Genesis 50:15-21

Joseph Forgives His Brothers

¹⁵ Realizing that their father was dead, Joseph's brothers said, "What if Joseph still bears a grudge against us and pays us back in full for all the wrong that we did to him?" ¹⁶ So they approached^[a] Joseph, saying, "Your father gave this instruction before he died, ¹⁷ 'Say to Joseph: I beg you, forgive the crime of your brothers and the wrong they did in harming you.' Now therefore please forgive the crime of the

servants of the God of your father." Joseph wept when they spoke to him. ¹⁸ Then his brothers also wept, ^[b] fell down before him, and said, "We are here as your slaves." ¹⁹ But Joseph said to them, "Do not be afraid! Am I in the place of God? ²⁰ Even though you intended to do harm to me, God intended it for good, in order to preserve a numerous people, as he is doing today. ²¹ So have no fear; I myself will provide for you and your little ones." In this way he reassured them, speaking kindly to them.

SECOND LESSON


Romans 14:1-12

Do Not Judge Another

14 Welcome those who are weak in faith^[a] but not for the purpose of quarreling over opinions. ² Some believe in eating anything, while the weak eat only vegetables. ³ Those who eat must not despise those who abstain, and those who abstain must not pass judgment on those who eat, for God has welcomed them. ⁴ Who are you to pass judgment on slaves of another? It is before their own lord that they stand or fall. And they will be upheld, for the Lord^[b] is able to make them stand.

⁵ Some judge one day to be better than another, while others judge all days to be alike. Let all be fully convinced in their own minds. ⁶ Those who observe the day, observe it for the Lord. Also those who eat, eat for the Lord, since they give thanks to God, while those who abstain, abstain for the Lord and give thanks to God.

⁷ For we do not live to ourselves, and we do not die to ourselves. ⁸ If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord; so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's. ⁹ For to this end Christ died and lived again, so that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living.



¹⁰ Why do you pass judgment on your brother or sister? Or you, why do you despise your brother or sister? For we will all stand before the judgment seat of God. ^[c] ¹¹ For it is written,

"As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bow to me, and every tongue shall give praise to [d] God."

¹² So then, each one of us will be held accountable. [e]

GOSPEL

Matthew 18:21-35

Forgiveness

Then Peter came and said to him, "Lord, if my brother or sister sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?" ²² Jesus said to him, "Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times.

The Parable of the Unforgiving Servant

Matthew 18:21-22, NRSV

...how often should I forgive?

²³ "For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves. ²⁴ When he began the reckoning, one who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to him, ²⁵ and, as he could not pay, the lord ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions and payment to be made. ²⁶ So the slave fell on his knees before him, saying, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.' ²⁷ And out of pity for him, the lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt. ²⁸ But that same slave, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow slaves who owed him a hundred denarii, and seizing him by the throat he said, 'Pay what you owe.' ²⁹ Then his fellow slave fell down and pleaded with him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' ³⁰ But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he would pay the debt. ³¹ When his fellow slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. ³² Then his lord summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. ³³ Should you not have

had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?' ³⁴ And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he would pay his entire debt. ³⁵ So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart."

Scripture Reading: Matthew 18:21-35

When you forgive, you in no way change the past — but you sure do change the future. —Bernard Meltzer

Agroup of Americans was on a short-term mission trip to the city of La Entrada in Honduras. They joined several Hondurans visiting the families of schoolchildren. These families were very poor and lacked the money to buy their children school supplies. The Americans sat in the homes of those families, heard about their struggles and made decisions about what kind of financial support they could give them.

A key member of this team was a Honduran man named Kelvin. He taught at a bilingual school and acted as translator for the Americans. On the second day of the trip, he announced that he would have to leave the team because one of his fellow Hondurans had insulted him. This created a huge problem, since the Americans really needed Kelvin's translating abilities.

His colleagues tried to mediate this conflict in English, while one of the Hondurans tried to intercede in Spanish.

Finally, Kelvin said that he would continue his work with the group. "I am a Christian," he said. "I must forgive."

What a simple but profound thought: *I am a Christian ... I must forgive*.

But, as we know, this is easier said than done. What we learn from today's reading in Matthew is that forgiveness *begins as a choice and then becomes a process*. First, we choose to forgive and then the work begins. It is a longer process for some than it is for others, and the process is also affected by the nature of the grievance.

But, when we are able to trust God's role in the process, we will come to the point when we can let go of the power of the grievance to control us, and turn that all over to God. When that happens, forgiveness is complete, and we are free.

Prayers of the People

Let us pray for the whole people of God in Christ Jesus and for all people according to their needs.

Heavenly Father, forgiveness is hard! When we have been wronged, we want to take vengeance on the one who wronged us. Our prisons are full of people who have taken action against people who have done them wrong. But all three of our lessons today tell stories of people who have been wronged. And Jesus' message is clear. We are to forgive. *Lord in your mercy...*

The story of Joseph always touches my heart. He was wronged because he was loved. His brothers thought their father's love was greater for this son of Rachel, Jacob's beloved wife. Perhaps Jacob did show unusual favoritism, but God had a plan out of which God would do a great miracle and make a great nation. *Lord in your mercy...*

We pray for our nation, state and city; our president, governor, mayor and the leaders of the world that all would live in unity and peace. The forgiveness that Joseph showed to his brothers united a nation and prepared it to become God's beacon of hope to a lost world. We can do the same. By our forgiveness we can break the bonds of hatred that can destroy ourselves and other people. Or, as Romans declares, "Who are you to pass judgment on the servant of another? It is before his own master that he stands or falls." Yes, it is before God, that we are judged and either punished or redeemed. Romans continues, "So each of us shall give account of himself to God." Lord in your mercy...

Remember this congregation its pastor and people as we share the love of Jesus. Touch those who have asked for prayer with healing, comfort and forgiveness. We name those among us who have asked for prayer. And for what else do the people of God pray or praise? *Lord in your mercy...*

Peter asked Jesus about forgiveness, wondering how many times we have to forgive someone who wrongs us. Jesus' reply was an infinite number. It is always our job to forgive. In Jesus Christ, God forgave humankind all its transgressions past, present and future. Can we do any less? In the precious blood of Jesus our sins are wiped away; He took our punishment. We must show mercy. Thank you, Lord God, in Jesus' mighty name, we pray. *Amen.*CAROLYN T. LINN





Kingsmen/Kingskids will restart on Wed., Sept. 20th




We will meet at **6:30PM** in Jacobson Hall. There will be a potluck dinner. Everyone is asked to bring a dish to share and plan on having a short bible time.




It's almost here!!
