

# A Report from Howard Henry and Lee Ann Grace From Their Border Ministry with Frontera de Cristo 2023



# Report #1:

Friday, January 13, 2023 – Our casita has three rooms (kitchen with small dining table, living room, bedroom) and a bathroom. A small bakelite wall element heated by gas is our source of warmth. It works well. We have access to a washer and drier located in the house immediately in front of us that gives onto  $12^{\text{th}}$  Street.

We have (thankfully) a lighter schedule than in 2022, teaching ESL every day but starting at noon on Monday and finishing by noon on Thursday and Friday. We have a Monday 4 to 8 p.m. shift at the Migrant Resource Center (MRC) and get up at 4:15 a.m. on Thursday to assist there from 6 to 8.

Mechanical problems with two vehicles have us again using the 14-passenger bus to go to the border, whereupon we walk across the line to the MRC and get picked up and taken to the Café Justo y Más coffeehouse, where we offer the ESL lessons.

We have been tired, adjusting to the thinner air (4,032 feet elevation), the two-hour time difference, and recuperating from travel, setting up house, and figuring out lesson plans for 10 people (and an 11<sup>th</sup> to come, and even adding the woman we work with on Thursday morning at the MRC).

Our friends are warm and inviting. Our student David (he and his family are from Colombia but are vital members of the Frontera team) picked us up in Phoenix on Saturday and drove us to Douglas. He has been our primary chauffeur. Jack (retired Mennonite minister) and Linda started us off with some food and JUST COFFEE at their casita. We celebrated a *rosca de Reyes* {Three Kings bread) gathering with Joca.

We went to First Presbyterian Church Douglas on Sunday and swelled the attendance by 20% just by walking in the door. We were unsure of the time and thus showed up a half-hour late. The minister welcomed us. Later, at coffee, one of the church members said to us, "I didn't turn around to see who had come in, but once we started singing, I knew who it was."

Thank you for your prayers for us and for the migrants and for all who are working to care for them and to make them safe. Thank you to Jerilyn, who year after year looks after the house and the mail for us and gives us a sense of ease about being away.

#### Frontera de Cristo 2023

### Report #2

Friday, January 20, 2023 - We have to be fluid. We didn't have our accommodation in the casita finalized until just the last week or so before we arrived. The Frontera van is not working. They don't know what is the problem. We can use the bus to get us here and there in town (Douglas) and even took it to Bisbee for some computer repair shopping. Joca's pickup truck, our anticipated transport in Agua Prieta, is not starting. It could be the battery but David has been so busy he hasn't had time to take it into the shop.

Mondays we go in late because we work until 8 pm at the Migrant Resource Center (MRC). Sam Pendergast, a PCUSA minister from the Utica area, and his wife, Cynthia, have just retired and have come to Frontera to live in Agua Prieta and serve for a year with Frontera. They have their car. Sam picks us up mid-morning on Mondays at the MRC and drives us to the coffee shop (Café Justo y Mas) so we can give our ESL classes.

Tuesday, David picks us up at 8 at the MRC and begins his 8 o'clock lesson in the car as he takes us to the coffee house. On Wednesday we are driven to the coffee shop by Catherine May and Dan Abbott, from Tempe, a couple filling in part-time for Mark Adams and Miriam Maldonado, the US co-missionary husband and wife team who are on mission interpretation for the year.

We do an MRC shift on Thursday morning from 6 to 8 a.m. and then Monica, who serves with us, drives us to the coffee shop in her car. We have added her as a student when we are not occupied otherwise with serving migrants. On Thursday mornings there are usually a number of migrants who have stayed overnight In the MRC and we feed them coffee and tortas (sandwiches) for breakfast. Or maybe it will be chicken. Or maybe rice and some form of protein. Sometimes food donations are dropped off. If not, it will be tortas. Bean tortas. Cheese tortas. Other fillings. We keep 80 ready to go, and always a full coffee pot.

David picks us up at 7:50 or so on Fridays (from the MRC). Class begins when we get in the car. We get to the coffee shop by 8 and Lee Ann meets with a new student while I talk with David.

It's takes the whole team to get us back to the garita (sentry box) / gate to re-enter the US. Most frequently it is David, but Alex has driven us, and Adrian, and today Joca, and Sam, and....

Last minute responsibilities can interrupt our class schedule and send our students off to other meetings or other needs that require fixing. We take a book or other paperwork to keep us occupied when such occurs.

Fluid, fluid, fluid. But we are grateful that we have friends to help in such matters and we have a warm place to stay and enough food to eat and adequate layers to fend off the cold or adapt to the warming of the day, and we can take a shower, and a couple of years back we bought ourselves bedroom slippers. Now THAT is luxury!

#### Frontera 2023

## Report 3- Friday, January 27, 2023

We are kind of tired. We had an extra meeting last night at the Migrant Resource Center—a monthly event—that made our day at least 11 hours, from 6 a.m. to 5 p.m. and beyond. We get up at 4:30. Usually we wind up around noon on a Thursday. The two-hour 6 to 8 morning shift is at the Migrant Resource Center (MRC) which has cold floors and not much heat. Yesterday our toes got very cold; today it was our fingers.

It has been cold this week. It was 18 degrees in the morning on Wednesday, 21 on Thursday and 24 today. Our heater is a gas space heater, not electric as I may have earlier reported, and to safeguard against CO we keep a window open in the kitchen. If the heater is off at night it makes for quite a cold morning. This morning we put on our winter jackets while starting the coffee and making breakfast.

Thankfully, we have hot water, so sponge baths and shaving are manageable. Once the weather warms up we can again take showers during the week as well as on the weekends.

My (Howard's) daily attire for those extra cold days is now a long-sleeved t-shirt, a heavy flannel shirt, a zip up sweater, a second zip up sweater, a winter jacket, two knit hats, jeans, hiking boots, cotton gloves. Hands get cold with cotton gloves but they are more practical, more easily removable and stowable. Lee Ann does not layer up as much as Howard but takes a heavy knit ruana to put on when she takes off her winter jacket in the coffeehouse. Large mugs of cappuccino or café con leche help warm us up before classes begin.

Classes are going well. We are committed to keeping our Thursday and Friday afternoons free so as not to tire ourselves out. The monthly MRC meeting will be our only exception. We will only have one more of those, on the last Thursday of February.

I am writing this at the Frontera de Cristo office where we have come for wi-fi access. Lee Ann has a report to complete for opera funding. Additionally, she has a Zoom meeting with a friend each Friday afternoon and the office is really the only place where she can do it.

With our limited shifts, we haven't seen the numbers of migrants that we saw last year. The numbers seem down overall, but overnight on Thursday they received 86 people. We had six women come during our 6-8 "turno." They asked for gloves, which we did not have, so Lee Ann gave them some "footie"-socks to put on their hands which were at least better than nothing. Small socks fit small hands.

We are seeing single folks, mostly from Mexico and/or Guatemala. They are mostly small in stature and to us seem unthreatening. They need a respite, short-term shelter, a toilet, food, something warm to drink, a kindly reception. They thank us for the little we are able to do for them and offer "Que Dios les bendiga" (May God bless you) on their way out.

This winter weather is draining on body and soul. I think to myself, you have to be very crazy or very desperate to expose yourself to this weather with so little clothing, so little food, and with so much rejection of your efforts to make your and your family's lives safe and better. We do not see craziness in these migrants.
