toward the south. Under normal conditions, most boats will be working the drop off that runs from about 8 miles straight out northeast towards Sable Point. The closer you get to Sable Point the more boats you'll find so it'll be difficult to run lead core. Sometimes the fish will be in close to shore off the Bathouse or even right in front of the pier heads. The Project just south of the pier heads has also traditionally been an area that holds fish.

There are many trap nets in this area so watch for the markers and stay clear. The best way to avoid them completely is to get their positions off of the Ludington Charter Boat Association website and load these positions into your GPS unit. Even with these precautions, keep some wire cutters handy just in case.

The Skipper's meetings will be at 5:00 a.m. both Saturdays at the Municipal Marina. The tournament starts will be at 6:00 a.m. Remember we no longer do shotgun starts. You can run out to your spot after the Captain's meeting but don't begin setting lines until 6:00 a.m. when the tournament start is announced on channel 72. Fish calls will be at 9:00 a.m. and noon for both weekends. For the Ladies Day Tournament we'll pull lines at 1:00 p.m., and you must be in the weigh-in line at 2:30. For the regular tournament the following week pull lines at 2:00 and be at the weigh-in by 3:30 p.m. The weigh-in for the Ladies Day Tournament will be at the Municipal Marina. The following week's weigh-in will either be at Peter Copeyan Park which is just off Washington Street a few miles south of town or the Municipal Marina. It will be announced at the Captains meeting.

## Ludington Tournaments August 5<sup>th</sup> & August 12<sup>th</sup>

The next two tournaments coming up on our schedule will be back to back at Ludington. The first one is our annual Ladies Day Tournament and will be held on August 5<sup>th</sup>. For this tournament, the guys can set lines and net the fish but only the ladies can fight the fish. Once again we will have a Pig Roast as well as each crew bringing a dish to pass during the weigh-in ceremonies. This port has been a favorite of the ladies the past few years because of the opportunity to get into some nice kings. Of course coho and steelhead are also abundant in the area but kings are what'll get you in the top ten in the standings. The following weekend we'll go back to our regular tournament format. There will be hot dogs and pop at the weigh-in.

This port more than probably any other, warrants you checking out the previous week's weather and surface temps. Water temps will dictate where the fish will be located. A north blow for several days prior, will tend to push cold water around Sable Point to the north and make the better fishing

### Manistee Tournament August 26<sup>th</sup>

Although our boat trolling season is winding down, we'll be getting into some of the best fishing of the year. Manistee is a favorite port of many of our Captains as evidenced by the excellent turnout every year. Maybe it's the variety of fish available or the chance to get that trophy of a lifetime. This port routinely produces master angler entries and this is the perfect time of year to catch that one for the wall. Remember the "Monster Coho", caught here a few years back. With over a million fish planted here annually, there's plenty to go around for everyone.

Depending on the weather conditions, one of the favorite areas to work is the shelf or ledge that's about two to three miles out and runs south all the way to Big Sable Point. Some of the landmarks in this direction are Gurney Creek and Three Bears. With the recent change to a 20 mile radius from the harbor, you can fish off of Big Sable point along with the boats out of Ludington. Just watch out for nets south of the harbor down to the point. Sometimes the big kings can be found off the river mouth or just north off the Green Onion. If finding the big kings becomes tuff, you can always find steelhead and three year old kings straight out in deeper water

Spoons will catch their share but if the fish are deep, the Dodgers or Hootchies with flys will tend to get bigger fish.

Don't be afraid to try some J-Plugs even if your not fishing off the pier heads. We landed a 28# plus king a few years ago on a J-Plug off the ledge. More and more Captains each year are finding that using cutbait will help you put fish in the cooler as well.

The Skipper's meeting will be at 5:00 a.m. Saturday morning at the K of C Pavilion just west of the DNR ramp, with a 6:00 a.m. tournament start. Remember we no longer do shotgun starts. You can run out to your spot after the Captain's meeting but don't begin setting lines until 6:00 a.m. Fish calls will be at 9:00 a.m. and noon on channel 72. Pull lines at 2:00 and be at the weigh-in by 3:30 p.m. The weigh-in will also be at the K of C Pavilion. Pop and hot dogs will be available during the weigh-in ceremonies.

### Port Austin Results June 24<sup>th</sup> & 25<sup>th</sup>

It used to be you could target kings by trolling high and fast and you couldn't keep the Lake Trout off. The skippers that usually did the best targeted slightly larger Lake Trout by trolling slow and running lures deep. Now, it seems you really have to work for them.

Those wanting to pre-fish on Friday were out of luck as there were small craft advisors in the morning and it didn't get much better as the day progressed. I don't believe there were any boats that went out Friday. Several of our Captains were also entered in the Thumb Area Offshore Challenge.

The winds did subside by Saturday morning and promptly at 5:30 a.m., Blaise the Port Captain,

announced the go ahead for the thirteen boats entered to begin setting lines. The 9:00 a.m. fish call found Outta Line and Silver Addiction with six fish in the box, followed by Aquarius II and Sloppy Joe with five each. The noon fish call had Silver Addiction and Sloppy Joe ahead of the pack with nine fish each, and Aquarius II with seven. At 2:00 p.m. it was time to pull lines and proceed to the weigh-in festivities.

### TIPS FOR BETTER FISH PICTURES

Many great fish have been caught, but far fewer great pictures of those fish are ever taken. The Detroit Area Steelheaders fine newsletter, "Fishin' Tales", is always seeking photos from our members. Unfortunately, not many good photos are given to our Editor, Bob Mitchell. Here's a few tips for taking better fish pictures.

First, you must always take a camera. It's too late to take pictures back at the car. Fish look much better immediately after the catch. Action pictures on the boat, river, surf or pier are more interesting than snapshots of stringers of dead fish at the parking lot.

Lighting is critical and usually the biggest problem. Always use the flash. It might not seem to make sense to do so on a bright sunny day, but it will make your subject really stand out. It will also eliminate the shadow on faces from the caps we all wear. Try a picture with the

flash and another without to compare. You'll see a big difference. Make sure the sun is striking the subject from behind the photographer or from a slight angle. Never shoot towards the sun. Get the subject to remove their sunglasses.

Avoid background clutter. After positioning the subject for the proper light, look through the viewfinder at the background. Remove any distracting objects, close any boat doors, hatches, etc. Change the angle of the shot if needed to avoid unwanted distractions from the background.

Think about the composition of the shot. This is the way you arrange the subjects within the picture. Do you want a closeup? (Usually it's best to be within six feet.) Or do you want the subject to be just part of the scene? The rule of thirds is a good one to remember. Do not fall into the rut of always centering the subject. Mentally divide the picture into thirds vertically and horizontally. Where the lines intersect are usually the best places to locate your subject in the picture.

Finally, experiment and have fun. Try staging some netting or releasing photos. The action passes, but great photos help us relive those great fish long into the future.




