"Tail Walker" wins at Manistee

After three days of rain and high winds, the Detroit Area Steelheaders got lucky, once again getting nice weather for our Manistee tournament on Saturday, August 23. At the tourney start at 6:15 a.m., there were over 150 boats at the pier heads, a huge fleet, with three tournaments going on, plus weekenders and the locals! The Salmon run had started!!

We had 24 boats signing up at the captain's meeting, with a twenty-fifth calling in after the first Fish Call was completed.

Fishing was good, in spite of too many boats and high rollers. At the first Fish Call, a few boats reported no fish, but most boats had one to three fish in the box, and the latecomer boat had four. Productive spots were in front of the piers from the "Green Onion" to the first clay bank in 40'-60' of water.

After 10 o'clock, some boats decided to go out on "The Shelf," looking for other kinds of fish, such as Lakers and Steelhead. By the second Fish Call only two boats were still

Wind limits Harbor Beach action

The Detroit Area Steelheaders wrapped up the 1997 Boat Trolling Tournament season on Saturday, September 6 at Harbor Beach.

Two weeks prior to the tourney, few boats were venturing out to fish, due to strong winds and high waves stirring up the water. Due to the bad weather, the fish were scattered at different depths and locations in the area, but by Friday, the wind had subsided enough for boats to go out and try to locate schools of fish. A few boats reported locating some fish in 120'-160' of water.

The tournament began as planned at 6:30 a.m. with light winds and 1'-2' waves. By the first Fish Call, "The Kidd" was leading, with three fish in the cooler, and by the second Fish Call, most boats reported catching fish.

During the day, we heard radio reports that fish were being taken straight out from the harbor in 150° of water. At around 11 o'clock, the wind started to pick up and blow waves up to four feet high. Fortunately for the fleet, the wind was blowing out of the southeast, which enabled the boats to come closer in to the harbor in search of calmer waters while still catching fish.

At the weigh-in Paul Colone, skipper of

"The Kidd" ended up in first place for the tournament with a score of 54.07 points, followed by Ed Hill and "Dredge" with 43.02 points. For the second tournament in a row, our Port Captain claimed third place. In this case, it was Stan Bilek and "Blue Star" finishing in the show position with a score of 40.15 points.

The Big Fish Pool was also won by Paul Colone of "The Kidd" with a 15.07-pound King Salmon. Second place went to Denis Harper of "Lady's Choice" with a 14.13-pound King, while Chris Nytko and "Aquarius II" claimed third place with a King Salmon tipping the scales at 13.15 pounds.

I would like to give a special "Thank You" to the crew of "Blue Star" for handling the cooking at the post-tournament picnic.

Since Harbor Beach was our final 1997 boat tourney, let me take this occasion to congratulate all the winners throughout the season, with special thanks to all Detroit Area Steelheader skippers and crews for participating in the various club events and making them safe and enjoyable for all.

FREE BOATING SAFETY COURSE LAUNCHED ON THE INTERNET

ST. MARY'S TREATMENT TO INCREASE FISH STOCKS

The St. Mary's River produces more sea lampreys than all other Great Lakes tributaries in the U.S. and Canada combined. The river, which connects Lakes Superior and Huron, has until recently been considered too large to treat. However, recent research breakthroughs have finally made treatment of the St. Mary's possible.

Increased funding of \$3 million from the Michigan D.N.R. will make it possible to fully implement the newly developed techniques next year. Due to this initiative, anglers could see a 20%-40% increase in the number of adult fish in northern Lake Huron in the future.

EVEN MOTHER NATURE 'VIOLATES' THE STANDARDS

Salmon Steaks, 1-inch thick

/ pound butter

1 teaspoon onion powder 1/2 teaspoon pepper

1 teaspoon salt

l teaspoon garlic powder

Trolling the Web

What value does the Internet provide to me? Many fishers are still asking the question. "should I purchase a computer?"

The Internet is truly an information superhighway-there is real value to the vast amount of information one can find. Our web site traffic continues to increase as anglers go on line. Many are visiting us from public libraries which have free access. The most recent 30day statistics show 5,600 visits, a 14% increase, and the trend continues.

Led by Michigan Sea Grant and Coast-Watch, anglers now have an added tool. Sea Grant CoastWatch has expanded its on-line "Surface Temperature Mapping Images" to include all Great Lakes regions, including detailed surface maps for 44 ports.

A link to these surface temperature maps can be found at the top of each of our state pages along with marine forecast, fishing reports, wind direction, and lake buoy data.

Surface temperatures images are updated four times each day: 7:00 a.m., and 1:00, 6:00, and 11:00 p.m.

Record Laker could wear a saddle!

throw a saddle on!" That's Lake Superior watershed fish chief Steve Scott's excited description of Michigan's new record Lake Trout. He says the 61.5-pound, 41-inch brute was "extremely deep-bodied, with a very large head." Caught somewhere in Lake Superior, out of L'Anse, the fish tops the former state record Lake Trout of 53 pounds, caught in 1944. That fish was 48 inches long.

The record Laker was caught by 15-yearold Lucas Lanczy of Herman (south of L'Anse) on a two-ounce jig in 40 feet of water. Lanczy was fishing with his dad, Bela, and a guide. He would not say which reef they were fishing over. Lanczy told Scott he was using 12-pound-test line, and that it took him 25 minutes to land his prized catch. He also said they caught two Lakers in the 30pound range on the same fishing trip.

The fish was seen by a D.N.R. creel clerk when the Lanczy boat came to shore in L'Anse. To qualify for state record status, the catch must be examined by a D.N.R. biologist. There were none left in the Baraga district at the time, due to early retirements.

When Scott arrived in L'Anse the next day, the fish had been wrapped in water-

"It looks like something you'd want to soaked sheets and frozen, on instructions from a taxidermist. The Lake Trout was so large it had to be frozen in a walk-in freezer.

Scott opened up a large-enough section of the wrapping to identify it as a Lake Trout. Lanczy had a certified scale weight sheet. When the fish is mounted, Scott said he would get enough remains to age the Trout.

Though far from an all-tackle world record, it may qualify as a line class record. The current 12-pound-test line Lake Trout record is 50.5 pounds, caught in 1969 in Flaming Gorge, Utah. To qualify for the line record, Lanczy must sent a portion of the line to the Freshwater Fishing Hall of Fame in Hayward, Wisconsin for testing.

Scott is confident Lanczy's fish was a "fat" (or siscowet) Lake Trout, a distinct subspecies that generally inhabits deeper water than "lean" Lake Trout, and that has minimal food value. Examination of stomach samples, he points out, show that "fats' spend part of their time foraging on shallow water prey. He believes there are larger Lake Trout in Lake Superior, but would not speculate on the odds of one being caught.

The world record Lake Trout, taken from Great Bear Lake, Canada, weighed 74 pounds.
