
Keep the faith, hang in there, and stay in touch. We will get past this.

Huron-Michigan Predator Diet Study Changes for 2020

Your help is needed collecting stomachs more than ever in 2020. Due to measures enacted to slow the spread of coronavirus, Michigan State University researchers and other collaborating agencies are unable to collect stomachs from anglers at this time.

This means they will be relying on anglers to collect their own stomachs until further notice. Most freezer drop sites will be unavailable for the immediate future, so we are asking anglers to keep their stomachs frozen in personal freezers until social distancing guidelines are relaxed and public freezer drop sites are reopened.





- 1 Decide if you will collect stomachs from this fishing trip.
- 2 Remove stomachs from ALL fish of each species that you are collecting.
- 3 Place stomachs and ALL conten
- into plastic bag with data tag.

 Freeze or ice stomachs immediately
- and deposit in freezer at drop site.

Salmon in the Classroom Final Release By Rodney Elnick

On Friday, April 24, Michael Gaule from Divine Child High School in Dearborn met with me at the Huron River in Flat Rock to release their Salmon. Also helping was Mrs. Karen Gaule, their golden retriever, and one high school senior, Ali Myers. As you recall, the other schools were locking their doors in early March so we had to release on March 16th and 17th. So, Michael somehow negotiated an agreement for entrance to the school. For 36 days he attended to the Salmon as the only one allowed to enter the school. He told me that he was specifically counseled to the areas he could touch in passing through the building

In the past, we released in the Huron Park, an island accessible by a walking bridge within the Flat Rock city limits. However, the park entrance was taped off, closed to the public. Michael had driven down a couple days earlier and located a grassed access on Atwater Street next to a taco restaurant.

The release went well, even with only us attending. We were happy with the average size, 4 to 4-1/4 inches. The property owner showed up half way through the release. He gave us his approval but didn't wish to help. The release total was 118 Smolts out of 154 eggs. That comes to 76.6% survival. The total Salmon released was 666 from 861 eggs. The final result is therefore 77.4% survival which is very good but a little less than last year. Looking back at the records, many eggs were lost within the first two weeks. No way for us to reason why. We wish again to thank all the teachers, their schools, and our DAS members for their time and effort to help this program to succeed.

Chef's Table - Smoked Salmon Chili

Thanks to DAS member and fish camp chef Fred Chartier for sharing his Smoked Salmon Chili recipe. If you have a favorite recipe you would like to share, email it to tgorguze@aol.com

Ingredients:

- 1 pound smoked salmon
- 1 medium chopped onion
- 1 can chicken broth
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 Qt whipping cream
- 2 cloves minced garlic
- 2 stalks chopped celery
- 2 cans great northern beans
- 2 cans rinsed cannellini beans
- 2 Anaheim peppers
- 1 tablespoon ground coriander
- 1 tablespoon lemon pepper
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1 teaspoon oregano





Prep:

Braise peppers, then remove skin and seeds,

Heat oil in a large pot over medium heat. Then sauté the onion, celery, and garlic until tender. Add smoked salmon, beans, chicken the river people are catching multiple fish broth, peppers and spices to the pot. Stir and bring to a boil. Reduce the heat and simmer for 30 minutes. Stir in the whipping cream. Simmer until the soup is hot (do not bring to a boil after adding cream) and serve.

Protecting Our Lakes By Rodney Elnick

Four 8th grade young ladies from Kennedy Middle School, Saint Clair Shores, have won First Place in Michigan and a \$2000 savings bond each for their micro-plastic mission. Under the guidance of Jann Tamer, teacher, Adelia Nasir, Alyssa Sonnnfeld, Emily Tolcer and Ava Pittiglio are participating in a national STEMbased competition, eCYBERMISSION, sponsored by the U.S. Army.

I worked for several years with Mrs. Tamer in our Salmon in the Classroom program. She had tank no. 2 in the Kennedy Middle School. I was asked by her to assist the students in their process of developing some design solution to their research.

Micro-plastics are very small pieces of plastic, from 0.05 mm to 5.0 mm (0.002 inches – 0.200 inches). The micro-plastics are seen using a Nile red dye and viewed through a special lens. The girls tested the waters in Marine City, New Baltimore, Metroparks Beach in Harrison Township, Veteran's Memorial Beach and Blossom Health

Beach in Saint Clair Shores. The worst results of their tests samples came from Marine City, they believe, because it is just down river from The Sarnia Wastewater Plant emptying into the St. Clair River.

On March 3, I accompanied the young ladies to Wayne State University campus, the Integrative Biosciences Center to meet with Dr. Tracie Baker. Her research into the contaminates escaping the waste water treatment plant and being discharged into the Detroit River was extremely disquieting. Also, part of her studies is the health effects of the contaminants and microplastics in the zebrafish model. The testing uses zebrafish because 70% of their gnomes are identical to humans. Her research was showing the microplastic buildup mostly in the digestive region but also the brain of the zebrafish.

Wastewater treatment plants do not test for or remove microplastics as part of their water treatment. Miss Pittiglio explains that with polyester clothing, ten to twelve million microfibers



are produced in one load of laundry. The result of their project was a cheap, easy-to-use filter design for the washing machine. All the students' results, a how-to video, and more are on a website they created, "pollutionpolice.weebly.com". The national judging for their project is coming up in June.

Waters of Lake Erie and Lake St. Clair Highlights for 2019

An update from the MDNR Lake St. Clair Fisheries Research Station

- Anglers spent over 583,000-hours fishing the Michigan waters of Lake Erie and Lake St. Clair in 2019, taking 112,000 total
- The 2019 Lake Erie Walleye year class was the largest in our

- Walleye harvest by anglers was the second highest on record since 2006, following the 12-year record high in 2018

 Nearly 1 in 10 Smallmouth Bass captured on Lake St. Clair was over 20" long, while 2/3 of fish were over 17" in length The 2019 Yellow Perch fishery in Lake Erie was challenging, with very low harvest rates in both the recreational fishery and the charter fishery. and the charter fishery.
