²² Thus says the Lord God:

on a high and lofty mountain.


²³ On the mountain height of Israel

2 Corinthians 5:6-17



⁶ So we are always confident; even though we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord— ⁷ for we walk by faith, not by sight. ⁸ Yes, we do have confidence, and we would rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord. ⁹ So whether we are at home or away, we make it our aim to please him. ¹⁰ For all of us must appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each may receive recompense for what has been done in the body, whether good or evil.

The Ministry of Reconciliation

¹¹ Therefore, knowing the fear of the Lord, we try to persuade others; but we ourselves are well known to God, and I hope that we are also well known to your consciences. ¹² We are not commending ourselves to you again, but giving you an opportunity to boast about us, so that you may be able to answer those who boast in outward appearance and not in the heart. ¹³ For if we are beside ourselves, it is for God; if we are in our right mind, it is for you. ¹⁴ For the love of Christ urges us on, because we are convinced that one has died for all; therefore all have died. ¹⁵ And he died for all, so that those who live might live no longer for themselves, but for him who died and was raised for them.

¹⁶ From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; ^[a] even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, ^[b] we know him no longer in that way. ¹⁷ So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!

GOSPEL

Mark 4:26-34

The Parable of the Growing Seed

²⁶ He also said, "The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, ²⁷ and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, he does not know how. ²⁸ The earth produces of itself, first the stalk, then the head, then the full grain in the head. ²⁹ But when the grain is ripe, at once he goes in with his sickle, because the harvest has come."

The Parable of the Mustard Seed

³⁰ He also said, "With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable will we use for it? ³¹ It is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; ³² yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs, and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade."

The Use of Parables

³³ With many such parables he spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it; ³⁴ he did not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything in

private to his disciples.



SERMON

"THE GOSPEL ACCORDING TO YOU"

One of Jesus' favorite teaching tools was telling parables. Parables were little stories with a big point. Jesus would tell these stories. By speaking in parables, each listener could make that story his or her own story through their own experience.

Did you ever wonder why Jesus spoke in parables? Did you ever wonder, why didn't Jesus just come right out and say what he meant? Why did he have to leave behind all these cryptic sayings, loaded with innuendo, instead of a stack of essays like, "How to Be a Good Disciple", "A Brief Definition of the Kingdom of God", or "The Coming Kingdom and You?" But no. Instead, we have this obscure, cryptic, mysterious and at times absurd collection known as Jesus' parables.

One reason Jesus told parables rather than leaving lists for us to learn from is because the stories were compelling enough where people could relate to them. We bring our own experience when we hear a parable. I might hear it differently than you do because I'm not you.

If you think we would have done better had Jesus just left a list of rules, try remembering the last time you sat down and enjoyed reading Leviticus or the first few chapters of Numbers. Jesus' telling parables made it easy to relate to and understand.

As we hear a parable and are swept up in it, the good news can become our own story, our own experience. We relate our experience to the story. We ourselves become a part of the parable. When you take your own experience with God and how you have seen God's love shared in our world you make up your own gospel.

You see, we are mistaken if we think our tradition stems from only the four canonical gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John) that are in the Bible. It's true that not all the gospels made it into the Bible. There is even the Gospel of Judas! But think of all the great saints that have gone before us. As well as "The Gospel according to Saint Matthew," "The Gospel according to Saint Mark," "The Gospel

according to Saint Luke," and "The Gospel according to Saint John," there are many others. Even though they aren't written down as gospels there is a lot we know about these people. There is the "Gospel of Saint Augustine," "The Gospel of Martin Luther," "The Gospel of Dietrich Bonhoeffer." Their lives tell stories of the good news. Their lives tell the gospel story in beautiful ways.

Gospel means, "good news." We see the good news of Jesus Christ reflected in the lives of people we know. Other gospels may not be quite as well-known but just as powerful. How many of you have seen the good news through "The Gospel of Grandma," or "The Gospel according to Uncle Jim," or "The Gospel according to that kid at camp whose name I can't even remember", or the Gospel according to someone else?

Think back over your life to all the people who in some way or another showed you the love of God. It could have been something they did, however insignificant it may have seemed. Their life spoke the gospel to you.

We are all in the process of writing our own gospel. Writing a gospel through our lives is part of being a follower of Jesus. We all have our own stories of experiencing God. Stories are powerful. Storytelling is one of the most basic practices common to all human communities. Stories connect us to one another, to our ancestors, to the world. And to our God.

In our gospel for today, Mark says that when Jesus spoke to the crowds around him, he "spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it; he spoke only in parables." Jesus knew storytelling was a great way to make God's message real to those who were listening.

What chapter did you add to your gospel this week? How did whatever stories that could be told about you reflect your witness to the good news? If last week wasn't great you still have this week!

We all have an amazing ability to affect others' lives, for good or for bad. Jesus is telling us in one of the parables today that the mustard seed, among the smallest seeds, produces the greatest of all shrubs. That means nothing we do in God's name, however small a gesture it may seem, is inconsequential. God can do wonderful things when we plant the seeds!

In your bulletins this morning is a poem called, "The Gospel According to You." I encourage you to read it later today. It recognizes that while we may be familiar with stories like, "The Gospel according to my Sunday School Teacher," "The Gospel of Mom", or "The Gospel of a friend", you too, are writing a gospel in how you live out your faith.

The last verse of that poem goes:

"You are writing each day a letter to others, Take care that the writing is true. It's the only gospel some people may read, The gospel according to you."

We have the good news, the gospel, that God loves us so much that Jesus was sent so we can have eternal life, now and later. My hope and prayer are that others see the love of God radiating through the gospels of our lives. May the love of God and Jesus Christ always shine through the Gospel According to You!








Kathy has included a page for taking notes while you go through the Worship Devotional and a page to color. It has been found that coloring reduces stress and calms a person.


