Today is Sunday, September 20th. The 25th Sunday in ordinary time and the 15th Sunday after Pentecost.

Our initial reopening plan as approved by Session was returned by Presbytery with four comments to address to gain their approval. We are addressing those and we are reapplying to confirm their completion. Pending their approval our tentative live service date is October 4th.

In preparation for that date lighted Exit signs are being installed above the doors, an ultraviolet light air cleaner will be fitted to the HVAC system, and a professional cleaning service will conduct an initial cleansing and sanitization of the sanctuary and CE building.

We are also meeting with an Audio-Visual Professional to design and implement a system that will improve our online streaming effort and quality. The new setup will allow us to simultaneously steam on our YouTube Channel & Facebook. Once that is in place the Zoom option will be discontinued.




It's All in Your Approach



This Tomato Soup recipe from Janet Parker checks off all of those bullet points, and it provides the perfect solution about what to do with the last of your Summer Garden Tomatoes. Bring them in from the garden, shake off the chill, and prepare a steaming pot of this delicious warm goodness.

2 T butter

2 T olive oil

2 medium onions, sliced

2 lb fresh tomatoes, peeled and quar-

1 (6 oz.) can tomato paste

2 T fresh basil 4 T fresh thyme

3 C chicken broth

1 t salt

1/2 t pepper

In large saucepan, combine butter and oil. Heat until butter melts. Add onions and cook until tender. Stir in tomatoes, tomato paste, basil, and thyme. Mash tomatoes slightly. Add chicken broth and bring to boil. Reduce heat; cover and simmer 40 minutes. Puree in blender. Return to sauce pan reheat and serve.
























Offerings
