GLSFC Retrospective 2009

The Detroit Area Steelheaders is a member of the Great Lakes Sport Fishing Council. The role of the Great Lakes Sport Fishing Council is stated as: To inform and educate anglers, boaters and the general public about natural resource conservation and enhancement. Promote, protect and conserve our aquatic resources; manage against over-harvesting at the commercial and recreational level: clean air and clean water; prevent the spread of unintentional introductions of nonindigenous aquatic nuisance species (exotics); promote safe boating practices; and represent the sport fishing community before divisions of government. The majority of the credit for the effort of the Council goes to its President; Dan Thomas. Dan serves as the editor of the Great Lakes Basin Report and web master of the web site at www.greatlakes.org. There is no other place to get the quality and in depth coverage provided by the Council. To understand the value of the information provided, you only have to look back at 2009 issues of the Great Lakes Basin Report.

In February, the GLBR reported "Environmental Protection Agency predicting more invasive species" The EPA had released a final report entitled, "Predicting Future Introductions of Nonindigenous Species to the Great Lakes." This report predicted the spread of aquatic nonindigenous species into the Great Lakes to help resource managers focus monitoring activities on particular species at the most vulnerable U.S. Great Lakes ports. The report also demonstrated the use of a habitat suitability model and ballast water discharge data to predict invasion potential.

In March the headline was: "NOAA posts Draft Mgmt Plan for Thunder Bay National Marine Sanctuary". NOAA was soliciting public comment on the draft management plan and the draft environmental assessment plan for Thunder Bay National Marine Sanctuary. Without The GLSFC most people would not have been aware of this request.

On a good note, it was reported that \$740 million goes to states for fish and wildlife projects. Department of the Interior Secretary Ken Salazar announced that more than \$740.9 million will be distributed to the fish and wildlife agencies of the 50 states, commonwealths, the District of Columbia, and territories to fund fish and wildlife conservation, boater access to public waters, and hunter and aquatic education. In March Dan attended the Lake Committee meetings hosted by the Great Lakes Fishery Commission and held in Ypsilanti, MI. From these meetings came a series of fabulous highlight reports summarizing the voluminous data presented at these meetings.

The April report featured the "Status of Lake Michigan Salmon":

•Michigan DNR Weir returns dropped to 16,907 fish; the second lowest return in the time series

•Weight of age-3 Chinooks increased at Strawberry Creek weir and from creel samples from 2007 levels

•Recruitment of naturally-produced Chinook salmon smolts has increased to 53%

•Alewife biomass from the bottom trawl was the lowest value (8.1 kt) in the time series (1985-2008

•In contrast, alewife biomass from acoustic surveys was the highest value (58.8 kt) in the time series (2001 - 2008;

•Results indicate that the abundance of young alewives is very high.

•Bottom trawl survey indicates the biomass of large alewife has declined substantially

•However recruitment and survival of young alewife appeared to be above expectations

•Less than 0.5% of the weir-returning Chinook salmon showed any sign of disease in 2008

Unfortunately, the status of Lake Huron was upbeat for walleye but remained very dire for salmon."The collapse of alewives in 2004 precipitated pronounced change in harvest trends and fishing behavior for the Lake Huron recreational fishery. Since 2003, walleyes have replaced salmonids as the leading species harvested in Michigan waters, even at Main Basin ports, which had traditionally been the focus of the salmonids fishery."

Lake Ontario was positive for salmon:

• The 2008 charter catch rate of Chinook salmon was the 6th highest in the data series. The six highest Chinook salmon catch rates occurred during the six most recent years (2003-2008).

• Charter catch rate for rainbow trout was the highest on record (104.6% higher than 2003-2007 average), with improvements across the season and all regions of the lake. Total trout and salmon catch (127,799 fish) and harvest (79,159 fish) were dominated by Chinook salmon (43.6% and 44.9%, respectively) and rainbow trout (26.7% and 24.9%, respectively).

• Brown trout catch rates in the east were above average for most of the season (April-September), resulting in the highest estimated seasonal catch rate for that area in the 24 years surveyed.

In July, we were warned that the Clean Water Restoration Act spelled trouble for Anglers, Hunters, All Outdoorsmen. At first glance, the Clean Water Restoration Act (CWRA) (Bill SB787) appears to advance the interests of American hunters, fishermen and other outdoor enthusiasts, given the connection between wildlife and water quality. In reality, the CWRA would threaten these interests. Senate Bill 787 as written and continuing through the legislative process of Congress could prove to be a nightmare in the regulation process of building fishing piers, intensifying the regulatory microscope for angling activi-

ties while trout-wading a stream, boating due to incidental discharges, or charter fishing state waters.

In October, we learned that the Obama proposal for Oceans/Great Lakes ignores recreational fishing. This past June, President Obama created the Interagency Ocean Policy Task Force. The Task Force, led by the Chair of the Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ), was charged with developing a national policy and implementation strategy for conserving and managing the United States ocean territory and the Great Lakes. The policy will govern ocean and Great Lakes resource management and coordinate efforts among countless federal, state and local agencies. Without recreational angler input, decisions made under this national oceans policy could be used to unnecessarily close saltwater and

> freshwater recreational fishing areas. Also, policies beneficial to oceans might be detrimental to the Great Lakes.

> In November we were informed of the possibility that the Asian Carp may have breached the Electronic Barrier. Multiple Carp DNA samplings have been found in multiple locations North and East, near O'Brien Lock. During a press conference call held November 20, it was confirmed that multiple samples of carp DNA have been found substantially north and east of the existing carp barrier, and in another water body that has a direct connection to Lake Michigan. Subsequent updates revealed that rotenone was used in a section of the river to kill all fish.

As I said at the beginning of this article, other than the GLSFC, there is no other realistic way to get this quality information. Also, many of the concerns listed above have not been resolved. The DAS: A Brief History

The Detroit Area Steelheaders (DAS) was originally organized as a chapter of the Michigan Steelhead and Salmon Fishing Association (MSSFA). Tom Schneider, John Makela, Ed Raquel and Joe Sizemore, as a committee of four, founded the club in September, 1974. The first organizational meeting was held on October 16, 1974. Forty one people attended that first gathering at the Northwood Inn. It was decided that the first 'annual meeting' would be held on December 4, 1974, and that date would be the official beginning of the chapter.

DAS quickly became the largest of all MSSFA chapters. It was DAS' Super Spring Show that all other chapter shows were modeled after. The DAS started the first research trips on the Great Lakes, introduced river tournaments, and held salmon and steelhead river fishing clinics to teach the proper techniques in catching river run fish. This had never been done before.

In January, 1990, due to conflicts with MSSFA 96% of the members voted to withdraw DAS from MSSFA and be an independent organization. Our official name became the Detroit Area Steelheaders, Inc. a Michigan non-profit corporation.

Our official corporate purpose is: "To teach, inform, and guide the public to respect and appreciate the Great Lakes, rivers, and land around us. To promote and protect the fisheries resources therein."

It was decided that there would be plaques for the Top Five boats only at each tournament. There will still be awards for the Top Ten Skippers of the Year. There were some minor rule changes made at the meeting and also some changes to the Team Doubles format and 333 format. These will be explained in next month's Fishin' Tales.

Some Data from the 2009 "Bobby's Toy" Fishing Log

2009 was the first year that I got serious about keeping a fish log of our catches aboard "Bobby's Toy". I compiled these logs into Excel and discovered a wealth of information. Maybe it means something, maybe not. I think it will take a couple or three years worth the data to see what value it brings but I already have drawn some conclusions that might help me make more informed decisions next year. I am always told that it is all about the details. This is what separates the boys from the men.

Our fish stats for 2009 are based on log entries for 17 trips and are as follows:

We had 117 fish on and boated 92 of them for a total of 729 pounds of fish. These 92 fish were comprised of:

- \Rightarrow 62 Kings,
- \Rightarrow 12 Lakers,
- \Rightarrow 10 Coho,
- \Rightarrow 3 Steelhead,
- \Rightarrow 2 Browns
- \Rightarrow 3 Whitefish.

The top five most productive trolling speeds based on my Fish Hawk 840 were as follows:

- 2.4 mph, 15 fish
- 2.5 mph, 14 fish
- 2.3 mph, 10 fish
- 2.2 mph, 10 fish
- 2.6 mph, 9 fish

Presentations:

The hottest device was downrigger number one bringing in 20 fish for a total of 165 pounds of fish.

The best device for overall weight per fish was the full super copper rig netting a 12.7 pound per fish average. This fact is pretty significant when you consider that the average weight for the 92 fish caught was 7.9 pounds.

Spoons have been the bait of choice for Bobby's Toy for many years. My spoon program improved tremendously over the last couple of years since I went to dedicated spoon rods running 12 pound Ande line, SG47LC Diawa reels on seven foot Ugly Stick rods. This idea was taken from Dan Keating's book Keating on Kings. I believe, as does Dan, that it has more to do with the action of the spoon due to the lighter line than it does with fish being line shy.

Silver Streak spoons most of which were the magnum size were the number one bait taking 57 of our 92 fish. I also run Moonshine spoons which gave us the best weight per fish at 11 pounds per fish average. The Silver Streaks averaged 7.8 pounds per fish.

The top producing Silver Streak was the double orange crush in magnum size netting 22 fish closely followed by the mag NBK which took a total of 16 fish.

The big fish spoon was the Moonshine Flounder Pounder in mag size with an 11 pound weight average per fish.

Our largest fish caught this season was on a special blue streak Silver Streak. It was good for an 18 pound king taken in Ludington on a super copper rig set straight down the chute

Our best port this year was Grand Haven in mid May where we had a total of 34 fish on, losing 10 of them over a three day period. We fished 19 hours over the three days giving us a total of 214 pounds of fish for a 1.2 fish per hour average.

We put in approx 106 hours of fishing time over the course of the 17 logged trips giving us a 0.9 average of fish per hour on the water. Considering all the obstacles this year that is not a bad average.

We took 43 of our 92 fish during the tournaments for a total of 361.1 pounds and 576.1 points.

That's all the stats that I wish to share at the moment. 2009 was a tough year for catching as the weather was windy and the water rough for most trips. I believe the log has identified strong areas for us as well as shown me some areas in which we need to improve.


