June Financials



Dear Good Shepherd Family,

There have been no major unexpected expenses this month. Our giving was down - BIA's rent for June came in the last week of May which accounts for most of it. We have spent \$11,508.15 than we have taken in year-to-date. Frankly I am worried as we head into summer, traditionally a lower giving time of the year. We still have our Synod proposed benevolence of \$1,179.71 for the first half of the year that I should have paid in June, and really should pay this next month. There just wasn't sufficient funds to pay that and pay our salaries, so the synod had to wait.

Please continue to pray for the financial health of our church. The council is looking into a couple of options to help including investigating receiving Employee Retention Credit under the CARES act (any money from that won't be realized for months from now).


GSLC Summer Book Club


> With his family's future now entangled in a stunningly beautiful old castle on the coast of Clare, Conor undertakes a mammoth project, and in so doing, he

Twenty-one-year-old Tanner Quimby needs a place to live. Preferably one where she can continue sitting around in sweatpants and playing video games nineteen hours a day. Since she has no credit or money to speak of, her options are limited, so when an opportunity to work as a live-in caregiver for an elderly woman falls into her lap, she takes it.



One slip on the rug. That's all it took for Louise Wilt's daughter to demand that Louise have a full-time nanny living with her. Never mind that she can still walk fine, finish her daily crossword puzzle, and pour the two fingers of vodka she drinks every afternoon. Bottom line -- Louise wants a caretaker even less than Tanner wants to be one.

The two start off their living arrangement happily ignoring each other until Tanner starts to notice things—weird things. Like, why does Louise keep her garden shed locked up tighter than a prison? And why is the local news fixated on the suspect of one of the biggest jewelry heists in American history who looks eerily like Louise? And why does Louise suddenly appear in her room, with a packed bag at 1 a.m. insisting that they leave town immediately?

Thus begins the story of a not-to-be-underestimated elderly woman and an aimless young woman who—if they can outrun the mistakes of their past—might just have the greatest adventure of their lives.





The song adapts Jesus' parable about the 10 virgins in Matthew 25:1-13 who took lamps with them in the evening to meet the bridegroom. However, the bridegroom delayed and they fell asleep. They awakened at midnight, when they heard a shout that the bridegroom was coming, but their lamps had gone out. Only 5 virgins had also brought containers of oil to keep their lamps trimmed and burning while they accompanied the bridegroom to the wedding. The other 5 virgins left to purchase oil and so missed accompanying the bridegroom when he came. Gordon and Diane Fake's home was packed with 21 OWLS on June 19th. We have a record breaker people! The Rookie Roster rounded up Bill and Dana Biggs, Marlene Beasley, Ken and Susan Berg, and Susan Linder. A dinner plate suggestion aided the balancing of desserts. Our generous Hooties contributed a \$54 donation.

Gordon the Narrator expanded our knowledge while Captain Diane kept us on a timely course reliving their 2020 Moroccan get away. Casablanca blinded us with a sea of all white buildings. Morocco is a mix of cultures and traditions. The three main languages spoken are French, Arabic and Berber. Berber wasn't adopted as an official language until 2011. Sometimes a young man who has left the country and has become successful elsewhere will return and fund the building of a brand new mosque as a gift for his home village.

Many (2,127) films have been made in Morocco. "The Ten Commandments", "Lawrence of Arabia", "Game of Thrones", "Black Hawk Down", "Gladiator", and some "James Bond" movies to name a few.

The popular king was celebrating his 20th reign. Every business is required to display a picture of the king. Plural marriages are not legal unless the first wife is unable to bear children. Her permission allows the second marriage. For some Moroccans a wedding is celebrated for a duration of 5-7 days. Loads of money and gobs of gold are necessary.

Homes called riads aging 500-700 years old have been converted into hotels. The "Blue City" of Chefchaouen looked like you were under water in the city swimming pool. The gorgeous, intricate Islamic art tiles rely heavily on geometry with Arabic texts which lined door entrances and the building's interiors. Colorful rugs and woven fabrics and pillows embellished rooms. A Tajean meal of vegetables and meat that is cooked in a lidded pot over charcoal is consumed often. Olives of numerous varieties are eaten at each meal.

Storks were EVERYWHERE for it was the season of love. Babies were tended to in huge, tall nests built on top of buildings and flat boards provided by the people. Baby blankets were not visible. We enjoyed Diane's photography of numerous cats and the cute donkeys. Buuuuut the SNAKES we could have done without. Diane is one brave serpent sister who got close and personal.

It was March of 2020 and near the trip's end when two ladies were awakened by a son's phone call at 3 am. He told them they must leave immediately because the president was closing the US border in 24 hours. COVID! Forty-five minutes later it was noted that a "slight" error had been made. Americans would be allowed to come home. The son who had called obtained tickets anyway and the ladies flew home a week before the end of the trip. Later ALL flight reservations had been cancelled. Could the remaining get a flight out? The Fake's heads spun with six new reservations and six cancellations in 6 days due to various countries closing their borders. So, the group continued on with their trip not knowing just how or when they would be able to fly home.

The Casablanca Hotel was closed on their last day. Only grocery stores and pharmacies were allowed to be open due to COVID's shut down. Their guide "bribed" the clerk for rooms and dinner for the group since they had no place to go. The airport ordeal would take an ENTIRE newsletter to explain. It was a long trip home to LA but without the souvenir of COVID. And the two ladies who made it out early with tickets obtained by one son? They will always remember their \$4,000 flight home!

Brian Sturgeon Swings a Sledgehammer!



On June 22, the public was invited to be a part of the demolition process by taking a sledge hammer to a wall as UCPCC takes ownership of their 35,000 square foot campus! Nearly 70 years in the making the new campus will unlock the potential of students with disabilities to expand their development goals. The Sturgeons became involved with UCP because their son, Brian, had cerebral palsy.

Children as well as adults joined **Brian in wielding a sledgehammer** that evening symbolizing shattering limitations and breaking through barriers for folks with disabilities. Brian represented not only those with special needs but the entire Sturgeon family as they have played a major role in the advancements toward the acknowledgement of people with special needs and the work toward inclusion.

Back in the early 1960's McDonald's began to play a big role as an event sponsor when a telethon was held under the direction of **Good Shepherd member Art Bender**. The telethon educated the audience about cerebral palsy and informed them of the services available. Others were held throughout the years.


In 1973 the Lanterman Act was passed by the state and funds were made available to serve people with developmental disabilities. Those disabled were described in the legislation as having cerebral palsy, mental retardation and epilepsy. As a result of the Lanterman Act, and in order to access those funds, a coalition of six Central Valley counties was formed and UCP became UCP of Central California. Ed and Vonny together with about four other couples were founders of this new affiliate! They eventually held various offices on the local, state and National levels.

During that time the Sturgeons moved to Visalia to take advantage of a pilot program which included children with cerebral palsy, who were blind or who had emotional challenges. For the first time, their children all attended the same school and learned by experience what "inclusion" was all about. It was a huge emotional dynamic for their entire family and one of the best decisions they ever made. Fresno Unified eventually developed a program similar to Visalia's project so the family moved back to Fresno.

In the 1980's the first Americans With Disabilities Act was passed by Congress. Ed and Vonny had the honor and privilege of testifying before Congress on its behalf. Congressman Tony Coelho sponsored that historic bill and when President Lyndon Johnson signed it, the huge audience was shouting "Tony, Tony, Tony!" Vonny said it was so thrilling to know that one of the Valley's own made this possible.

In 2002 Brian served as a torch bearer for the Winter Olympics inspiring persons with disabilities to participate in every kind of sport! Along the way the Sturgeon family has been recognized with State and National awards in the field of disabilities. Vonny says the zenith of her career was being asked to speak at the 70th Anniversary of the National UCP organization. She got a standing ovation!

The Sturgeon family has been a vital part of the UCP Community for 65 of those 70 years. It began in 1954 with one program and 15 children. Today UCPCC is a community without boundaries, unlocking the potential of more than 1,100 children and adults alike with a broad range of disabilities. Vonny said the family thinks that Brian is a true example of the meaning of inclusion. **Brian has been the key** to the Sturgeon family involvement all these years.
