Angels We Have Heard (Or Have We?) Randy York

I know. I know. It's not even Thanksgiving and I'm beginning to look a lot like Christmas. Barbara has been experiencing her seasonal angst during our walks lately as some neighbors string their lights and trim their trees while we still have cornstalks and pumpkins on our porch. Yet though I use the carol as a banner for these thoughts,

my principal consideration is that of angels themselves. Part of the definition of these heavenly residents suggests that they offer comfort and aid to others in time of trouble. With that in mind, the story begins.



Our sister in Christ, Polly Grobelny, has been dealing with the effects from exposure to the virus for the past few weeks and it's good to report that she is doing well and healing nicely. I called Polly this past Sunday ostensibly to offer comfort, check on her status, and possibly minister to her needs. Thirty minutes later, she had instead ministered to me.

We spoke about all the prayers being offered for her healing and she said, "You know you can't pray too much, because after the prayer moves the healing, the rest spills over into other lives." The power of that insight swept over me, one of those "pressed down, shaken together, running into other lives" thoughts.

Most times we pray at a certain time or for a certain reason and then check the box, "I said I would, and I did" and move on. Prayer though should be a constant conversation in our relationship with an Abba Father God. He makes daily deposits of grace and mercy in our lives and in a manner of speaking our conversation, our prayer, is the interest that accrues from those spiritual assets. When it comes to prayer, we should be extravagant. We should go beyond what is deserved and just let go. We should pray from a heart sharing in the need, considering the experience of the folks we lift up. We should let our joy in and with our creator flow out. But wait, doesn't that presuppose joy with God being alive in us? It most certainly does.

As Granny Clampett sang, you've gotta have that "Joy, joy, joy, joy down in your heart." So you say, "Just a second Randy. Perhaps you need to look around. There's a lot going on socially, economically, politically, and one thing it's not is joyful." Point taken. But to quote a certain purveyor of discord, "That's all fake news." That's the world.

Lemon Meringue Pie

"I have made these pies for many years for our roast beef dinners, etc. at church."

Editor's note: Anna brings 2 pies to our church dinners because 1 pie is always grabbed up by the staff and doesn't make it out of the kitchen.

2 baked 9" pie shells

3 T shortening

8 T flour

6 T cornstarch

2 C sugar

1/2 t salt

4 C water (total)

4 egg yolks-beaten

2 lemons—juice of 2 (1 lemon = ap-

proximately ¼ cup) and grated rind of 1 lemon

MERINGUE for 2 pies:

4 egg whites (I usually increase this for a fuller pie)

4 T 10X sugar (or regular)

In a double boiler heat 3 cups of water and add shortening. Mix dry ingredients. Beat egg yolks with 1 cup of water. Add dry ingredients to yolks and water (I use a whisk). When water and shortening are hot, add a few tablespoons of water and shortening mix to eggs and return to double boiler. Cook and stir until thick. Remove from heat and add lemon juice and rind. Pour into pie shells. Top with meringue. Brown in oven at 350°. (Makes 2).



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COVID Update

Below is an email from the Presbytery regarding the latest on the Virus. At present there is no change on how we are conducting worship. Though if events warrant, then the Session will take all appropriate actions for the safety of everyone.

As a personal note, I encourage everyone to go to the New Jersey State website and follow the link to download the FREE COVID Alert NJ App to their phone. Here is the link: https://covid19.nj.gov/pages/app.

How it Works:

Download COVID Alert NJ on the App Store or Google Play Store. Opt-in to receive "Exposure Notifications"

- 1. As you go about your day, the app will use Bluetooth to sense any **"close contacts"**—other app users who are within 6 feet of you for 15 minutes or more within a 24-hour period
- 2. When your app senses a close contact, your phone will **exchange a secure random code** with the close contact's phone. It's important to note that your location and name are never disclosed
- 3. If you test **positive for COVID-19**, a public health representative will call you and ask if you're willing to **anonymously notify your "close contacts"** by uploading your app's close contact codes Each day, the app will compare your list of close contact codes to the list of codes associated with positive COVID-19 app users. **If there's a match you will get an Exposure Alert**, along with appropriate next steps
