DETROIT STEELHEADERS RETURNING TO GRAND HAVEN

Everything is set. We're going back to the port of Grand Haven, on the west side of the state on Lake Michigan, on May 15 for a tournament. I am especially excited about this tourney trip because of the quality of fishing there the last three years, particularly in the spring and fall.

Over the past two springs, the fishing has been red hot, with May being the hottest. Furthermore, the port of Grand Haven has led the way for most King Salmon taken two years in a row! I squawked when a tournament for this port was mentioned, and right after that, I was elected Port Captain.

I don't know what the program will be at Grand Haven, but we should know more by tourney time. If not, we're all 'Big Water' vets, so figuring out the program should not be a problem.

Grand Haven itself is a vacation destination for people from all across Michigan. It offers a ton of things to do for everyone! The downtown area is beautiful, full of shops, restaurants, and bars. The musical fountain will be in operation starting on our scheduled tournament date, Saturday, May 15 at approximately 9:30 p.m. at the Waterfront Stadium. The Great Lakes Sport Kite Championships will also be taking place the same weekend. There are plenty of accommodations around town, including hotels, motels, campgrounds, and lots of marinas.

I have some fond memories, although blurred, of Grand Haven and frequenting the Tip-A-Few, the Kirby Grill, and the Rosebud Tavern to enjoy an adult beverage or two.

PORT AUSTIN TEAM DOUBLES TOURNAMENT IS SET FOR JUNE 5-6

The weekend of May 30 will find the Detroit Area Steelheaders fishing out of Port Austin. Lake Trout are likely to be the prime catch. Try northeast of the Lighthouse (about 5-7 miles) in 75'-100' of water. Staying as close to the bottom as possible will get you some Lakers. Good baits include P-Nuts, Spin-N-Glows, or Wobble-Glows with cowbells or chrome dodgers. Anything in green or chartreuse should produce for you. The key is a s-l-o-w presentation. If you are going to bounce the bottom, consider using break-off weights to save your cannonballs and downriggers. Better yet, don't *bounce* the bottom.

Dodger/squid setups run 5'-10' off the bottom may also get some Kings. Speaking of Kings, keep your ears open. Some years there are lots of Kings in the area. If the Kings are there, they can be the fish to target, at least at first light. Look for them straight out of port in deep water, or by the "Junk Pile." Spoons will be the presentation of choice.

If you've never fished at Port Austin before, be sure to follow the green cans out past the lighthouse before heading east. **DO NOT** cut between the lighthouse and shore; the lighthouse marks a reef that extends all the way to shore.

The Saturday Skippers Meeting will take place at 5:00 a.m. next to the D.N.R. launch ramp, with a 6:00 a.m. start. There will be Fish Calls at 9:00 a.m. and noon, with lines pulled at 2:00 p.m. for a 3:00 p.m. weigh-in.

There will be a Team Doubles tourney on Sunday for skippers who are staying over. Team assignments (first place on Saturday

paired with last, second place with next-tolast, etc.) will be made at the weigh-in on Saturday. Good luck to everyone — I'll see you at the docks.

Out of a total fleet of 17 boats, 13 weighed in fish, with "Eagle III" taking first place, followed by "Tomorrow's Dream" in second place and "Floating Holiday" in third. New Detroit Area Steelheader member Bob Jones and "Bobby's Toy" claimed top honors in the Big Fish contest with a 13.09 King Salmon.





Gill net restraint may be added bonus from enhanced St. Mary's lamprey kill

A helicopter crew may score a double knockout in the St. Mary's River this summer. According to Lake Huron fisheries leader Jim Johnson, the 2,000-acre lamprey attack should:

- Reduce lamprey predation on Lake Trout in northern Lake Michigan and Lake Huron by 40%-50% "almost immediately."
- Enhance chances of a resource-based tribal netting agreement by the 2000.

If lamprey take a knockout hit, natural reproduction of Lake Trout should follow if tribal gill nets are withdrawn, giving netters incentive to agree to restraint, Johnson explains.

An experimental lamprey treatment on 200 acres of the St. Mary's River last summer was so successful that officials have decide to treat the entire remaining 2,000 acres of primary spawning habitat this year. Initially, the treatments were to be spread over five years so that they could be "fine-tuned."

That isn't necessary according to Johnson. Follow-up sampling of the areas treated last year convinced officials that the process is "deadly effective."

Over several years, researchers isolated the major lamprey spawning habitat and pinpointed it with GPS (Global Positioning System) map-

ping. They also tested using granular Bayer to target the submerged spawning beds where immature lamprey live in the muddy bottom.

Another key element was charting currents and developing a strategy to calculate how far upstream to release the sand-based chemical so it landed precisely on the beds.

Prior to last summer's release from the chopper, the target areas were dug up and the number of lamprey determined. Follow-up dredging revealed that the chemical hit the targets and devastated the lamprey.

The chemical strike is coupled with release of sterilized male lamprey to curb future spawning. Last year a record 17,000 sterile males were released in the river. Johnson expects even more this, and following, summers.

The males are trapped as far away as Lake Ontario and sterilized at the Hammond Bay lamprey research station.

With this ongoing effort, Johnson predicts lamprey predation will be cut 75% by the year 2010 in the north end of the Lakes.

The St. Mary's River is the biggest producer of lamprey, putting out 200,000 to 300,000 lamprey per year.

The critters have been controlled, not elimi-

nated, in the rest of the Lakes by treating their spawning streams with the liquid chemical TFM, and with barriers. TFM cannot be used in the St. Mary's due to cost, complexity, and size. This new program will be ongoing.

Controlling lamprey in the St. Mary's River is considered critical to Lake Trout recovery because the best Trout spawning reefs are in the northern part of the Lakes. State fisheries surveys have documented the virtual obliteration of Lake Trout by gill nets.

Federal and state fisheries officials and the tribes have declared their goal is a self-sustaining Lake Trout population. Biologists point out commercial fisheries and spawning Trout populations are compatible if trap nets (which allow live release of non-target fish) are used.

President Clinton has asked Congress for a \$1,000,000 boost in the U.S.'s share of lamprey control budget, to \$9,353,000. Canada has also stated that it will increase its funding. Governor Engler has budgeted \$1,000,000 per year for the task, and has challenged other Great Lakes states to follow suit.
