THE CONFESSION AND PARDON

The Invitation[†] (John 3:19, CEB; Eph. 3:12)

The Gospel of John tells us the basis for our judgment is this: "The light came into the world, and people loved darkness more than the light, for their actions are evil." We confess our sins to God, to whom we have access through faith in Christ. We come in boldness and confidence, not according to our merit, but according to God's grace.

Forgive us, we pray, for hiding in the darkness of this world more than loving the light of your righteousness made known to us in Jesus Christ. Judge us with mercy, we pray, and extend your grace to us. Strengthen our faithfulness to you and to all who are precious in your sight. We pray in the name of Christ, our Light. Amen.
