Who knows we may have to resort to that again, if we don't get a good freeze before this event.

The fishing can be outstanding on Mitchell's Bay, with many techniques that work well to put perch on ice. My favorite has been the use of Slab Grabber or Guster spoons figged close to boffom or anywhere in the water column. A few good colors stand out with silver spoon and red or green bead being the best. Other times, copper spoons or white will produce on dark days. I also like to use a lure called the Sincoe bug with a few maggots on the hook to entice the less active perch into biting; I prefer this method as a dead stick rod. Over the years, I've learned to use a minnow technique from the Canadians called a Tip Down which consists of a rod balanced on a pivot base. When the rod tips down, just lift up and bring in a fat jumbo perch. This works great for people just learning how to ice fish or the diehard minnow guy! This fishery is very mobile and you need to be able to move to stay on active schools of

If plans go well we should meet at TOM'S DUCK CAMP on the end of Rivard road and be ready to leave the parking area at 7.00 am. Get there early because parking is limited. Bring a walkie-talkie to communicate with so that lunch and big fish contest can be announced about noon or to let others in on a hot bite. About 2:30 pm we will head back to Tom's and pack up for the ride home. The last time we visited Mitchell's Bay, 28 DAS Nomads on 22 fee machines enjoyed a great day with many jumbo's in our buckets. Hope to see you there and call me well in advance to let me know how many are going and to try to arrange for parking spots and food.

DNR to stock Atlantic Salmon in Lake Huron

After three-years of experimentation to determine whether Atlantic salmon can be successfully reared in state hatcheries, Michigan fisheries officials say it's time to shift gears. The 2013 fishing season will be a bellwether of what is possible.

"We'll have 60,000 to 80,000 Atlantic salmon yearlings available for planting in 2013," said Todd Grischke, Lake Huron coordinator for the Michigan DNR. "We are going into the stocking phase and will be evaluating the plants: where they go, where to best stock them and what to expect once we do. ❖

More Atlantic Salmon Planned in Michigan Waters

Michigan became world-famous when it made a daring effort to revitalize the Great Lakes sport fishery by stocking Pacific salmon in the 1960s. While Chinook and coho fishing still is very good overall, Michigan is now looking at residents of the other ocean to beef up the Great Lakes fishery: Atlantic salmon.

Highly prized around the world for their sporting characteristics, Atlantic salmon are currently thriving in the St. Mary's River, the connecting water that drains Lake Superior and flows into Lake Huron. Michigan DNR personnel hope to expand the Atlantic salmon fishery further into Lake Huron. Atlantics already have a presence in Lake Huron, often turning up for sport fishermen in a number of ports. At times, the Atlantic salmon catch surpasses the Pacific salmon catch at some locations, such as De Tour.

"We're not replacing Pacific salmon with Atlantics," explained Todd Grischke, the DNR's Lake Huron Basin coordinator. "We're trying to bolster the existing fishery and create an additional riverreturn fishery in other locations. "And we're adapting to the changes in the ecosystem. Since the invasion of quagga mussels, the lake no longer produces the alewives that are necessary to support a large Chinook population. "Atlantic salmon return to creel at a higher rate than any of our other stocked salmonids," Grischke continued. "We're hoping to play off that success. The St. Mary's fishery works. We want to make it even better, and we want to bolster the off-shore fishery, too."

Although the DNR has been working with Atlantic salmon for decades, their presence in the St. Mary's River falls to Lake Superior State University's Aquatic Research Laboratory. The lab churns out the 25,000 Atlantic salmon annually that have created the fishery.

Originally begun as a way to give students hands-on training, the lab started with a grant from the Michigan Fish Producers Association to research whitefish. The lab began working with Atlantics in the 1980s when it received a shipment of eggs from Gull Lake, where the DNR was stocking Atlantics, as explained by Roger Greil, who runs the lab.

Despite several false starts — Atlantics are delicate fish, vulnerable to disease and environmental constraints — Lake Superior State University's lab used the Michigan fish, and additional eggs obtained from Maine, to establish the Atlantics. The lab saw the first returns of the program in 1990 and soon began taking eggs from the returning salmon. By 2004, the lab began using only St. Mary's River Atlantics for broodstock (mature male and female fish that are kept separate for breeding purposes). Since then, the lab has been self-sustaining.

On site at the power house owned by a local power cooperative in Sault Ste. Marie, the lab not only produces the 25,000 Atlantics needed at the St. Mary's River, but has also been sending surplus fish to the DNR for stocking in Torch Lake. Now the DNR is experimentally raising Atlantics at the Platte River State Fish Hatchery with an eye toward stocking Lake Huron.

"This year, for the first time, the fish are healthy, growing well and disease-free," Grischke said. "We are attempting to produce 80,000

yearlings, which we'll be stocking into Lake Huron. We're still in the process of learning how to best rear this species at the hatchery, and still deciding how those fish will be allocated."

Adult Atlantics usually begin showing up in the St. Mary's River in June and are present in good numbers by the time the Aquatic Research Lab begins egg-take in the fall. "We try setting our gill nets the last three days of October and we'll hold the fish in our raceways," explained Greil. "Normally our egg-take starts around November 4 and is wrapped up by November 14. We do two or three egg-takes a week, usually 25 to 30 females each time. Our goal is to do 100 pairs a year. "We don't have a lot of problems collecting the fish we need for egg-take. We capture what we can handle."

Once captured, the fish are stripped of their reproductive products by hand and are fertilized on a one-to-one basis. The fertilized eggs are placed in egg trays. By mid-December, Greil said staff starts seeing "eye-up" — a growth stage at which the eggs are determined to be viable — and hatching generally follows by the first of January. By mid-February, they're moved into indoor raceways, and in June are transferred to larger rearing containers. The yearlings have to be moved out in June in order to make room in the larger raceways for the younger fish; otherwise, it gets awfully crowded.

The raceways that hold the fish can be drained directly into the river. "Just being reared in the same water is what gives us a fairly high return rate," Greil said. "We don't see a lot of wandering, if any. They've been reported in the river up in Georgian Bay in the spring of the year, but I believe they are in there chasing smelt."

"The only thing that's transported is our surplus fish," he added. That reduction in transportation is a big plus to the operation.

Greil is pleased with the Atlantic salmon-rearing program and optimistic about its future expansion. That's good news for the resident and visiting sport fishermen eager to add Atlantics to their catch in coming seasons. "It seems to be a good fishery," he said. The 2012 DAS Boat Trolling season started off with a bang but unlike the hot weather cooled off slightly as the summer progressed. The 8 tournament schedule took us to ports on Lakes Erie, Ontario & Michigan but again as a result of the status of the fishery no events took place on Lake Huron.

First up was St. Joe. What a great way to start the season as only one word was needed to describe the fishingFANTASTIC! Even though fog, left over from Friday evening, threatened the start, the 11 DAS boats got off without a hitch at 6:00am. But even the sometimes early morning iffy weather could not interfere with the great fishing as more than half the fleet returned to port with limit catches before the noon fish call. At the 3:00pm weigh-in, all 11 boats had the 8 fish maximum to weigh with a total of 141 fish caught. Skipper Paul Gjeldum and his "Blue Horizon" crew captured 1st place with 86.25 lbs. and 125.25 points. Big fish, a 14.50 lb. King, was weighed in by "Bobby's Toy II". Port Captain Blaise Pewinski and the "Sea Hag" crew prepared a tremendous feast of deep fried salmon chunks, pulled pork, tuna noodle salad, cole slaw, rolls as well as plenty of cold drinks. All in all, a great start to the 2012 season.

12 boats showed up for the 2nd tournament of the season at the beautiful port of Grand Haven and the fishing did not disappoint either. In addition, we experienced what had to be some sort of record at this port 3 days of good weather in a row! Being the only 2-day event on the schedule, it's that much more difficult to pull out a win here but Skipper Bob Jones and his "Bobby's Toy II" crew did just that. They had a good catch of 8 fish weighing 86.35 lbs. and 126.35 pts. on day 1 leading the 2nd place boat, Vickie's Seacret by 33 lbs. Despite a nice 8 fish catch weighing 73.2 lbs. on Sunday by the "Nite Moves" crew, they held on for the win with a 2 day total of 201 pts. This beat out "Nite Moves" Skipper Carl Ventimiglia's come back total of 162.05 pts. Jody Robinson, skipper of the "Miss Dipsey",

weighed in a huge Lake Trout of 16.45 lbs. for Big Fish of both days. Port captain Bob Feisel (mostly his wife, Vickie's effort) provided a great luncheon of fried chicken, potato salad, cole slaw, delicious rolls, cookies as well as cold pop and water. The good fishing, great weather and fine food made for the 2nd great tournament in a row.

Could the sleepy little port of Olcott, NY on Lake Ontario make for three in a row? I'm pretty sure that all the skippers and crews that showed up were pleasantly surprised by the fishing that they found there. Especially considering that the date of June 23 falls into the "dog days of summer" department at most ports around the Great Lakes. Boats pre-fishing on Friday found pretty good success. "Bobby's Toy II" set lines at the "crack" of 7:20am and was heading back into port for a late breakfast at 10:00am with a 4 man limit (20 fish) of kings & steelhead! "Sea Hag" came into town in the early afternoon and found the same kind of luck in the middle of the day. Needless to say, hopes were high for Saturday morning.

Amidst calm seas and fair skies, the fishing was pretty steady on Saturday morning. 5 of the 7 boats entered weighed in 8 fish at the 3:00 weigh-in. A total of 49 fish....24 kings, 24 steelhead & 1 lake trout were weighed-in. Skipper Bob Feisel and his "Vickie's Seacret" crew edged out the "Bobby's Toy II" boat with 124.15 pts. to 123.20 pts. Talk about close! This port was chosen for the 2nd season in a row for its reputation for Big fish and on that it did not let us down. Winner Bob Feisel weighed in 2 nice kings a 25.00 lb. brute as well as a 22.30 lb fish. "Sea Hag" Skipper brought a 25.50 lb hog to the scales but Tim Robinson fishing on "Bobby's Toy" caught a 29.45 lb. monster king which was good for Big Fish at Olcott as well as Big Fish of the Year.

During the weigh-in, we enjoyed the great subs and chicken wings from Wilson's Pizza & Sub Shoppe in nearby Newfane. They also provided 3 different kinds of homemade cookies for a desert treat.

Tournament Review from Pg. 6

Along with the cold sodas (that's what they call pop in New Yawk) & water, the crews enjoyed another great luncheon. I'd say this definitely qualified as 3 good tournaments in a row.

The season's 4th tournament was in a port new to the DAS; the little fishing town of Erieau, ONT on Lake Erie. This port was chosen for the great steelhead fishing that begins in early July plus there was the bonus walleye fishing that exists here also. Also, the Metro-West Steelheaders had already scheduled this date for their tournament and it would be the perfect opportunity for a little friendly inter-club competition.

Fishing was pretty good early on tournament morning but most of the catch was walleye and the 8 crews were searching for the steelhead that would count for the tournament. As the day went on more boats began to catch some of those steelhead especially the "Blue Horizon" boat skippered by Paul Gjeldum. They were the only boat to weighin 8 steelhead and easily out-weighed "Bad Dog" with 46.45 lbs to 23.90 lbs. to take 1st place. Skipper Carl Ventimiglia took Big Fish honors with a 9.80 lb. steelhead. And even though they weren't counted in the actual tournament, there was a 2nd Big Fish pool for the largest walleye which was weighed-in by "Vickie's Seacret". Skipper Bob Feisel took that pool with a 9.45 lb. chunky walleye.

In the head-to-head competition between clubs, the top three boats compared their best 5 fish weights and the DAS came out on top 73 lbs. to Metro-West's 45lbs. Port captain Carl Ventimiglia and his "Nite Moves" crew grilled up hot dogs and hamburgers with all the fixings prior to the weigh-in. Even though they would of liked to catch more steelhead, I'm pretty certain all the crews enjoyed the walleye fishing, the meal, the hot weather and the friendly competition and are looking forward to returning to Erieau.

On Saturday, August 4 it was the Ladies' turn to show there stuff at the annual Ladies Day tournament in Ludington. Reports leading up to this day were pretty good and the pre-fishing on Friday provided plenty of action in preparation for the real thing. Fishing was a little tough on Saturday morning but most boats managed to find some fish. At the 2:30 weigh-in, the 8 boats brought 37 fish to the scales. A little disappointing considering this was Ludington but the Ladies had a ball catching the fish they did.

The Ladies on "Almost Paradise" didn't have any problem catching fish. They weighed-in 8 fish for a total of 97.65 lbs. and 137.65 pts. to take 1st place, outweighing the 2nd place catch of "Miss Dipsey" by 30.45 lbs! "Almost Paradise" also took Big Fish with a 19.40 lb. King. Port Captain Joe Von Grabe arranged for chicken, cole slaw and barbecue beans from KFC, along with other dishes brought by the crews. Everyone enjoyed the meal and had a great time at the weigh-in festivities.

During the following week, some of the club's Skippers and families were vacationing prior to the Ludington II tournament and were treated to some great fishing. Limit catches and good weather prevailed all week. However, Friday the winds picked up and the lake was quite bumpy. Gale warnings forced tournament co-directors Bob Feisel and Bob Ksionzek to make the decision to postpone the tournament to an abbreviated 6:00 am to 11:00 am for Sunday morning. This would prove to be a good decision as wave heights were less than 2' on Sunday and the weather was beautiful. Port captain Tom Gorguze and his wife Diane provided a great luncheon on Saturday afternoon despite the lake conditions. Lasagna, chicken wings, salad, rolls and desert treats were enjoyed by everyone. Tom and Diane even had some breakfast available for the 5:00 am Skipper's meeting on Sat. morning

Eight boats were still around on Sunday to participate but the big question was where would the fish be after the lake flipped and surface temperatures dropped twenty degrees. Four of those boats managed to find the fish and did quite well while the remainder of the fleet struggled to find and/or catch fish. Skipper Bob Paradise and the "Almost Paradise" crew once again took 1st place with a nice 8 fish catch worth 160.15 pts. (120.15 lbs.) and beat out the "Bad Dog" crew who had 143.90 pts. (103.0 lbs.). The 17.60 lb. King weighed in by "Almost Paradise" was also good for Big Fish.

On August 25, the Steelheaders headed north-west to Manistee for the 7th tournament of the season. Saturday morning the forecast was for 1 to 3 foot waves, which are pretty good conditions for salmon fishing. There were very few reports of fish from the eight boats. However "Almost Paradise" & "Bad Dog" did find the fish and by the noon fish call, "Almost Paradise" had 14, "Bad Dog" had 7 and "Sea Hag" had 4. For the third tournament in a row "Almost Paradise" took 1st place with another nice 8 fish catch good for 154.50 pts. and pretty much 'smoked' the other boats, beating 2nd place "Bad Dog" with 95.70 pts. And again, Mr. Paradise and his crew weighed in an 18.10 lb. King that was also Big Fish.

For lunch on Saturday, Debbie Paradise and Michelle Yaquinto graciously cooked Italian sausage with sautéed onion and green peppers, freshly picked juicy, garden-ripe tomatoes, baked beans, coleslaw, and little mini-cupcakes were on the menu.

Our Season Finale took place on Sept. 9th in the beautiful port of Frankfort. The DAS had not held a tournament here since 2007. Unfortunately, most of the week there had been a steady wind out of the south, which kept the warm water in the area. Despite this the boats pre-fishing on Friday did manage some pretty good catches.

Saturday morning we held the Captain's meeting at 5:30 and 6 boats reported. Although, overnight the wind had switched to the north and was blowing hard. The captains made the decision to wait until twilight to head out and see if the water was fishable. "Sloppy Joe", "Miss Dipsey" and "Bad Dog" were the first boats to head out, Once hitting the pier heads "Sloppy Joe" and "Miss Dipsey" turned back to the docks and "Miss Dipsey" called over the radio and canceled the tournament for the day. Port captain Jody Robinson held the luncheon at 1:00 pm on Saturday treating everyone to Subway Subs, Chicken Salad, Potato Salad and Cookies for dessert.

By Sunday Morning, the lake was fishable and all boats reported being out the water fishing. Most boats struggled to catch fish except "Bad Dog" did get into the fish right near the pier heads. We pulled lines at noon and had to be at weigh in by 1pm. Tom Gorguze and the "Bad Dog" crew managed to bring 7 fish to the weigh in and take 1st place with 118.95 points. "Hardtop & Tails" not far behind with 5 nice kings wrapping up 2nd place with a score of 82.35 and also winning the \$30 big fish pool with his 14.50 king.

On behalf of Bob Feisel and myself, I would like thank all those captains and crews who participated this past tournament season. We would also like to thank all the Port captains who provided the great luncheons at the weigh-ins. Without this participation, we could not have experienced the successful season that we did. By the time this is published, we will have had the boat trolling committee meeting and the 2013 schedule will have been set (Find on Pg. 4). Here's hoping we can have even more success and better fishing for the upcoming tournament season.

On Monday our ammonia shot way up and even after a 1/2 tank water change it did not come back down so we purchased and added some Ammo shock which is meant to stabilize the ammonia. This has seemed to work as it has been 0 since the treatment. The kids are all anxious to start the feeding process and we anticipate to start feeding them on or around Dec 26th. I have made arrangements with the

Janitors and the teachers that I will be at the school everyday with exception on Christmas Day to check on the fish. Fishing the Big Manistee River



The Big Manistee usually heats up mid-March to mid-April depending on the weather. Some years it's 10 to 15 degrees in March but last year it was 80 degrees, so you never know. I personally like to start fishing the upper part of the river whenever the snow melts. The Big Manistee draws a lot of steelhead each year, but also draws a lot of fishermen.

The fishing from Tippy Dam to 'Suicide Bend' is about ¾ of a mile. If you have never fished here, you are in for a surprise. The fish and fishermen stack up here by the dam, and some days you might be fishing the runs with anywhere from 5 to 25 people. The fishing is second to none when the timing is right. I have had days with 20 to 30 bites, but average around 10 fish.

When fishing by the mass of people, the trick is to pay close attention to what the others are using for bait, and their technique, because some days the fish only want one thing.


Fishing the river requires different techniques. I personally prefer bait fishing (spawn, wigglers, wax worms). Sometimes floating bobbers with 8lb. test Trilene and a 8lb. fluorocarbon leader.

Presentation is the key to catching these steelhead. If you like to float fish, the presentation should be barrel swivel, 8lb. fluorocarbon, size 8 or 10 short shank hook, and your choice of bait (wigglers, wax worms, spawn). Bobbers should be 5 to 7 ft. from hook depending on depth of water. When fishing with live bait I like to put 2 or 3 wax worms or wigglers on the hook, especially if the water is muddy. The trick is to cast at around 2 o'clock and watch your bobber, if it occasionally catches bottom your depth is good, if not add more line.

When fishing spawn bags, the size should be about the size of a dime, with fresh spawn and the mesh color of your choice. The real trick is to adapt to the conditions of the river, persistence is the key, and you must keep at it to be successful.

I have fished this part of the river for most of my life and used every kind of technique, but those listed above seem to produce the best for me.
