Enter a time of quiet contemplation, beautiful music, the glow of candlelight, and a rare opportunity to savor silence in the midst of a busy and often noisy season.

For many people, the music of Advent and Christmas is their favorite music of the year. The UPC Choir is currently preparing beautiful music for the Advent and Christmas seasons here at University Presbyterian Church. On November 27, the First Sunday of Advent, the choir will sing "Praise My Soul, the King of Heaven". December 4 will include "Of the Father's Love Begotten" accompanied by handbells. An old French melody, "Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence" featuring Sarah Smith and the choir will be sung of December 11. The Fourth Sunday of Advent, December 18, will feature the UPC Choir accompanied by organ, two violins, and a cello, singing the beautiful and joyful "In Dulci Jubilo" by Dietrich Buxtehude. Although originally this text was sung both in Latin and German "alternately, we will be singing a translation in English. Most of us know this melody as, "Good Christian's All Rejoice. Please join us throughout the Advent season as we present the story of Jesus' birth through choral music!



The Incarnation—God come to earth in human form to be baptized, teach, heal, eat, and die—is what we celebrate at Christmas, and Mark shows us just how radical and celebration-worthy it is! *Holy Disruption* presents a fresh understanding of the holiness of Christmas grounded, not in a conventional cozy Christmas message, but through Mark's disquieting gospel which invites its readers to experience God's disruptive but transformative love for us and our world.

This year our church will use the season of Advent to facilitate conversation and connection to each other and the meaning of this time in the church year.
