### **CLOSER TO THE HEART OF JESUS**

preaching text: Luke 10:25-37

This week it became legal for churches to endorse political parties and candidates. We won't lose our tax exempt status like we would have in the past. I want to assure you that is not going to happen. I will never tell you who to vote for.

My sermon today is not political. It is about Jesus. It is also about us because whether we are going to follow Jesus' example or not is up to us.

I like to think my religion affects all areas of my life, including politics. In case there was any question whatsoever in terms of contemporary issues what is right and what is wrong Jesus is very clear here. For some of us, we will hear Jesus' words and take them to heart. And, I imagine, there will be those who will dismiss his words as impractical because it goes so against your politics. It is interesting how we can have different reactions to the same Bible story.

Today we hear about someone who was not afraid to help. Jesus tells this story after an expert in the Law asks Jesus how he can get to eternal life. But, says Luke, this expert in the Law wanted "to justify himself." That's an interesting phrase, isn't it? He wanted to justify himself and so he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?"

There are 3 basic attitudes about life in this great story that say a lot about a person. First, we have the lawyer who asked Jesus what he must do to inherit eternal life. His attitude was basically: "What's in it for me?" Think about his question to Jesus, "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" He's not asking what he can do to build a better world. He's not asking even what he can do to be a better person. All he's interested in is finding out what he must do to get into Heaven.

It's an increasing reality of our complex society where there are so many real needs. We need to see that because we are connected to one another in God's family, they are really our problems. So the first attitude we see: What's in it for me? The second attitude: Not my problem.

These are the basic problems I see with the direction we are heading in today. Medicaid benefits for people living in abject poverty are being cut so we can give a \$4 trillion tax cut to the billionaires. There is something profoundly evil about the richest man in the world taking away food and medicine from the poorest among us. If we hear Jesus' words and think these things are ok, we are fooling ourselves!

Then there is the Samaritan. His attitude is: "What can I do to help?"

Jews and Samaritans despised each other. And that's significant, of course. It does make it even more remarkable that he helped him. The Samaritan was a foreigner. How have we been treating foreigners lately? ICE has a bigger budget than the IRS now . People are being rounded up, caged, and sent to the other side of the world. South Sudan? ICE was supposed to be picking up just criminals. Instead there have been instances of innocent brown people being indiscriminately shipped out of our country without any rights.

No matter what else he saw, the most important thing was that this foreigner was programmed to see someone in need. Whoever it was, here was someone in need and he responded. He simply acted and did what needed to be done. Thank God that there are people like that. There are people like that here today.

Three attitudes. Where do you stand? Which dominates your life? What's in it for me? Not my problem? Or, what can I do to help?

# Scripture Reading: Luke 10:25-37

The first question the priest and Levite asked was, "If I stop to help this man, what will happen to me?" But the good Samaritan reversed the question: "If I do not stop to help this man, what will happen to him?"—Martin Luther King Jr.



Thomas Merton (1915–1968) was an American Trappist monk, writer, theologian, mystic, poet, social activist and scholar of comparative religion. And a prolific writer. He has an interesting take on the Good Samaritan. Here's what he writes: "Let us remember that while to us all Samaritans are Good Samaritans, it was not so to those who first heard the parable. In their eyes all Samaritans were, by the very fact, bad. Indeed, that was why a Samaritan had to be the subject of the parable: since it was necessary for the hearers to realize that at least one Samaritan could be a good one."

The parable of the Good Samaritan can be found in today's reading. There are many lessons that can be drawn from Jesus' parable, but Merton points us to one that is often overlooked. The kindness, generosity and compassion found in this story came from a person who was commonly thought to be devoid of these positive qualities.

The Good Samaritan was not one of "us." He was one of "them"! Shocking!

This leads us all to reflect on who might be one of "them" from our point of view. Someone beyond our religious, political, ethnic and cultural experience (think music, tattoos, piercings, for example)?

Get this point? One of the lessons of this parable is about our prejudices we don't even realize we have. The Good Samaritan is a story about how one of "them" helped one of "us."

Ask yourself about persons, ethnicities, political perspectives with which and with whom you have trouble. We all have these negativities.

But the fabulous nature of the gospel is that the people who inhabit our negativities are, according to Jesus, our neighbors! And Jesus is on record as saying we should love our neighbors as ourselves!

It's a tall order, isn't it? I know it is for me. But God is faithful and will give me and all of us the courage to realign and redefine who is our neighbor. And when that happens, we have a huge opportunity to put a little love on them, and make their day! Thanks be to God!

# GOSPEL Luke 10:25-37

### The Parable of the Good Samaritan

<sup>25</sup> An expert in the law stood up to test Jesus. <sup>[a]</sup> "Teacher," he said, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" <sup>26</sup> He said to him, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?" <sup>27</sup> He answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind and your neighbor as yourself." <sup>28</sup> And he said to him, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live."

<sup>29</sup> But wanting to vindicate himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" 30 Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and took off, leaving him half dead. <sup>31</sup> Now by chance a priest was going down that road, and when he saw him he passed by on the other side. 32 So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. 33 But a Samaritan while traveling came upon him, and when he saw him he was moved with compassion. 34 He went to him and bandaged his wounds, treating them with oil and wine. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. 35 The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, 'Take care of him, and when I come back I will repay you whatever more you spend.' 36 Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" 37 He said, "The one who showed him mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."
