## MY LUDINGTON TRIP

I would like to tell you all about my annual trip to Ludington this year. I am a member of the Detroit Area Steelheaders; we have scheduled back to back weekend tournaments for the last couple of years. We fish a powder puff tournament the first Saturday of August and our normal tournament format the second weekend of August. I schedule vacation time around these tournaments and stay and fish the entire week between the tournaments. Many of our regular tournament fishing people does the same thing. My wife usually stays the week as well but this year she decided to head home Monday morning after ladies day and leave me to fishing. I had some great outings with some great friends. I fished morning and evening whenever the chance arrived.

My first full day on my own was Tuesday morning; I had my boat docked at Harbor View and ready to go. The crew of Pride and Joy, a fellow DAS member fishing team went out with me that morning. The crew consists of a husband wife, Tim and Jody and their eldest son Brian. Jody had to leave that afternoon for work but Tim and Brian would be up the entire week to fish with me and our friends from the club. We were on my boat, Bobby's Toy, a 22.5 ft Crestliner Saber 225 well set up for Great Lakes salmon fishing. At 5:15 AM. We cleared the pier heads and headed for a fishing hole that a charter friend told me to try first thing in the morning. We were running in 50 FOW on plane until I started marking fish top to bottom. I brought the boat down off plane and ran at

quick troll speed while we set lines. By the time we set the 4 Walkers, 2 dipsey's and a couple of half cores we started running out of the fish. I turned the boat around and set up on a south troll, the auto pilot engaged waiting for our fish of the morning. About 2 minuets into the South troll one of the dipsey's starting singing that sweet song of a screaming drag. It was the "Even Rig" that told everyone would go first. It worked like that all week. The even rig was my name for the hootchie and fly combo my charter bud Dave Even told me about the previous day. Jody was the first one up and made short work of the 12 king. Next it was rigger 1 going with a favorite spoon, the BJ, in honor of my name; Bob Jones. Get your mind out of the gutter. Rigger 3 popped shortly after with a moonshine spoon, double on! Tim and Brian were up on deck battling the double. I proceeded to work the back of the boat for the next one and half hours netting fish and setting lines. We were all by ourselves in the skinny water and having a ball. I told my crew that I always tell my tournament crew that the captain's buys breakfast if we limit out early enough. Well this day we were sure to be calling the captain on his offer. By 8:00 AM we had 13 fish in the boat, 12 kings and a steelhead. We decided to pull lines and head in for breakfast. Now I need to explain something here; my friend Jody is lady luck and known for incredible luck on dipsey rods. They call her Miss Dipsey on the Pride and Joy boat. Miss Dipsey pulls the rod, gets it half way the boat and fish 14 hits it. Brian and I got the rest of the lines out of the water while Jody fought the fish and Tim netted. We were sitting in Old Hamlin Inn by 9:45 eating the breakfast that the captain bought. I would do it again in a heartbeat for the same results.

The next trip was the next night as it started blowing Tuesday night through a good part of Wednesday. We attempted to go out Wednesday morning but were blown off and fishless. Tim, Brian and I went out on my good friend Mark William's Boat; the Silver Addiction, a 268 Penn Yan fisherman Wednesday. Sweet rig, set up with all the toys. We went out that evening to the point. It was still rather rough out but the big Penn Yan just plowed through the 3 to 4's. Fishing was slow the first hour or so until the sun started to go down and we started hitting fish. We baited up with a selection of Moonshine and Silver Streaks on the Scotty riggers and flasher/fly combos on the dipsey's and lead. We found speed and the direction of the troll to be crucial. We were fishing with a pack of charters and other recreational fisherman like ourselves. For the most part we all behaved and managed to fish without incident. The fish were concentrated in a tight area so you had to be efficient and ready to go when the fish hit. The doubles starting coming quick, Brian and Tim were hot on the rods while Mark and I switched off with the driving and netting and managed an occasional fish if we beat Brian and Tim to the rods. We had a blast and scored our 4 man limit in less than 3 hours. All kings, the biggest weighed in on the Ludington Municipal scale at 19.9 pounds. Good host, good friends and great fishing it doesn't get much better than that, or does it?

Tim, Brian and I decided to sleep in the next morning as we were worn out.

Jason Adam, our club president called me and invited me fishing Thursday night. I asked Jason if he minded if a brought Tim and Brian along and he said of course! The three of us arrived at Jason's marina around 6:30 and were clearing the pier heads by seven. Jason has a beautiful 26 foot Stripper, a 99, before they messed it up with the integrated swim platform and too long transom. Jason has Outa Line highly customized with more electronic goodies than I could ever name. This is one of the quietness boats that I have ever been on. Jason headed straight out to about 190 FOW and set lines. We were completely by ourselves as most of the pack went north to the point. Tim and I told Jason about our trip on Silver Addiction the night before and how great we did. Jason said it sounded great, but he had not the much success so far that week. He was told to fish the area we were in buy a charted friend of his that said the area would not disappoint. As the evening starting drawing near, the sun set over the water was something to see, it was pure solitude, then all the sudden reels started screaming and it was a double on. Tim and I beat Brian to the rods and starting fighting the first of many doubles that night. The next couple of hours were a repeat of the night before, but then we scored a triple. Brian, Tim and I were all fighting fish at the same time. Jason was ecstatic. I gave Jason my

camera and he got a nice picture of the three of us fighting our fish.



We had to stop and take count of our fish so that we didn't go over our limit. Brian cleared the fish boxes and counted 11 fish twice, so we decided to stay and get our twelfth king. Wouldn't you know it, a double hit again. This time we made sure Jason had the honors of getting fish twelve and Brian was on fish thirteen. Brian's fish came in first and turned out to be a Coho so that left us room for king twelve. Jason's king took three runs and proved to be the biggest of the night. We were all thrilled with the result, especially Jason as he stated, "this has got to be one of the best trips I have ever made", I was thankful to be there and part of the moment. We had a great time and headed back to the Marina for the late night fish cleaning. My tournament team called and was at my campsite waiting for me to get back. By the time we took pictures and cleaned fish and back to Ponchos Pond Campground it was past 11. Here is the catch from Outa Line: I think Jason's expression says it all!



The next morning it was out with my team for pre-fishing. We were on the water by 5:30 AM, the fishing had slowed somewhat, but we had a great time and were able to get our strategy inline for Saturdays tournament. We brought 10 fish in from the morning bite. We spent the rest of the day getting Bobby's Toy ready for the big fishing day.

Saturday morning I went to the 5:00 AM captains meeting while my crew headed to Wesco for coffee and ice. We met at the boat by 5:20 and cleared the pier heads by 5:45 heading for the skinny water that I and Pride and Joy did so well in a couple of day's previous. The bite didn't start until 6:30 and never got to the fever pitch of the days previous. We worked the skinny water until the early bite ended and headed North West towards the point and deeper water. The move proved to be good one. We proceeded to boat over 24 fish between 5 fishermen. We had some steels and Coho to keep us within our twenty king limit. All the clubs boats were reporting fish caught at the 9 and 12 O'clock fish calls. Bobby's Toy was one of three boats calling banner catches. Many of our fish were hitting spoons, the remainder coming on J-Plugs and flasher/fly combos. The hottest spoon was the moonshine Flounder Pounder, hottest J was a number 4 green glow with black ladder back, hottest flasher/fly was the Even Rig, a tuxedo Fishcatcher with a light blue sparkle fly, it has a name but I can never remember it even though I bought every one that Captain Chucks had. Even though our catch was the largest overall, our eight largest fish were only good for a 7<sup>th</sup> place finish. I was rather disappointed with the finish but very pleased with the overall catch. It is always a pleasure fishing with my good friends and sharing these good times. No better way to spend a week in Ludington.

## Looking ahead to the 2008 boat trolling season.

Another (2007) boat trolling season is behind us and we'll soon be looking forward to the 2008 season. The participation was down again this year for a lot of reasons. The economy, fuel costs and decreasing club membership continue to take their toll. On the bright side, the fishing this year on Lake Michigan was as good if not better than last year and one of the best in recent years. The numbers of fish caught, especially Kings were as good as ever, and many more Lake Trout were part of the catch.

In early November, our top skippers from the previous year met to discuss and vote on boat trolling rule changes and agree on our upcoming tournament schedule. This year, we've reduced the number of tournaments to a total of eight, with the top five finishes counting for Skipper of the Year honors. Our 2008 schedule continues to reflect the downturn in the Lake Huron fishery with only one tournament being held there.

This season's tournament schedule kicks off May 3rd at St. Joseph/Benton Harbor. This has traditionally been a Coho fishery at this time of the year but the king salmon fishing has been fantastic in recent years. Limit catches are typical here, especially at this time of the season. Besides the water around the pier heads; the Cook Nuclear Power Plant, the junk cars, and the chalets to the south; and the clay banks to the north will often hold fish.

Our second stop will be at Grand Haven on May 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup>. This is our annual two-day tournament with points from both Saturday

and Sunday combined to determine the final positions. This port often provides fast action with many limit catches. Last year, the fishing was nothing short of fantastic

After our first two tournaments, we leave the southern part of Lake Michigan to fish the always dependable Port Austin on the weekend of June 7<sup>th</sup>, and 8<sup>th</sup>. This will be our only tournament on Lake Huron this year but this port has always come through for some very close finishes. Once again, this port will host our annual team doubles tournament on Sunday. The team doubles competition matches the first place boat from the previous day with the last place boat and so on for an always fun event.

Our annual "Special People" outing is tentatively scheduled for June 21st this year and will be held at Toledo Beach Marina on Lake Erie. Any skippers who have volunteered their boat and time for this event will tell you that the reward of seeing the smiles on the faces of the special people is something you won't soon forget.

For the balance of our schedule, we head back to Lake Michigan starting with the port of Manistee on July 12<sup>th</sup>. This marks the mid-point of our season. This port is a favorite with many of our captains as it often will produce some of the best catches and largest fish of the year. Three bears and the bank to the south and the green onion to Onekama to the north are some of the landmarks that you'll hear over the radio. Steelhead should also be in the mix here during this time of the year. This port now has trap nets so keep an eye out. Make sure you get the latest information on their location and load them into your GPS or chart plotter.

Next we head to Ludington for back to back tournament weekends. August 2<sup>nd</sup> is our ever popular annual Ladies Day tournament. We won't be doing a pig roast this year but a main dish will be provided by the club along with the pot luck goodies

brought by the crews. In this tournament, only the ladies are allowed to fight the fish while the men can set lines and perform netting duties. Ludington offers some of the most challenging conditions of any of the ports on our schedule with huge water temperature swings, under water currents and boat congestion to deal with. Again, make sure you get the latest information on the location of the nets in the area, and stay clear. Some of the hot spots include three bears, the point (stick), and the bath house to the north, and the project, and Pentwater to the south. August 9<sup>th</sup> we're right back here again with our Ludington II tournament.

For our eighth and next to last stop it's back to Manistee on the weekend of August 23rd. This time we should be honing in on staging kings.

The 2008 tournament schedule wraps up September 6th out of Arcadia. We've decide to give this port a try because our top skippers wanted to fish this area but there are concerns with availability of slips in Frankfort this time of the year. This is one of the most picturesque areas on our schedule with some fantastic scenery as seen from the water and from land. With the great structure here, you won't have to go more than a few miles from shore to catch fish.

It's not too soon to start make plans for this upcoming season. Start getting your crews lined up and make your marina and motel reservations now. Get all of your tackle maintenance chores out of the way over the winter so you'll be ready to go come spring. Don't miss out on the fun. Fishing our club events is a great way to learn new techniques, become familiar with other ports, and make new friends.
