DAS Guys Have Good Showing at Ludington and Manistee River/Pier Tournaments

There were back-to-back Steelhead tournaments – one on October 27, 2012, in Ludington from Michael's Bar & Grill and the other in Manistee, on November 3, 2012, from the Lakeshore Motel.

The tournament from Michael's was fished by the Almost Paradise Fishing Team consisting of Bob Paradise, Tom Thieda (TNT), Al Wiechert, and Pat Hoey, Gaspare Aragona. Most got on the pier at about 4:30 pm. The tournament officially began at midnight. TNT arrived on the pier at 8:00pm and Al wasn't far behind arriving around 11. With the exception of TNT and Al, fish were being caught in big numbers. About 4:00 am TNT's luck turned around.

We ended up the session around 3:30 pm (15:30) so that we could be at the weigh in before 4:30 pm (16:30) in Ludington. All in all we ended up taking first, second, and third place at Michaels'. TNT ended the tournament in first place securing his place in tournament history with the Big Tom Memorial Cup; TNT was also awarded \$120 cash and an Okuma reel. Second place went to Bob Paradise who was awarded \$120 cash and Pat Hoey, Mark Beven's brother-in-law, rounded out the top three taking home a \$100 cash award. The weather wasn't too bad and everybody had a great time.

The following weekend in Manistee the Lakeshore tournament was a different story. The Almost Paradise Fishing Team consisted of Bob Paradise, Gaspare Aragona, Al Weichert, Adam Plank, Tom Thieda (TNT), and Don Mikros. Fishing was much slower. Everyone got out on the pier about 4:30 am. Except TNT and Don Mikros waited until about 11. They didn't end up with a prime spot – but that's to be expected. The fish did not start to bite until morning. Bob Paradise went 5 for 7 fish and his biggest came around 2:30 pm. Also on the pier were Doug Karakas and Dave Roehr – they arrived early to secure a good spot. However, even securing a prime spot didn't help them land a fish. Gaspare had two or three nice rips but his eyes weren't on the rod tips and he lost his opportunity to hook a fish. By 6 or 7 am there were 10 – 15 people on the pier. Besides Bob, only one other person got one fish. At the weigh in, of the 79 people that fished – 60% came up empty. It was a rough day with a rising barometer. Fishing the surf was Bill Stanley, Mark Stosiak, and Tom Gorguze. They had the same luck – zero fish! During the dinner and prizes, Bob Paradise ended up in second place by the narrowest of margins – .04 pounds! Unbelievable – but that's fishing. The ticket you received as an entry fee was used to raffle off the monies. At our table four out of ten people were winners collecting cash prizes of \$50, \$40, and \$20. So next year when they have the tournaments maybe a few more Steelheaders will show up for the great times and fishing.

Amazing Revelation: Some Pacific salmon DO feed During Spawning Run

Anglers in Michigan rivers have long known that Chinook and coho salmon will bite on eggs and egg imitations. Salmon were believed to stop feeding in rivers, but recent research suggests this isn't always the case.

Conventional wisdom is a funny thing – especially when it comes to Chinook and coho salmon in rivers. When these Pacific salmon species were initially stocked in Great Lakes waters, most people assumed that they would not bite once they entered rivers near the end of their life cycle. Snagging was legal for decades, in part, because of this erroneous assumption. If a stocked fish won't bite, then why let it go to waste?

There is no doubt that salmon can be tough to catch once they enter rivers, but they will hit stick baits, spinners, and a variety of other lures in addition to skein and spawn bags, if conditions are right. Anglers who take advantage of this fact have long assumed that salmon hit strictly out of aggression or some feeding reflex left over from time spent in the big lake or ocean. While this might be true in the case of lures, new research suggests that (at least in some Alaskan rivers) salmon can, and do, continue to feed in rivers.



Hook-jawed kings like this one are preparing to spawn and die. The difference between the stomach of a spawning-phase salmon and one fresh from the big lake is obvious. Lake-run fish are better able to digest large meals of fish, but new research suggests some salmon can and do digest small meals of eggs after entering the river.

The preferred – in fact, the only – food item found in salmon stomachs was salmon eggs. This much should come as no surprise as salmon are often caught as they mouth skein or spawn bags on an angler's hook. Salmon obviously have a taste for their own eggs (or the eggs of other salmon, at least), but in some cases, they actually digest and derive energetic benefits from egg predation.

One coho jack was found to have 159 eggs in its stomach, and 13 percent of all salmon examined had consumed at least one egg. This type of feeding may prolong the life of spawning salmon slightly and give them a bit of extra energy for their difficult journey upstream and subsequent battles for prime breeding grounds and mates.

Some Alaskan rivers had higher feeding rates (up to 40 percent of female cohos ate eggs in one river) while others had lower feeding rates. Might Great Lakes salmon eat during their spawning run, or does the conventional belief that stomachs harden and shrink to the point of digestive atrophy hold true? While there is no published research available for Great Lakes runs, curious anglers might want to start checking stomachs when cleaning river-run salmon.

Salmon In The Classroom, Progress Report: November 9, 2012

On October 18 we purchased the tank and accessories through craigslist.com. Parts were reviewed for relevance to the fresh water application and the DNR requirements. The Yukon was repacked and Katy Engle (3rd grade teacher) drove it to school where it was unloaded and setup in a commons area for all the students to view. There were constant inquiries from the students, "What is in there?" and then later "When are the fish coming?"

Saturday, October 27, Katy visited Key Aquarium on 23 Mile and Van Dyke. The family run store had graduated three children from Oakland Christian Schools and was happy to give small discounts and lots of advice. The largest purchase was the chiller and submersible water pump for cooling the tank to the recommended temperatures during the Salmon growth cycle. Other purchases were made to complete the now functioning tank; ie. an additional (smaller) water filter, hose clamps, netting to cover the suction (feed) lines to the filters and pump, etc. Note that the tank needed to be running for 7 to 10 days before the introduction of the eggs. We also did chemical tests on Nov. 2 on the tank water, everything was '0'.

On November 6, Tuesday, I picked up Katy from school after doing some repair work on the tank. We made it to Kalamazoo in 2-1/2 hours and were in front of her parents' house ten minutes later. I stayed at the Red Roof Inn about 15 minutes away. We easily made the 9:00 am start time at Wolf Lake Hatchery and spent the rest of the day in a very enjoyable seminar by the DNR and the Wolf Lake personal. They supplied lunch. At 3:20 pm we started the car for the trip home with the eggs in a cooler. At 6:35 pm we walked into the school with the janitor unlocking the door. We spent another hour conditioning the eggs to our tank water and the water temperature (most important). A process of exchanging 25% of the water in the plastic Ziploc egg sack with the tank water for 15 minutes. So, an hour later, we slowly poured the eggs into the tank.

The last report from Katy, Thursday after school, was the eggs looked fine, she could see no dead eggs, and everything was working. The water chiller is maintaining 50.4 degrees (47 degrees is recommended) so I'm searching for Styrofoam to insulate the three sides of the tank.

So far, I've reimbursed Katy for anything she paid for. We will have additional purchases.



Angler catches 58-pound Great Lakes muskellunge in Antrim County, breaks state record

The Department of Natural Resources confirmed the catch of a new state-record Great Lakes muskellunge on Saturday, Oct. 13, 2012.



The fish was caught by Joseph Seeberger of Portage, Mich., that same day on Lake Bellaire in Antrim County at 10:30 a.m. The fish weighed 58 pounds, measured 59 inches long and had a girth of 29 inches. Seeberger was actually bass fishing with a minnow at the time when he caught the fish. It took nearly two hours to land and required the help of two friends.

The record was verified by Patrick Hanchin, a DNR fisheries biologist at the Charlevoix Fisheries Research Station and Conservation Officer Steve Speigl.

The previous state-record Great Lakes muskellunge was caught by Kyle Anderson of Rapid City, Mich., on Torch Lake in Antrim County on Sept. 27, 2009. That fish weighed 50.5 pounds and measured 56.13 inches. "This fish shows that Michigan waters are capable of producing huge fish," said Fisheries Division Chief Jim Dexter. "Great waters coupled with appropriate management strategies can result in even more record fish."

State records are recognized by weight only. To qualify for a state record, fish must exceed the current listed state-record weight and identification must be verified by a DNR fisheries biologist.
