Artic Grayling Update

EMMET COUNTY, MI – A batch of Arctic grayling salmonid eggs were transported from Alaska to Michigan as the carry-on luggage of a researcher as part of an initiative to repopulate the native fish.

This is the second year-class of eggs to make the trip. Since their voyage, the eggs have hatched, and the fish are growing and thriving at a fish hatchery. Their predecessors, the first year-class, arrived in 2019 and have been moved from the hatchery to the next stage in their journey toward reintroduction into Michigan waters.

The once plentiful species of salmonid is on track to return to Michigan cold-water streams by 2025 – after nearly a century of absence.

A native species known for their large, sail-like dorsal fins and light blue and sometimes iridescent pink bodies, Arctic grayling have been absent from Michigan since the 1930s. It was the dominant salmonid species found in the state's cold-water streams before it went extinct in the Midwest due to over-fishing, habitat loss from timber practices, and competing with and being preyed on by non-native species like brown trout.

The Michigan Arctic Grayling Initiative to bring them back began in 2016. The effort is a collaboration between the Little River Band of Ottawa Indians, Michigan Department of Natural Resources and more than 40 other partners to bring this native fish back to the Great Lakes state.

Late this past spring, the DNR received the 2021 year-class of brood eggs from Alaska. The eggs from this year-class, along with the 2019 year-class, will help establish a brood population in Michigan.

The 2021 eggs were "very carefully" transported from Alaska to Michigan. They traveled by plane as the carry-on luggage of a Michigan State University researcher. Upon arrival, they were stored at a MSU lab in East Lansing before journeying to the Oden State Fish Hatchery in Emmet County. They are "growing well" and the mortality rate is "remarkably low."

Researchers plan to bring the next batch of eggs to the state in May 2022, when the DNR and the Alaska Department of Fish and Game will collect them from Alaska's Chena River.

Meanwhile, Michigan's 2019 year-class of 4,000 young, healthy future broodstock fish, averaging 6.5 inches long, was transferred in September 2020 from Oden fish hatchery to the Marquette State Fish Hatchery where the fish are reared in water that mimics the grayling's natural habitat - and will trigger spawning.

Because the eggs originated from outside of the Great Lakes basin, they had to be quarantined and pass three health exams before being moved to the Upper Peninsula hatchery.

The move to Marquette was important because grayling need water temperatures and daylight that change with the season, and the water source at the Marquette hatchery, Cherry Creek, does that.

Staff will care for the group at the hatchery until the fish are ready to produce eggs, usually at 4-6 years old. At that time – likely 2024 or 2025 – the DNR will collect eggs and milt from the fish, fertilize the eggs and place them in instream incubators. When they hatch, the fry will emerge into the stream in almost the same way as if they had been spawned naturally. The site of the initial reintroduction has not yet been selected.

The second-year class is two years behind the first because the COVID-19 pandemic forced a hiatus in growing the Arctic grayling broodstock - no eggs were brought to Michigan in 2020. The DNR plans to send staff to Alaska again in 2022 to collect more eggs.


Do Not Miss Tomorrows Meeting

Ludington Tournament Setup and Strategy

From day 1 in my salmon fishing career, Ludington has been my favorite port.

Ludington has The Point; my favorite place to troll. It has tremendous structure there. It has the Big Sable River (where Chinook used to be planted by the thousands but now has Coho) It is a place where salmon school up prior to running the rivers. It has big fish. It is the place where more tournaments have been won than any other.

On the other hand, many tournaments have been won at Ludington's other hotspots; the pier heads, the Project, Little Point, Lincoln River and North of the Point to name the most popular. Ignore them and you may be relegated to middle of the pack at best. Don't just focus on The Point.

Your first decision will be where to start. Network. Talk to Locals like Captain Dave Even, Captain Mark Williams or long time DAS member Jason Adam. Go to Captain Chuck's Tackle. Ask, "what



and where." Walk the docks and see what the boats (especially Charters) have hanging off their rods when they come in. Look at the Ludington Buoy and see what the surface and sub surface temperatures are. All this information should give you a decent picture of what and where at the start. If you have the luxury to pre-fish, spend an hour North, straight out and South. Don't just check one place and stay there because you are catching fish. Eliminating spots is as important as finding

If you are starting in the right place you are going to have company; 100+ boats in July/ August on weekends. That will necessitate that your beginning spread allow for maximum maneuverability. I'd start with 2-4 downriggers and 2-4 Dispseys. No Boards until you are sure you can maneuver so you won't get boxed in or cut off. This is hand to hand combat. It's not about how many fish you get on, it's about how many you box! You need to be able to stay on the drop off or whatever structure you're targeting and to peel away from the pack when you get the "big guy" on. As the day progresses I would start eliminating downriggers for lead or copper lines.

At the start you have the best shot at a "Hog". As such, I would probably be focusing on big fish rather than filling the box. That means meat, flasher flies and mag spoons. It's late summer so I don't have to focus on 42-48 degree water. Pre-spawn chinooks are less temperature reliant as they school up getting ready to run the rivers. I'd spread the presentation from 54 degrees down to the bottom. For lure/ rotator selection I'd be sure to include some Super Glow and UV patterns early. As the day progresses, the salmon will tell you what colors and patterns to run; not me or anyone else.

Once the morning bite seems to calm down its time to start making changes. Point #1, "What did the fish tell you over the previous couple of hours? Waypoints, what lure, what colors, what presentation. Pull any downriggers that were not productive and add in boards (and 2 more divers is you only have 2 out) Inside, deep diver set at 1 ½ and outside high divers set at 4-5. Next, what do you need most? More fish to fill your max weighable or a couple of Big Guys? If mostly more fish, add in some smaller spoons that will pick off 3-7 pounders. If you just need a couple pigs, focus on meat, flies and a few Mag spoons. Repeat your successes. Over the past 2 hours the fish told you color, type and presentation. Listen to them! (I am not clairvoyant nor is anyone else.)

In a tournament you may have to make a run. It's usually a crap shot and often fruitless as the bite may be over once you get there. A short run my be worthwhile. Picking and running is almost always the preference to trolling there. In higher wave conditions, trolling with the waves then picking up and running back up wind is preferential to pounding into the waves and not running your spread properly. (The fish will quickly tell you if you're only getting hits in only one direction.)

Ludington has awesome currents. If you don't have a Fish Hawk (you should) watch your downrigger cables like a hawk. Into a current your cables will sway back and, with the current tend to slump straight down. Surface speed of 2.5 into a 3 mph current has your lures running 5.5mph. With the current, .5mpg. Neither is good.

In a short article it's impossible to cover all of the decisions you will need to make or explore all of your options. Follow these general suggestions and you should catch fish. Good luck and hope to see you in Ludington.

Manistee II

The DAS skippers will be making a second stop in Manistee on August 7th. It's back to back weekends for what looks to be some great fishing. One week after our Ludington SOTY tournament we will moving north, up the Lake Michigan coast. The fishing has been pretty steady most of the summer. Not the greatest number of fish, but definitely some nice ones.

If you're not sure where to start fishing in Manistee, head straight out to 120 feet of water and find a spot to join the fleet. Boats typically fish a north-south troll along the drop that runs from Ludington to Frankfort. Straight out from the pier heads is some of the most stable water in the area. After a big blow, it sets up fast. If you want to avoid the crowds try to the north, or head south several miles and tuck in where boats are more spaced out.

This weekend, there were twenty fish over twenty pounds weighed, including a thirty-four and a half pound king at the Salmon Splash abbreviated one day tournament. You can get the scoop first hand at the July meeting from DAS members that fished the Ludington and Manistee, Tournament Trail events.
