Atlantic Salmon Fin clipping

On Monday, May 6, 2019 at 8:00 AM Rod Elnick and I met with Roger Greil, Aquatic Research Laboratory Manager at Lake Superior State University in Sault Ste. Marie. We were there to help students fin clip the Atlantic salmon prior to being released into the St. Mary's River this June. If you recall Roger was at one of our membership meetings last year speaking about the Atlantic salmon program at LSSU. Our club has been donating a \$1500 annual Scholarship to students in the fisheries and biology programs at the university. Beginning last year, we also have been providing volunteers to help with fin clipping, thus our being there.

Roger gave us about a half-hour tour with some education on how the lab and program works. As you know Rod heads up the DAS Salmon-In-the-Classroom program and is currently working closely with 5 schools. The workings of the lab, although on a much larger scale, were familiar to Rod but I was amazed at how the rearing of the Atlantic salmon happens. I was very excited to be a part of this and was looking forward to helping out.



After the tour, Roger introduced us to Gary and Brad, the students we would be working with. We were both given an apron and latex glove for the left hand. As Rod and I are right handed, we would be holding the fish with our left hands for clipping and that hand would be spending much of the day in the 39 degree river water in the trays and buckets. Gary and Brad showed Rod and me how to do the fin-clipping. This was a very simple procedure using scissors to clip the right pectoral fin from each fish and placing them into the raceway from which the fish would be released. The fish were from 4 to 8 or 9 inches long.

It was Brad and Gary's job to capture and sedate fish into a 5 gallon bucket from a different raceway that Rod and I would net into a tray for fin clipping. They use a chemical called MS222 (Tricaine-S methane sulfonate) which sedates the fish for 5-10 minutes. This is enough time to fin clip a bucket full of fish.



We brought along a perch counter that Carl Ventimiglia purchased. Jim Zanke made some modifications by adding a plastic funnel inside and removing a return spring to make sure these smaller fish would trigger the counter. We only brought the one to try and if successful the club would donate more of these to assist in future fin clippings. Roger, Gary. and Brad were thrilled and thankful that we brought the counter. It worked out very well. They had been doing manual check counting (IIII) on sheets of paper and this made the counting much easier.



We did take a short break about 10:45 am. Sharon Dorrity, Director of Constituent Relations of the LSSU Foundation stopped by to meet us. With LSSU photographer John Shibley on hand, we took the opportunity to get a photo with Rod & I handing Sharon & Roger the big photo-op check (and the actual \$1500 check) for this year's scholarship. Ray & Gary, on one side of us continued to fin clip while Linda & Brad were on the other side. This made for a great picture that captured it all.

Our April speaker was Hunter Engel from Best Chance Too Charters in Saugatuck, Michigan. Hunter represents the third generation of his family making their living on the lake. He was accompanied by his brother Zach and their presentation focused on southern Lake Michigan spring Salmon tactics. Early season presentations may vary somewhat from your summer program, but the key is still locating baitfish.

As the southern ports in Lake Michigan begin to warm up, some nice Kings and Lake Trout can be had along with the seasonal concentrations of Coho. Gold/ orange and red/black Thin Fins on longlines continue to be favorite presentations when targeting Coho. Hunter pointed out that last year was an exceptional spring as big kings showed up in good numbers. This year it looks like big fish have returned, but it's not clear if the numbers will match last year. Many of the attendees were fortunate to leave with swag provided by the companies that sponsor the Best Chance team. In addition to all the raffle prizes they gave away, random members were also rewarded for insightful observations and questions. Thank you Hunter and Zach.

St. Clair River Bottom Bouncing Outing

Like buying real estate the key to successful walleye fishing can be summed up in three words; location, location, location! Try shallow water early in the morning and on overcast days. Move out to deeper water on sunny days. Walleyes don't like bright, sunny days.

Try Trolling with the current, approximately 2.4 - 2.9 MPH, to keep the harness blade spinning. You don't want to go too fast that you cannot feel the bottom with your

bouncer. On windy days, you can actually just drift, you will pick up enough speed to get their attention.

We use a 3 oz. Bottom Bouncer, and a double hook harness, approximately 36 inches long. We prefer, green on green, purple and pink, fluorescent orange and pearl harness colors. You don't need high dollar equipment. Just about any medium action spinning rod and reel with 10-12 pound line will do. We use our jigging rods with 10 pound braid. It helps you feel the bite.

Best tip to catch fish is holding your mouth just right, lol Good luck to all! Jim and Ed Paehlig

Fin Clip

DAS Director Blaise Pewinski and Member Rob Pinskey spent the day on Thursday, May 9 helping 3 LSSU students to fin clip over 6800 fish to finish this year's stock for planting. The total count was some 19,000 fish that will be released into the St. Mary's River in June. The stock was a little down this here as there was a parasite in the river water that caused some mor-

tality early on until the problem was resolved. Besides feeding, the remainder of time will be spent in acclimating the fish to the river water. The actual release is rather simple as they open a valve on a large pipe in each raceway and the fish and water are washed into the St. Mary's.



I personally enjoyed this experience and I am grateful to be able to help with this wonderful program at LSSU. As Roger Greil told us during lunch "Our goal is not to release Atlantic salmon but to educate and give the students a rewarding experience. The salmon are a benefit we receive." The Detroit Area Steelheaders will continue to support the LSSU Aquatics Research program with our scholarship and other donations. We are also looking forward to continue with the help during fin-clipping. It would be tremendous if we could provide additional volunteers in the future. If you have the time next year, consider giving up a day for this extremely worthwhile experience.

A total of 9.44 million salmon were stocked into Lake Michigan in 2018, the lowest number stocked since 1972. The Fish and Wildlife Service stocked 96% of the lake trout while state agencies stocked all Pacific salmon (chinook & coho), brown trout, and rainbow trout.

Summary of 2018 Salmon Stocking in Lake Michigan

Lakewide salmon stocking, recent trends Chinook salmon In 2018, 1.64 million were stocked, a 19% increase from 2017. Since 2014, the average number of Chinook salmon stocked has also been 1.64 million.

Brown trout 0.89 million were stocked in 2018, a 12% decrease from 2017. This also represents a 44% and 29% decrease from the recent 5-year mean in Wisconsin and Michigan waters, respectively.

Lake trout 2.52 million yearlings were stocked in 2018, a 9% decrease from 2017. Lake trout stockings were the lowest they have been since 2004.

Rainbow trout 1.98 million were stocked in 2018, a 7% increase from the recent 5-year mean in Wisconsin waters and a 33% increase from the recent 5-year mean in Michigan waters.

Coho salmon 2.41 million were stocked in 2018, a 9% decrease from the total stocked in 2017.

Stiff Winds Greet Algonac Anglers

On April 27th a record 14 boats and 42 anglers participated in the annual Algonac walleye outing. The weather was cool and dry but 15 – 20 MPH winds made it difficult to keep lines vertical. While most participants struggled to catch fish, 14 anglers brought fish to the weigh-in. Steve Prout, Rob Pinskey, and Blaise Pewinski fished together and managed to weigh five each. Rumor has it they were spotted near St Clair fishing the Canadian side by the power plant. Steve weighed a 4.05 Walleye along with his 12.45lb five fish total, and walked away with a cool \$200 'Big Fish' prize. His total was also good for first place over all. Second place went to Rob Pinsky with an 11.20lb catch. Mark Paradise narrowly edged Blaise Pewinski out of third place with 10.35lbs.

If you've ever been to the Algonac outing you know fishing is only half the fun thanks to the club members who donate some of their choice Perch and Walleye fillets for the fish fry that follows the weigh-in. Special thanks to everyone who brought assorted sides and desserts, and Don Mikros who promises to share his recipe for the Mac 'n Cheese side dish in a future newsletter.



St Joe Report

The expectations were high for the skippers and crews heading to St. Joe for the DAS's first SOTY tournament of the season Sat., May 4. Reports were good with cohos, lake trout, steelhead and kings....big kings being caught.

Winds, rain, fog and made for less than

ideal lake conditions but certainly did not seem to bother the catchin' as "Bobby's Toy" managed a nice catch of 5 big kings, 3 lake trout and a coho Friday. Spoons and body baits were working on shallow set down-riggers and 3 and 5 color lead cores in 35 fow. But as Skipper Bob Jones warned "doing good on Friday can be the 'kiss of death' for Saturday". Just as the 'Prophet Bob' predicted, by Saturday morning the bite had slowed. Only "Bad Dog" reported 1 fish at the 9:00 am Fish Call! What a turnaround from Friday! The fishing did get a little better as the morning went on with "Bad Dog" reporting 3 fish, "Vickie's Seacret – 2 fish and the rest of the fleet - 1 fish except "Blue Horizon" and "Bobby's Toy" still had the skunk in the box at the 11:00 am call.

All boats pulled lines at 1:30 and everyone made it to the weigh-in line by 2:30 PM. Rookie Port Captain Brett Mauk ordered up a fantastic meal from Harding's Friendly Market.

92.9 points - 39.9 points ahead of 2nd Place "Bad Dog's 5 fish. "Vickie's Seacret" finished just behind in 3rd place with their 5 fish and 48.7 points. "Fish the F On" also managed to win all 3 Big Fish pools with a 19.4 lbs. King, 13.1lbs. Lake Trout and the only steelhead weighed-in at 2.95 lbs!

Amazingly, Skipper Brett and his crew's win was good luck amongst a day of bad luck as they had to fish on one engine as the other motor failed, did not have a working graph and lost into the depths their Fish Hawk transducer! Congratulations to Brett and his crew on the win and also big Thanks for doing a great job as first time Port Captain!!

Six boats and 18 members travelled to Grand Haven intent on competing in our two-day tournament. It looked like Saturday was going to be the best day for fishing as far as the weather was concerned. We were all aware that Sunday could be dicey. Small craft warnings were posted with the possibility of high wind and lightning. When you travel to these tournaments you take what you get, and you do the best you can with the conditions at the time.

Saturdays 0500 captains meeting arrived, and all six boats were ready to go. Waves were from calm to about one foot most of the day and the temperature was a little cool, but really a good day for fishing. The problem was, the fish did not get the memo. Fishing started out slow and did not get very much better as the day wore on. The 0900 fish call recorded a total of 4 fish for all six boats. The 1100 fish call was not too encouraging either with 7 fish aboard all six boats. Saturdays, day one weigh-in had Bob Feisel (Vicki's Seacret) in the lead with four fish. Jim Zanke (Hard Top N Tails) came in second with 2 fish, Bob Jones (Bobby's Toy) recorded 2 fish, Brad Walton (Moon Shot) and Dan Chisholm (Channing) had one fish each.

We decided to have a brief captains meeting on Sunday morning just because the weather prediction was for high wind, rain, and possibly lightning. At 0515 Sunday morning there were only 4 DAS boats left in town, Lake Buzzard and Moon Shot had already trailered their boats and were headed home. The weather at that time was not very bad at all. It was the possibility (risk/reward) of being caught out in bad weather that had turned most of us off. With only one boat willing to go out and take the chance it was decided that the tournament results of Saturday would be the official results.

Bottom line results: First place – Bob Feisel (Vicki's Seacret), Second place – Jim Zanke (Hard Top N Tails), Third place – Dan Chisholm
