


Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, Fresno, CA September 20, 2020 Sixteenth Sunday of Pentecost

FIRST LESSON

Jonah 3:10-4:11

New Revised Standard Version

¹⁰ When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed his mind about the calamity that he had said he would bring upon them; and he did not do it.

Jonah's Anger

4 But this was very displeasing to Jonah, and he became angry. ² He prayed to the LORD and said, "O LORD! Is not this what I said while I was still in my own country? That is why I fled to Tarshish at the beginning; for I knew that you are a gracious God and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and ready to relent from punishing. ³ And now, O LORD, please take my life from me, for it is better for me to die than to live." ⁴ And the LORD said, "Is it right for you to be angry?" ⁵ Then Jonah went out of the city and sat down east of the city, and made a booth for himself there. He sat under it in the shade, waiting to see what would become of the city.

⁶The LORD God appointed a bush, ^[a] and made it come up over Jonah, to give shade over his head, to save him from his discomfort; so Jonah was very happy about the bush. ⁷ But when dawn came up the next day, God appointed a worm that attacked the bush, so that it withered. ⁸ When the sun rose, God prepared a

sultry east wind, and the sun beat down on the head of Jonah so that he was faint and asked that he might die. He said, "It is better for me to die than to live."

Jonah Is Reproved

⁹ But God said to Jonah, "Is it right for you to be angry about the bush?" And he said, "Yes, angry enough to die." ¹⁰ Then the LORD said, "You are concerned about the bush, for which you did not labor and which you did not grow; it came into being in a night and perished in a night. ¹¹ And should I not be concerned about Nineveh, that great city, in which there are more than a hundred and twenty thousand persons who do not know their right hand from their left, and also many animals?"

SECOND LESSON

Philippians 1:21-30

²¹ For to me, living is Christ and dying is gain. ²² If I am to live in the flesh, that means fruitful labor for me; and I do not know which I prefer. ²³ I am hard pressed between the two: my desire is to depart and be with Christ, for that is far better; ²⁴ but to remain in the flesh is more necessary for you. ²⁵ Since I am convinced of this, I know that I will remain and continue with all of you for your progress and joy in faith, ²⁶ so that I may share abundantly in your boasting in Christ Jesus when I come to you again.

²⁷ Only, live your life in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ, so that, whether I come and see you or am absent and hear about you, I will know that you are standing firm in one spirit, striving side by side with one mind for the faith of the gospel, ²⁸ and are in no way intimidated by your opponents. For them this is evidence of their destruction, but of your salvation. And this is God's doing. ²⁹ For he has graciously granted you the privilege not only of believing in Christ, but of suffering for him as well— ³⁰ since you are having the same struggle that you saw I had and now hear that I still have.

GOSPEL

Matthew 20:1-16

The Laborers in the Vineyard

20 "For the kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire laborers for his vineyard. ² After agreeing with the laborers for the usual daily wage, [a] he sent them into his vineyard. ³ When he went out about nine o'clock, he saw others standing idle in the marketplace; ⁴ and he said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard, and I will pay you whatever is right.' So they went. 5 When he went out again about noon and about three o'clock, he did the same. ⁶ And about five o'clock he went out and found others standing around; and he said to them, 'Why are you standing here idle all day?' ⁷They said to him, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard.' 8 When evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his manager, 'Call the laborers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and then going to the first.' 9 When those hired about five o'clock came, each of them received the usual daily wage. 10 Now when the first came, they thought they would receive more; but each of them also received the usual daily wage. [5] 11 And when they received it, they grumbled against the landowner, ¹² saying, 'These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat.' 13 But he replied to one of them, 'Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? [d] 14 Take what belongs to you and go; I choose to give to this last the same as I give to you. 15 Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?' [e] 16 So the last will be first, and the first will be last."[f]

"LIFE ISN'T FAIR"

Preaching text: Matthew 20:1-16

Watching the news can often be depressing. That seems to be especially true this year. This week featured the sudden devastation of the Western fires and Hurricane Sally. People in both are left with nothing, their lives suddenly turned upside down. There were people on the news who lost their homes in fires who were just recovering from losing their homes to previous fires. I bet the same is true of some of the Hurricane victims. If you went out and interviewed those who are victims and asked them, "Is life fair?" they'd probably laugh. Or cry. The fact is life is not fair.

It would be great if things always worked out well ... where the good guy gets rewarded and the bad guy gets punished. But that's not the way life always works. How many times have you felt that life is not fair?

In our Bible reading Jesus tells a parable about a landowner who went into the marketplace early in the morning to hire workers, a common practice in rural communities even today. Those hired agreed to be paid the standard wage for a day's work. Three hours later the landowner hired more workers. At noon he hired more workers, then again at 3:00, then again at 5:00. Quitting time was 6:00. At 6:00 he had his foreman line up the workers to be paid. He began with those who had worked only one hour. He paid them for a full day.

Those who had been working since six in the morning thought to themselves, "Wow! If he pays them a full day's wage for working just part of a day, think about how much he's going to pay us!" But when their time came ... they also received the standard wage for one day's work. They were furious! They had worked all day and they were getting exactly the same as those who had just worked one hour. It wasn't fair. The landowner said, "Didn't I pay you what we had agreed on? Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?"

One way to interpret this parable is to realize that it doesn't really matter when someone comes to believe in Jesus, when they come to faith, we all get the same reward. That is, through Jesus we all go to Heaven. It doesn't matter if you went to Sunday School your whole life or if you had a last-minute conversion.

Is that really fair? What about those of us who have been a part of the church our whole lives, who have labored since six in the morning?

If that's true, why not go ahead and live life full throttle doing whatever we want and wait until the last moment of our life to repent? If we get the same reward, why not party like a rock star and tear it up right to the end? The problem is that question assumes that a life of sin is better than a life of faith.

Let me ask you some questions: What would you change about your life if you knew there were no heaven or hell? Would you be less loving towards your family? Would you start cheating on your wife? Would you become dishonest in your business? I don't think so. There are other reasons to maintain your wedding vows, to run your business in an ethical way, and love our families other than the fear of going to hell.

We live virtuous lives not just out of fear, but because if you take a minute to look around, you'll see that the moral life really is the best way to live in this world. It is hard to imagine living life without morals or ethics. Deep down we know a life lived without a moral compass leads only to destruction and dissolution of everything that is good and lasting and ultimately worthwhile in this world. We do the right thing not just out of a fear of hell but because in the long run it is in our best interest and in the interest of those we love.

The fact is none of us deserves the gift of salvation because of what we've done. If God was fair, we'd get what we deserve. That's why we need a Savior. God accepts us as we are, as if we've never done anything wrong. God cleans us up and makes us into a new creation in Christ.

There was a young boy years ago who was a great fan of both Captain Kangaroo and Mister Rogers. The boy faithfully watched both of their television shows. One day it was announced that Mister Rogers would be paying a visit to

the Captain Kangaroo show. The boy was ecstatic. Both of his heroes, together on the same show!


Every morning of the week leading up to the show the boy would ask, "Is it today that Mister Rogers will be on Captain Kangaroo?" Finally, the day arrived. The whole family gathered around the television. There they were, Mister Rogers and Captain Kangaroo, together! The boy watched for a minute, but then, surprisingly, got up and wandered out of the room. Puzzled, his father followed him and asked, "What is it son? Is anything wrong?"

The boy responded, "It's too good. It's just too good."

That's how we should feel about God's grace. It might not be fair, but it is so incomprehensibly good. Life isn't fair. That's tough. God isn't fair. That's grace. It doesn't matter when you come to Jesus. Just come!

Lord, give us courage to persevere. Lord in your mercy...

Remember this congregation, its pastor, and people, as we find new ways to share the love of Jesus. Touch those who have asked for prayer with healing, comfort, renewal, and peace. We pray for those in our congregation who suffer from illness or pain, naming them before you... *Lord in your mercy...*

Lord may your kingdom come on earth as it is in heaven. Thank you for your mercy and steadfast love to all people. In Jesus' mighty name, we pray.






The Lord's Prayer




