

Getting to know one of our own David Winiarski



Although Dave has been with us for a while, due to all the confusion with Covid and lockdowns I hadn't gotten around to interviewing our sexton, David Winiarski. until now. So please forgive me and enjoy learning about our sexton.

Dave is a homegrown and lifelong Buffalonian, the eldest of two younger brothers. He graduated from Emerson Vocational High School with a regent's diploma in drafting and tool design. He was raised Catholic, and became a member at St. John Kanty's Church when he married his first wife. They raised their five children in the Broadway/Bailey area. While they were attending grammar school he was involved with the home school Association. He also became a member of the school board that was formed to consolidate the remaining catholic elementary schools on the east side and city line limit of Cheektowaga. In 1991 they made a move to West Seneca and joined St. Gabriel's Church where he is still a member. He became involved with St. Adalbert's Church when his son married and he helped his new in-laws as they worked to help keep the parish open. He has a history of ties with St Adalbert's since both sets of his grandparents attended there after relocating from Poland. His father, aunts and uncles were baptized there. He currently works with other volunteers in order to keep the Basilica building and the grounds clean.

After high school, his first job was at Tops, where he worked his way up to assistant manager at the Broadway Market location. After leaving there he started at Buffalo Electric Inc., ordering and receiving material for the custom panels they built while utilizing his drafting skills. In time he was promoted to making the quotes for all the projects they had bid on and after thirteen years the business closed. With the contacts he had made previously, he was able to land a job as a salesman handling contractors at Wehle Electric. After seven years, he moved to WESCO Distribution working in the same capacity and retired in 2018 after 20 years in that position.

After twenty-six years of marriage Dave lost his first wife to cancer. They had six grandchildren which have kept him very busy through the years. After the loss of his first wife, Dave met our former secretary Denise, and was fortunate enough to share sixteen years of marriage with her. At the time of her passing, our congregation was looking to replace our former sexton Joe Maiwald. Tracy asked Dave if he was willing to take on the part time position. Since he was familiar with the congregation and the building, he agreed.

Working at UPC gives him the opportunity to use his skills to help the congregation, in return for all the support given to him during the loss of his wife. Dave was brought up to be kind and helpful; whenever there's a need and he can assist, he will do it. -Amy Erickson

Dear Friends,

In the book of Acts, the story of Pentecost tells of the amazing way the Holy Spirit pulled together a fragmented and frightened group of Jesus' followers, resting on them and filling them with fresh ways to speak the good news of God's love. The story is toid in a way that reminds believers of the old story of the tower of Babel in Genesis, where the unity and common purpose of humanity was shattered through pride, misunderstanding and confusion. It was a disaster that shattered human community. I am thinking today how that old story unfolds again and again in the disasters we witness ~the ongoing ravages of war and civil conflict in Ukraine, Syria, Tigray, the Democratic Republic of Congo and others; tired and fearful refugees from North Africa, Cameroon, Latin America, and Eastern Europe; the hard, ongoing work of recovery after fires in the West and humicanes in the Gulf and Caribbean, and the fearful vulnerability of communities shattered by the ferocious Intensification of incidents of mass gun violence.

Yet, I am also filled with gratitude for the ways that *new story of* Pentecost is also unfolding, as good news is demonstrated, transcending differences of language, culture and race, through the gifts, prayers, and volunteer hours of so many in the Presbyterian family. By your generous gift to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, you have spoken the language of love in a tangible, impactful way, offering a gift that helps to bring renewed hope and joy to those individuals and communities suffering from disaster and its aftermath. On behalf of them, we thank you.

I rejoice in the PCUSA's partnership with friends like you, who, along with our ancestors in the early church, gave when asked and served with compassion and faithfulness.

Please know that your gift of \$3,905 on 5/23/2022 for DR000156 blesses those who walk the hard road toward recovery, letting them know they are not alone, helping them to find hope in the midst of chaos, and making real the promise of Pentecost—the tangible demonstration of the "mighty acts of God" in healing and restoration...in the language each one needs most to hear.
