

### **New Mi. Record Brown Trout**



The big fish my nephew -- Casey  
Richey of Frankfort, Michigan --  
caught yesterday has turned the  
fishing world on its ear. All it took  
was one fish.

An early peek at the fish  
yesterday told Todd Kalish, a  
DNR fisheries biologist from  
Traverse City, one thing: he  
better get a second and third  
opinion. The question was: was  
the fish a brown trout or an  
Atlantic salmon?

Kalish told us yesterday he was  
80 percent positive, but he asked  
Casey for another day to get a  
second and third opinion. It's  
better to be safe than to make a  
major mistake.

Today, district DNR fisheries  
biologists Tom Rozich and Mark  
Tonello of the Cadillac office,  
drove to Traverse City to eye-  
ball the fish. They wanted to be  
absolutely certain about the  
identity of his catch.

"One look at the fish told Mark  
and I all we needed to know,"  
Rozich said. "But we went  
through the entire drill of further  
identity checks, and they backed

up what all three of us, Casey and his Uncle Dave knew."

It was a brown trout. Not just any brown trout but a new state record that literally shattered the earlier record by over two pounds. In the record books it will now stand as the third largest brown trout on record.

The fish also will set a new line-class record for brown trout being caught on 10-pound line in the records kept by the National Fresh Water Fishing Hall of Fame in Hayward, Wisconsin.

The Hall keeps track of all freshwater species of fish, and besides listing the overall largest fish of that species, it keeps track of fish caught in various categories and with various line-class records.

Casey's 36-pound, 13-ounce brown trout trails only two catch-and-keep fish. The heaviest brown ever caught and registered weighed 40.4 pounds, and was caught by Howard Collins from the Little Red River in Arkansas in 1992.

Michael Manley caught a 38.9 pound brown from the Norfolk River, also in Arkansas, in 1988. Casey's huge Lake Michigan brown trout was caught on 10-pound line, and the previous record-holder in the 10-pound line category, weighed 35.1 pounds.

That fish was caught by Lloyd Arndt in 1996 from

Wisconsin's Keweenaw River.

Michigan's new state-record brown couldn't have been caught by a more deserving person. Nepotism aside, Casey's fish was the culmination of over 30 years of fishing the big lake. His father, my late twin brother, George Richey, and I, spent years teaching Casey how to fish for brown trout.

Now Casey, a single parent, takes his son Shane whenever they get a chance to fish. Shane, at nine years of age, is following in the footsteps of his father and uncle.

Shane is a tough little guy, and when I asked if he could hold up his father's fish, he said he could. Casey picked it up and laid it across Shane's outstretched arms, and then told him to curl up his arms and hold the fish against his chest. The idea of catching a state-record game fish appeals to most anglers. Frankly, it is a very difficult thing to do.

It requires being in the right spot at the right time with the right lure at the proper depth with a hungry fish looking for an easy meal. There is a great deal of water around that one fish, and the odds of catching a new record are enormous. Luck plays an important role in catching a state-record fish.

So, folks, just for fun and giggles, indulge me a bit. Let's try something that will take only 10 seconds of your time.

Study the fish above. The angler is Casey Richey of Frankfort, owner of Richey's Custom Flies. He is my late

twin brother George's son and my nephew. He is a hardcore troller.

There are times when nepotism runs strongly in me. It's an easy story to write when some kinfolk does something outstanding.

That outstanding thing in this case is the fish he holds. It looks exactly as it did when caught. It also is a new state record for its species. The burning question is: what species of game fish is it?

This fish was caught today at 6:10 a.m. at Frankfort while trolling Lake Michigan. Casey, a dedicated brown trout troller has caught 27 brown trout since ice-out this spring, and the average fish weighed six to seven pounds.

He was fishing for browns today, and both lines were set and he began trolling. His son Shane was sleeping in the bow, and Casey trolled around the Frankfort-Elberta harbor. He was trolling No. 9 Rapalas 100 yards off the in-line planer boards.

In and out, around in a circle, quick speed-ups and slow downs. all designed to give the lures a bit more action.

The fish hit 10 minutes after they got started, and Casey often fishes alone or with Shane, and he is used to fighting fish while reeling in other lines and bringing in the planer board lines.

"The fish hit and promptly took out 100 yards of line," he said. "That was good for me because I was the only boat out fishing, and it gave me an opportunity to start reeling in line. I woke up (Cont. on page 5)

Shane, and he started reeling in lines while I brought in the planer boards.

"I knew it was a big fish. There are a few bright chinook salmon around, but this fish was different. It had to be a brown ... or, at least, I thought it should be a brown trout."

Casey is no stranger to big browns. A number of years ago he caught a 24-pound brown with a big hooked jaw and large spots. But, he went long minutes fighting a fish he hadn't seen. It stayed deep and away from the boat.

Fishing lines and planer board lines were cleared, and he began fighting the fish in earnest. It didn't want to come near the boat, but when he would work it close, the fish would turn and move away ... not fast, but hard enough to take line out against the drag.

Finally, it rolled over on its side and Casey thought it was a big brown trout from brief glimpses he'd seen. The fish finally gave in to rod pressure, and came up next to the boat. One dip of the net, and the fish was surrounded by mesh. One net screw pulled out as the fish was lifted into the boat.

"I sat down and looked at it, and thought 'Oooh, what a brown'," he said. "A hand-held digital scale was used, and it read 37 pounds 1 oz. It's a new state-record brown, and Shane and I celebrated before heading for shore."

Mother's Day is not a good day to get a big fish weighed on certified scales. No one had scales that would weigh over

30 pounds. Casey called me, told me the news, and we took it to Meijers, but they also had 30-pound scales. They sent us to Deerings Market on Union Street in Traverse City.

The fish was weighed on certified scales, witnesses by two people other than me. I didn't want any hint of collusion by me being one weighing witness. The fish was 39 inches long, had a 27-inch girth, and the certified weight was 36 pounds 13 ounces, just four ounces shy of his digital hand-held scales.

I called Todd Kalash of the Michigan DNR, and he met us at the office off South Garfield Road, and examined the fish.

"I'm 80 percent certain what it is but I'll have our District Fish Biologist Tom Rozich make the final determination tomorrow," Kalash said. "It's not a chinook salmon. The mouth is white, and the rays in the anal fin are wrong for a king. It is either an Atlantic salmon or a brown trout. Rozich will make the final decision, and if he isn't certain, a scale sample will be sent off for more positive testing.

"It will be a state record in either case," Kalash said. "It is two pounds heavier than the existing brown trout record and over four pounds heavier than the state-record Atlantic salmon."

So, folks, a simple email to me at < [dave@daverichey.com](mailto:dave@daverichey.com) > with one or two words is all I need. Study the photo, and you tell me: Is this a state-record Atlantic salmon or a brown trout? I've got my beliefs, and Casey wants it to be a brown but will be tickled either way.
