

### Dear Friends,

My parents are members of Lord of Life Lutheran Church in Surprise, AZ. Their pastor, Pastor Steve, shared the information below. It is about the importance of being together. This is from his article:

"Research shows that attending faith-based services four times per month will add 4-14 years of life expectancy. From a purely pragmatic point of view, that's reason enough to belong to a faith-based community. Increase your life expectancy by 10%? That's a big deal! Think of all the 'wonder drugs' that claim to help you live longer. And, of course, we don't just want to live longer, we want to live better. We want to be happy, health and whole.

How does belonging to a faith-based community help with that?

Well, let's think about what it means to belong. The Oxford English dictionary defines belong as being

- 1. In the right or suitable place and
- 2. comfortable and happy in a particular situation or with a particular group of people

When a person 'belongs', it doesn't mean that his/her situation is necessarily good. Life isn't a bowl of cherries. We experience ups and downs, good times and bad. Ecclesiastes says that there is a time for everything, a time to weep and a time to laugh, a time to mourn and a time to dance.

Who wants to laugh and dance alone? And who wants to weep and mourn alone? Life is better when we experience it together. <u>We can be comfortable in</u> <u>any situation</u> when we know that we are not alone; when we know that we belong to God and to a community of faith. Our sense of belonging changes as we age. Living longer may mean that we outlive our spouse, siblings and friends, the people with whom we have the closest relationship. And then we may withdraw, spending more time at home, alone.

When that happens it's vital for the church to continue reaching-out to renew that sense of belonging. If you notice that someone is absent or alone, here are some things you can do:

offer a ride to church, the store, or medical appointment

invite the person to dinner

call or visit regularly

. sit together during worship and happy hour

 alert the pastors if the person needs a visit, telephone minister or eucharistic minister

Marines have a saying that I have always like: 'we started together, we finish together.' In other words, we take care of each other and leave no one behind. We belong together.

That's a good motto for the church, as well. We belong to God and to a community of faith. We all want to live better, longer. Happy, healthy and whole. Together.

The only major expense we had this month was the air conditioning repair and finishing the electrical repair. These came out of designated funds, so they do not appear in our expenses report and did not impact the budget adversely. In August we will have \$6,561 that will have to come out of the budget. Two classroom air conditioners have gone out. They are on backorder and will not be in until mid to late August. Enjoy the rest of your summer and see you at VBS.



### The Unsinkable Greta James Saturday, August 6 at 9:30 am – Community Center

Greta James's rise to indie stardom was hard-won. Before she graced magazine covers and played to sold out venues, she spent her girlhood practicing her guitar in the family garage, full of big dreams and determination. Her first fan was her mother, Helen, who always encouraged Greta to follow her heart. But her father, Conrad, was less supportive; he saw only a precarious road ahead for his daughter, and always pushed her to make more practical choices.



Greta has spent her life trying to prove him wrong. And she's succeeded beyond even her own wildest dreams. But a week after her mother's sudden death, and just before the launch of her high-stakes sophomore album, she completely falls apart on stage. The footage quickly goes viral, and she stops playing, her career suddenly in the exact kind of jeopardy her father always predicted.

Months later, Greta--still heartbroken and humiliated and trying to find a way back to her music--reluctantly agrees to accompany Conrad on the week-long Alaskan cruise her parents had booked to celebrate their fortieth anniversary. It could be their last chance to heal old wounds and forge a new relationship in the wake of such loss. But the trip will also prove to be a voyage of discovery for them both, as well as for Ben Wilder, a historian also struggling with a major upheaval in his life.

As Greta works to build back her confidence, and Ben confronts an uncertain future, they find themselves relying on each other to make sense of life's difficult, unexpected choices. In the end, Greta must face the biggest challenge of all: can she find a way to listen to the song within her while also making peace with those who love her? -- Powell's Books

We are reimagining Sunday mornings for youth and children. Children's church will continue to be available during the sermon portion of worship, featuring some kidfocused ministry moments and an





### WHAT IS OUR CHRISTIAN VIEW?

My second husband, tried to enlist during the Vietnam War years. His eyesight was so poor he was not accepted. Later in life was a gun owner and an NRA member. He participated in black powder competitions where members would go through a scene mockup competing for time and accuracy. I once visited a gun range with him and fired a rifle at clay pigeons and a target. He was surprised at my accuracy--my vision was better than 20/20 in my younger days!

Fast forward to a year after his death in 1995. I was left with a collection of rifles, handguns and a gun safe. I subsequently sold most of the guns through one of the gun shops.

However one item was an assault rifle. He had owned it for just a couple of years. Assault rifles flooded the gun market after the Cold War ended. Russian and other countries wanted to raise money and sold them to any market


What to do with an assault rifle? Even before mass shootings I could not in good conscience keep OR sell it. I had learned from him how destructive they could be and how they differed from other guns. Not only did I not want to have it in the house, I didn't want to think that anyone else could ever use it against innocent people.

I called my brother who has a machine shop in southern California. "Can you get rid of this for me? Can you destroy it somehow with the equipment in your shop?" "Sure," he replied. "Bring it down. I can cut it apart so it can't be used." A few weeks later it was destroyed. There is no good reason to have such destructive tools all over the US.

This is MY Christian view "Thou shall not kill". Having a gun for protection is fine. Using a rifle to hunt, supplementing family food needs is useful. Using an item for mass destruction in peacetime is NOT FINE. Pastor Ted said one Sunday we are "to bear, share and care"; to bear each other's burdens, to share our basic needs with others in some way; to care for the lame and ill--not to kill.

This is my opinion and my testimony. I don't want to hear about another mass shooting. I am in despair-there's nothing left to say, nothing left to talk about. Let's not wait until there's nothing left.....

I hired a plumber to help me restore an old farmhouse, and after he had just finished a rough first day on the job: a flat tire made him lose an hour of work, his electric drill quit and his ancient one ton truck refused to start. We passed the tree and my curiosity got the better of me. I asked him about what I had seen him do earlier. 'Oh, that's my trouble tree,' he replied 'I know I can't help having troubles on the job, but one thing's for sure, those troubles don't belong in the house with my wife and the children... So I just hang them up on the tree every night when I come home and ask God to take care of them. Then in the morning I pick them up again.' 'Funny thing is,' he smiled,' when I come out in the morning to pick 'em up, there aren't nearly as many as I remember hanging up the night before.

Hang your troubles up on your tree, folks, before you walk in your front door. I promise you, Heavenly Father has your back even when you think it's broken.




