GIVING MATTERS!

Dear Good Shepherd Family,

2023 started with the large deodar cedar between the Memorial Garden and the classrooms falling on Martin Luther King Day. There are pictures in this newsletter. We called
a tree company, and they were able to remove it that day. The cost was \$2500.00. We
have had a roofer out. We know there is minor damage to the classroom roof and the
roof over the walkway, however, we are waiting on an estimate from the company. We
are so grateful it fell on a holiday and was able to be removed when no children were on
campus! We used dedicated funds that were in Campus Maintenance to cover the cost.
We can not make a decision whether or not to turn into the insurance until we have the
roof estimate. I dread to think what a fifth claim would do to our insurance premiums upon renewal in April...

We were able to get the sanctuary heating fixed for only \$569.00. That expense came out of general funds. The three AC condenser units were placed this month and the cage around them was finished. Those costs came out of designated funds.

January is the month when our subscriptions to QuickBooks, and QuickBooks Payroll (\$1074.) renew and we ran low on stamps and had to purchase stamps, so our expenses were high. The numbers below look really good – but I have to tell you \$5480.48 of the income is for February's rent that came in early. I won't be surprised if next month we are not in the negative a large amount. Continue to pray for our church and for its financial health. Thank you for your continued financial support.



"Sea of Tranquility" by Emily St. John Mandele



The award-winning, best-selling author of *Station Eleven* and *The Glass Hotel* returns with a novel of art, time travel, love, and plague that takes the reader from Vancouver Island in 1912 to a dark colony on the moon five hundred years later, unfurling a story of humanity across centuries and space.
