MESSAGE FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

With great pleasure, I present to you the 2022-2023 Annual Report.

The last fiscal year went so fast. ECNWCI saw a steady increase in client numbers, completion of a new project, increase in partnerships and collaboration, more community connections and strengthening of existing partnerships.

Our agency noticed a steady increase of individuals choosing to live in the region whether they come as international students, temporary foreign workers, through family reunification and the Canada Ukraine Authorization for Emergency Travel (CUAET). We also observed an increase in the number of immigrants moving from other provinces.

The Economic Recovery Work Experience initiative was completed on December 31, 2022. It was our first opportunity to deliver an employment project and we learned tremendously from it. We hope that this experience has proven that we can handle an employment program.



Partnership and collaboration seem to be the magic words in 2022-2023. Agencies were eager to form alliance with other agencies to reach a common goal for our common clientele. It was not an "us and them" attitude anymore but a "we" approach to reach our common objective. Partnerships were of various sizes and degrees but the key thing was agencies were communicating and open to new cooperation.

There was also a downside to the reawakening of economy. ECNWCI experienced the highest turnover since the start of its operation. Five staff members bid goodbye to the agency in a span of 7 months due to relocation and employment opportunities. Competition for the right qualified staff was the biggest challenge we faced. We are very grateful to the staff members who stepped up to assist and support the clients meant for those vacant positions. They were so remarkable and kept their spirits and energy high in spite of the additional workload.

To our volunteer board of directors, we truly appreciate your support. Your perspective, your patience and your quidance have been a blessing.

Thank you to the continued supports from the Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada and the Ministry of Immigration and Career Training. We would not have the opportunity to serve our clients well without your assistance.

Settlement and integration of immigrants in the small centres has not been viewed as critical in the past. Today, the success of settlement of immigrants in small centres is considered a vital pathway to the success of the immigration program in the nation.


















OUR PROGRAM AND SERVICES

The Settlement Worker in Schools (SWIS) program plays a crucial role in assisting newcomer children and their families, while our Employment Program endeavor aids individuals in finding meaningful employment opportunities. COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS

The primary role of the CCW department is to act as a bridge between the community and the services available to Newcomers.

What is Community Connections Programming?

Community Connections programming aims to foster strong connections between individuals and their communities. This service is designed to connect newcomers with social and professional networks, community organizations, resources, events, and activities.

Community Connections provides support to individuals in various aspects of their lives, including but not limited to:

- · Networking activity with other newcomers or Canadian citizens

Community Connections is funded by Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC). Through our Community Connections service, we strive to facilitate positive and meaningful relationships between individuals and their communities, ultimately contributing to a healthier and happier society.

In November 2022, we hired a new staff member in the position of Community Connections Worker, meet Ruel Guthrie.

Ruel has exceptional interpersonal skills, gained from his fouryear career in sales and finance. He is a great fit for the community connections worker position because of his passion for making long-lasting changes, excellent organizational skills, and cultural awareness.








EAST CENTRAL SASAKATCHEWAN IMMIGRATION PARTNERSHIP WEBSITE UPDATE

In September of 2021, after research identified a need for a local immigration partnership, a huge step forward was taken towards creating more welcoming and inclusive communities throughout East Central Saskatchewan by starting a Local Immigration Partnership which is known as East Central Saskatchewan Immigration Partnership (ECSIP).

In order to promote the settlement and integration of newcomers ECSIP embarked on updating our website.





EMPLOYMENT PROJECT COMPLETED

The Economic Recovery Work Experience Initiative was a one-time pandemic recovery project for employers and job seekers. The initiative helped fund paid work-placements for participants in priority sectors - Accommodation and Food Services, Agriculture, Retail Services, Health, IT, Childcare, other sectors identified with a need. Aligning opportunities with priority fields supports economic recovery by providing employers with access to new talent and ensuring more underrepresented people gain the practical skills that work experiences provide.

This Economic Recovery Work Experience Initiative is different in that the employer was not required to make any application. The project was administered by East Central Newcomer Welcome Centre Inc. (ECNWCI) and was expedient for the employers as ECNWCI did the job matching. ECNWCI worked with and managed the agreement with employers for individual work experiences, including the fade of financial support. ECNWCI's Employment Coordinator provided employers and participants with support. The number of weeks was negotiated up to a total of 16 weeks and, the starting hourly wage must be at least the provincial minimum wage.

On January 17, 2022, The East Central Newcomer Welcome Centre officially received the funding to deliver the program by helping 25 clients find employment in the region. To help deliver the program, an Employment Coordinator (EC) was hired. By the third month, interested employers started to contact the EC. A total of 14 employers participated and 27 clients registered to the project. Most of the employers were referred by the Ministry of Immigration and Career Training and were in the accommodation, food services and manufacturing sectors.

At the end of the project, 14 clients completed the 16-week paid work placement and continued to be employed by the same employer. A few clients dropped out from the project due to reasons such as relocation to other provinces, returned to school, found other employment and disengaged for unknown reasons.

We considered that the project was a success in spite of the clients dropping out because the employers got an opportunity to assess job seeker skills and match for their organization for up to 16 weeks at a minimal cost to them; the job seeker had an opportunity to prove their skills and had an opportunity to obtain sustainable employment; ECNWCI received an employment outcome with their client; and priority sectors in Saskatchewan were supported in connecting job seekers and employers.





THE QUEEN ELIZABETH II'S PLATINUM JUBILEE AWARD

Our Executive Director Edith Monteclaros was recognized and awarded The Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee Medal for outstanding contribution in public service to Canada, Saskatchewan, and particularly Yorkton and surrounding areas.

Edith is a highly accomplished individual with an impressive 15-year track record in the settlement and integration industry. Her extensive knowledge and unwavering commitment to this field have positioned her as an invaluable resource to the community of Yorkton and the surrounding areas.

Settlement Services started in 2008 in East Central Saskatchewan at Partners in Settlement and Integration, where she worked as a Senior Settlement Supervisor for many years.

Her expertise in navigating the complexities of settlement and integration led her to launch a non-profit organization in 2018, which is dedicated to supporting individuals and families new to Canada, to meet their social, educational and employment goals, leading to opportunities for success.




OUR IMPACT

Diversity in East Central Saskatchewan






SERVICE INQUIRIES

The East Central Newcomer Welcome Centre Inc. offers a diverse range of communication channels to reach out and explore our services. Notably, during the period of 2022–2023, a significant 32.29% of inquiries were received through phone calls, demonstrating a clear preference for direct conversation. In-person inquiries accounted for 54.57%, underscoring the importance of face-to-face interactions. Surprisingly, email and social media inquiries combined constituted a mere 2%, indicating a lower reliance on technology for messaging.

Within the span of 2022–2023, our office received a remarkable total of 3,788 service inquiries. Unsurprisingly, the most prevalent inquiries centered around the Settlement Process, indicating a pressing need for assistance in this area. Following closely behind were inquiries concerning the Immigration Process, reflecting the significance of this topic among our clientele. TOP COUNTRY OF ORIGIN

In the fiscal year 2022-2023, Ukraine emerged as the leading country of origin for our newly arrived clients, accounting for 30% of the total. The Philippines secured the second position with 23%, while India stood third with 19%. These three countries consistently maintain their top three rankings in terms of the origin of our clients who settle in East Central Saskatchewan.

LANGUAGES PRESENT IN OUR AREA

The term "mother tongue" refers to the language that an individual learns as a child, typically from their parents, and is also known as their native language.

Among our clients, Ukrainian was the most frequently reported "mother tongue" language in 2022-2023. This aligns with the fact that Ukraine was also the top country of origin. Ukrainian is an East Slavic language belonging to the Indo-European language family. It serves as the native language for approximately 40 million people and is the official state language of Ukraine. Written Ukrainian utilizes a variant of the Cyrillic script.

Tagalog is the second most commonly reported language among our clients. It is an Austronesian language spoken primarily by the ethnic Tagalog people, who comprise a significant portion of the population of the Philippines. Additionally, Tagalog serves as a second language for the majority of Filipinos. Its standardized form, officially known as Filipino, is the national language of the Philippines and is one of the two official languages, alongside English.

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STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY

To the Members of the East Central Newcomer Welcome Centre Inc.:

Management is responsible for preparation and presentation of the accompanying financial statements, including responsibility for significant accounting judgments and estimates in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. This responsibility includes selecting appropriate accounting principles and methods, and making decisions affecting the measurement of transactions in which objective judgment is required.

In discharging its responsibilities for the integrity and fairness of the financial statements, management designs and maintains the necessary accounting systems and related internal controls to provide reasonable assurance that transactions are authorized, assets safeguarded and financial records are properly maintained to provide reliable information for the preparation of financial statements.

The Board is composed entirely of Members who are neither management nor employees of the organization. The Board is responsible for overseeing management in the performance of its financial reporting responsibilities, and for approving the financial information included in the annual report. The Board fulfills these responsibilities by reviewing the financial information prepared by management and discussing relevant matters with management and external auditors. The Board is also responsible for recommending the appointment of the organization's external auditors.

Sensus Chartered Professional Accountants Ltd., an independent firm of Chartered Professional Accountants, is appointed by the Board to audit the financial statements and report directly to them: their report follows. The external auditors have full and free access to, and meet periodically and separately with, both the Board and management to discuss their audit findings.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board Members of: East Central Newcomers Welcome Centre Inc. Yorkton, Saskatchewan

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of East Central Newcomer Welcome Centre Inc., which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2023 and the statement of operations and changes in net assets, and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of East Central Newcomer Welcome Centre Inc. as at March 31, 2023, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements section of our report. We are independent of East Central Newcomer Welcome Centre Inc. in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing East Central Newcomer Welcome Centre Inc.'s ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate East Central Newcomer Welcome Centre Inc. or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing East Central Newcomer Welcome Centre Inc.'s financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.







As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian auditing standards, we exercise our professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to
 fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit
 evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not
 detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as
 fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of
 internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures
 that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the
 effectiveness of the East Central Newcomer Welcome Centre Inc.'s internal control.

However, future events or conditions may cause the East Central Newcomer Welcome Centre Inc. to cease to continue as a going concern.

 disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events
 in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

1. DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION

East Central Newcomer Welcome Centre Inc. provides services to immigrants, newcomers and refugees towards their smoother settlement and integration in their new community. The organization is exempt from income taxes under paragraph 149(1)(I) of the *Income Tax Act*.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. The following are considered to be the more significant accounting policies:

Revenue recognition

East Central Newcomer Welcome Centre Inc. follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred.

Grants are recognized as revenue when the amounts are known, entitlement to the funding is established, and the expenses to which the funding received have been incurred.

Government programs include COVID-19 temporary wage subsidy and is recorded when the related payroll expenses have been incurred.

Contributions of cash to purchase depreciable assets or donations of the depreciable capital asset themselves are recognized over the useful life of the asset on the same basis as amortization on the asset. Donations of material and equipment are reported at fair market value.

Capital assets

Capital assets are initially recorded at cost. Amortization is recorded using the straight-line method. The rates are intended to amortize the cost of asset over their estimated useful lives.

Use of estimates

The preparation of these financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Significant estimates include those used when accounting for amortization of capital assets. All estimates are reviewed periodically and adjustments are made to the statements of operations as appropriate in the year they become known.

8. RELATED PARTIES

During the year, the organization had transactions with IRCC and ICT which are considered to be related parties as they provide funding to East Central Newcomer Welcome Centre Inc and have significant influence over the organization. Funding received during the year were grants in the amount of \$435,097 (2022 - \$457,945) from IRCC and \$265,470 (2022 - \$276,757) from ICT. The amount of grant revenue received in excess of expenses incurred has been recorded as deferred revenue to be recognized in future periods. These transactions are in the normal course of operations and are measure at the exchange value (the amount of consideration established and agreed to by the related parties), which approximates the arm's length equivalent value.

9. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The organization is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments.

Credit risk

East Central Newcomer Welcome Centre Inc. does not provide credit to its clients.

For grants receivable, the organization assesses, on a continuous basis, amounts receivable on the basis of amounts it is virtually certain to receive based on their estimated realizable value.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk of being unable to meet cash requirements or fund obligations as they become due. It stems from the possibility of delay in realizing the fair value of financial instruments. Liquidity risk has increased from the prior year due to an increase in amounts paid to suppliers and employees and a decrease in amounts received from funders.

The organization manages its liquidity risk by constantly monitoring cash flows and financial liability maturities.

Accounts payable are generally paid within 30 days.

10. BUDGET

The budget figures presented for comparative purposes are unaudited and are those approved by the funding organizations.

11. COMMITMENTS
