
GSLC BOOK CLUB—October's Book







Honduras Mission Trip! Dec 2024

Hello friends,

We are gearing up to build our **22nd home** in Roatan! Over the last 11.5 years, God has used this network to bless 21 families with secure homes. We have a team headed back in Dec to build a home for the Monge family.

Nolvia is a single mom with two children: Sirey (5 1/2, first grade) & Axel (3). Her husband of six years abandoned the family two years ago. Nolvia was able to complete high school, which is quite rare in Honduras. She currently works as a cook in a restaurant, making \$22 a day.

Nolvia also takes care of her mom, Martha, and her younger brother, Ronald (15). They both live with her, and Ronald works at any job he can get to help with family expenses. He dropped out of school in 6th grade to work. Nolvia has worked hard to purchase land for a home, and she is doing her best to provide a future for her family. Our desire is to bless them with a secure home. I included a photo of the family below, and I attached a photo of a recently completed home (we are now including paint on all homes).

We are inviting you to partner with our team once again! 
BULA Ministries & *DwellingsNow
































Memorial Garden Committee

September's excursion landed the OWLS at Gordon and Diane Fake's home. Guests brought an array of dishes to share upon the warm, fall themed tables. Business noted a heads-up on CA ID's and ending landline phone service. It was unanimous that \$50 would be donated to the Oktoberfest for walkie talkies.

The Turkish carpet souvenir anchored the audience as we followed the Fake's to Ankara, Turkey with its population of 5.5 million. The history of Turkey goes back thousands of years. We were shown slides of ancient artifacts from the Museum of Anatolian Civilizations.

At a local art studio, Gordon and Diane each made a piece of artwork by laying paper on top of a pan of water with colored oil floating on top that they swirled with a stick to make a unique design. This is called paper marbling or Ebru. We expect to see their work framed the next time they host.

Next we saw slides of the ancient site of Hattusas, the capital of the great Hittite Kingdom that ruled from 1750 to 1200 BC.

In Cappadocia, the Fakes visited the legendary geological formations known as "fairy chimneys." They walked through the Goreme Open-Air Museum where they were able to visit five ancient churches carved out of the rocks known for their colorful frescoes. They even visited a family that actually lives in a home carved out of a huge rock. Instead of a balloon ride, Whirling Dervishes mesmerized them that evening. The trance-like whirling meditation called a sema frees the dervishes to reach God.

The next stop was Istanbul where the Fakes visited the famous Hagia Sophia which was a Christian Church for a thousand years, then became a Mosque, a museum and in 2020 again a mosque. Next they visited the Topkapi Palace which housed 25 sultans over a span of nearly 600 years. It is the world's oldest and largest surviving palace with one of the world's richest museums.

A flight took them to the next destination of Ephesus, the best preserved Greco-Roman city in Asia. Our guest speaker Carolyn Linn filled us in on the Biblical significance while Gordon showed slides of their walk down the main street. The most famous ruin in Ephesus is the Library of Celsus. Only the front wall of the library stands which once held 12,000 scrolls. A LOT of neutered cats are fed there. Visitors maneuver around and over the sleeping felines.

We look forward to seeing the second half of this trip the next time the Fakes host. For you see, sometimes as many as 4,000 slides are taken on one trip and many hours of preparation are required. And with that we thank the Fakes IMMENSELY!


