Presidents Message

We put the finishing touches on 2019 with a successful annual meeting and Christmas celebration. Hard earned fishing awards were given out, members were celebrated, board directors were recognized for their service and everything was looking up. Our 2020 trolling tournament schedule was published, as was our 2020 angler schedule. We had successful member meetings with great speakers for three months, and our Wild Game Dinner fund raiser was a huge success. Everything was looking great! Until it was not. Just a few days past our Wild Game Dinner, on March 7, the Covid-19 Virus hit the fan and things got difficult and hard to manage. The Virus was real, deadly real, and not to be taken lightly. Our immediate challenge is how to award the Skipper of the Year, Angler of the Year, member, and board member of the year without being able to gather indoors as a group. We also are considering how to run an election of officers and hold a successful fund raiser while still under meeting restrictions. This Covid-19 challenge just will not let up.

That is enough of the challenges. The good news is the vaccines are approved and rolling out, we could be back too normal in a short time frame. We are planning a video conference for the January meeting where we can run club business while benefitting from knowledgeable speakers that can present their expertise to membership just like a normal membership meeting. We have a friendly and active club full of good people and I am looking forward to seeing you all at membership meetings and fishing events soon.



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In case you missed the October meeting

It turns out the October membership meeting was our last meeting in 2020. We were at the Shelby Twp. River Bends Park and started at 5:30 PM because we knew it would be getting dark and colder as the evening progressed. Our monthly speakers are all good and add value, but my favorites are club members because most of the time I have fished with them and it is easier for me to relate to their message. Members Tom Theida and Bob Paradise are both experienced river/pier guys, and they did a great job explaining how to attract strikes from Steelhead while on the river or pier. The timing for a river/pier message was perfect because the following weekend was the DAS club tournament in Manistee.



We started on time and Bob Paradise got right into it with examples of how to attract Steelhead while fishing the river. He led off with a bobber fishing rig using a weighted swivel and trout beads. His next example was a rig using a 3/8 oz drop weight and flies. Tom was next up as he demonstrated the use of pyramid sinkers and spawn off the pier. The size of the spawn bag, how to use floats and a split shot to place the spawn in the strike zone were all useful information to help us out that weekend. Thank you both Bob and Tom for sharing your experience and making it interesting.

We debated holding off on our normal meeting raffles but when 26 members showed up Jeff Bustos put together a good Tackle Raffle and collected for the evenings 50:50 raffle. (Winners: 50:50 – Rodney Elnick, - Every Member drawing: Gary Gross \$50). This was our fifth consecutive outdoor meeting in the Park and we have been very fortunate

to enjoy good weather with mild temperatures and exceptional speakers. The board of directors is discussing working in some outdoor summer meetings as part of our normal meeting plan for 2021.

The upside down nature of Corona-19 kept us scrambling every month to keep the club going. Just when we located a suitable indoor location, the governor's shut down forced us

to cancel our November and December meetings. Mandatory restrictions on indoor meeting places are still in place, so watch the DAS Facebook page, the DAS newsletter, and the frequent email blasts that are being sent out for the most up to date information.


The Detroit Steelheaders provide a \$1500 annual scholarship for students enrolled in a fisheries focused curriculum at LSSU. Recipient's are nominated by the staff and selected based on academics and financial need. Congratulations Julia!

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Covid-19 Impacts on Salmon In The Classroom

This fall, we have three schools participating in the Salmon program. We lost one school to participation issues and two schools are participating in the on-line DNR program in accordance with their in-home instruction.

At Pine Knob Elementary in Clarkston, Janice Driver teaches 3rd grade and heads up the S.I.C. program for us. She picked up 151 eggs for her class and has lost 3 eggs before the hatch. However, after the hatch, she separated out 11 Alevin that were malformed. An Alevin is the stage of Salmon just hatched and feeding off the yoke-sac for several weeks. The yoke-sac becomes its stomach as the contents are all absorbed.





Also in Clarkston, the Independence Elementary tank is overseen by Dennis Klenow, teaching 2nd grade. They collected 165 eggs from the DNR and have had a loss of 4 eggs. Note that the eggs are confined in a netted box. This is a Net Breeder Isolation Chamber that we use to retain the eggs and Alevin for their safety from the pump suction and to provide a great viewing for the students.



Oakland Christian Schools of Auburn Hills is our third school and Elise Hosmer is our main care-taker. They started with 150 eggs and have had to discard 7 eggs. As you can see, the tank is quite large. We were able to find a 130-gal tank for the same price as a 75-gal tank. Having a larger tank does have some advantages for a large number of Salmon; more room to swim, more Oxygen reserve and a lower percentage nitrite and nitrate. But it makes it a lot harder to catch the Salmon when it's time to release them to the Clinton River Watershed.



All our tanks have three sides covered with insulated boards. These help maintain the lower temperatures for the eggs and later, the Alevin, Fry and Parr. Temperatures for the eggs are held between 45 and 47 degrees. With the Salmon swimming, temps are maintained between 48 and 52 degrees.

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Chef's Table

Smoked Salmon, and Smoked Salmon Poppers!

This topic is huge at this time of year. Seeing as all of you killed the salmon this year, why not use the stuff starting to get a little weird in the freezer, aka freezer burnt! Save it before this happens. Here is one of the best ways to do smoked salmon!

Brine Ingredients

gallon of water
apples chopped
onion chopped
bunch Green onion chopped
cups of salt
cups brown sugar
cinnamon stick
Cayenne 2-3 tablespoons



I like to boil the brine for about 45 minutes on low to get those flavors working hard. Then cut the heat and chill the brine. For a fast chill add ice. Once chilled down cold add your salmon filets. Brine these in the cold solution for around 12-24 hours fully submerged. After the time is up, take the salmon out of the brine and rinse the fillets under cold water

Prep your smoker for your salmon, using apple, cherry, or maple chips. Any of those woods will work and tastes nice. Slow smoke at about 150 degrees for 3 hours. Then I like to crank to around 175 degrees for the last hour.

During the smoking process, use a brush to baste with a mixture of 1 cup of cheap bourbon, 1 cup of maple syrup, 1 cup of brown sugar, and a dash of cayenne to your taste. Mix all these items together. If necessary, add some water to thin it out, but younwill want to keep it at a slight pasty consistency. Every 45 mins brush your salmon with the mix-ture.

When done let your salmon cool. Enjoy as you would like.

Salmon Poppers

A fun thing to do with your smoked salmon (if your trying to use it up) is make jalapeno poppers out of it. Just take some smoked salmon and mash it up. Take 1 bar of cream cheese, 3 tablespoons of garlic powder, 1 tablespoon of cayenne, 3 tablespoons of minced dehydrated onions, 3 tablespoons of onion powder, 1 tablespoon of cracked black pepper, and 1 cup of sour cream. Finally mash all these ingredients together until mixed well!

Take 6 jalapeños (or how many ever it will take), cut the stem off and halve the jalapeños. You can use a spoon to shave out the membrane and seeds. Now take the cream cheese filling you made and fill the halved jalapeños. After all the halves are filled take a strip of bacon and wrap the whole jalapeño. Wrap every halve! Lay all out on sheet tray and turn oven on at 350. Cook for about 45 mins to an hour. Remove and enjoy your salmon jalapeño poppers!

I hope to get back into the swing of things with the fishing group seeing it was a family to me that I felt super accepted at such a young age. 

The entry fee for each tournament will be \$20 / boat. Entry fees will be collected at the weigh-in. This fee includes lunch that will be provided for all captains and crew at the weigh-in.

There will NOT be captains' meetings before the start of the tournaments. Registrations can be made by text message or phone call to Bob Feisel (248-765-2504) or by email to (<u>fishon2153@gmail.com</u>). The following information must be provided: Captain's name, captain's cell phone number, boat name, names of crew members, and whether or not the captain wants to participate in the Big Fish bet. It is preferred, out of courtesy, that all registrations are received before 9 pm on the Thursday prior to any given tournament. However, entries will be accepted up to the start of the tournament. There will be a roll call on VHF channel 72 within approximately 1 hour after the start of each tournament. Failure to reply to the roll call by radio or cell phone will result in a 5 point deduction

Fish Calls will be conducted on VHF channel 72 during each tournament. All boats must answer all fish calls directly or through relay with a fellow skipper, or via phone call to the port captain or tournament director, within 15 minutes after a fish call. Failure to answer a fish call will result in a 5 point deduction for each missed fish call. Captains are asked to report only those fish that they believe will count towards their score (salmon or trout species that are at least 19" long or weigh at least 3 pounds).

The Big Fish bet will be \$20 / boat. All money collected will be awarded as follows:

- 50% biggest salmon
- 25% biggest steelhead
- 25% biggest lake trout

If no fish is weighed for a given species, the prize winner will be determined by a random draw.

The complete tournament rules are posted on the DAS website, under the heading "SOTY TOURNAMENTS". Looking forward to a great season. And thank you to the skippers who have volunteered this year to be our Port Captains in 2021.

Tips 'n Tricks..... Some Cold Facts

As one who needs to be convinced of the convenience of a garage refrigerator. Whether you have one already or are thinking about getting one, here's how to help it perform its best. Understand the basics

In a non-climate-controlled garage, refrigerators struggle. Excessive heat forces them to work extra hard, resulting in high electric bills and early failure. Freezing temperatures make your refrigerator think it doesn't need to work, letting frozen things thaw and refrigerated items freeze. Humidity is also an issue, as it can cause rust on the coils. The ideal way to keep your garage refrigerator running at peak performance is to condition the garage air. However, this gets expensive and involves insulating the garage. You could frame up, insulate, and condition a small space within the garage, but that's not very practical and there are easier options. Keep things cool

If your garage is hot, over 100 degrees F, set up a fan to increase airflow over your fridge's cooling coils. Just make sure the air is moving across and around the back of the fridge. If humidity is an issue, set up a dehumidifier. if your garage is also your workshop, clean up sawdust daily and make sure it does not build up on your refrigerator's coils.

Fridge heaters

In cold climates, you need to heat the air around the fridge's thermostat. One way to do this is to install a heating coil around the cost less than \$50. Another option is to put a metal clamp-on work lamp near the fridge' with an incandescent light bulb aimed at the thermostat. Stock smart

Every time you open and close the fridge door, the air is sucked out and replaced. Keep your garage refrigerator well stocked. The cooled items inside help cool the new air, preventing the fridge from working too hard. But do not fill it too full. This can block the blower, preventing cold Air from circulating efficiently. *Courtesy of the familyhandyman.com*

2021 AOTY Rules

1. All participating DAS members must be up to date on their DAS membership dues. A grace period of 1 month late is allowed. Example 6/19 is good until 7/31/21.

2. To be eligible for AOTY points for an event you must contact the event chairperson and register your name and pay a \$10 entry fee prior to the event start time or call in to say you are participating and will pay the entry fee at the weigh-in. Even if you do not catch anything you must still pay the entry fee.

3. Each event will have a start and stop time posted by the event chairperson, along with meeting and weigh-in location posted before each event. Contact the event chairperson or look at the DAS web site or monthly Fishin'-Tales newsletter.

4. POINTS will be given to all event participants for AOTY. To determine your standing for the event, scoring will be: 5 points per fish, plus total weight of catch. The winner of the event based upon the scoring will be awarded one point. Two points will be awarded to the second-place finisher based upon their score and this continues for all participants. Twenty-five points will be assigned to all participants that did not weigh a fish. If an individual records less than five scores during the AOTY competition, fifty points will be scored for each event until five scores are counted.

5. Overall winner of AOTY will be determined by the individuals best five low scores for the year. For award recognition the DAS will recognize the top three anglers. The angler who earns first place will receive an embroidered jacket or a \$100 gift card.

6. In events where boats are involved, all participants on the boat must be entered in the event. The same scoring method will be used for each individual regardless of the event. For scoring purposes it is imperative that each angler on the boat keep track of each fish they catch.

7. All events will have a voluntary \$10 per person big fish pool. Each person must commit to the big fish pool by paying in advance or by notifying the chairperson that you will pay at he weigh-in prior to weighing your catch. Entry in the Big Fish pool is not mandatory to compete in any event. Big Fish will be determined by length or weight of target species per event. Big fish pool will be awarded as follows: first place fish 50% of Big Fish pool, second place fish 30%, and third place fish 20%. In case of a tie longest of the 2 or heaviest of the 2 will get paid out.

8. All events have a posted target species along with the maximum quantity of fish to be weighed or measured by length to determine the top catches of an event.

January 30th Ice Outing at Metro Beach Day Sail Ramp

The first 2021 AOTY outing is moved to Saturday, January 30. There is not enough ice to safely venture out from the Metro Beach Day Sail Ramp this coming Saturday so I am hoping there will be enough ice formed in the next two weeks to allow us to go out on the 30th. Everything else remains unchanged: Meet at the Metro Beach Day Sail Ramp at 0700. Fish until noon and come to the

weigh-in at the Day Sail Ramp by 12:15. Scoring will be best five perch "by length" to determine your AOTY score. Ties will be determined by "total weight of your five fish". Metropolitan Beach is a managed facility and there is a fee to enter. The 2020 rates were "annual pass" \$40 (seniors \$29) and day pass \$10. I do not know if these rates have changed for 2021 or not. Just be aware there is a fee to enter.

There will be a \$10 fee per person to participate in all AOTY events in 2021. This will cover your entry fee and weigh-in lunch. The \$10 Big Fish pool is totally voluntary and you need not enter Big Fish to participate in any AOTY event. 2021 AOTY Rules have been revised and are included at the end of this



message. Port Captain for Metro Beach is Dan Chisholm. Please contact me with questions and to enter this event. Please note: It's a lot easier on the port captain if you register early as opposed to calling in the morning of the event.

I can be reached on my cell 586 530 9171. Text message is best because I do not hear well and text should give me the proper spelling of your name, your phone number, event entry (\$10) and/or Big Fish entry. 2021 AOTY Rules follow at the end of this message.

In the event January 30 ice conditions are not safe (no ice is safe but you know what I mean) we can still meet at Metro Beach Day Sail Ramp at 0700 and determine if another location (canal or DNR port entry) will be available to fish. The Selfridge DNR ramp often is frozen over early and there can be decent fishing there. Dan

Sea Grant surveys document impact of COVID-19 on Michigan's charter fishing industry

Preliminary results show revenues were down over \$6 million from 2019,

but fishing was beginning to bounce back by late summer.

This year has been a hard one for many small businesses, and Michigan's charter fishing industry is no exception. In addition to dealing with high water levels and the usual ups and downs of weather patterns and fish populations, charter captains had to contend with COVID-19, the infectious disease caused by novel coronavirus, and related restrictions. Michigan Sea Grant conducted a series of surveys on Michigan's charter fleet during 2020, and preliminary results reveal the impact of the pandemic.

Spring fishery shut down

During the early part of the 2020 season, the fishery was effectively shut down. Some of the captains who were hit the hardest were those who focused on spring fisheries for walleye and steelhead. Due to the timing of the stay-at-home order and restriction on motorized boating, captains who focused only on spring fishing lost their entire season.

By the end of June, 32% of captains had not taken a single charter fishing trip during 2020. On average, captains were down a total of 15 trips during the early part of the 2020 season. When restrictions were relaxed later in the season, many captains expressed concern regarding guidance that left captains and customers unsure of the legality and safety of operating a charter fishing business. Charter fishing provisions from Michigan DNR were updated in August to clarify that charter boats could legally operate even if social distancing was not possible onboard, so long as masks are worn.

Some recovery

With clarified and relaxed restrictions later in the fishing season, many captains saw their trip numbers recover to some extent. Captains who responded to our October survey reported 5.3 fewer trips during the late season (July-October) in 2020 vs. 2019. However, we also found that captains who were hard hit during the early part of the season were less likely to take our October survey. When accounting for this we estimated that the average captain lost 6.7 trips during the late season in addition to losing 14.8 trips during the early season (March-June).

Due to declining trip numbers, revenues from charter fees also declined substantially. The average captain lost \$10,711 in revenue during the 2020 season, which means that Michigan's charter fishing industry as a whole lost \$6.05 million in charter fees this year. Due to ripple effects and economic multipliers this has a much greater impact on coastal communities, but the old equations don't necessarily hold up in 2020 because other businesses like hotels and restaurants were often impacted by different restrictions than the charter industry.



Industry is resilient

Although this was a very challenging year, survey results also speak to the resilience of the industry. When asked about their five-year plans, 8% of captains planned to sell their current boat. Thirteen percent planned to quit the business altogether. Although this may sound like a high number, previous surveys from 2002 and 2011 found that 18 to 21% of captains plan to quit during "normal" years. Even so, our October survey revealed that most captains are cautious about expanding their operations any time soon. For example, previous surveys found 14% of captains planning to buy a bigger boat and this declined to 4% in 2020.

Uncertainty has been the one constant in 2020, and while there is some cause for optimism in 2021 there is still much uncertainty. Some captains were seeing increased bookings toward the end of the year, with 4% of captains reporting that bookings for next season were 25-50% above what they expected at this time of year. However, 34% reported a 25-75% decline and 14% reported a 100% decline in bookings. The remaining 48% reported that bookings for 2021 are about what they would expect.

As captains are wondering what next year will bring and dealing with revenue shortfalls from 2020, it is worth mentioning that \$300 million in federal funding from the CARES Act was specifically dedicated to assistance for marine fisheries participants, including charter boat operators. Under Section 12005, many states and territories were allocated from \$1 million to \$50 million, but Michigan was left out because Great Lakes fishery assistance was not included. As Congress is currently debating a second round of stimulus funding, it is possible that future funding might help to alleviate some of the financial woes experienced by Michigan charter operators.
